The rules of slalom

Each competitor must negotiate the set sequence of gates, laid out over the rapids, in as fast a time as possible. His score for the run is the time he takes plus any penalties incurred by not passing a gate correctly, viz:

PENALTY:

10 seconds: for touching one pole from the inside of the gate

20 seconds: for touching two poles from the inside

50 seconds: incurred if only the boat or the body passes between the poles

100 seconds: incurred for ommitting a gate

Each competitor has two runs over the course, his lowest score counting for the results list. A gate marked with an 'R' must be taken in reverse, and one marked with a 'T' means that during the team event, when there are three competitors on the course, all three must pass through the gate within 15 seconds otherwise a further penalty of 50 seconds is incurred.

Liangollen Town Slalom

The event this weekend is the third in the 1968 series to decide the British National Championships, the fourth and final slalom being held on November 2nd and 3rd, on the rapids at the Chain Bridge Hotel near Llangollen.

A number of the classes are being contested, the most important of which is the men's kayak event. This is being held on Sunday with two runs over the course for each competitor, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. The best run of each competitor is taken into account and the man with the lowest score at the end of the day is the winner. In the men's kayak event the paddlers to watch are Dave Mitchell (Chester Canoe Club), who is at present leading the championship table, Ken Langford (Manchester), John Woodhouse (Chester), and Richard Prince (Manchester). Any of these could win the event, but others with promise who could spring a surprise are Chris Skellern (Worcester), Raymond Calverley (Manchester), and Tony Young (Leeds).

The Ladies event follows the men's kayaks with a greatly reduced number of entrants. The battle for first place will be no less intense, however, and the girls to watch are Pauline Squires (Leamington), Heather Goodman (Lakeland), and Audrey Keerie (Sunderland), all members of the British team.

On Saturday the competition for single and double Canadians is being held: these are known as C.1.s and C.2.s and have only recently been introduced to this country although the class has been popular on the continent for many years. The difference between the Canadian canoe and the more usual kayak is that the canoe is paddled from a kneeling position with a single blade and thus calls for a more sophisticated technique. In the C.2 doubles the main battle is expected between Witter/Woodhouse (Chester) and Court/Goodwin (North Staffs. Polytechnic), both crews being currently in the British team.

In the C.1 event the most skilful paddler is acknowledged to be Geoff Dinsdale (Chalfont Park), but several people have been training hard for this event and he may not have things all his own way.

The prize-giving in the station is being preceded by the draw for a raffle which has been run this season in order to raise money to send competitors to the 1969 World Championships which will be held in the French Alps. The canoe manufacturers have donated many valuable prizes and it is expected that the raffle will have raised a very worthwhile sum.

Safety Precautions

The slalom will be run to the rules of the B.C.U. as stated in the slalom year cook. Crash helmets will be compulsory and the organisers can accept no responsibility for loss or damage to competitors or equipment—howsoever caused.
