### **Editorial**

There has always been a constant flow of criticism over the way the affairs of the Union are run. Many members feel they are in the hands of a junta who have no awareness of the wishes of the membership or are possibly inclined to ignore them.

This myth is now dispelled as a result of the Council's response over the issue of Federalisation — an issue that has emmanated from the wishes of members who have brought their opinions to notice and who are seeking change.

The work that has been undertaken by the officers of the Union, over the past two years, has clearly demonstrated a democratic response to what appears to be the wishes of the membership — whether it is a majority view remains to be seen.

The present structure has been the base for the Union's functioning for forty years. It is therefore now of paramount importance that what emerges from this current debate, is such that it will see the British Canoe Union go forward, into the twenty-first century, with a strong and equitable constitution that, whilst expressing the wishes of the majority, safeguards the rights of all minorities within the corporate body.

MEMBERS ARE URGED TO SEIZE THIS OPPORTUNITY, HAVING CONSIDERED ALL THE FACTORS, TO ENTER INTO THE FINAL DEBATE ENSURING, THROUGH THE TABLING OF THEIR OWN INDIVIDUAL OPINIONS AND PREFERENCES, THAT THE OUTCOME EXPRESSES THE MAJORITY VIEW.

THE DATE OF THE SPECIAL AGM, TO CONSIDER THE FINAL PROPOSALS, IS 30th September.

### APPOINTMENT OF NATIONAL COMPETITION COACHES

### A – For RACING & MARATHON B – For SLALOM

Applications are invited for the following 2 positions:-

- A National Coach to organise the Competition Coaches (Racing) Scheme in order that Racing and Marathon paddlers at all levels may be provided with sufficient qualified coaches and instructors.
- B A National Coach to organise the Competition Coaches (Slalom) Scheme in order that Slalom paddlers at all levels may be provided with sufficient qualified coaches and instructors.

Such National Coaches will be expected to attend conferences held in connection with their work. (At present these are held annually).

The successful candidates will be expected to make positive contributions to the formulations of the policies for the Schemes as laid down. They will be expected to maintain close contact with the Racing and Marathon disciplines on the one hand, and with the Slalom discipline on the other in the execution of their duties.

These part-time appointments are honorary; but the successful candidates will each receive £500 per annum as a contribution towards his expenses. Any fees which he may earn as a result of the appointment will in no way affect the above arrangements. Each will be responsible to the BCU Council through the Director of Coaching and the National Coaching and Development Committee.

### **Henry Compton Canoe Club**

Henry Compton School Canoe Club is now in its fourth year and during that time it has risen to be one of London's strongest canoeing schools, being overall canoeing champions in London for the last three years.

It all started with canoeing being introduced on to the games timetable for the 3rd, 4th and 5th years, enabling me to build up a reasonable canoeing team in each year from these games groups. During the winter months boys were introduced to pool work after school when we were able to use St. Thomas the Apostle School's swimming pool for one evening a week. One other evening a week is spent on repairing canoes and equipment and also planning trips and expeditions which the boys take part in. In the summer the evenings are spent out of doors on the Thames, at Putney, Chertsey and Windsor, where notable experience is gained in tidal and river work.

Many weekend trips were arranged in the beginning by the staff to enable the club to grow and these took place on various waters, south coast and the Isle of Wight, river trips on the Thames — sponsored paddles, raising money for the R.N.L.I., competitions run by other canoe clubs and expeditions in conjunction with the B.S.C.A. Awards. The wide choice of canoeing which we offered gave the boys a chance to take up an aspect of canoeing which they liked and enjoyed so that when they left school they would feel strong enough to continue with canoeing, whether it was in competition or just for enjoyment.

Longer trips of a weeks duration materialised and the club visited the River Wye, upper and lower (Easter and October), Cornwall's surfing beaches (June and August), Monmouthshire and Brecon Canal (November) and the Pembrokeshire Coastline (May and October). The cost of a week away being no more than £15.00 per boy. Four full trips are run each year in holiday time to the places mentioned and the equipment, canoeing and camping is all supplied by the school.

Within the London Schools competitions, the school club has been overall canoeing champions for the last three years and senior sprint champions for the last two. It has also held the Leaside Min L.D. Trophy for the last two years as well.

With all this canoeing in the school involving teaching, competition work and school journeys, I find the expedition side the most enjoyable. The appreciation can be seen in a boy's face when you take him canoeing and camping for the first time (for some its their first trip outside of Fulham) and although you may never hear a 'thank you', at least some of the boys would not be lost to canoeing when they leave school.

The future of Henry Compton canoeing lies in its strength within the school, the enthusiasm of the staff and boys and the willingness to learn what is to some a very difficult skill. We hope to get more canoeing on the games timetable, run courses in water safety, train for the B.C.U. Proficiency and Advanced Tests, venture further with the B.S.C.A. Expedition Awards and introduce the less able boy into the canoeing world as an option to team games, in which he is unable to compete with his peers.

In all, there is a bright future for canoeing at Henrys and we will continue at school level to turn out pupils who one day may join larger clubs when their school days are over to continue where we started. That will be our loss — but canoeing's gain.

### Devizes Westminster

The 1978 Devizes to Westminster race was held in good conditions on a warm night with a reasonable flow on the Thames and a following wind. 60 senior crews and 54 junior crews completed a 125 mile course with Brian Greenham (Reading and Leighton Park) and Tim Cornish (Richmond) finishing with a sprint from Lambeth Bridge to take 5 minutes off the record. Junior winners were K. Smith and J. Raciborski (Warren Canoe Club). Newham were disqualified as a Junior team as the club did not comply with relevant conditions.

The new Canadian record was 26 hours 33 minutes set by K.A. Gale and R.A. Clements of the 35th Norwich Sea Scouts. The Gluckstein Trophy, given for courage and fortitude, is to be awarded to A. Stainsby of the Metropolitan Police, who completed the whole course with a painful back injury. He continued solely to give his partner the opportunity to complete the race before going back to Australia.

### **Federal Structure**

The Council of the British Canoe Union at the Annual General Meeting on the 18th January, 1978, submitted proposals for a federal structure for the British Canoe Union.

Prior to the meeting, the membership had received a circular outlining, in detail, how it was proposed to structure and operate the new Federal System.

A motion was to be presented to the meeting to cover the formation of a new British Canoe Union and English Canoe Association. However, just before the A.G.M. the Chairman received legal opinion which indicated that the motion and proposed constitution may not be admissable in law and that they should be withdrawn pending further discussions.

At a special meeting of the Executive of the British Canoe Union, held immediately prior to the A.G.M., it was decided, after long discussion, to withdraw the motion from the agenda. The Executive decided to ask the meeting's agreement to federalize the Union, when the proposed constitution had been re-written to cover specific legal requirements.

The proposition was put to the A.G.M. together with a rationale of the proposed Federal System. The proposition was defeated and a long discussion ensured which resulted in the following proposition being unanimously approved:

- 1. That a federal structure for the B.C.U. shall be implemented from 1.11.78.
- 2. That the basis of federalization shall include items 2, 3, 4, 5, 14 and 15 of the draft constitution (as circulated).
- 3. That a special general meeting be held within six months to agree the details of the constitution of federal association.

The agreed clauses are as follows: -

- 2. The Union shall be the governing body for the sport and recreation of canoeing in the United Kingdom and the Channel Islands and Isle of Man and shall represent the U.K. and the Channel Islands and Isle of Man.
- The Union shall promote canoeing in all its forms and shall work to improve the facilities available for canoeing in the U.K. and the Channel Islands and Isle of Man.
- 4. The four national canoe associations for England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales shall constitute the British Canoe Union and be integral parts of it. The national associations shall be responsible for the conduct of canoeing within their own areas for all members of the Union and Union shall be the body responsible for matters of collective concern throughout the United Kingdom.
- 5. These matters of collective concern include:
  - a) The overall broad promotion of canoeing as a major water based activity.
  - b) All negotiations with Central Government departments and other British National Bodies, including the British Olympic Association.
  - All matters of liaison and negotiation with the international Canoe Federation.
  - d) The promotion of Touring and Recreative aspects of canoeing as required by the International Canoe Federation.
  - e) The organisation and conduct of British Championships and where allocated by the International Canoe Federation, World Championships and such other events as may be designated.
  - f) The maintenance of comparable making standards for competitive canoeists at United Kingdom level, and if necessary and appropriate devising the procedures for determining the British Rankings for top competitors.
  - g) The Training and Selection of British Competitive Teams (e.g. Training arrangements, selection procedures, appointment of Selectors and Team Managers, etc.)
  - h) The administration and development of coaching throughout the U.K. including establishment, review and maintenance of uniform standards for Coaching Awards.
  - i) The provision of a central Journal and Publications service for canoeists in the United Kingdom.

### Surrey on the Move

Focus No. 9, "Demob", reported that the Surrey Coaching Panel were running their last course at Stoughton Barracks, Guildford, due to the disbandment of the 39 AYT. ### Federalization (cont).

The voting rights of each national association shall be:

England 6 votes
Northern Ireland 1 vote
Scotland 3 votes
Wales 2 votes

Motions before the Council shall require at least 9 votes in favour if all associations are represented and cast their votes. If a representative abstains from voting or in the absence of a representative or authorised deputy the number of votes required to pass a motion shall be reduced by the number of votes of the associations.

A consultative paper will be sent to all full members in the next few weeks. A special General Meeting will be held in London on 30th September 1978 to discuss the final proposals contained in the new consultative document.

The special AGM has been delayed until over six months after the AGM in order that the members could be fully informed and have an opportunity to take part in the full consultative process.

### **Access...** River Wye 1978

Conditions set out in previous years will continue, with little change, during 1978. Relationships between canoeists and fishermen have continued to develop during 1977 with the majority of groups having apparently adhered to the terms of the agreement.

It is felt that these efforts will not go un-noticed and may help to bear fruit in future when additional open days during the fishing season are again sought. Unfortunately, a specific request for additional open days was refused for 1978, with the rider that (a) effective control over those groups still offending the fishing interest and (b) an acknowledgement fee should be mooted before increased access could be made available.

### RHAYADER

# Who Examines the Examiners' Examiners?

.... this could be an open-ended problem. Having worked with Bob Gray on committees, and knowing of his concern for the sport, I go along with much of what he says (Canoe Focus No. 9).

Having also been involved with the policy-making machinery I know the difficulties. What might appear to be a rational solution to a problem by a given individual, is not necessarily accepted as such by a group of individuals forming a committee!

There has been a radical change of coaching qualifications within the last five years. The rumblings are only just dying down. Various national bodies have only just got around to final acceptance of the system. And a dramatic re-appraisal now would really set the cat among the pigeons!

The shortcomings which Bob highlighted – particularly the natural upgrading of the basic award which has in fact occurred – is recognised and is being dealt with. A means of qualifying candidates of lesser ability level, within the existing system, is under active consideration. This is particularly applicable to teachers and youth leaders. Simply stated, the suggestion is that such people be given the necessary authority to operate, but in a controlled environment only.

Proficiency tests have been scrutinised, and the Coaching Committee is about to publish a definitive description of the levels of performance, experience and knowledge required for each item of the syllabus. The syllabus itself has not been changed.

A new series of tests have been devised, complementary to — in no way replacing — the proficiency tests. These new tests grade levels of ability in canoe handling techniques and knowledge only, and do not require expedition experience.

Another approach to the problem of Bob's original theme — that of standardising assessments — is to so structure the coaching scheme that more people become involved in the routine work, leaving the coaches of ability and experience free to oversee the technical side more effectively.

I personally like the concept set out in the paper Bob produced.

Unfortunately it was presented at the time when the present system was being finalised. The full process of working party, tearing apart in committee, back to the drawing board, and finally the great British compromise solution, had been agonisingly pursued. To have scrapped the implementation of the present system, in favour of a whole new approach, and to go through the process again at that time was unthinkable. It would have 'rocked the canoe' with a vengeance. And we all know how easily they capsize!

So, while I go along with Bob in his anxieties and contentions, I would just say, be patient. Improvements along the lines he envisages will come. But a lot of hard work has gone into producing what we have now. The system is quite good, in spite of shortcomings. We would all like to see a BCUtopia!

And in defence of the 'system' which takes so long to produce the right answers, I would say that a lot of hard working, enthusiastic, genuine people, but with differing backgrounds and experience, do take time to find the right solution. But in this they are no different to any other such cross-sections of human beings running a canoeing discipline, or any other sport or service in the British Isles.

Membership of the Squad is available, on application, to those performers who are of a sufficiently high standard, as determined in the following paragraph, and who are prepared to undertake the sustained training, and preparation required.

The Squad functions from the 1st
January to the 30th September each year.

Members are selected annually, in December, by the British Canoe Union Racing Selection Committee, by refererence to performances during the previous season and the recommendations of Training Squad Coaches based upon monitered training commitments in October, November and December. Additionally, Youth Membership of the Training Squad is restricted to those in the following age categories: in the following age categories:

For 1978/79 — those born in 1961/62/63 For 1980/81 — those born in 1963/64/65

The number of members of the Training Squad falling within the various competition categories, i.e. kayaks, canoes, men, women, boys, girls, is subject to the circumstances prevailing at the time of Training Squad selection within the overall approved limitations:-

Seniors - 44 ) 76 Total Youths - 32)

To ensure that the concept of a unified, national, preparation training programme is maintained, the National Olympic Training Squad is administered as one unit, with management and coaching personnel available to perform their duties as from time to time required, for an on behalf of the various competition categories within the Training Squad.

The primary objective of the British Canoe Union olympic preparation training programme for the period 1977/80 is to develop national standards of performance to a level sufficient to ensure British representation in:

- All the 1980 Olympic mens and womens kayak finals, i.e. K.1, K.2, K.4, 500m and 1000m events.
- All the 1980 Olympic mens canoe semi-finals, i.e. C.1, C.2, 500m and 1000m events.
- The first six places of the K.1, K.2 and K.4 10,000m events, at the 1978 and 1979 World Championships.
- The first twelve places of the C.1 and C.2 10,000m events, at the 1978 and 1979 World Championships.

- All the 1979 Junior European Championships mens and womens kayak finals, i.e. K.1, K.2, and K.4 500m and 1000m events.
- All the 1979 Junior European Championships mens canoe semi-finals, i.e. C.1 and C.2 500m and 1000m

COACHING AND FEDERALISATION

The proposals brought by the BCU Council to the last AGM stated that the administration and development of coaching throughout the UK including establishment, review and maintenance of uniform standards for coaching awards should be a federal matter. At their March meeting the National Coaching and Development Committee had a lengthy discussion on the subject. A minute was recorded which endorsed the BCU Council approach. The effect of this should be to dispel any worries that federalisation might mean that a Welsh Senior Instructor would not have his qualification recognised in say Northern Ireland. The NCDC has set up a working party to consider the details and the structure that will be required to implement federal policy and to back this up Oliver Cock, the Director of Coaching, will be visiting all countries of the UK to discuss the matter and record ideas and opinions. It is intended that this will all be thrashed out by September of this year so that the proposals can be circulated for discussion before the October NCDC meeting. Not only members of the Coaching Scheme, but also any members of the BCU or customers of the Coaching Scheme are invited to send comment and suggestions on the subject to Oliver Cock at BCU Headquarters. The more contributions that the working party has from you all the greater is the chance that we shall come up with a satisfactory answer.

I have just read the BCU 'Access Statement' in issue no. 9 of 'Canoe Focus', and the letter in the same issue from C.D. Warren complaining of the BCU attitude over access. Mr. Warren appears to base his case on the success of a 'gentleman's agreement' reached with 'the fishermen' on the Upper Wye above Rhayader.

The BCU Access Statement seems to me to be, if anything, very mild, and more to reflect a search for 'gentleman's agreements' than a hard line over the scandalous denial of right of navigation on rivers to which access depends mainly on the good will of those who happen to own river banks, and accruing fishing and other amenity

rights.

I belong to the BCU as an individual member (I also belong to a club) because, as an adult recreational canoeist, I wish to be represented, at a centralized, informed and funded level, by a body which will act vigorously about the access problem using every legal means. Since I first canoed 25 years ago, the increase in pressure on every sort of water for recreation has made it only too obvious that canoeists, as often the least wealthy (and amongst the least polluting) of leisure boat-users, are likely to be the hardest hit in the scramble for limited facilities. We can only protect ourselves, in my view, by vigorous campaigns to inform the wider public of our reasonable claims; and eventually, by getting the law changed in our favour, involving long-term pressure on M.P.'s.

In my view, this must be the basic concern of a British Canoe Union; for by comparison, say, with other European canoeists, it is we in Britain who are most outrageously restricted in our access to our own rivers. I do not object at all to competitive canoeing, or to its energetic support by our responsible national body. My point is that, without wholehearted attention to the access question, involving a lot of money, BCU expenditure on competitive canoeing may be seen, in a few years time, as the expensive gilt on an ever duller gingerbread.

### **Canoe Polo**

The National Canoe Polo Championships were held at Crystal Palace on Sunday, 26th February. Many thousands packed round the swimming pool at the Palace to see if the top polo teams of Bere Forest and Luton could make the Championship a completely one-sided event.

The event started at 10.45 with the defending champions, Bere Forest, taking on Aberdeen University. The Forest team won convincingly and indeed, all the other quarter-finals were one-sided. The victory by Northampton over Birmingham 'A' was, we believe, the first time Northampton have been successful over this very talented Birmingham 'A' team. The match itself was the closest contested game out of the four quarter-finals.



The semi-finals got under way, and for many people the match of the day was between Bere Forest 'A' and Luton. Luton starting a little slow, soon found themselves defending their goal frantically for the first two or three minutes, but having survived this early pressure, Luton opened their game and remainder of the match was exciting end-to-end stuff, keeping the capacity crowd on the edge of their seats. Bere Forest emerged the winners by three goals to one, and although the score line looks convinving, Luton can look back on this match and count their missed chances, for with perhaps a little more luck, they could have run out easy winners.

The second semi-final between Northampton and Bere Forest 'B' looked as though it could have been another evenly contested game, but eventually Northampton were completely over-shadowed by Bere Forest and at the final whistle, the Bere Forest 'B' team went into the finals having beaten Northampton four goals to one.

The final game between the two Forest teams was won predictably by the 'A' team who have now held the title for four consecutive years.

Looking back over the whole competition it was all to easy to see which clubs have given total dedication to the game of Canoe Polo. Those clubs not only train regularly, but they have sets of boats all the same, their own paddles and accessories, and approach every competition in a thoroughly professional and organised manner. If other teams are to compete even in the same pool as these top teams, then some serious thinking should be done by all Canoe Polo Competitors.

### Racing

### THE RACING REGISTRATION SCHEME

### Introduction

The Racing Committee has been concerned for some time over the lack of an efficient communication system between the Committee, competitors, officials and regatta organisers and its inability to ensure that only B.C.U. members compete at regattas. The Committee feels that these shortcomings will be overcome by the introduction of the Racing Registration Scheme which will also enable it to establish exactly how many active racing canoeists there are in the country, at any one time, and more importantly, be able to contact them, individually, whenever the need arises.

### Initial Registration

All racing canoeists, including Espada Paddlers, are requested to register with the Racing Committee. This should be done at the first National Water Sports Centre Regatta attended during the season.

Registration will only be carried out on production of a current BCU membership card when the details of the competitor (name, address, Club, racing status, BCU number etc.) will be entered into the Racing Register and a racing number entered onto the competitors BCU membership card.

### Renewal of Registration

Registered competitors will remain on the Register and retain their racing number until such time as they are no longer actively competing or their BCU membership lapses.

Competitors will not be required to confirm their registration whilst a BCU member.

### Advantages of Registration

Registered competitors will be entitled to purchase the Canoe Racing Year Book and other racing publications that may be produced at a reduced price. In addition, those who subscribe to the Racing Technical Journal will receive their copies post free, on publication of each Journal, and will, of course, be fully up-dated on Olympic Selection policies, team training days etc. Finally, from the 1979 racing season only registered competitors, with the exception of first time attenders, will be allowed to compete in racing regattas held at the N.W.S.C. and in National Championship events.

### Water Wanted

The Wild Water Racing Committee are in the process of grading their paddlers into Divisions, it is anticipated that there will be three classes for Mens KI as well as Under 18, 16, 14 age categories.

What is needed is: Suitable rivers and clubs willing to run races on them. Under the terms of its constitution, the Wild Water Racing Committee is allowed to control racing on all grades of water, i.e. 0 to 5, so if there is a reasonable stretch of moving water near your Club put in an offer to the committee.

The more races we have, the better our standards will become.

### RACING COMMITTEE - INTERNATIONAL SELECTION POLICY - 1978

In establishing the 1978 International Selection Policy, the Racing Committee have had regard to the need to provide the maximum opportunity for all racing paddlers to obtain selection in one of the nominated racing classes during the 1978 competitive season. At the same time, the considerable training demands imposed upon athletes seeking to achieve high level performances at international events, and particularly the World Championships is acknowledged and therefore the necessity to reduce the number of selection events to the minimum. The primary concern of the Committee will be to identify teams that will be the strongest available to the Selectors. Subject to the achievement of satisfactory standards, consideration will be given by the

Selectors to the entry of individuals and crews in the following events at international competition during 1978:

Senior Men K.2, K.4, C.1, C.2 500m, 1000m, 10,000m Junior Men

.2, K.4, C.1, C.2, 500m, 1000m

Senior Women K.1, K.2, K.4, 500m

Junior Women K.1, K.2, K.4, 500m

Individual paddlers and crews considered for entry in the international events referred to, will be expected to be capable of achieving standards of performance, which indicate a reasonable possibility in all kayak events of a final placing in 500m and 1000m races, and a place in the first six in 10,000m races, and in all canoe events, a semi-final placing in 500m and 1000m races, and a place in the first ten in 10,000m races.

Crews will be considered as crews, and the Selectors will not interfere with the composition thereof, unless they believe that their performances are not of a sufficiently high standard to merit

Team arrangements for participation in international regattas will be made on behalf of the British Canoe Union Racing Committee by the officials appointed by the Committee.

The British Canoe Union Racing Committee will undertake to meet a proportion of the reasonable travelling expenses and accommodation charges of all selected competitors and officials participating in the 1978 International Regatta programme, from the funds to which they have

The British Canoe Union Racing Selection Committee will be responsible to the Racing Committee for the selection of all international teams participating in the 1978 International Regatta programme.

### Instructors by R.N. Castle

I have been involved in various ways with canoeing since 1963, entering the Coaching Scheme in 1967, gradually progressing from Instructor, Senior Instructor to Coach and to Honorary Slalom Coach. I have had a varied amount of experience in Slalom and White Water and sea canoeing. For a short while I was L.C.O. for Suffolk and have since taken over as A.C.O. in the Eastern Region. Throughout my canoeing career I have been involved with many training and assessment courses in various parts of the country.

What makes for a competent Instructor?

I feel that there are three major factors in deciding someone's competence.

(a) The ability to teach a small group.

(b) The ability to lead and look after a small group safely.

(c) The ability to react quickly and well in incidents and situations that arise.

Of course the acid test is the question, "Would YOU let your son/daughter cance with

that instructor?"

An Instructor has to make judgements — and decisions as a result of these judgements. Possibly the hardest decision the Instructor has to make is that the conditions are too severe for the ability of the group. It may well be that the group has travelled many hundreds of miles to either go sea canoeing or to undertake a trip down a white water river. The Instructor is then placed in the unenviable position of saying to his group, "Well, I'm sorry friends, but it's not possible to do what we came to do." I would advise anybody when taking a group any distance to canoe, that it could well be that they may have to abort their expedition.

Within the last six months, in Suffolk, there have been two incidents where, despite fairly lengthy journeys, no canoeing has taken place; one of these being a visit to the River Dee and another being a course scheduled for Felixstowe for Senior Instructors Assessment and Training, where the Instructors considered that it was too hazardous to lay on training or assessment courses — for Senior Instructors. I should like to stress that it is very easy for Instructors to arrive at a river or beside the sea and just look and get changed and go afloat. It is much harder for an instructor to look at the situation, weigh up the ability of the group and then make a decision not to venture forth.


