EDITORIAL

Interest in Kayak Magazine is growing fast and shows just how badly we needed a means of communication both in our clubs and amongst Scottish Canoeists in general.

Since the Newsletter publications, starting in April 1973, the character of the magazine has changed considerably and is now catering for a different and more diversified readership. Basically, however, KAYAK is still the club mag designed primarily to relay out to the members a stream of information which is directed towards the club from external sources and also to form an efficient communications medium for information generated within the club these functions now having been expanded to include an extra mural readership. As club representation on committees of the Scottish Canoe Association, and similar bodies, represents one of the channels of information connecting us with the official voice of canoe sport, the Minutes of these committees are being published in this issue of the magazine. We have had the co-operation of the S.C.A. on this and sufficient copies are supplied to us ready to clip into the magazine. This has advantages for the S.C.A. who save on postage and envelopes and for us as we save on paper, typing and duplicating AND still maintain quality of communication. This facility is only available to us because of the large readership external to the club. As well as the official body, individuals or clubs are also able to benefit from the same advantages. Consideration will be given to all articles, events information, results and reports sent in for publishing and, unlike SCA copy, the material need not have been already duplicated.

Sprint Canoeing is the only Canoe Sport represented at the Olympic Games.

Last year Scotland sent its first Sprint team abroad, and in 1975, it is hoped to send teams to two International events.

In 1976 it is expected that the Strathclyde park will be opened and the S.C.A. will be using the race course there for its Sprint events. The S.C.A. also intends to purchase a glass K4 every year for the next few years, to build up a stock at the Centre.

The B.C.U. already make full use of the National Watersports Centre at Holmepierreport which opened only four years ago. It is hoped that this Centre will be used for the World Sprint Championships before the end of the decade.

It is therefore clear that Sprint Canoeing is a sport increasing greatly in popularity. To date, Slalom canoeing has been by far the most popular but it may be that in the future school groups and youth organisations may introduce youngsters to Sprint Canoeing instead of Slalom as in the past.

It is with this in mind that the S.C.A. has purchased 12 Espada Kayaks and these are now available for training and racing. Anyone wanting information on the use of these kayaks should contact Drew Manzie, 2b High Road, Castlehead, PAISLEY.

To many, the Espada is a mysterious canoe about which they know very little, so I have attempted to glean as much useful information on these kayaks as possible for the benefit of the reader.

ESPADA HISTORY

Designed in May 1961 by the world's foremost kayak designer Jorgen Samson of Farum, Denmark.

First produced in July 1961 in the hot moulded veneer method by Kirk and Storgaard of Struer, Denmark.

Paddled by Danish champion V. Schmidt on the Copenhagen course to win the Danish 10,000m championship in 47 mins 48.6 seconds.

Paddled by Fritz Briel to win the German 10,000m championship in 1962

The first Espadas had a higher freeboard but when the other virtues of the boat were seen, Samson lowered the freeboard to make the boat more suitable for smaller paddlers.

Superceded by the Pointer and later the Hunter and the Ranger whose advanced design and considerably greater lack of stability make them less suitable for the learning of an economic stroke.

1970 The right to produce the Espada in glass fibre as a one design boat was passed to the British Canoe Union by Jorgen Samson

The B.C.U. has adopted the Espada K1 as a one design kayak in order to encourage youth kayak racing.

The kayak

All kayaks will be in Glass Fibre; it is intended that moulds should be available for loan or sale, so that youth organisations, schools and clubs may produce kayaks at a reasonable cost. Professionally manufactured kayaks will also be available.

Three Espada kayaks have been traced in this country and have been purchased by the B.C.U. They have now been prepared for use as plugs and may be borrowed only by approved manufacturers. When not on loan they will be carefully stored by the B.C.U.

PRODUCTION OF FIBRE-GLASS ESPADAS

Stipulations

Espada is a one design kayak with regard to hull and deck. Slight variations are permitted in the rim only of the cockpit.

The hull should be moulded in one piece.

The minimum weight is 12 Kilograms. This includes buoyancy. Weighing according to B.C.U. racing rules.

The rudder may be of an overstern or a fin design.

Other fittings may be to the choice of the maker or owner.

The present design shall stand for at least 10 years from 1st October 1970.

Registration

A 50p licence fee will be payable:

- (a) on each mould produced by a manufacturer.
- (b) on each kayak used in competition.

Kayak registration forms can only be obtained from the manufacturers, who will provide the necessary registered mould number and they should be returned completed, with the fee, to the Class Director.

The manufacturers will also distribute forms with moulds and kayaks.

Unregistered kayaks cannot be raced in class events.

Manufacturers may obtain registration forms from the Class Director.

Promotion

All organisers of regattas and L.D. events have agreed to arrange races for the Espada Youth K1.

National Championships in both Sprint and L.D. have a full Espada Programme.

The Sprint Racing Committee have approved racing distances for each age group.

Age groups for events will be:

- Espada. A. Competitors should have reached their twelve birthday and not have reached their 14th birthday by January 1st of the year in which the event is being held.
- Espada. B. Competitors should have reached their 14th birthday and not have reached their 16th birthday by January 1st of the year in which the event is being held.
- Espada. C. Competitors should have reached their 16th birthday and not have reached their 18th birthday by January 1st of the year in which the event is being held.

Management

The Class Director is:

David R. Cook, Bryntysilio Outdoor Education Centre, Llangollen, Denbighshire. Tel: Llangollen 2454. Safety precautions in the use of an Espada may in various circumstances be some or all of the following. It is not supposed that this is a complete list:

- 1. A safety boat operated by a competent boatman, possibly with a crew.
- 2. Spray decks.
- 3. Boat buoyancy.
- 4. Life jackets to the requirements of the British Canoe Union. (British Standard 3595)
- 5. Personal buoyancy to the standards of the International Canoe Federation.
- 6. Painters.
- 7. Fore and aft loops or toggles.
- 8. Suitable warm and waterproof clothing.
- 9. Previous practice of immersion in cold water.
- 10. Appointment of a regatta or race officer with sole responsibility for safety.

As a point of interest relevant to this, the Council of the British Schools' Canoeing Association passed the following minute on 16th October 1971.

'It was resolved that in all general canoeing activities of the B.S.C.A. B.C.U. lifejackets shall be worn. However, for competitive events in which close supervision exists and in closely supervised training activities, I.C.F. and S.B.B.N.F. approved buoyancy aids may be used. In sprint races of up to 500 metres, personal buoyancy may be dispensed with at the discretion of the organiser/organisers, if conditions permit.'

SPRINT

The Sprint Racing Committee has approved the following distances for Espada Class racing.

University of Strathclyde, Glasgow.

These last few years the West Coast Tour has met with such adverse conditions that the mileage covered has been hardly worth the bother. However, in the hope that 1975 will be different and make daily paddling possible, can I suggest a route which was done so often in the old days that we called it "The Milk Run".

A rough itinerary for such a trip would be:-

- Sat/Sun. Assemble at Knock Castle, north of Largs prior permission to camp necessary if not possible, take boat across to Inellan.

 The chap at the pier has a lorry to run you round past Toward Point where there is a camp site opposite the old 2nd World War blockhouse.
- Monday Paddle round the Kyles about 2 miles after the narrows there is a camp site in a bay on the Bute shore but no drinking water. approx 15 miles.
- Tuesday Paddle southward and round Ardlamont Point. In a fresh S.W. wind rounding the point can be hard work. Keep to the East side of Loch Fyne there are no campsites on the Tarbert side. approx 15 miles.
- Sharks are plentiful around here: Garage at the Canal Locks will supply a lorry to carry the party over to Crinan Harbour. (It takes 6 7 hours to do the canal which is very boring and very midgy.) From Crinan Harbour paddle N.W. to the headland where there is a camp site. Approx 14 miles.
- Thursday On leaving this site keep well into Loch Craignish to avoid the Dores More current which at times bounces off Craignish Point.

 North of this point the tide floods north. Make for the East side of the Island of Luing. There is a camp site south of the slate jetty at Toberonochy. If storm bound, there is transport from here to Oban. 10 miles.
- Friday Continue northwards to Seil Sound and Clachan Bridge. It is important to time your arrival at Clachan Bridge for full tide otherwise Seil Sound will be dried out. If this happens, or the weather is against you, there is a good campsite about 200 yards beyond the bridge on the right.

 Once clear of the Sound there is an open crossing to Kerrera. If the weather permits there is a nice campsite on the West side of Kerrera, about 2 miles up from the South end. Look for the waterfall about 50 yards inland. Should this not be possible there is a good site on Kerrera opposite the yacht club at Oban.

Saturday and Sunday at Oban.

- Monday It is probably best to leave at Half ebb to cross to Mull, aiming at a point a good mile South of Duart Castle. By the time the other side is reached the tide should be beginning to flood North and the current is quite strong. Camp site 1 mile north of Craignure.

 12 miles.
- Tuesday Given the flood tide it should be no problem to reach Tobermory. Camp on the high ground opposite the town. 15 miles.
- Wednesday Cross to Loch Sunart and paddle to Salen. Here one has the option of using the public camp-site at the head of the bay or 'phone the garage at Acharacle and get their lorry for the portage over to Loch Sheil. 15 miles.
- Thursday Paddle to the narrows and turn right once you are through. There is a good campsite. Alternatively one can continue up the loch for another 4 miles and find a good site on the left. 9 miles.
- Friday Continue to Glenfinnan camp in the bay on left about half a mile South of the pier. 9 miles.

Saturday

Saturday Home by train from Glenfinnan Station or organise your own transport.

There you have a comfortable 2 weeks trip of about 130 miles - provided the weather behaves and you have had a good read at the West Coast Pilot, you can't but enjoy it.


SLALOM JUDGES COURSE

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Canoe Club Colours

It was with surprise and a little dismay that we at Irvine C.C. read in the October '74 issue of "Kayak" Magazine under 'Commodore's Comment', that we appear to have usurped F.C.C. colours.

In an attempt to find out just when I.C.C. registered with S.C.A. and also, if club colours were submitted for approval, I have been looking through I.C.C. past minutes and find the undernoted mentions.

Oct.3rd 1958. Mr. H. Stevenson proposed, seconded by Mr. J.Spiers that I.C.C. affiliate to S.C.A. passed nem., con.

Oct. 10th 1958 Letter from S.C.A.Sec. stating that I.C.C.'s affiliation would be accepted but, a written constitution would be required.

Mr. H.Stevenson promised a constitution would be presented to the next meeting.

Nov.5th 1958 Letter from S.C.A.Sec. to the effect that I.C.C.constitution had been approved, therefore request for affiliation had been complied with. It was noted that I.C.C.'s Club Burgee was Blue and Gold, as was commodore's flag.

15.5.61. It was reported that, there may be some difficulty in obtaining Club Racing Strips. Matter referred to next meeting.

Agreed to notify Forth Canoe Club and Kyle Canoe Club of suggestions made with regard to style and colour of strips -

Other than the reference to the Club Flag colours I cannot find any mention of actual "Club Racing Colours", but our records are far from complete.

Should F.C.C. wish it, I am sure that we at Irvine will manage to agree on alternative colours for I.C.C., although we would prefer, naturally to wait until our present vests, T shirts, etc. have worn out, or alternatively, we could sell them off to F.C.C. if they feel they have sufficient paddlers of generous chest dimensions to fill our racing vests.

As a matter of general interest I would like to see in Kayak a published list of dates of the various Canoe Club affiliations to S.C.A., with Club Colours, Flag, etc. if these were registered. Perhaps also in that issue we could have F.C.C.'s comment on the foregoing, plus a few lines from S.C.A.

W.McKinlay, Secretary I.C.C. Now that two training week-ends have been held for the squad it seems an appropriate time to comment upon the relative value which these week-ends have within the overall training schedule for individual paddlers.

At the first weekend, held in November, there was a noticeable lack of enthusiasm and a certain reluctance by several paddlers to participate in the programme of the weekend. Perhaps the main reason for this, certainly as far as the slalom paddlers were concerned, was that it was their "end of season" and consequently they felt no great need to indulge in a strenuous weekend of training. For the W/W racers this excuse was not valid yet there was still some apathy - somewhat disturbing in view of the fact that the W/W season was about to commence.

It is pleasing to report that a distinct improvement was apparent at the second weekend, held in January, by both the slalom and W/W members, particularly the latter, where it was evident with certain individuals that a considerable build-up programme had been carried out.

To digress for a moment to the function of these training weekends I feel that they serve a dual role (i) to bring together the top paddlers enabling them to indulge in high level training and competition amongst themselves and (ii) to pass on information pertaining to training methods which the paddlers can continue on their own once the weekend is over. This latter feature is of utmost importance since it is a pointless exercise to attend the weekends and do nothing in-between. The weekends themselves will not create internationalists, people must now be prepared to venture out regularly in the wild and wet weather in order that they maintain and improve their level of fitness. With rising costs it would be wrong to expect the Sports Council to grant aid the International Team if its members were not at their peak condition. January is now over and the slalomists, especially those expecting success in the early season events, should now be developing their gate techniques either on moving water or in the baths using either single or multiple wiggle tests the latter is particularly useful as it shows up the paddlers' weakness at long-term gate work.

It is encouraging to observe the improved standard and increased depth of competitors in the fields of slalom and W/W Racing. Keen competition will take place later in the year at the selection events for the Scottish Team. In particular the junior places will be hotly contested.

To end on a more serious note, I would like to reiterate my plea for paddlers to continue their own training schedules between the organised weekends. Furthermore, paddlers are expected to arrive for the training weekends at a reasonable hour - not the early hours of the morning after having attended a disco or similar function. The standard of conduct should reflect that of responsible citizens since this is an important aspect particularly whilst abroad.

A third training weekend has still to be arranged but as yet the venue is undecided. Selection for attendance at these events is always difficult, however the selection committee try to use the latest sets of results on which to make a decision.

Scottish W/W Racing Championships, 1975. Graham Smith.

This event was held on Sunday 26th January in what was undoubtedly the worst weather experienced by many paddlers. Several retirals and capsizes were recorded and the icy conditions with sleat and snow upset both paddlers and organisers alike. The recording of results was a major problem and only the first paddlers in the various catagories were announced on the day. The team event was cancelled and the Championship event will now be held in conjunction with the Royal Dee W/W Race on the 9th February.

The conditions of the Nith were excellent for a Championship event presenting /

presenting conditions akin to those likely to be encountered abroad - boulder strewn rapids with large standing waves and tricky falls.

REPORT NITH RACE 1975 - Scottish White Water Championships
26th January 1975 A.Douglas Allison

In appalling weather this race was run for the second time by Dumfries Canoe Club down one of the most exciting courses in Britain. Despite high winds and rain before and during the race, the river was actually at an acceptable level and Down River Racers were challenged to complete 8 miles nearly half of which was in the Grade III/IV range. Both immediately before and after the race the river was in full spate and caused major flooding further down the valley. It has been known to rise 20 - 30 feet in the gorge itself!

Sunday 26th was a grey day with a rising southerly wind, which must have come round a very sharp corner from the Arctic, blowing straight up the course. As the magic hour of 11 a.m. drew near sleet began to fall and fingers and brains began to go numb. So it was with some reluctance that 24 able bodied men set off downstream to "the second road bridge across the river" a mere 8 miles away. Determination must have been high though, as 18 survived the course with the fastest paddler making an average speed of over 10 m.p.h. Sad to say that this Scottish Championship was won outright by an Englishman with the new Scottish Champion some 12 seconds behind. Mind you, he'd never done the course before so it was a good run.

Ladies and Juniors had the course shortened to a mere 5 miles which still included some awkward water, and 3 ladies (including a Junior Lady) duly set off followed by 4 of the younger men. Times were still pretty good with the first lady making 9 m.p.h. and the first Junior boy making nearly 11 m.p.h:

For slalom canoeists, Juniors covered the same course as the D.R.R. class Ladies. Again there was a good entry here with some 20 competitors starting. More would probably have done so if the weather had been kinder, for by this time the morning had drawn on; the weather had drawn in; and the starter at least was nearly frozen solid. From this number 17 finished the course (too easy perhaps?) with the first place going to a West Coast Englishman this time! Fortunately Scots took the next places.

Finally an even shorter course was chosen for Junior competitors and here 13 males and 4 females braved the conditions to eat up 3 miles of water. From the results it would seem that some were hungrier than others with three very fast times, and the rest a good bit slower. There was quite a high fall-out rate here too with only 9 male finishersall the girls came through though. It was only in this last Ladies Junior section that the host Club made any impact on the results with a 1st and 2nd. For the rest, it seems that Edinburgh is the canoeing capital of Scotland these days. (Now I come to think of it, isn't it actually Scotland's capital....?!)

Because of the foul weather the team events were cancelled. These will be run for the Scottish Championships on another river at a later date. All entry fees will be returned in due course. Let us hope that the weather is never-so bad again this year.

A final word of thanks to the Duke of Buccleugh and his staff for permission to run the event through the Estate and have free access to the river; to Dumfries Sub Aqua Club for their rescue services (did anyone see them? - they saw you!); to the various timers and helpers including cooks; and lastly to all the competitors who turned out when we could all have been home watching the telly; without their fearless courage, etc. etc. it would have been a dull day. See you all next year...
