Alan & Melvin did especially well, being squeezed into 2nd position in a final sprint against Antoine Goetschy & his partner with the rest of the French team following on behind. This outstanding Chester achievement was followed by even greater deeds at the national K4 10kms championship which was won by Swallow, Tordoff, Tordoff & sprinter Nick Fay. Watch out OTS!

The Exe Descent in November also saw very good results from WWR regulars in most classes:




