### MORAG EATON &Lillian Williamson A WEST COAST LOG

Members of the group: - Blanch Keith Bootland, Karen Brown, Deter Brown, Morag Eaton, alex Farrell, Jeannie Stewart, Lillian Williamson, & John Young Leader. Sat. 19 July . After meceting at John Young's @ 9.00, we set off from Telford Coll. 12 noon , complete with 6 boats, 9 people, and a box of kippers. We stopped at Pitlochry for tea. Stopped at Kinloch Moidart for the night. Kippers for lunch Sun . After breakfasting on Kippers, attempted to pack our boats-this, however, met with little success, because of continuous arguments. I had a lunch of hamburgers, (and kippers ). We left the campsite at about 6. o'clock. Our campsite was a sandy beache at the mouth of L. Moidart.

Then, after another meal of Kippers, and a walk, we turned in for the night. Mon. The weather was too bad to canoetoday, so Karen, Alex and Morag decided to walk back along the coast to Kinloch Moidart, A miles , as the canoe paddles, however, when mistaking contours for tracks, the walk tended to become a few miles longer. We finally reached the main road and hitched into the village. Then, after buying some food, and the shop's supply of Mars bars, we ate a meal in a small tea shop, and started back . Fortunately, we were given a lift most of the way. While we had been away the rest of the group had been given a mapreading lesson. Tues. After packing our cances in brilliant sunshine, we started to paddle across to A=10aig- in wind, rain and an 8' swell. Made camp and are staying here until either the weather improves, and we can cross to Eigg, or if not continue up the coast. Roday 5 of us went back to Kinlochmoidart from Port nam Marrach. (10)

The others went a trip into Arisaig and back.

Thu. Didn't cance today, as wind was force 5 with heavy rain. Went into Mallaig for provisions. Visited the loch, sands, and falls of morar.

Friday. Today some of us climbed the rocks, then the 5 who'd gone back to the Transit at Kinlochmoidart drove into Arisaig, left the Transit, and canoed back. 1 week to go. See you when we get back.

17th International Regatta, Zaandam, Holland, 7th/8th June 1975.

Following the successful visit to the Netherlands in 1974 the Scottish Canoe Association Sprint Committee elected to send an enlarged team to participate at Zaandam this year. A total of twelve paddlers, comprising 1 lady, three youths, one novice, 3 juniors, three seniors and a veteran were selected on the results of time trials held at Dullater in early May and the group, travelling in four cars made the journey south to Harwich on Thursday 5th June. One unfortunate and regretable incident marred an otherwise uneventful journey south - due to a misunderstanding regarding his pick-up point Robert Montgomery failed to make contact and sadly missed the opportunity to take part in what would have been his second regatta at Zaandam.

The journey to Holland was by the night ferry and the group were grateful for the comfort afforded by the berth accommodation which enabled the majority at least to disembark refreshed for the short final stage of the journey from the Hook to Zaandam. Unlike 1974 the weather was hot and sunny and this encouraged everyone to quickly pitch tents and after a light breakfast venture for their first paddle on the nearby canals. The mirror-like water maintained the paddlers interest and long leisurely jaunts were made by all around the suturbs of Zaandam in search of quaint Dutch houses.

Friday afternoon was spent acclimatising to the hot conditions and after an early evening meal the entire team set off for what is likely to be a regular feature of the visits to Holland - a tour of Amsterdam. Alas both memory and geography failed in attempts to re-visit the "bright" spots discovered in 1974 and the group had to content itself spending the evening in "Rembrantsplatz" surveying the renowned characters of Amsterdam.

Saturday dawned bright and warm and after a morning cruise around the local canoe club the team travelled to the regatta site, one of the main canals of Zaandam, for the long distance events of the weekend. Being aware of the language difficulties experienced at managers meetings in 1974 the management group secured the services of an English-speaking Dutch official to act as interpreter for the weekend. This enabled our programme amendments to be successfully effected.

Our team got off to an excellent start in the afternoon events with Maureen McClure paddling competently to hold second place in the Junior Ladies event over an unfamiliar course length of 3000 metres. In the next event, Mens K1 (u-16 years), Douglas Melville led the field to the half way stage the 1000 metre buoy and a close tussle developed over the next 500 metres between Douglas and his team mate Lindsay Wright. Over the final 500 metres of this event a late successful challenge from the West German paddler Ankersmit resulted in Scotland taking second and third positions.

In the Senior Mens 10,000 metres Drew Patchelor gained highest position finishing in eighth place. The event started at a fantastic speed and Drew had the misfortune to be baulked by several paddlers all chasing the renowned Hoekstra; this caused him to slow down momentarily and so lost his position with the leading group. Undaunted Drew steadily remade the lost ground and although unsuccessful in regaining a position with the leading group he finished strongly with Tomanski and Kent.

Drew Samuel in the Junior 10,000 had the misfortune to slip his footrest in the opening stages and had to retire after only 100 metres. Ian
Speirs and Colin Dunlop maintained a position in the upper part of the
field and, after paddling close together for much of the event, finished
7th and 9th respectively. The final event of the Saturday saw Jim Dolan
holding a position with the leading group in the Novice 10,000 for much
of the event, however, towards the end the distance combined with the hot
conditions resulted in him finishing 6th with Poortman, the paddler whom
he had wash hung for much of the event going on to take first place.

Saturday evening was spent in the local club facilities attending a social and dance which lasted up until midnight. The strains of the day's paddling were felt by many of the paddlers who opted to turn in early in preparation for the events of Sunday.

With the first event scheduled for 8.45 a.m. and the managers meeting one hour beforehand everyone was up early on the Sunday. In the 500m qualifying heats only Jim Dolan (novice) managed to gain a place high enough to reach the final - in which he eventually came 3rd. Drew, Alan and Colin narrowly missed third position in their heats finishing 4th, 5th and 5th respectively. The youth u-16 500m event was split into two finals due to large numbers and both Lindsay Wright and Douglas Melville won their events to gain our first gold medals of the competition.

We were more fortunate in the 1000m K1 events with Ian, Colin and Jim all qualifying for their finals. Ian was unfortunate to miss the start of his final event due to his competing in the K2 event immediately beforehand; Colin managed to attain 7th place in the junior final and Jim 5th in the novice.

In the K2 events it was the youth and novice paddlers who achieved our greatest successes with Melville/Wright finishing 2nd in the u-16 event over 500m; Dolan/Wright finishing 2nd in the novice event over 500m; Speirs/Batchelor gave a most creditable performance in the senior 500m finishing in 5th position amongst a field of international K2 pairs. In the junior 1000m K2 Speirs/Samuel finished strongly to hold 5th position.

Our third gold medal together with a magnificent trophy was gained by Maureen McClure in the junior ladies 500m event. With several scratchings the heats for this event were cancelled and a straight final arranged as the third last event of the programme. Maureen got off to a fine start and steadily increased her lead finishing an incredible 16 seconds ahead of the second lady home. An exciting climax to a weekend's canoeing.

For the second year in succession sustained team effort has produced a set of results for which all competitors should be congratulated. For those who view success in terms of medals obtained we gained a total of ten. The more important success for all paddlers was I feel, their reaction to and experience of International competition; new friendships have been established and a reputation maintained of which all participants can be proud.

In concluding this report I would like to thank all the team for their contribution to the success of our visit to Zaandam. The hard work and hours of preliminary training at home has been justly rewarded.



The Three Lochs Marathon is one of the oldest canceing events in Britain. The route is a combination of sea, loch and river, and presents participants with an unique opportunity to test their skills in a variety of conditions in some of the most beautiful scenery in Scotland.

Participants who do not already have a detailed knowledge of the area are advised to make a thorough study of maps and charts before the event.

Completion of either the Full course or the Short Course is an achievement in itself and the members of all teams who finish will receive a Certificate of Merit.

Classes.

SENIOR - over 18 years of age on 1st Jan.1975.

JUNIOR - 15-18 years (signature of parent/guardian required with entry)

- Route. FULL COURSE ( 52 miles) SENIORS ONLY.
  - Saturday: Start at Duck Bay Marina (OS Ref 372836) 12 miles north of Balloch proceed down River Leven to Dumbarton; down River Clyde estuary, and up Gare Loch to Garelochhead, keeping well clear of the prohibited area by Faslane. Portage to Loch Long.

    Canoe up Loch Long to camp site at Ardgatan (Forestry Commission)
  - Sunday: Cance to Arrochar. Portage to Tarbert on Loch Lomond.

    Pertago to Establish Local. Cance down toch Lomond,
    passing Luss to Finish at Duck Bay Marina.
  - SHORT COURSE ( 32 miles) SENIORS AND JUNIORS.
  - Saturday: Start at Helensburgh Kidston Car Park(OS Ref 279829)
    between Helensburgh and Rhu. Canoe and portage via Garelochhead
    to campsite at Ardgatan (as above-Full Course).
- Sunday: Route as above- Arrochar, Tarbert, Loch Lomond, Duck Bay Marina.
- Start. Teams may start at any time between 0800 and 1200 hrs on Sat.6th Sept. and between 0800 and 1000 hrs on Sun.7th Sept. Teams must report to the Starter one hour before their intended departure time for an equipment check.
- Recording. Observation points will be set up at a number of places; DuckBay, Dumbarton, Helensburgh, Garelochhead, Ardgartan, Arrochar, Tarbert, luss and Duck Bay. Team numbers must be clearly shown on a white disc.
- Portages. These cover busy roads. The Police are aware of the event, but care must be taken by every competitor. Consideration for other road users and property must be shown. Trolleys may be carried for portages.
- Prizes. Prizes will be presented to each member of the winning teams, senior and junior. Certificates of Merit will be awarded to members of teams completing the course.

Three Lochs Canoe Marathon (contd) ....

Fees. Senior £3.00. per team. Junior £2.10p per team (Incl.Camp sitefee)
Entry forms. Entry form attached. Closing date for entries TUES.2nd SEPT.

- RULES. 1. Teams will consist of three kayaks, one of which may be a double (i.e. a team may have three or four members).
  - 2. At least one of the kayaks in each team must be a touring type craft. i.e. of no competitive class.
  - 3.All competitors must be properly equipped for sea canoeing as for B.C.U. Profiency standard. BS 3595 lifejackets will be worn at all times on the water. Flares will be carried by each team member, also First Aid Kit, exposure bag etc. The kayaks must have adequate bouyancy securely fitted, and deck lines for rescues. Each team must have a spare paddle.
  - 4. The team members must at all times remain together as a group on the water. Throughout the course there must be no more than one minute between the first and last team member.
  - 5. Camping equipment will be carried by the team and will include adequate tenting accomodation, food, sleeping bags, clothes, toweletc, pots, pans and utensils as used for a normal camp.
  - 6. No assistance may be accepted at any time after starting. This includes the portage, food supplies, safety etc.
  - 7. Finishing points on the Saturday and the Sunday will be indicated by a red and white flag on shore, and the teams time will be that of the last member of the team to touch the flag. Competitors must report to the judges on arrival and on Saturday make camp immediately thereafter.
    - 8. Teams withdrawing from the Marathon after having started must inform the organisers. If this cannot be done personally, telephone 041.776.1445.
    - 9. Competators enter this Marathon at their own risk and the organisers can accept no responsibility for injury or damage. Competitors must be capable of coping with the variety of conditions which they may encounter in this event.
    - 10. Any infringement of the rules will render the team liable to disqualification.

For the third successive year full white water racing and slalom teams are representing Scotland at International events this summer.

The first event of the series was held at Spittal in Austria over the period 11th - 13th July.

- The team arrived at Spittal on the Wednesday prior to the weekend's events 1 PINT and after a short inspection of the Lieser the whole team of eleven with the Team Manager embarked upon an ill-fated cruise down the river. Alas, our knowledge of local weather patterns and water level fluctuations was lacking and the effects of afternoon thunderstorms at the head of the valley caused the river to rise a foot between inspection and practise. This created large stoppers and holes which caused havoc with the racers but delighted the slalomists in their more manoeuverable crafts.
- 2PINTS The first casualty of the afternoon paddle was D. Melville; in a moment of relaxation he allowed himself to be swept sideways into a stopper, capsized, failed to roll and was swept down the river for some distance before being towed to the side. His boat was less fortunate, ending up a total write-off some 2 miles downstream.

The water was becoming increasingly turbulent and R. Kennedy, A. Morton, B. Kersel had to demonstrate their rolling prowess during the 5 mile paddle.

The W.W. race course at Spittal finishes at the start of the Slalom site if the water is high and includes the slalom course when the river is low. our restricted knowledge of what was "high water" and what was "low water" we decided to venture down the slalom course to be confronted with gaping 3 PINTS stoppers and huge standing waves - the former capsized L.Wright and K.Fraser, wrenched them from their boats and gave them uncomfortably long swims. Unfortunately both canoes disappeared, never to be seen again. Scottish team's introduction to Continental rivers had been costly and the nerve of several paddlers stretched to the extreme.

On Thursday the level had dropped sufficiently to tempt several paddlers on to the river again but not without cost - L. Wright again capsized and wrote off one of the spare boats.

In the team event on Friday afternoon the heavy water was responsible for the rather disappointing placings of 9th and 10th in a field of 17 teams. J. Dolan was seconded from the Slalom team as a substitute for Lindsay whose nerves were still the worse of two swims. However, Jim's experience of the white water course was insufficient to lead the 'B' team down the course in a faster time than A. Morton whose team finished 50 seconds ahead.

The heavy toll of damage continued in the individual event on Saturday when only two of the five Scottish paddlers completed the course. A. Morton retired with a holed boat, R. Kennedy and B. Kersel capsized, failed to roll and the former wrote off his boat.

K. Fraser finished 18th and J. Oliver 31st, both very commendable performances when one considers that of 46 starters only 35 completed the course.

The Scottish Slalom team, disappointed with the cancellation of the team event due to high water, gave a creditable performance in the individual event. In a field of 103 competitors positions attained were: J. Dolan, 13th; G. Florence, 35th; J. Young, 46th; S. Ramage, 60th. The Slalom Course had been reduced in length because of the high water level and the fast water coupled with a tight course suited J. Dolan more than the other team members. Jim's time of 137 secs. clear was only 17 secs behind the renowned Norbert Sattler (Austria) the winner of the event (whose autograph may be seen by private arrangement with David Cuthill) P. Fauster (Austria) was second. With the events of our first weekend's competition over and the remaining canoes repaired, the team felt justified in spending their last night in town sampling the local booze and writing this.
