EDITORIAL SECTION OF THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPE

Once again the weather jinxed Scottish canoeing at Strathclyde Park. At the beginning of the month the first Scottish Sprint Championships to be held at the Park were cancelled due to the strong cross winds. One wonders whether this is a valid reason for cancelling a Regatta? What are the criteria for cancelling a Sprint event? Obviously, "Safety" must top the list, and certainly it could easily be seen that the rescue craft, of which there were at least two, had difficulty coping with capsizing youngsters. But I did not see any of the over eighteens risking their lives! It was obvious that the organisers considered a "democratic vote by the paddlers" as being a close second on the list, and who can blame them; but is it really up to the paddlers to make decisions about events? I don't think so. A few River Racing and L.D. paddlers were keen on continuing the event because they were better able to cope with the rough water, but they were heavily outvoted. Is this fair?

The British Universities paddlers coped after a fashion and their main events were run without a great deal of difficulty. If we had invited foreign teams to the event, would we have sent them home without a race?

What was particularly sad about this occasion was the gigantic amount of work put into the event which went to waste. Moreover, it could be seen that an enormous proportion of the work and responsibility was carried on very few shoulders, and this leads me to another point:

It is true to say that we just do not have enough non-competing officials in Scotland, and events at Strathclyde Park are going to prove very difficult to run well without an increased number of helpers. Unfortunately, at the moment the extra tasks still have to be carried out by active competitors. Some of our best competitors were involved in considerable extra work in the days before to ensure the smooth running of the event. There is no doubt that until competitors are completely free to concentrate on training and racing the full potential of Scottish racing will not be realised. Moreover, the pressures on the present organisers may prove so much that they relinquish their posts.

I am sure all the competitors would join me in, firstly, thanking those who did give of their valuable time to help run the event both before and during the ill fated day; and, secondly, in pleading for assistance from the ranks of our elders to take an active interest in the future organisation of our Sport.

The Universities may have come in for some criticism last issue, but I had to swallow my words and a few glasses of ale at the Glasgow University Canoe Club dinner on Friday 13th May (unlucky for those who did not make it)

As a social event it must rank as the Scottish Championship with gold medals all round. The club boasts fifty active (very) members, and there must have been at least forty of them at the dinner plus another twenty past members and dignitaries - and Graham Smith: The event was held at the Athletic Club at Westerlands and the start was at 8p.m. with no late entries being accepted: Dinner was excellent and was followed by speeches, a slide show and a Disco. I did not make the finish due to lack of fitness, so what followed the disco is perhaps best left to the imagination.

The speechmaking by Irvine Ross, Colin Tannock and the Rev. William Hewitt, lasted well over an hour due principally to the long breaks while the audience recovered from each quip and witicism. The slide show, not suitable for children, was superbly compered by the inimitable, incomparable, iniquitous, incredible, inebriated George Clelland.

Trophies

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TROPHIES

Organisers of events may be interested to know of a mail order firm who specialise in Trophies. The firm has had a number of exhibitions of their wide range of cups, shields, medals and plaques in and around Scotland recently.

They have many trophies of a reasonable standard costing little more than a pound, and these may be engraved by machine at the rate of ten letters for 15p.

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Another canoeing season is well underway. Teams have been selected for the Slalom and W/W Tour of the Continent and several successful "home" events have been staged.

In Down River Racing there was considerable disappointment in the low level of the River Nith which resulted in the event being deranked as the Scottish Championship event. This was switched to the River Awe in late April where the medals went to Messrs. Turcan, Lang (without an i) and Oliver. The level of the Awe was lower than normal although the previous day had seen the river in almost flood conditions. Perhaps greater liaison is necessary with the Hydro Board if we are to gain best advantage of this excellent stretch of water. During the 1977/78 racing season an increased number of Canadian boats have taken part in competitions and it is pleasing to note the improving standard in this field. The hard working duo of "George and Hugh" deserve special mention for their devotion to C2 racing during the year. They have trained regularly and coped with water conditions in a most proficient manner.

Several slaloms have been staged with the usual high attendance at The Teith event was blessed with very good water ever popular Comrie. conditions - perhaps somewhat fierce for several first time novices, however the experience will place these paddlers in an advantageous position in the future. It is always difficult for event organisers to set up a course which can be adjusted to compensate for large fluctuations in water level and it is sometimes the case that a course appears considerably more difficult than perhaps it ought to be for the particular Division under test. Competitors should remember that everyone is placed at the same disadvantage with respect to tackling the gates and the more difficult ones can usually be by-passed if the competitor so wishes. Compared with south of the border, the Scots are in a most enviable position with regard to canoeing waters. Let us set the standard of course at the various divisional levels so that we do not end up with a series of flat water events at the lower end of the slalom spectrum. Only by experiencing moving and rough water can our young paddlers gain experience and confidence.

For several years our top slalom and Down River Racers have come from one of the three centres of population, Glasgow / Aberdeen / Edinburgh but recently new names have appeared in the result sheets from other parts of Scotland. It is encouraging to see, for example, that a most active club is now in existence at Brechin High School. Let us hope that it is not too long before Brechin can boast of having paddlers in the Scottish Team.

In Division I slalom it is the same old names that dominate the top end of the result sheets. Messrs. Dolan, Young and Cuthill continue

before other Scots placings are evident. Perhaps more training and a more serious approach to the sport would see Messrs. Milne and Florence of the Aberdeen Club higher up the finish. When paddlers do qualify for Scottish Team selection they should assume a more responsible approach to the sport so that they give their very best in International events. It is to these experienced paddlers that our young hopes look for encouragement - not to down pints of bear in rapid valcoes for the best demonstrate a high degree of fitness and skill on the water.

BRITISH 10,000m CHAMPIONSHIPS

For the first time ever the K1 10,000m Championships come to Scotland. The event is to be held at Strathclyde Park on June 4th and should be a most exciting event to watch. In the Senior 'A' class men, Alistair Wilson, Peter Turcan, Andrew Morton and Drew Batchelor will be competing. As you see from the results on page 13 Alistair won this event ten years ago, and in fact, was British Champion for many year.

On the following day, competitors move to Loch Lubnaig for a Long Distance race which is one of the three selection events for the British L.D. Team this summer.

PUT THIS DATE IN YOUR DIARY - JUNE 4th - Strathclyde Park.

CONGRATULATIONS to Maureen McClure and Robert Montgomery who have been selected to paddle for the British Spring Racing Team in Continental regattas this year.

The Scottish Championships, the selection events, the ranking races and smaller events are over bar the June race on the Awe.

This season has seen a very high standard of competition in Scotland borne out by the number of different names appearing in the top places at each event. Andrew Morton's stranglehold on Down River Racing has finally been broken and, in fact, his performance throughout the season was completely overshadowed by the speed and capability of Peter Turcan, Robin Lang and Kenny Fraser. These three, along with Jas Oliver, have been selected for the Scottish Senior Team travelling abroad this summer, and we probably have not had such a fit team in the short history of Scottish River Racing.

The early part of the season was dominated by Port Glasgow paddler Robin Lang who performed well at the Eden, came first at the Aberdeen Dee and Grandtully. During the winter, Peter suffered from the rare disease of over training, but as the season progressed, came up fast along with Kenny Fraser who won at the Clyde and the Nith. After these wins Kenny was very disappointed to be beaten at the Awe, especially since he beat Peter again at the Tryweryn the following weekend. Peter really only appeared at the Awe, but with devastating success.

Other wins came from Alan Eastwood, Colin Tannock and Andrew Morton. Next season we are sure to see Alan making a bid for the Team which could well be successful. In the meantime, lay your bets for the B.C.U. Ranking Event on the Awe.

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Organised by Strathkelvin Kayak Club

In the past this event has basically been a tour which combined river, loch and sea canoeing for teams of three. Teams were required to carry all gear for the race and for camping and to negotiate two portages. This year the nature of the race has been totally changed.

In September, a Scottish team will compete at Gudena in Denmark and although the selection for this is the Tay Marathon, the results of the Three Lochs will be taken into consideration. Seniors will therefore compete as individuals but in the interests of safety, Juniors will still race in teams of three.

BRIEFING This will take place at 1.00 p.m. on the Saturday at Ardgarten Camp Site. The Senior start will be at 2.00 p.m.

COURSE SENIORS (56 mls). JUNIORS (27 mls.).

SENIORS

Start at the camp site at Ardgarten (OS 275030).

Proceed down Loch Long and turn right into Loch Goil.

Canoe up to the head of Loch Goil, turn around a buoy and return to Loch Long and Ardgarten.

Sunday Start at Tarbet on Loch Lomond. Proceed north to turn around a buoy at Ardlui and return to Tarbet. Continue south to Luss and finish at Duck Bay.

JUNIORS

Start at the head of Loch Goil and proceed south to turn left into Loch Long. Canoe to finish at Ardgarten.

Sunday

Start at Tarbet. Proceed south to Luss and finish at Duck Bay.

Competitors must keep to the west bank of Loch Lomond where check points will be situated.

CLASSES Seniors. (Age 18 years on 1st Jan.1977). K1 / W.W. / Touring Juniors (Age 15 to 18 years). Teams of three, any class.

N.B. Parents / Guardians signature required.

BLACK CART TODAY - WHERE TOMORROW?

Scottish Canoeing is once more forced to fight a legal battle to prove our right to use rivers in Scotland. Paisley Kayak Club have been prevented by Interim Interdict from using a three mile stretch of the River Black Cart in Renfrewshire.

This case is in stark contrast to the previous Spey Case where we had a river used by canoeists from all over Britain, and a very rich fishing interest. The River Cart is only of local interest at Novice level and the Trout fishing could fairly be described as poor. However, the importance of this case lies in the fact that Castle Angling Club claim the support of their "National Organisation". If this is true their motives, and the future effects on canoeing, if we lose, become obvious.

With this in mind, Paisley Kayak Club and the Scottish Canoe Association are vigorously defending the action, using the Spey case as a defense. We can not be grateful enough that Clive Freshwater had the courage to Fight the Spey Case as far as he did, and thus provide us with something in Law to defend our right to canoe on rivers.

The Paisley Kayak Club is holding the Round Cumbrae L.D. on SUNDAY, 12th JUNE, 1977. It will be a B.C.U. Tier 4 race.

The event will start and finish at the Pencil Monument, Largs. O.S. Sheet 59, map reference 208577. Competitors should assemble in the car park near the monument on the road from Largs to Fairlie.

START TIME Start at 1200 hrs. Briefing at 11.10 a.m. As usual the race will start promptly.

COURSE Senior Route - Round Great Cumbrae. Approx 12 miles.

Junior and Ladies Route - Pencil - Downcraig Ferry - Keppel - Pencil. Approx. 6½ miles.

CLASSES K1, K2, WWR, T1, T2, Slalom; Senior, Ladies, Junior, Veteran and Juvenile.

There must be a minimum of three canoes of a type to constitute a class.

RULES Competitors must comply to B.C.U. L.D.R. Committee Rules.

SAFETY This is a sea race. All competitors MUST wear Lifejackets/Buoyancy Aids, and canoes must be rendered unsinkable. The Organisers cannot accept any responsibility for injury to competitors or damage or loss of their equipment.

Safety boats will patrol the routes.

The event may be cancelled if the weather is bad.

Dear Andrew.

I really am surprised at the tone of your recent editorial in 'Kayak'.

In the first place I think it is a bit much coming from a Glasgow graduate who must remember full well the difficulties that were experienced in the late sixties of getting a good turnout from membership on a guaranteed basis. In that same vein the fact that you had direct experience of club organization in Glasgow and again in Aberdeen must have made you aware of the real problems of student club organization and its peculiar ability to fluctuate almost with the phases of the moon. Over the years I believe this is an inevitable consequence of the rights of students to organize and control their affairs in clubs and I strongly defend their right to do so without interference from people like myself or other officials however well intentioned or informed we may well be in the activity concerned. And so, as you well know, there are bound to be ups and downs in the affairs of student groups, who have a fairly short attachment to the club and are subject to a multitude of other pressures, that cannot be anticipated to any great degree. Any coach or official in the University has to come to terms with these pressures and on the effects they have on the way in which students approach their leisure time activities, and I can only surmise that your attack on the students has occurred in a period of blackout on your own University and College experience. Secondly I think it is unfortunate within the canoeing scene of Scotland for any group or individual to single out a particular section for public attack. It would be and is too easy to launch into attack on event organization, on responses to events on the assumption that by attacking you will bring about an improvement in those affairs. I think, however, that experience shows the reverse is likely to be the outcome, with those under attack deciding "why should we bother if through any effort we make, it is seen as being inadequate by those who have access to communication systems or in official positions". In the circumstance under present attack, the control of affairs lies with the Committee and the event organisers, - simply to establish the already agreed procedure "not to accept entries on the day" but so often organizers are disappointed at the turnout and then may be very happy to accept any money that comes their way whether on time or not.

Finally I feel it is unfortunate that Forth Canoe Club and Kayak Magazine should have joined the ranks of the gutter press in knocking students, as over the years the clubs you attack have provided a very substantial part of the canoeing programme in Scotland and a fair amount of the hardware - even to allow Forth Canoe Club the ability to run the race in question! - so that I would have expected a rather more tolerant attitude towards them, in times when their strengths and enthusiasms are not quite what we would like. I would suggest that the editorial theme of Kayak would be more effective if the exhortation was laced with encouragement rather than criticism, and promote a greater sense of our collective responsibility for the success of Scottish canoeing which cannot be enhanced in my opinion by indulging in attack in print to be given such wide distribution as "Kayak".

Dear Editor,

A regular subscriber to your magazine since its inception, I feel that I must take you to task over what, in my view, is a detrimental theme by one of your major contributors. On receipt of your most recent issue I read with some annoyance the editorial, contributed by the writer in question.

We are all aware of Mr. Morton's high ideals and administrative ability - reflected in his competent management of the S.C.A. monetary affairs. However, I would plead that he "lays off" getting a dig at the majority of the canoeing fraternity - the recreational paddlers, who turn up at the eleventh hour to take part in Down River Races.

In earlier issues he has criticised the organisers and now his latest outburst is directed at the paddlers. We are all aware that organisers would like entries 'days' before the event and, in slalom, I am in complete agreement with the official B.C.U. regulations. However, none of our races are so well attended that rigid start times need be adhered to. It is no great hardship to add extra late entries to the start list on the day and thereby boost the income of the organising club. (Perhaps Mr. Morton's own club is sufficiently wealthy not to need this extra cash if so might I suggest that he refunds some of the extra money charged at the Grandtully event through - dare I say it? - incompetency by the organiser::).

In an area of the sport which is attracting a growing following of young paddlers, let us not get so tied up with needless red-tape and over officiousness that we reach the stage where there are more spectators than paddlers.

The Universities have not come out particularly well in the recent asides by the 'Marjory Proops' of canoeing. Let us not forget the time in the not too distant past when it was the University Clubs who assumed the bulk of all organised canoeing north of the border. The pioneer work by Aberdeen University Canoe Club introduced many people to the competitive scene (including myself) in the late sixties and early seventies. Under the auspices of Strathclyde University, our Coaching Secretary has given stalwart service for many years. No: Mr. Morton, please refrain from getting in your "digs" at the event organisers. Why not turn your energies to a 'dig' in your back garden - rumour has it the Roselea Drive Residents Association are up in arms:

Dear Andy,

We were interested to read your comments on the organisation (or lack of it) in Scottish Universities canoeing and, while recognising that postal entries make race organisation much easier, we would like to make the following observations.

The information sheet for Grandtully stated that entries would be accepted on the day of the event and that such entries would be subject to a 20p surcharge. S.U.C.C. decided to enter on the day and we were very pleased, if a little surprised, when this surcharge was not levied. Since the purpose of the surcharge was to discourage entries on the day, the effect of not charging it is surely to encourage these same entries - so perhaps the organiser should not blame Universities for using the system which his actions encourage.

We would also like to point out that some of the criticisms of late arrivals and entries were un-called for. The editorial claims that Glasgow and Strathclyde were late, which is factually wrong since both were at Grandtully before the organiser, and submitted their entries long before the stated dead-line.

We are told that the students failing is 'organisation', but apparently the graduates failing (Andy was himself a student no more than a decade ago) is 'perspective and accuracy.' We wonder who is worse off,

That the Headquarters of an Olympic ranking sport should issue such a ridiculous, undignified, uninspired piece of publicity is difficult to understand. It will certainly never be displayed on my car. Those in charge at Brompton Road should be ashamed of themselves. What about the S.C.A. producing publicity labels of a more suitable nature?

At the Tweed race it was noticeable that a number of competitors stuck their race number bibs on the deck of their canoes instead of wearing them. This is most inconvenient for the organisers, and will not be acceptable practice in future.

Letter to the Editor

May I endorse the sentiment of your editorial remarks in the last issue of our club magazine. It does seem inconsistent that those who are capable of booking their group transport well in advance for an event are incapable of reserving their entries at the same time.

But the answer to your problem of late entries lies in your own hands as organiser. Should you feel that it is essential that events be run with precision, may I suggest that you merely implement firmly the well-established procedure of refusing to accept late entries. By insisting on this as a matter of course, organisers may be assured of their events running like clockwork.

As an alternative, may I suggest that organisers make a substantial charge for late entries. This would achieve the long term effect of encouraging early registration for events, and in the short-term, would compensate organisers for the complications involved in accepting last-minute entries. It must be possible to arrive at a late-entry fee high enough to deter late entries without a detrimental effect on attendance.

May I comment on another distressing habit of some competitors which was observed both at Grandtully DRR and at the more recent Teith Slalom. I was amazed at the number of paddlers who made little attempt to mark their boats clearly. It is in the competitors own interest to ensure that his number may be easily and correctly read from the bank by the judge, so that times/penalties are assigned to the correct person. I am surprised that those competitors who take the trouble to mark their own boats carefully are not giving short shrift to those who are less careful, and whose penalties they may accrue due to an error. Clear marking is especially important where two are sharing a boat, are assigned start-times close together, cannot return the boat to the start in time for the second person and who consequently starts out of order. If you think that is confusing you should see what happens to the results for the people involved.

It was inexcusable for one slalomist with a kayak and a Canadian Canoe at his disposal, not to have his boats clearly marked. He will not start at the next event where I am setting paddlers off, and I hope that judges will simply not mark any boat whose number they cannot read.

Again, the answer is within the organisers grasp. They have merely to stock white circles/squares and black tape for sale to those who have been refused a run for a poorly marked boat. There is no cause for any animosity if the organisers think out the answers right out to the end.

A word of warning. Let not our club be found short in any of the above matters in the future.


