EDITORIAL

Happy New Year to you all! The first half of the domestic season seems to have passed very quickly ... and was in my opinion a success in the face of adversity in the form of the drought (now forgotten) that removed three Washburn events from the calendar (we also lost the first Usk race for other reasons).

The November races were accompanied by very good water levels PLUS mild weather (especially Aire 2, Wharfe 1, Dee 1 & Tees 1).

The split Div "A" season with three races upto December 9th appeared to be well received ... although it may have been even better had Tees 1 been the Div "A" (only a handful took advantage of the first Tees to practice for the Div "A"). Bill Fraser invites your comments on this or any aspect of the calendar.

The Dart appeared a fine Div A venue in most opinions ... with the organisers very keen to tighten up their performance in the light of this first Div "A" experience. With high water it could be our BEST Div A race whilst at a medium/low level it provided entertaining canoeing.

The Dee Regional (December 16) was very efficiently organised by Henry Syska with the cooperation of Tim Cannon (Manchester CC). At least four regions made serious attempts to field full teams and the competition was made especially intense because Henry was able to publish the "half-time" scores between the Individuals and the Teams (See Report). Some people did however feel that the Regional might best have been combined with the Div "A" in early November for maximum participation. Comments to Henry or to Bill Fraser.

Individual race attendances, especially at Div "C" level have been UP. Perhaps the Washburn cancellations forced paddlers to break their habits ... certainly Ironbridge 1 was a fine flat water event. Meanwhile three Lowenbrau 500 events have been held at Wharfe, Dart and Teme with especially good competition at the Dart.

Coming up in January we have two new and accessible Div "C" races (Thames & Goyt) plus the AGM at Dee 3 (Sat 19th at 4.30). There is the inevitable contentious issue to liven things up - provided this year by Denis Cooper. Along with Mike Phillp, Denis is lobbying for a revision of the 1985 World Champs Selection Policy - see his article in this Issue. High drama is virtually guaranteed, especially as it is rumoured that the Team Manager along with some class coaches and Exec members may resign forthwith if the Cooper motion is upheld. My only comment is that I don't recollect willing administrators being in very plenteous supply in this sport (or any other for that matter)!

There were many chilly swims during practice on Saturday. The conditions did not deter Richard Fox who won the Open Event from Andrew Martin and Melvin Swallow by an impressive fourteen seconds. No doubt prospective Team paddlers are hoping that Richard restricts his interest in WW Racing to Rapid Racing.

The Regional Event turned into a duel between the efficiently organised Nort West Region, well represented in all the classes, and the Kl strength of West Midlands Region, with Combined Services pressing them hard. 

LOWENBRAU 500 LEADERS






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ISSUE 7 PRIZE CROSSWORD SOLUTION

Some points for discussion at the W.W. AGM, DEE III, January 19th 1985

This year's 1985 Wild Water Racing A.G.M. Agenda contains a proposal regarding British Team selection policy for 1985. This policy is stated in the 1984-1985 WW Race year book; briefly:- British Team selection takes place in Southern Germany (Garmisch, river Loisach) in April and is followed by a compulsory 4 days paddling.

The policy was finalised and apparently ratified in June 1984. Limited finance, for the selection event, is available to some pre-selected paddlers.

1984 Team paddlers were aware of the policy (which was formulated mostly by some of the regional coaches) at the pre-world championships in June 1984, some discussions took place and some opposition was made.

The proposal included in the 1985 A.G.M. Agenda is:-

This meeting finds the selection policy for the 1985 W.W. World Championships unsatisfactory and directs that the selection event be held in Great Britain.

Some of the points made for the present selection policy are:-

There is no guaranteed water release on the Tryweryn at selection time.

Selection is on the same course as the World Championships.

Some of the points made against the present selection policy are:-

Heavy water is unlikely on the Loisach, which is a British type river in terms of depth, flow, equipment required etc. paddlers that do well at home should also do well on the Loisach.

The slalom team are selecting on the Tryweryn.

A foreign selection camp uses up more of the available resources, both team and personal, than a home selection event.

Equal opportunities are not open to all (DIV A? paddlers) to take part in the selection event and an elitist group tends to be formed into which it is more difficult for up and coming paddlers to break into.

A £10 fee must be paid by paddlers wishing to be considered for selection (£5 if paid before 31st December).

Some prospective team members (i.e. teachers) cannot attend the present selection event without giving up their job.

More prospective team members cannot, or do not want to, attend the compulsory 4 days' training after selection.

Selection camps abroad adversely affect team spirit.

Adverse weather and water conditions may prevail in Southern Germany in April.

A training camp planned to take place after the Bourg (France) selection race in 1983 did not succeed.

The same or a very similar team will be selected whether selected at home or abroad.

For the best world championship results, the selection event should cause as little disruption to the paddlers training schedule as possible, a Home selection causes the least disruption.

Free discussion on route finding (important on the Loisach) will not take place during the selection week.

A training camp (rather than a selection camp) at Garmisch will produce better overall world championship results.

This is an important issue for the British WW team, performances are somewhat behind the G.B. Slalom team, do we have the right policies? Make your views known at the A.G.M.

The Denis Cooper Motion :

Some Comments from Nig Morley (National Team Manager)

The Selection Policy for 1985 was finalised on June 15 1984 by the Selection Committee as per the Wild Water Racing Committee Constitution paras. 2.3 and 8.1 and 8.2. This policy has been well published in the Year Book and White Water News, and by myself to 60 interesteed persons.

I assure you that the Committee was well aware of all the points raised in the motion, but the considered view was that the best interests of the Team would be served by holding the Selection Event on the World Championship course for 1985.

The motion is frankly inaccurate in much detail, biased to suit the point of view of what I believe is a small minority and in many ways shows a self centred approach to Team affairs.


Such actions brought about within 16 weeks of selection taking place not only undermine the morals of the competitors aiming for selection but also make the very onerous tasks of the Team management and coaches more difficult to carryout. To put it very blantly I have much better things to do with my time than to spend it typing out a defence of what I firmly believe is a good selection policy. Those who are fortunate enough to gain selection will have worked very hard to achieve that aim and although a selection event on the Loisach is going to be very hard on the paddlers as well as on their equipment, it will be nothing to the effort that will be required of them 5 weeks later in the actual World Chompionship races.

This Team Management has no wish to change the stated policy and would ask for the wholehearted support of the silent majority in confirming its actions.

Some Comments from John Handyside (National Ladies Coach)

The Selection Policy was originally drawn up by myself and then altered in discussion with the regional coaches and some exec members, therefore perhaps I ought to explain the thinking behind it.

The 1985 World Champs is an ideal opportunity to optimise the psychological and physical preparation of the team. WHY? Because of the location and nature of the river Loissach, we shall have had the chance to learn the river completely prior to the final trip for the Championship. Therefore we are in a position to take advantage of the peaking and periodization processes used by athletes and swimmers. They do very little work immediately before the event, concentrating on the final taper, recovery and acclimatization. The better we taper and the fresher we are, the better our results. Incidentally, that is why we shall fly out and stay in a hotel where we are at home (having stayed there for the post-selection training camp).

There are other reasons for planning that training camp immediately after Selection :

1 For the Team to go out any later would definitely interrupt preparation.

2 Realistically our best medal chances are in the Team events. Team event training on the river will be a priority in these days - especially important for C2s (ie big boats). This will also allow people do check out best routes (see Denis' point).

3 We would hope to start functioning as a Team. Team spirit and commitment to a goal beyond our own performance has gone a long way in previous Worlds. Denis suggests that such training camps adversely effect Team spirit - I believe that PEOPLE with adverse attitudes effect Team spirit!

4 Furthermore Management need to get very close to the psychology and needs of the chosen paddlers if they are to be effective under Worlds pressure.

Furthermore there are other reasons for selecting on the Loissach other than tying in with a training camp and therefore finalising river learning prior to the Worlds trip:

1 The water on the Loissach is not likely to be heavy BUT it is still not a British type of river. The turning and boat placement required in the first six minutes (out of approx 17) has no equivalent on the Tryweryn (for example).

2 Paddlers who did well at the Tryweryn selection last year will confess to being amazed how badly they did at the Loissach Pre-Worlds.

3 They would also confirm that racing the Loissach is a world apart from practicing it. Even our most experienced have only done 3 Loissach races (eg 1980 EC, 1984 April, 1984 Pre-Worlds) and some have only done one. The Selection offers TWO truly pressurised races - just like the real thing as opposed to time trials!

Most people have a fascination for the names, events and legends of the past. Taken from Canoeing Magazine, Mike Clark's report on the January Dee race of 1974 involves both legend and famous names. Bill Fraser, Stuart Fisher, Gay Goldsmith, Jim Sibley, George Parr and Denis Cooper are still heavily involved in WWR — as are Jim Dolan, Albert Woods and Alan Edge in Slalom. The legend is the river level for the race and that amazing winning C2 time!

Down River Championships

With Force 9 and Force 10 gales all round the country during the second week in January, plus torrential rain almost across the whole of Britain, it seemed a reasonable chance that the River Dee in North Wales would produce high water for the National Down River Championships held over the weekend 12th/13th January...!

Being at the International Boat Show all the week, Robin Witter came in on the Thursday to say that certainly the Dee was running hard and great water for the event. That settled it, although I had to pack up all the gear on the Canoeing Magazine and not vacate the Exhibition until 7.00 p.m. on the Saturday night, I just had to try and get up there. In fact, I had already booked in at the Bryn DerwenHotel and indicated I expected to be late... Late was right, I cleared Earls Court by 8.00 and managed to crawl into the Bryn by 1.25 a.m...

With the race start not until 10.00 a.m. and the top Down River Class not until 12.00, there was time to look over the course and see what was going to be the best place for photographs. A long walk through thick mud and the occasional heavy shower of rain along the bank opposite the Chain Bridge Hotel gave the only reward of the Serpent's Tail being completey covered by flood water, with all the rocks on the left going downstream being covered. However, just one superb wave and stopper looked as if it would produce a few spectacular shots. Alas the only position below was too low to show the size of the water in any photograph, while above, although very good, one was only going to get canoeists' backs-unless some hapless canoeists went down backwards... With the slalom class paddlers already coming down, I reeled off a few shots, but decided maybe the Town Bridge would give better prints. Indeed the bridge produced some good shots, but the TV cameras (recording for the Grandstand programme of the following weekend) had plugged for the rocks on the right of the Mill Rapid-it seemed like a good idea to join them.

Covering a Down River Race is very difficult. The Llangollen site is only short and it is not possible to follow a paddler down or see him at more than just one place, unlike an L-D, the race is over in a matter of minutes and, with paddlers following at minute intervals, it is impossible to say who is the winner until the results appear. Thus one goes on form and hopes that the right paddlers are captured on film. And when the race is over, what does one report? Joe Bloggs looked great on the water? Or, John Thomas certainly took a wrong line down the main fall? Neither, one reports that.

after almost ten years at the top of rough water sport in Britain, year after year winning the National Slalom Championship and the Down River Championship, Dave Mitchell of the Chester Canoe Club is still the best in the country...!

Your young Avery's, Dolan's and Hignall's, even the great Long Distance and Down River paddler in the shape of Jackson from Grappenhall, could not match the brilliance of Dave Mitchell. With a superb 9min 49sec, Dave took the K1 Championship, just 5sec clear of Jackson in second place. Chris Avery of Guildford took third with a time of 10min 11sec—17sec behind Dave... while less than a minute covered the first ten places. When the chips are down, and the event really counts, Dave still seems to be able to pull it off. Great Dave, just great...

In the Womens K1, it was yet another Championship win for Pauline Goodwin, holding off none other than Peggy Mitchell, while in the Mens C1 the name of Goodwin appears again in first place! Taking the Mens K1 and C1 and the Womens K1, the Championships proved what you might call a family affair with both the Mitchells and Goodwins taking home a 1st and 2nd place...

Sibley/Hewitt took the win in the C2, while in K1 'A' the win went to A. Edge of Manchester with team mate P. Mansell winning the class 'B'

With the water high and spectacular, the rain holding off long enough to get good photographs, certainly the rush up to Llangollen was worth it.

Denis Cooper Motion - John Handyside Comments continued:

We must consider the weather and water level issues raised by Denis very seriously. We can only go on experience - but that is quite well founded as I have been racing the Loissach with Germans for a number of years.

Consider last year for an example. In our April trip we had an excellent range of river levels from high to low. In March Bill Fraser's trip had more snow and a generally lower level but still trained for some days at over the eventual Pre-Worlds June level! No paddling days were missed by either trip.

Finally a word of moderation about the "Compulsory" nature of the post-Selection training camp. Whilst Management really believe the positive value of this - as outlined - noone should lotheir job over it. I suggest that if anyone has a real problem about this, and that they inform their class coach in advance in writing (and discuss it with him). then common sense will prevail.



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
