SCOTTISH CANOE ASSOCIATION 16th INTERNATIONAL REGATTA ZAANDAM NETHERLANDS

It was felt that the time and opportunity had come for the Association to venture into the realm of international sprint racing, reflecting the growing interest in this form of racing in Scotland, and a vindication of the lonely sustained efforts of Alistair Wilson and the other Ayrshire paddlers who for so long have carried the presence of Scotland to International events, although never actually as Scottish representatives. Our first venture into this area would have to be exploratory and initially the Gent Regatta in Belgium was considered, but the British Team had decided to take part and thus our participation was excluded. Further enquiries elicited the advice to take part at Zaandam near Amsterdam in the Netherlands.

Thus at 11 a.m. on Thursday 6th June two cars, with six competitors and one official arrived at Harwich en route for the Hook of Holland. Vainly they waited for the third car with three more competitors from Ayrshire, and eventually had to board the ferry without them. It turned out that the car had broken down with "big end" trouble just ten minutes away from Harwich. Their consequent efforts to repair, rethink, hire, re-insure, transfer bookings must constitute an epic in itself, but they did manage to follow on the next ferry and duly arrive in Zaandam to join the others who after an uneventful passage, a rather vague journey through The Hague and a wet passage to Amsterdam, making the final haven at the remarkable canoe club "De Geuzen" headquarters in Zaandam.

The Friday was spent repairing the ravages of travel including a training session on the local water (swimming definitely not advised) and some quiet exploration of Zaandam and a view of the stranger sights of Amsterdam, as well as the fascinating arrangement of the canals and the old city centre. The Saturday involved an early examination of the regatta course and for the Team Manager an incredible leaders meeting, where there seemed to be more leaders than paddlers and with little interpreting being offered, considerable ingenuity in deciphering hand and facial gesture and the intonation of the voices to ascertain whether all was going smoothly or otherwise. However it afforded an opportunity to consider the management capabilities for the various teams assembled from the Netherlands, Belgium, West Germany, Australia and Scotland.

The afternoon's events were centred mainly on the heats for the Youth Classes in which R. Montgomery of Irvine Canoe Club found himself in the fastest heat of the series and his own time of 2.22.3 would have allowed him to qualify easily in any of the other heats. A creditable performance despite his elimination and a good opening to his international career in sprint racing. Following that event he joined J. Dolan and J. Young in the 3000m event which was to be raced along a 2KM stretch of the main canal in Zaandam, to a point where it meets the Nordzeekanal where a turn around a set of buoys is made, to make a final 1000m leg up to the Finish situated at the local rowing club In this event our young competitors were able to hold to the headquarters. middle of the field throughout the event and finished in creditable positions just out of the first six places. However our pleasure in their performance was soon to be heightened as Maureen McClure taking part in the joint Senior Junior Ladies 3000m found herself dominating the Junior event and finished in 1st place to her own delight and to the immense pleasure of the Scottish team. The Mens Senior 10,000m followed and in a very strong and determined field D. Batchelor and A. Burwood battled hard through four long legs of 2 km and five turns to finish sixth and eighth respectively, and we began to feel that perhaps we had been under-rating the standard of competition in Scotland. This feeling heightened as the Mens Junior 10,000 developed and A. Morton stayed with, and appeared to dictate the tactics of the leading group, eventually battling out the last 1000m with Drespa of Dusseldorf and holding off a very strong challenge from Tomansky of Gent. to come out the winner in

a time of 50m 15.8s. So in spite of some apprehension that we might be getting into deep water, it was a well satisfied team that relaxed with the other competitors in the social gathering held in the Canoe Club later that day, but dutifully followed instructions to retire early.

The following day the first competitors involved, J. Dolan and J. Young, found the competition in their heats just too much and although finishing third and fourth were eliminated from the 500m K1 in their age group. Later D. Batchelor, A. Morton, A. Burwood survived their heats in the 500m and A. Morton won through the first round of the 1000m. and to conclude the morning session J. Dolan and J. Young won their heat in the Youth K2 500m. Thus the early fears of being reduced to spectators for the Sunday afternoon session had vanished with our presence in six finals and a venture into K4 racing with a rather untried crew, finding things very hot.

Into the afternoon the sun shone in more than one direction for the Scottish team, for excitement mounted as Andrew Morton came through with a late rush to win the Junior 500m, to be followed later by the valiant efforts of A. Burwood and D. Batchelor who fought hard to remain on terms with the redoubtable Heckstra of Belgium with A. Burwood finishing in a fine 5th place. This effort was followed by the sight of the two leading slalom paddlers in Scotland combining their energies to win Silver Medals in the Youth K2. Jim Dolan and Jock Young pushing an experienced pair from West Germany to a very fast time. Hardly had that excitement died away when A. Morton again struck home to squeeze ahead of Tomanski by .7 sec. in the Junior 1000m and to become the only competitor in the Regatta to win all three of his singles events. Finally after a long day's waiting through all the excitement of the team's successes Maureen McClure produced a sparkling performance to win the Ladies Junior 500m against very strong opposition, to conclude what must be one of the highlights in the paddlers careers and one of the most notable days in the Association's history.

All in all a very creditable performance by a team effort in which individual highlights were sustained by the efforts and support of the whole team, in the knowledge and realization that although this can be a highly individualistic sport, the real satisfaction exists in the feeling of community and mutual support, that all are enriched by a team-mate's success but none are diminished through any lack of success.

Hardly had our euphoria subsided and the team had to tackle the problem of return to Scotland, and thus the Ayrshire group set out to take the earliest available ferry to England and thence by hiring another vehicle for the purpose, to tow their damaged car all the way back to Kilmarnock, battling valiantly for 14 hours, while the remaining two cars made a more leisurely return on Monday.

To conclude this report I must express my thanks to all the team members for their part in the success of the venture, and to hope that with the experience gained, we will be able to continue and extend our participation in a wider field and eventually look to that day when at the 16th Strathclyde Regatta we would be as delighted as our host in Zaandam at the efforts and successes of another "raiding party".

MITTENWALD W/W RACE, BAVARIA - 20/21 JULY 1974

Two cars set off for the Continent on Sunday 5th July; Team Captain Graham Smith driving his car, containing Jim Dolan, Scott Ramage and myself as passengers. After blowing 3 trailer tyres to bits on the motorway we arrived in Ramsgate on Sunday evening and met up with the Manwells and Irvine Ross.

On Monday morning we hovered over to Calais during a force 8 wind and 2.5 m waves - the effect of which all of us became acutely aware considering our hearty breakfast of sausage, bacon and eggs. After a brief recovery in Calais we motored off heading for Cologne, Germany, where we spent a night on the campsite beside the river Rhine. It was not until late next evening when After some discussion it was decided that we we pulled into to Mittenwald. required a campsite with more mod.cons. e.g. hot showers, so we proceeded to find such a site. Meanwhile the heavens opened and released millions of tons of rain. Night fell and the rain persisted, camping sites all full, so we searched in vain for B.& B. lodgings (or Zimmer Frei as they say in German). 4 hours and 2 border crossings later, just when we were thinking in terms of a lowly cattle shed, Scott, David, Jim and Graham found a layby in which we commenced an attempt to put the tent up in the dark. After a noisy night with thunder, lightning and rain we awakened to the sight of approaching disaster. 1 large puddle approaching at about 2 cm/s. In great haste we rescued the food and equipment and repacked the car and trailer. It was still raining and consequently the tent was saturated. We moved to a campsite in Seefeld, Austria and spent the afternoon looking at the course and training on the stretch below, Jim, Scott and myself shooting the rapids and 8 foot weirs with reckless enjoyment freed from the confines of the journey out. We trained on the course on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. The rain had persisted all week and the tent leaked badly because it had been put up wet. Sleeping bags were drenched, food was soaking and the ground muddy.

The River Isar is, in the upper stretches of the banks, closed to public road traffic so we had to travel to the start via a forest warden's Volkswagen at an extortionate fare. For practice the water was low but after a week of rain the river rose on Saturday night after the team run in which Graham, Irvine and myself battled our way to 7th place down the foaming cataracts of the Isar Gorge.

The individual results were as follows:- Jim Dolan 1st, Scott Ramage 3rd, D. Cuthill 4th, I. Ross 5th and G. Smith 7th. Although this was a small event with the championship class German paddlers in a separate collection event, the Scottish team did well to achieve these results.

The next day - Monday - we left for Bourg St. Maurice in France, travelling via Innsbruck to Italy for a fast Autostrada trip. Arrived at Bourg on Tuesday 23rd July.

BOURG ST. MAURICE, FRANCE - 27/28 JULY 1974.

The Tuesday before the event (23rd) the Team arrived from all parts of Europe. From Aberdeen, Glasgow, Mittenwald and one member arrived from another Bourg, having gone to the wrong town for the competition!

The campsite at Bourg for the competitors is situated right beside the Slalom course in a very pleasant setting. However there were a number of undesirable features - no shower, plenty of dust and a busy railway line only 50 yds from the tents. Consequently the ladies of the Team, Mrs. Manwell Annette and Mrs. Morton all insisted that a more suitable site would have to be sought for them! (Mrs. Rickerby, however, decided she had better stay and keep an eye on her husband!) Fortunately there were two very pleasant sites only half a mile from the river and so the team ended up rather scattered along the valley.

The water was dam-controlled and turned on in the morning, leaving the afternoon for relaxation during the training periods. The water and rocks proved to be very sore on the boats as both courses were quite rough and technical. Graham Smith's repair outfit soon became depleted and a blind man could have found the Scots by following the smell of resin through the campsite! Poor Ronnie Kennedy had both his boats wrecked within the first three days, although, to be fair, he only had the pleasure of writing off one of them personally.

The British Junior Team arrived not long after we had established ourselves and they proved to be a headache for our manager. It transpired that there was no Junior event at Bourg and so their manager, Albert Woods, expected to take all the 6 Slalom places and leave Scotland the W.W. race! Andrew and Graham however had their letter files with them to prove their right to compete and eventually after much haggling in French we had to forfeit our Slalom Team Run places to the British Juniors. Of the four runs taken by the Junior teams on Saturday afternoon only one counted, two ended in capsizes and one was abandoned before starting!

After the first Slalom Runs on the Sunday Norbert Sattler of Austria was leading Christian Doring by 1.2 secs. after a sparkling clear run from both paddlers. However, Ulrich Peters from West Germany came through in the second run to win my 4.7 secs. after a rather doubtful judging decision. 5 of us saw him definitely touch a pole but evidently the judge did not. Jim Dolan was also the victim of dodgy judging and was at first given a 50 for ducking under a pole. This was subsequently reduced to a 20 which, with one other 10 gave 30 penalties in total. This made the difference of 10 places to his result.

The W.W. race was held on Sunday morning and although everyone in the Team had practised hard, the course was so long and continuous that no one could claim to know their way down all but a few of the main falls. The French and Belgians obviously did know all the course and filled 9 of the first 10 places in the event! The World Champion and Europa Cup champion, Jean-Pierre Burny, won the race one minute 15 secs ahead of the first Scottish paddler, Andrew Morton who was 17th in the event. Irvine Ross was 32nd, Graham Smith 33rd, David Cuthill 35th,Geoff Hatfield 36th and Neil Rickerby 37th in a field of 42 competitors.

Annette Ramage was 8th out of 12 paddlers in her event and finished a minute behind Peggy Mitchel of Britain who won the Bronze medal.

The 1974 Scottish Youth Sprint Championships took place in May on Loch Vennachar. The regatta was included in the programme of the Trossachs Festival of Inland Water Sports. A regatta for the over 18's was held in conjunction with this giving an entry of 50 competitors over the two events. Prizes were provided by the Callander and District Tourist Association and the Scotsman - the sponsors.

Andrew Batchelor of Irvine was first in the 500m with Andrew Morton of Forth 3rd. First in the Men's K2 were Batchelor and Willie Reichenstein. In the mixed K2 Batchelor was again successful with Yvonne Allison while the Forth crew, Morton and McClure were 2nd. Maureen McClure was first in the Ladies K1 and also in K2 with Christine Linn.

In the Youth Championships William McKinlay was first in the boys. Espada A with Meryl Montgomery in the girls. In class B. Robert Montgomery was first in the boys with Yvonne Allison in the girls. Ronnie Kennedy won class C. with Gregory Brooks of Forth 2nd. Montgomery and Cameron came first in the youth K2 event.

LOCH LUBNAIG LONG DISTANCE RACE

Also held in the Trossachs Festival was a Long Distance race on Loch Lubnaig. This attracted about 30 paddlers away from practice for the Leny Slalom. Forth C.C. gained 2 first places - Andrew Morton in Mens WW in 58.45 sec over the $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles; with 1st Lady Maureen McClure 10 minutes behind. Scott Balfour of Forth was fourth man, Irvine CC took 2nd and 3rd places with Ian Speirs and William McKinlay. 1st in the Junior WW was D. Cameron also of Irvine, while first junior in the slalom class was George Boag. Yvonne Allison completed the Irvine success being first in the Junior ladies.

My pleas for better weather this year were answered, making both events very enjoyable. Plans are now afoot for the Trossachs Festival of Inland Water Sports 1975, and it is hoped to incorporate a number of canoeing events in the programme.

The bad news of the summer is that Fay Roberts from Edinburgh, who was leading the British Women's Slalom Championship table, is now out of the running for this year and may have to give up slalom for good, after an accident which resulted in her shoulder being dislocated. It happened on the concrete slalom course at Augsburg whilst on a training run after the main event. This is the second time her shoulder has been dislocated and if it happens again will require surgery to put it back. She has been advised by doctors not to cance again.

OMMODORE'S COMMENT

However, Fay intends to strengthen the damaged shoulder by special training over the winter and hopes to be back at Competitions next year. It is desperately bad luck, for this setback, which is one of the worst kind of canoeing accidents, to have happened in her most successful year.

This was the second such accident to have struck the British Team as one of the top British C1 canoeists had a similar but less serious mishap at Merano, Italy, earlier this summer.

For that purpose I designed one with a thistle motif which is internationally recognised as "Scotland" and used by international teams of rugby, tennis, badminton, cricket etc. I hope the S.C.A, will think again for next year.

POLO - the game with the goal in it!

B.C.U. COMPETITION RULES

- 1. Area of Play: Any shape and size of water, but goals will face each other and be between 20 metres and 30 metres apart. Goals will consist of a metre square supported vertically with the lower edge 2 metres above the water surface. 'Out of play' areas will be defined on each pitch.
- 2. Ball; Size 5 plastic football 27" 28" circumference.
- 3. Number of players: five each side. Substitutes are only allowed for injury and may not assist the players.
- 4. Two referees and one time keeper: the time keeper to keep the score and blow for half time and full time.
- 5. Boats: Length not less than 2 metres and not more than 3 metres.
 Beam not less than 50 cm. and not more than 60 cm.
 Ends Plan a curve at any point not less than 10 cm. radius.

Profile - A curve at any point not less than 5 cm radius.

Buoyancy - at least 22 1b (10 kg) must be fitted.

6. Propulsion by paddle or hand, single bladed or double bladed.

- 7. Blades must not be metal tipped, and no part of the blade may have a radius of less than 3 cm in plan. Thin section GRP or ABS blades are not acceptable. Padding or metal tips is not allowed. Referees will disallow the use of blades that are considered to be dangerous.
- 8. Play will be not more than seven and not less than four minutes each way. Injury time will be allowed.
- 9. Tie. In this event, decision will be reached by taking the following steps in order:
 - a) A one minute interval and change of ends followed by play to the first goal with no break. In the event of insufficient time to obtain a goal -
 - b) Goal average.
 - c) Goals conceded.
 - d) Toss up (it is hoped that this should never be necessary).
- 10. Players will wear team bibs or some easily identified team marking.
- 11. a) Players will wear suitable helmets.
 - b) Buoyancy aids or padded or pneumatic belts which afford protection to the lower lumbar region must be worn.
- 12. All teams must be ready to enter the water as the referee requests.
- 13. At the commencement of play, players will line up with their teams on their own goal line. The ball will be placed in the middle of the playing area. Play commences when the whistle is blown.
- 14. At the commencement of play, after half time, and after a goal is scored, the positions described above will be taken.
- 15. a) When the ball is put out of play over the side-line the non-offending team throws it in from the point of exit, but may not throw it in the direction of attack.
 - b) /

BAT POLO RULES (contd.)

b) When the ball is put out of play over a goal line by an attacker, the defending team has a goal throw from under the goal-board. When the ball is put out of play over a goal line by a defender, the attacking team has a corner throw.

c) No goal can be scored from a penalty throw, goal throw or corner before the ball touches some other object.

d) For any of the above throws there must be a space of at least three metres between the thrower and his nearest opponent.

16. a) The paddle may be used for propulsion of the canoe, to stop the ball in the air or to draw the ball on the surface of the water. It may not be used to strike the ball either in the air or on the water.

- b) Deliberate misuse or dangerous use of the paddles will be severely penalized.
- 17. If a player leaves his canoe he will be out of play until he is properly back in his canoe again.

18. If a player goes out of the playing area he will be out of play until he returns to the area completely with no part of his craft over the boundary line.

19. A player may tackle only the man with the ball. When the player has lost the ball the tackle must cease.

20. Obstructive play, removal of spray deck, attempts at sinking or holding under or any other form of play judged to be dangerous or unwanted will be penalized.

21. A player must dispose of the ball within three seconds of having received it, whilst it is in play.

22. Penalties will be at the discretion of the referee, these being as follows:-

- a) Free throw to other side (see 15, c and d).
- b) Player sent off for two minutes.
- c) Player sent off for rest of match.
- d) Player referred to Polo Committee for decision.
