John started his working life as an apprentice carpenter and joiner in Merthyr Tydfil, where he worked for some years before taking up a teaching post in London.

It was whilst in London, in the 'Sixties', that he took up canoeing and was a member of a club in Waltham Forest. On returning to Wales eleven years later, he continued with his canoeing activities and founded Aberfan Canoe Club, of which he was later to become President and which in 1999 celebrated its 25th Anniversary.

John was an enthusiastic Coach and was always encouraging others, especially Juniors on the river. His shout of "Come on – Keep Paddling" could frequently be heard. In fact it was teaching youngsters to develop their skills that gave him the greatest satisfaction.

Many trips were run on local rivers as well as weekends in Bala, Llangollen, etc., and all were remembered for one hilarious reason or another. Yet, all the time, largely through his enthusiasm and stubborn determination the Club was steadily


River Wye Valley Cycleway The proposed 50 mile traffic-free cycleway linking Chepstow,

The proposed 50 mile traffic-free cycleway linking Chepstow, Tintern, Monmouth, Ross and Hereford is now getting into gear.





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Spraydeck!



Its amazing when your memory works. It may fail the night before, as you carefully list all the items you'll need tomorrow. It may fail in the morning, as up you gather together every bit of kit you'll need for the day ahead.

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t may even fail during that final mental checklist, as you head off to your destination. But you can guarantee that as you're sitting comfortably in your boat ready to push out into the flow it will suddenly return. In this case it may have been triggered by something physical, or rather, by something that definitely wasn't. "Spraydeck!" yelled Tom, "Where's my Spraydeck?"

Perhaps when you're cruising along the Bude canal a spraydeck doesn't really matter but on a descent of the East Lyn river a spraydeck is kinda useful. The Lyn, running steeply off the Exmoor hills in North Devon, is a river that commands respect from the word go and no matter how bazaar our solutions to the problem, the simple fact was no spraydeck, no chance.

Our party was make up of an elite band of West Country paddlers (admittedly prone to memory loss). Firstly Rory Sacree, who actually had remembered his spraydeck, son of the famous Jeff Sacree manufacturer of Gecko headgear, and instructor with Shoreline Outdoor pursuits (where he has to admit to loosing the occasional surfboard or two). Next the days subject of ridicule Tom Iggledon, Cornish through and though and supremo in the surf – admits to lapses in the past like the day he won the Inter Celtic surf championships and couldn't even remember getting into the water. Compared to their history fellow paddlers Simon Hammond and Matt Britton seemed almost reliable. Simon had, after all, remembered his route all the way from Bude to the river and as it turned out Matt could still remember how to get out of his boat and swim instead of being recirculated at the base of a particularly nasty drop.

We'll just have to run it twice

So our solution, we'll just have to run it twice. Personally speaking, and exciting as it is, running the Lyn once in a day and getting sway with it, is plenty enough for me, but as it's a short stretch of water and we were there early, a double run was perfectly feasible. We agreed to flip a coin at the end of the first run with the winner giving his spraydeck to Tom for the second.

Having not rained for 12 hours the water level was just on the lower side of ideal. For the Lyn this meant that the run to the gorge would be more technical than normal, the gorge itself would be as formidable as ever and that there would be an increased risk of pinning on the final leg to the coast. Lovely! Not far from the start it was Rory's memory that was the first to be topped up after a sharp drop into a boiling pool. And his now permanently imprinted memory is 'if you try multiple hand rolls in a shallow gully you will eventually bang your head'. On a positive note, he was at least able to assess the value of his dads helmet design.

However, it was Matt's escape during the second section in the gorge that was most impressive. The final approach to this diagonal drop involves some accurate positioning along a roller coaster under cut channel. Perhaps the memory loss virus choose that moment to hit as Matt's idea of accurate positioning suddenly appeared to be 'side on and slightly backwards to the flow!' The drilling he then received was only to be expected, memory returning around his second submarine survey of the fall. I have to say his 'capsize drill' was performed with style and his 'hanging onto a rock' technique looked well practised.

Matt volunteered (or was it insisted) that it would be his spraydeck and not actually himself who would run the river again. Back up the hill at Watersmeet Tom patiently listened to the obligatory horror stories with a rapidly disintegrating smile and then we were off to run the gauntlet again. I have to say that we were all aware of the implications of rushing a second run and so took our time setting up cover as we'd done before.

Tom obviously hadn't been psyched out during his wait and ran the river without a hitch that was until he got well and truly broached 300 m from the end. Despite this very public humiliation right in the middle of Lynmouth Tom's departing words echoed all of our thoughts – what a brilliant river.

Oh and the answer to Tom's question 'Where's my spraydeck' well its still with Simon Cass and its time to give it back!

Access BCU Right to Roam

Officers In the Yearbook we showed that there was a vacancy for a local access officer for the Great Ouse between Newport Pagnell and Olney; in fact we have a local access officer, who is Keith Whitehead. 9 Hydrus Drive, Leighton Buzzard, Beds LU7 8UL, tel: 01525 371728. The address for Tony Hill, local access officer for the River Hamble, should be amended to 3 Catherine Close, West End. Southampton SO30 2GH, tel: 01703 472623. As can be seen from the BCU Yearbook

there are guite a number of rivers without local access officers; if you can fill one of these vacancies, please get in touch with your regional access officer.

Thank you to all members and clubs who have sent us copies of their letters to MPs plus any replies they received. If you have not already done so, please let the BCU Development Service at Nottingham have a copies of your responses. As we write this paragraph we are expecting any day to see the publication of what will be the government's 'Countryside Amenity and Conservation Bill'. The more responses there are, the more likely that canoeing will be taken seriously. Replies received to date do not give us hope that the needs of canoeists will be included in the Bill; the government continues to point to the access agreement route to secure more canoeing waters.

The reply to our letter came from Chris Mullin MP, Parliamentary Secretary of State for the DETR. We have written to him to object to his view that existing powers can be used to secure agreements; no canoeing agreements have resulted for these powers since the 1949 Access to the Countryside Act became law. We welcomed the stated government intention to promote recreational use of rivers, but pointed out that that not much will happen to help canoeists so long as there is no statutory obligation on landowners to enter into agreements.

Lobbying

There are frequently issues, many of them local, on which lobbying support by members would be very helpful. Passing information on such issues through Canoe Focus is seldom quick enough. We are therefore building up a list of members and club officers, who are willing to contact local media, local councillors, MPs and others as needs arise. We can then email or mail those individuals at short notice with the necessary background information. If you can help canoeing in this way, please let your Regional Access Officer have your name and contact details.

River Lune

After the deadline for the February Canoe Focus we received a letter from the solicitors acting for the riparian owners of approximately 1km river left downstream from the A684 bridge (map ref 632923) near Sedburgh. The letter warns us that permission will not be given to canoe this part of the river. They have given notice that canoeists, who trespass on this water, will be prosecuted. The local access team, supported by national officers has been trying for many years to secure an agreement for this stretch. This information was posted on the BCU website www.bcu.org.uk when it arrived.

Local Environment Agency Plans (LEAPs)

We make a point of sending responses from the BCU office to all LEAPs. This is important because if canoeing and the needs of canoeists do not feature in these plans, then Environment Agency support for canoeing will be limited. However, if the central response is the only response, it will have much less effect than if there are also many responses from local BCU officers, local canoe clubs and local canoeists.

Taking the Bedford Ouse Leap as an example, there was a total of 26 responses at the consultation stage; of these one was from the BCU in Nottingham and one from a local canoe club/county association, which resulted in nine references to the needs of canoeists in the statement of consultation. In the final LEAP document Issue 8 covers portage facilities and Issue 9 is about the impact of Cardington Canoe Slalom Channel on the ecology of the surrounding watercourses. 19km of the River Ivel has been identified in a recent waterway restoration priority report.

Do find out from your Environment Agency Area Office when they will be drafting the LEAP for their catchment so that you have the opportunity to write a response yourself.

Access in Devon and Cornwall

Regional Access Officer Adam Box has expressed concern in his annual report that the 10 voluntary access officers in his region are experiencing continuing pressure as they strive to meet the needs of canoeists. There is an increasing expectation that they will always be at the end of a phone, ready to distribute permits and information on water levels. Please remember that these access officers are volunteers providing a service in their leisure time; when you do need to phone, please don't phone at unsocial times and do phone well in advance of your planned trip.



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Well that's it! After spending a wee fortune in time & training, last November I qualified as a Level 5 Coach Open Canoe. If any of you folk are considering working toward Coach 5, then maybe this article will swing you one way or the other!

Humble Beginnings!

Having always paddled a kayak, I stumbled into coaching at City University Canoe Club, London in the late 1980's. Whilst here and at the Shadwell Basin Project I realised that I enjoyed working with people in the Outdoors so much so that I left the Royal Navy & began freelancing around the Northwest. With spells at Outward Bound Ullswater & at Alpine Action in France, I returned from the summer season of 1994 to qualify as a (SI) Level 3 Coach Kayak. In the days after the assessment weekend I realised that I had been operating at that level for some time.

Wanting an involvement in long term projects, I landed a job with Whitehough Outdoor Education Centre in Lancashire, with responsibility for running the Burnley Canoe Centre. The Head of Centre and my bosses at the Youth & Community Service gave me the scope to explore the possibilities of using Open Canoes for work with Duke of Edinburgh groups. This opportunity captured my imagination, resulting in many trips away. Transferring many skills across from kayak, I quickly found myself on 5 Star and Level 3 Coach assessment OCN. In less than 3 years I had witnessed a coming together of ideas and enthusiasm for the 'group friendly Open Canoe' amongst paddlers & Coaches alike.


During this period I compiled 'BOBBI's Junior Canoeing Scheme' for young paddlers - this had a good response in Northwest Region trials, & became integrated into the Paddlepower Scheme. Result!

I had achieved my wish for something long-term. Where though, do you go next?

Why Coach Open Canoe?

Having been enthused on an earlier Coaching Processes Course, the Level 5 Development Course in October 1997 was the obvious step forward. The intensive week at Plas y Brenin saw 10 of us work with a wide variety of Coaches on areas from feedback to presentation, physiology to injury prevention, sprint to surf, boat dynamics, edging to working with clients. The week was incredibly rewarding and prompted much discussion and exchange of ideas amongst all present.

It was Franco Ferrero, Head of Canoeing, who confirmed my wish to stick with Open Canoe – even when my logbook was heavily kayak orientated. I

left the course with a substantial action plan, wanting to develop my skills & ideas further.

Action Plan or Action Man?

I contacted my Coach Tutor, Ray Goodwin on my return from a Sea kayak expedition with Raleigh International in Chile. Over the next 18 months I had the opportunity to work with Ray on his 5 Star training courses, Dee & Teifi tours. As part of my action plan, Ray observed me working and offered some feedback on my style, my ability to run away with my own enthusiasm & my solutions to people's technical problems.



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Coach 5 Experience

I was packing in the courses, the trips, and the rivers & still managed to freelance and take a trekking trip to Peru in the summer of 1998 after the Canoe Centre closed. This lost opportunity opened other doors.

Doldrums!

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As with any long-term project, the path to Coach took a backward step the following autumn & winter. I became 'technically blind' to simple situations, doubting both my own abilities as a paddler, let alone as an 'Aspirant'. I managed to sink boats on the easiest of problems on the River Kent, successfully mis-diagnose problems, get my group management



completely muddled up & break every wooden paddle I could lay my hands on! It was during this period that the Tutor-Aspirant relationship paid off for me. Ray was always available to discuss issues, problems or solutions and behind the 'Fetch me a Coffee, Aspirant' banter, was a genuinely concerned Coach, hoping that I would find my way.

PGL & Segs!

The turning point came when I realised my own limitations and addressed them head on. Having organised a successful 5 Star training with 2 other Aspirants in Feb 1999, I sat down with the feedback and shakily booked a place on the spring 1999 assessment weekend. I was very aware that I felt uneasy about this date, but peer pressure & time constraints got the better of me!

Then came the opportunity to work with PGL at their summer canoeing camp at Segries in the Ardeche (Segs). Some 80 Coaches assembled for the 5-week training & assessment course, during which time I was stretched well outside my comfort zones in terms of my technical understanding, personal abilities, course organisation, confidence, delivery and assessing style. In fact, everything I had previously believed was a strong point in my enthusiastic style was hacked into tiny pieces & re-wired. I even took the first swim of the season, and postponed the assessment date to make the most of the experience. Segs was a 24hr a day coaching environment – so many questioning minds continually asking my opinion or for clarification of the day's events – the bar was alive every night! It is heartening to see the commitment that an organisation like PGL has to its up & coming staff – the Training Department are well respected by all participants.

We can re-build him!

With a summer of paddling in Scotland, the Lakes & Wales I managed to I dip into Sports Psychology (Newcastle College's Coaching to Win course) & related it to my paddling & those I was coaching.

This proved very useful when I collapsed the new portage trolley within 5 metres of lashing the canoes onto it. When trying to line down the Falls of Dochart at Killin, I believe that the 'River Gods' recognised I needed a 'little detachment therapy for combating external stress'. I resorted to using the dog's lead to pull out our brand new 'broached' Explorer – with all the rescue kit in it, I might add - much to the delight of the tourists! The difference now was that my confidence in my own abilities was untouched – I had rebuilt my coaching style and believed that I could be a Coach 5.

Don't Panic... The Assessment Is Coming!

It was amazing to see just how focused I became about the assessment weekend, paddling 30 days in the 40 days prior, focusing on my long-term students and enjoying myself. The list is inspiring... Awe, Dee, Derwent, Eamont, Eden, Etive, Kent, Orchy, Pendle Water, Ribble, Tay, Twyweren, Teifi, Tyne Tour, Wharf, some bits on the sea & playboating at Teeside with the Bolton School Trainee Instructors in the last few days.

A fellow Candidate joined me on the Thursday to recce potential coaching sites, putting my fears about the assessment to rest and gave me a real feeling of being content with the work I had put in.

Obviously, the day before your Level 5 Assessment you carry on paddling...right? Not so! I fitted a tow-bar to the car – to ensure that I was completely relaxed. I would recommend this basic menial therapy to anyone!

I made the effort and contacted Ray, as his (Hopefully) 'Outgoing Aspirant', before I joined my long-term students in Teesdale.

Too Late...It's Here!

The weekend itself was a credit to all involved. Some 28 paddlers were present, with a Level 5 standardisation meet running alongside the 6 assessments being carried out. Thanks to Bill Taylor & his team for that.

A brisk start on Saturday saw me working with my long-term students on a nearby reservoir, then onto the River Tees from Egglestone to

Scores on the Doors

Of the 6 Assessment Candidates, (3 OCN, 3 IK) there were 2 Passes in each discipline, and 1 deferral in each. For my long-term students & me the evening became a house party in Windermere, with other Coaches heading for distant parts of the

country and even New Zealand! Phone-calls to my partner, family & Ray reinforced my success. Holidays, family time and a meal out with Ray as means of thankyou confirmed our friendship and gave me the confidence to be accepted as a Coach 5 by my Tutor and peers alike.



The Future...!

Now I have got the

ticket I have to go and learn how to use it! The whole experience has been a worthwhile one – I estimate it has cost me £4,500 in time spent chasing experience, course fees, time away from work, travel etc, but this is far outweighed by the deeply rooted confidence in my own abilities and improved enthusiastic coaching style.

I will be running my very own courses over the coming months and intend to live and work in the Lake District, providing Centres, Coaches and individuals with paddling & Coach Development Courses.

his was Cumbria. We were Troughly half way down the River Rawthey, which oddly, is in the Yorkshire Dales National Park (in Cumbria). northern rivers; North Tyne, South Tyne, Tees, but this was a different game. Its grading does not do justice to its huge character. A regular flow of technical rocky rapids gives way to a broader landscape, views of Cautley Spout, before the walls of the gorge close in and the true beauty we privileged canoeists can submerge ourselves I, which, on this trip was more literal than Mike would have liked.

The journey continued to enthral and we continued to engorge ourselves in its splendour. Inevitably Sedbergh arrived. The Rawthey returns to its pretence of being just another river meandering through pasture land, relatively broad and flat. We didn't have time to paddle to the confluence with the Lune although we did ponder the logistics but I wanted to keep the character a sit was not me, still starry-eyed and gob-smacked. This river that belies its humble status had provided a world of imagination, one way beyond our expectation, looking back, maybe it was a Reindeer .. 😐

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National Award for Alan Edge

Winter Training 2000

Enthralled by the prospect of an Indian summer in Australia, the World Class Performance athletes from Slalom travelled to Penrith in New South Wales, to train on the Olympic course.

This was the first warm weather training camp conducted by the team since Performance funding came on line and it was a great success. Athletes were able to take maximum of advantage of training in a warm climate. It enabled paddlers to



focus on quality technique work at a high intensity with less risk of injury, together with a greater continuity of training. Generally it was an excellent competitive environment to train in and every athlete had a good work ethic. Three races were held during January and February and they attracted a high quality International field. They were probably the most intense and competitive races I have ever done so early in the season. However they gave athletes the chance to perfect race techniques on the course and to give early season form indications.



Alan has been the British Canoe Union National Slalom Coach since 1985. He coached Britain's Canoe Slalomists to their first Olympic Medal in 1992 and a further nine World titles, 11 World Cup Titles and six European titles. Alan competed as an elite athlete before his coaching involvement with the team and became World Slalom Team Champion at the 1979 World Championships in Canada.

He currently coaches World Cup Champion and Olympic hopeful Paul Ratcliffe and is also responsible for implementing the Slalom World Class Performance Programme. Alan's coaching knowledge and expertise also makes a significant contribution to the British Olympic Association's Coaches Advisory Group.

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Familiar territory was the Holme Pierpoint sprint racing course and the many marathon venues around the country. However, the following is written to coax other "semiretired competitors" to benefit from the side of the sport which continues to provide buckets of adrenaline, but in a recreational context rather than competitive !

The rest is up to you !

1. Introduction

What is it that brings together 18 paddlers from Chelmsford Canoe Club, during the bleakest months of February, to paddle some of the most scenic and challenging rivers in the United Kingdom. I suspect the question may just have been answered. This was the teams seventh year.

Led by Paul "Puppy" Anderson (some would say mis-lead), the intrepid Braemar born adrenaline junky, a man for whom modelling socks and quoting Blackadder is an entire way of life, the groups were carefully navigated down the river.

The team were set to challenge whatever the rivers would throw at them. As an outsider, I wonder at the mind set of those who name the rapids - "Fairy Steps", "The Rooster Tail", the "Crack of Doom", "Wish You Were Here ?" - none of these give an insight to the approaching paddler as to the "fun" that lies in wait. What is wrong with "right hander" and "bumpy down the middle" ?!

Consider "The Cauldron" (as Mark did intimately on two occasions) - to the normal person this is the sound of something associated with home cooking. Now the mere name makes me run for a change of laundry.

The following represents a potted highlight, for those wishing to enjoy the same week of perfect paddling and teamwork.

2.The Frostbite Tour

Some advice for a successful tour. Have someone who knows the rivers inside and out. Have someone who is happy to do the organisation and planning, and most important - have a victim that you can send down the rapids first !

A quick word of warning - if your idea of excitement is Eastenders, you are probably not yet ready for a trip to the areas described in this article. However, if you aspire to bungee jump off a moving 747, read on. To put this into context, by the end of day one, despite being entirely careful, we had one broken boat, one sprained ankle and one full harness rescue !

Before each day the coaches met behind closed doors to have extended and protracted debate about the water conditions and best river for the following day. In truth, the extended and protracted bit, and indeed the debate, was principally concerned with what and how much to drink.

Never-the-less, each day was a careful choreography of teamwork, planning and on the water inspections.


Quite soon two distinct groups of paddlers formed - those trying to avoid Mark Laskey for fear of being contaminated by the boys natural affinity with the bottom of the river, and those for whom poor judgement and adrenaline are second nature - and who led or followed Mark through some of the biggest holes that could be found.

Day 1 - Walking on Water

The River Spean is an excellent induction, especially at low to medium flows when the gorge offers a range of grade 3 and 4 paddling. From Spean bridge a 15 minute paddle leads you to "Fairy Steps", the first of a series of grade 3 to 4 rapids, ending in the infamous 'Constriction'.

Of particular note, and about half way through the gorge is "The Cauldron". A grade 4+ drop, undercut and dropping into a huge boil. Julia "Jesus" Stevens managed an impressive "manoeuvre" inches above the fall resulting in a capsize and a subsequent "out-of-body" experience. (Note for children - do not try this at home !).

Once again, Mark Laskey confounded his critics and completed the most risky and foolhardy performance of the day - the first upside down navigation of the constriction - an extremely tight "S" manoeuvre at lower levels !

That evening, back in the self catering accommodation, the whole group were eagerly "talking up" their readiness for further challenge - I suspect the planning team were quietly smiling as they contemplated the further treats in store !

Day 2 - The Longest Day

Old Chinese proverb say; when going paddling, always take your paddle. After a return trip back to the accommodation, we were finally ready for take off.

It had rained overnight, which was the essential ingredient for a trip down the River Roy. This is a class 4 river at medium levels (with one nasty grade 5). At high levels, take your arm bands. From the put in to the Roy Bridge is approximately 7 miles.

The river travels from the outwash plains in the headwaters, through a series of 3 gorges, to the lower reaches before it joins the Spean. This is a long trip, and in territory where the weather and river conditions change as quickly as pantomime costumes.

With a full group of 18 at the beginning progress is slow, and 5 hours to complete the trip. With a smaller group it will still take a few hours as a number of drops are worthy of inspection. Whilst being the longest day, all were in agreement that the River Roy is very special for transient scenery, and for the range of paddling experiences.

Top tip for the day from Mary-Jean Smith - when paddling into th always listen to the wise words of your coach explaining the route do the next rapid.

Day 3 - Of Mice and Men

Dawn of the third day and a little more rain, so the group activated rivers action plan, and headed for the grade 4/5 Etive.

The group of 18 reduced to 12 before even getting on the wate most creative excuse was "I became travel sick on the journey" (a 2 minute hop from Fort William !), though we had close contenders finger hurts" and "don't you need me to take the photographs".

The Etive is a great river by any definition. Starting at Triple F ending at Right Angle Fall, one can experience several grade 3 to such as the "Crack of Doom" and the "Ski Jump".

aspirations were to complete the River Arkaig, and then hopefully go to the Nevis when the predicted afternoon rain had started to bite.

The Arkaig is an easy river (special mention to Mary Jean for falling in at a grade 1 rapid), with one grade 4 waterfall, and makes a good first stop on any Scottish canoeing trip. For the adrenaline junky however, read on.

By the time we got to the Nevis, the gorge was "full on" (note authors natural use of jargon from 4 days of full exposure). This is a river to be extremely respectful of. A fully experienced group of four started in the Scimitar Gorge and finally

emerged less one boat, one paddle and three teeth ! The river rises feet in minutes during heavy rain, and a grade 4 becomes a treacherous grade 5 +. For our esteemed leader, this was the last chance to get his adrenaline buzz before having to turn into "Captain Sensible" prior to the arrival of his girlfriend. This he achieved with full colours after negotiating "Leg Breaker" at Pink Granite Falls in his beloved "Stealth" whilst shouting "give it to me baby, ahhah" (rumour has it Paul consigned the girlfriend to the spare room so that he could continue to sleep with his boat).

During the evening, a small prayer group formed to perform the ritual of rain making, and to allow the team to return again to their beloved River Nevis. As I write, I can already hear the excuses of those whose evening bravery (induced by copious quantities of liquor) was quickly translated into bowel movements on viewing the river.

Roll on tomorrow (no pun intended)!

Day 5 - Rest day ?

Theory and practice clearly do not meet on a canoeing trip. If I had a fiver for the number of times I heard "the book says the route is on the left" when the right was clearly better. This equally applies when the "rest day" dawns.

The 'A' group decided on a repeat visit to the Nevis which by now had gone down to mere mortal levels, as those who had sensibly decided to portage the grade 5 "Leg Breaker" and 30 foot "Falls of Arabach" wanted another bite at the cherry.

The difference a meter of water makes is truly amazing, though seasoned paddlers will no doubt look on that comment in disdain. What was a whirl pool that had cost us three teeth and a paddle the day before, had turned into a "breath in" constriction.

Despite the barriers the river put in our way, the whole group finished the morning with a wide smile and a sense of achievement.

In the afternoon, most of the group went their separate ways. One group, led by our Mountain expert / photographer, Shane Bartley, undertook what was billed as "a pleasant walk around the mountain". Fifteen miles later, after traversing bogs and rivers, the once buoyant group had been walked into submission - the evening meal was distinctly quiet !

Both Paul and myself 'snuck off' to the upper Spean, as the river looked high in Fort William. True to form, we arrived with three pipes releasing from the face of the dam. The guide books describes one pipe as reasonable, two pipes as optimum and three pipes as frightening. I should have taken out shares in Andrex before the trip.

The over-pours, boils, whirl pools and stoppers were what you would expect of a continental size grade 4/5 river. I have no desire to repeat the sensation of sitting in a whirlpool in water so full of air it couldn't support a rubber duck. I have to say that as I spotted the get out point above Monessie falls, I once again looked to the heavens and said a small "thank you" - amazing how religious one can become on a trip such as this !

Day 6 - The Finale !

An exhausted group entered the final day with hopes for a finale to be proud of. The full team decided to descend the River Loy, which was running at a good grade 3 with occasional grade 4's.

Neil Costen excelled today with a 1 minute long trashing in a simple grade 2 stopper, aided by Carl Foody who nobly sat on his boat to prolong the experience. Neil sat on the bank after his swim, looking like he had just been saved from the Titanic - in many respects looking at his full expedition boat, he was probably right.

The troops had hoped for another shot at the larger than life upper Spean, running with 3 pipes, however on this day we were to be disappointed. However, as tired limbs had now set in the various

cars drove to disparate parts of the area to enjoy the scenery for a final afternoon of site seeing. To close the day, and to recognise the achievements of a number of paddlers during the week, dinner prizes were awarded for the following categories :a) Best trashing of the week - awarded to Carl Foody for biting off more than he could chew on the River Nevis

b) Most impressive manoeuvre - awarded to Julia Stevens for her roll on the top of Triple falls and subsequent backwards descent

- c) Most embarrassing moment Neil Costen for his simulated cardiac arrest in a grade 2 stopper (joint with Carl Foody who sat on his boat and helped keep him there !).
- d) Most improved paddler Gillian Mara, for going from the Chelmer river to the Etive in under a week !
- e) Biggest nuts The prized trophy went to Mark Laskey, mainly for trusting Paul Anderson, but also for nobly sacrificing his paddles in his endeavours to rescue Mary Jeans boat (any alternative motives here we have to ask !!).

3. Summary

The Fort William area is a must for any canoeist. Not only is the density of rivers incredible - several grade 3-5 rivers within 20 minutes travel time at most river flow conditions, but the area ranks as one of the most scenic areas of Scotland. Day trips for skiing remain possible during the Winter season, and on poor weather days, a simple drive on the road to Skye reveals sights which must not be missed.

On a concluding note, I must pay a particular tribute to our nonpaddler photographer, a Mr. Shane Bartley - what can one say of a man whose efforts in "getting the photograph" would embarrass the "Milk Tray" man. Apparently the secret of a good photograph is to give advise to approaching paddlers in order to maximise the drama ! Other paddlers beware - Shane is easily spotted - he's the one with the ice axe !

Equal tribute must go to the Neil Costen, an old hand on the trip whose old hands are better geared towards preparing the evening repast, than in helping him stay upright ! Without Neil we would not have had the oncein-a-lifetime experience of indigestion on a grade 4/5 rapid.

And finally, to wrap up what must go down as one of the best trips to date, I implore my paddling colleagues to take up the challenge of the Frost Bite Tour, or something similar. Unlike the true condition of a frost bite, you should come away with all limbs intact, and a feeling of re-vitalisation drawn from adrenaline and from the surroundings which make this such a special area.

Middleton (Tees KC) Further details and contacts for each of these events can be found in the 'Slalom yearbook,' for 2000 or by contacting: Don Raspin, 28 Cotswold Drive, Skelton, Cleveland, TS12 2JN. Tel: 01287 650668. No other national ranking Slalom events have been organised for these dates to encourage clubs to schedule these weekends as enjoyable social outings for their members. So book your minibus now.

2 Unfortunately entry numbers will have to be limited for this first season, although it is hoped that they will prove so popular that more Club events can be introduced into the calendar for future years. Sites will be graded according to expected water levels and courses will be set at about Div. 3 level.

Each event will include:

a) On Saturday:

Opportunity for coaching and structured practice time; Demonstration team runs by Div 1 & P coaches/officials A team event for Div 2/3 & 4 competitors in teams of 3 paddlers from any of these divs/classes.

b) On Sunday:

Individual runs in separate divisions and classes for Div 2, 3&4 competitors (D.4 eligible for promotion) and an Officials' competition open to Div 1 & P coaches and officials.

3 Club entries must be submitted by a Club Manager.

Clubs wishing to compete should contact the organiser at least 6 weeks before the event indicating probable entry numbers and the name and address/tel. no. of the Club Manager. The organiser will inform the Club Manager of the maximum entry numbers s/he can accept from that club at least 4 weeks prior to event.

Completed slalom entry cards and fees of \pm 5/entry (1 Ind. + 1/3 team) must be submitted by Club Managers at lest 2 weeks prior to event. (C.M.'s may enter any eligible paddler in

more than one div./class on payment of the extra entry fee/s. Current, or previously ranked paddlers, wishing to compete in a class for which they have no current ranking status may be entered on division below their current/previously ranked division. (i.e. a Div 1 K1 paddler can compere in Div.2 C1 or C2). Competitors from lower divs. Can compete in higher divisions). Each team entry should be accompanied by the name of an official which will be included on the organiser's list of officials duties.

The organiser will then forward a Start list to Club managers about 8 days prior to event. Only competitors named on this start list will be eligible for BCU Voucher prizes.

Late entries:

Club managers may make substitutions for paddlers on the original start list. Div. 4 competitors should have priority for late entries up to the event limit. Late entries for Div. 2&3 paddlers and for scratch teams are at the organiser's discretion. All club entries must be made via the Club manager and only entries submitted by the C.M. can count for club points.

4Premier and Div.1 paddlers may enter the Demo. Teams and the officials event only if they help with coaching and judging duties as approved by the event Coaching Co-ordinator.

5(6 weeks prior to event) will be taken on trust but if they are later found to be default the compile/slalom exec. May nullify the club's points from that event.

6 Most prizes will be in the form of BCU vouchers giving free entry to a Div. 2/3 ranking competition (within 12 months of the issue date). Other prizes will be at the organiser's discretion.

7 Judging and officials duties will be allocated to each club under the supervision of their Club manager. A Coaching Co-ordinator will be appointed to supervise the Saturday, coaching sessions and to organise a Jury.

8 Proposed Points System:

The top placed individual/team for each club in each div./class will score points on this basis:

Individuals & officials:	1st=2pts,	2nd=4pts, etc.
Teams:	1st=1pt,	2nd=2pts, etc
Clubs with no entry in	a div /class will	score may points

Clubs with no entry in a div./class will score max. points +1/team or +2/individual thus giving a double weighting to team results.

Total points will give the club positions in reverse order for the event. It is hoped that this system will enable small clubs to compete on more even terms with their larger rivals and even to recruit extra members from unattached competitors attending the events.

A % system will be used to calculate the end of season rankings from a club's best 3 events are .We are seeking sponsors for appropriate trophies.

Surprise, Surprise! It was like taking off a blind fold, waking up to find you were in the midst of the most beautiful scenery in Britain. The snow capped mountains of Glencoe and the crystal clear water of the rivers immediately acted as an uplifting drug, banishing away the aches and pains of being couped up for eight and half hours in an mini bus based on the ergonomics of a primary school child. Not that this would have damped the spirits of the twenty paddlers on a mission to have a great weekend paddling. Our objectives, according to our top secret agenda, were to: get wet, get cold - really cold, not just York cold, re-orientate ourselves into new, 'there's always water', 'loads of rivers' culture, understand the native language with the aid of translator McSquirt and last, but certainly not least, to discover the attraction of single malt whiskies.

Being a mixed ability group of paddlers ranging from the fishes Bwho had only been canoeing since October to those who were happy throwing themselves off grade 5 waterfalls just to tick it off, get the T-shirt, get the photo, we nevertheless found a river for everyone. 

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
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Are not exactly new to making warm and dry clothes for use in cold water. They supply and mend survival suits to the offshore oil and gas industry operating in the North Sea.

Over the last year their Great Yarmouth Branch has been carrying out repairs on clothes for a local canoe club. During this period they were approached by several club members who wanted good quality kit that is reliable. They only sell directly to the consumer, to try to keep the prices as economic as possible.

The two garments that I tested was their W3T (dry top). It is made from Exeat – Tactel 'performance' fabric. It has a twin seal neoprene waist, latex neck and wrist seals with neoprene over protectors. It comes in a selection of colours. I used this top with their W2P (dry trousers), they are made from the same material as the top. It features latex ankle seals again with over protectors and a neoprene waist tube. The knees and seat feature reinforced for extra durability. The latex seals were thicker than average ones, they are the same ones as used on survival suits. They were a it tight to begin with but loosened up as they got a bit warmer. I would expect them to last longer than most others.

The clothing was tested during a five star white water training weekend in Wales at the beginning of December. This kit was very reliable it did not leak over the whole two days and kept me very warm. The kit is so breathable I could have taken off the top and head straight down the pub for a drink without having to take off any wet under kit.

I also used the kit at a later date in one of my local play spots again the kit was very reliable and did not leak and kept me warm. At this time a friend of mine used one of their basic tops W1T. This top is made from the same material as the others and is twin sealed, the latex neck and wrist do not have over protectors. This was perfectly adequate for the couple of hours that he was in it. It kept him warm and dry.

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
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
