

#### E D I T O R I A L

Isn't it a bit unfair that when there is a strike the workers are usually blamed? The managers somehow or other are exempt.

If "tomorrow's managers" are at present studying at University and currently doing a spot of canoe racing, then Britain's industrial decline must be assured if their behaviour at River Races is anything to go by:

On what grounds do I make this libellous statement? Simply from my experiences at the Grandtully D.R.R. plus one other anecdote which I am sure you will find interesting.

At Grandtully, the worthy students from Glasgow, Strathclyde and Aberdeen, despite being sent information regarding the event two weeks earlier, declined to enter before the day as requested. Glasgow University and Strathclyde University arrived shortly after 11 a.m. and held up the start for some time while I entered them and some other non-students.

Aberdeen University arrived after mid-day, completely missing the race. Heriot Watt University entered a week earlier with the correct fees, even including those for the team event. However, they changed boats and names on the day of the race without informing me. Consequently there was some confusion that evening when they 'phoned for results!

Edinburgh University did not appear for the race; they were probably up to the eyes organising the Tay race for the following weekend. Their event must have come as an afterthought and did not appear on the Calendar. Consequently there was only an entry of around 20 appeared on the day. Give them their due though, the E.U.C.C. race was well organised and the hot soup much appreciated!

Meanwhile, back at Grandtully. One young lady, a former student, entered late, complained about her number, was unaware she had won her class and proceeded to practise on the river during the prizegiving. All in all this made for a rather unhappy day at the races for the organiser.

Oh yes, I almost forgot, "the anecdote" or should I say by now, the epilogue?

Edinburgh University nominated Peter Turcan for Sportsman of the Year at the University. Peter had a distinguished year of competition in 1976 and consequently won the award. A special presentation was arranged with the University dignitaries in attendance, but unfortunately Peter was unable to attend as he was out training. "What conceit" you might say? No! the Canoe Club just forgot to tell Pete he had won the Award.

During 1977 the S.C.A. hopes to send teams abroad to compete in W.W. Slalom, L.D. and Sprint events. Final details will not be known for some time but it is probable that (a) a combined W.W. and Slalom team will visit the Continent in late July/early August for events at Augsburg, Mittenwald, Lofer and Laningen, (b) an L.D. team will go to Denmark for the Gudena Marathon on 17/18th September and (c) a Sprint team will go to an appropriate event during the summer.

The selectors will decide the precise mix of each team but it is their present intention to aim for a balanced mixture of seniors and juniors.

Selection events will be:-

- 1. W.W. 1st Senior and 1st Junior at the Nith on 27th February.
  1st/2nd Senior and Junior at the Awe on 24th April.
  (There is a possibility of two Canadian paddlers being chosen if there are paddlers available who are considered to be of sufficiently high standard).
- 2. Slalom Grandtully Div. I Slalom on 9/10th April.
- 3. Sprint based on Sprint Regattas at Strathclyde Park on 7th May and 4th June, and Loch Lubnaig on 22nd May.
- 4. L.D. based primarily on performance in Tay Marathon on 3/4 September supplemented by results in Three Lochs Marathon on 25/26 June.

The Selectors for 1977 are: -

W.W. and Slalom: - Kath Irvine, Andrew Manwell, Graham Smith.

L.D. and Sprint: - Bill McKinley, Fred Nelson, John Turcan.

Team Managers: - Sprint - Bill McKinley

L.D. - John Turcan

Slalom and W.W. - to be appointed.

Most senior competitive paddlers in Scotland will know about trips abroad by Scottish teams but some younger paddlers may not be aware of the opportunities open to them in all branches of the sport. Chances of selection are good for those who train regularly and take part in both the selection and other events.

Although selection is based primarily on performance at particular events, the Selectors usually need to take into account performance at other events before reaching a final decision on team composition. To try to make sure that relevant information is available when required, a central record of race results is being started this year. Those who would like to be included can obtain the record forms from the S.C.A. office in Edinburgh or from John Turcan.

This year's A.G.M. was held in Bristol, one of the biennial forays into the Provinces which make it more rather than less difficult for many members to attend.

Meetings of various committees were held throughout the day and I stayed for a while at the L.D., Sprint, Sailing and Sea Touring Committees. The Sea Touring Committee is still in process of formation and whilst I was at their meeting the proposed rules were amended to include a statement that on matters related to Scotland the Committee would liaise with the S.C.A.

The A.G.M. started at 1500 hrs and I was told that the attendance of about 130 was higher than usual. Many present were, I think, surprised by the election results. Though David Wain is held in high regard by those who know him it came as a surprise when he polled 200 votes to 186 for John Dudderidge. John has made a tremendous contribution to the development of canoeing in Britain and I hope that his advice and help will still be readily available to us in the future.

In the elections for Council, three new members were elected - Hilary Peacock, John Handyside and Geoff Sanders. Eric Totty and Alan Laws were re-elected.

There was only one motion for discussion, namely "that the Slalom and W.W. Committee be separated into two committees". As the management of the Union is constitutionally the prerogative of the Council, the motion was amended to read "this meeting recommends to Council that separate Slalom and W.W. Committees be created". After a full and slightly acrimonious discussion, the voting on a show of hands was 62 For, 24 Against, 14 Abstentions. To my astonishment one of the opposers of the motion asked for proxy votes to be counted and this increased the majority in favour of the motion considerably - 233 For, 56 Against, 18 Abstentions. The B.C.U. Council will now have to investigate the management of Slalom and W.W. as a matter of some urgency and if the recommendation for splitting the committee is not accepted the reasons will need to be good.

\*The A.G.M. ended with the presentation of Awards, though unfortunately many of the trophy winners were absent; a situation we are familiar with at our own A.G.M.

After the A.G.M. a short meeting of the new Council elected Geoff Sanders as the Chairman for 1977 with Ted Owen becoming vice Chairman as well as Treasurer. Ted was clearly happy at shedding some of his responsibilities.

ARRANGEMENTS TO DATE: The race will be of two stages:

Stage I: 26 miles from Killin to Grandtully on Saturday

Stage II: 34 miles from Grandtully to Perth on Sunday.

Teams of 10 paddlers have been invited from Wales, England and Ireland.

The 28th/29th August, 1976, saw the first North East of Scotland Surf Championships being held at Sandend, near Cullen. For those of you who don't know the area, Sandend is on the north coast of Scotland between Inverness and Fraserburgh, some 60 miles north of Aberdeen. Sandend has a superb gently shelving beach which is ideal for surf. The judging is done from the side of the bay so the judges have an excellent view of the competition The organisers were somewhat worried about the event because right up until the Thursday evening there had been weeks of perfect weather for sunbathing. On the Thursday evening a gentle 15 - 20 knot wind from the north, started to blow waves and on the Saturday there was a beautiful sunny day with ideal surf conditions, although the wind was a little cold. On the Sunday morning there was heavy rain which made the surf even better, but made life difficult for judges, competitors and spectators. As a result two of the events had equal points but with conditions being so cold the organisers didn't put the competitors out for another 20 minutes in order to make a decision.

There were nearly 70 competitors who came from all over Scotland, most of them either camped at the Sandend Caravan site or stayed in the Cullen Outdoor Centre which has accommodation for 50 people with ample quantities of hot water for showers, etc.

Sponsorship for the event came from local distilleries and national canoeing

The : main judge was Jim Newnes from Caldercrux and he was joined by a team of surf canoeists.

#### WANTED URGENTLY

2 "INTERCEPTOR" CANOES in reasonable condition

Miss M. Boyd - Brechin High School, Brechin, Angus. The Sprint Regatta planned for 3rd January would probably have been the best attended sprint meeting ever held in Scotland, if the loch had not been frozen solid. Nearly 100 'would-be' competitors actually turned up at the Park and an unknown number wisely stayed in bed or went ski-ing.

During the previous week, Park officials had some difficulty in preparing the buoyed course because of strong winds but these were followed by two days of calm with temperatures down to minus 10°C. The result was that by the morning of the 3rd, not only had the loch frozen over, but the river Clyde alongside was also a mass of ice.

The organising club, Strathkelvin, with the considerable support of Drew Samuel, had put in a lot of preparatory work but, on the day, could do no more than try to dispose of the gallons of soup prepared in the expectation of cold but not freezing conditions. Drew also managed to rescue an unfortunate seagull which was frozen to the road.

Some of the more enthusiastic went for a run around the loch, whilst others inspected the magnificent facilities in the Watersports Centre and the two brand new K.4's belonging to the S.C.A.

Officials of the Park were as disappointed as we were that canoeing was impossible, but we have now arranged for this trial Regatta to take place on 19-20th March. We hope to make good use of the two days by including a 10,000m event and appropriate distances for ladies and juniors. Details will be circulated during February.

#### S.C.A. CANADIAN SLALOM RANKING LIST FOR 1977

Following the increase in interest in Canadian paddling during 1976 the slalom committee has decided to draw up another ranking list on a similar basis for the 1977 season.

Once again it will be based on 6 events, namely:-

FAIRNILEE ... April 2/3rd

COMRIE I ... April 16/17th

LENY ... May 28/29th

AWE ... September 3/4th

POTARCH ... October 15/16th.

Five points will go to the winner of each event for C1 and C2; 4 to the second and so on, and the ranking lists will be drawn up at the end of the season using each person's (pairs) 4 best results.

Organisers of events are asked to make sure that all paddlers who wish to enter Canadian classes at these events are given a run, whether or not they are members of the correct division at that particular slalom. A copy of the results of each slalom should be sent by the organisers to Irvine Ross, the slalom committee secretary. It is hoped that trophies will be available for presentation to the ranking list leaders at next year's S.C.A. A.G.M.

From 1940 to 1959 John and I worked very closely together during our terms as Secretary of our respective canoeing organisations and got to know each other well.

Time makes changes inevitable but still I thought John was good for a year or two yet.

At the Grandtully White Water Race a number of canoes came floating past the finishing line after competitors had come to grief at the fall under the bridge.

It was obvious that at least two of them had insufficient buoyancy in them and caused our rescue service a lot of trouble in getting them to the bank - not the occasion for laughing all the way to the bank! Obviously in these circumstances it helps not at all to have the end loops taped to the deck.

According to the B.C.U. Standards, a kayak must have at least 13.5 kgs (30 lbs) of buoyancy at each end or be able to support at least 27 kgs (60 lbs) dead weight placed amidships, on an even keel fore and aft, when it is fully swamped. Will competitors and others please note.

As a founder member of the Scottish Inland Waterways Association and a committee man for some years, I wonder if I might commend membership to this busy and enthusiastic body to all canoeists who use a canal for their activities. The S.C.A. should certainly be a corporate member; but perhaps they are?

#### THREE LOCHS MARATHON - 25/26 JUNE 1977

The format of the race will be changed this year. The course chosen will be more sheltered and the race will be open to International K1 and K2 craft paddling without gear. In other words the touring aspect of the event is replaced by a true endurance marathon type race.

#### AIR BED RACE

DOWN GRANDTULLY: SUNDAY 13th MARCH

(at participants' risk)



#### BY KAYAK TO CAPE HORN.

This parody on the title of Jack Henderson's book "By Kayak to Cape Wrath" is taken from the Scotsman article about Barry Smith's projected trip to Cape Horn next December. He is the only Scottish based canoeist in the party which will be made up by three others from the South:

Nige Matthews, Frank Goodman and Jim Hargreaves.

The kayaks for the expedition were designed by Goodman. They are approximately 18' long and weigh about 50 lbs each. The trip will mean roughly 350 miles by canoe and include some open water - one crossing being 18 miles. A radio will be included with the gear so that weather forecasts can be picked up from Tierra Del Fuego. The Chilean Navy will also assist if required. This is wild country and campsites are going to be difficult to find, but no doubt we shall be hearing all about it later. Obviously a lot of training will have to be done and trips are planned for this summer round Cape Wrath and across the Pentland Firth.

We had hoped that Barry Smith himself might have been able to write something for this issue of Kayak, but he is out of town at present.

However, if we are lucky, we might get some personal thoughts from him on this high adventure, for our next issue.




