

Olympic Games

areth Marriot's fourth place in Atlanta again provided the GB canoeists with their best result at the Olympic Games this time missing a medal by the narrowest of margins. The next best result was that of Steve and Andrew Train who came 6th in the final of the Sprint Racing C21000m. All of the Sprint Racing team made the semi finals despite the traumas of late selection due to the ICF assessment criteria. Lynn Simpson's 23rd place in the ladies Slalom Competition came after incurring a 50 second penalty for missing a gate, although she did complete the fastest run of the day. Ian Raspin came 9th and was our best mens K1.

As I write this comment, the debate over Britain's overall performance at the Olympics, the worst for many years, flourishes and the BCU will be having its own debrief to see what can be learnt from the Atlanta experience.

Helen Reeves - Junior Slalom World Champion

Congratulations to Helen Reeves who became the Ladies K1 slalom junior World Champion at the recent event in Lipno, in the Czech Republic. Certainly a tip for the top in future years.

Marathon World Championships Great Britain's first World

Championship canoeing medals of the year were provided by the Marathon Racing team. Ivan Lawler and Steven Harris kept the World title in the mens K2. Steve and Andrew Train regained the title last won by them in 1988 in the mens C2 and Anna Hemmings came second in the ladies K1 winning the silver medal by a fraction of a second.

Sailing and Polo World Championships

Good luck to both the Canoe Polo and the Sailing team's who will be taking part in their respective World Championships later this month in Australia - lets have some more medals!

Sports Club of the Year Awards 1996

The CCPR have once again been asked by the Foundation for Sport and the Arts to find the 'Sports Club of the Year'. Prize money for the 1996 awards will be £10,000 (1st place), £5,000 (2nd place), £1,000 (3rd place).

Olympics 2000

Indications from Australia are that Slalom canoeing will not be included in the Sydney Olympics. The International Canoe Federation are appealing against the decision of the Australian organisers which is said to be because of the high costs involved in developing a course.

The BCU is assisting in ensuring that the case for Canoe Slalom is properly made and that all opportunities for lobbying are being undertaken. Additionally, the Union is making sure that if Slalom cannot be included opportunities to explore the possibility of including Marathon will be pursued. Presentations will be made at a special dinner to take place at the CCPR annual conference on Wednesday 27 November 1996. Nominations should be sent to the BCU office, for the attention of the Chief Executive by 25 October 1996.


As you know October is a very busy period for membership renewals, please get your application in early and allow 10 days for return. We will, during the peak time, give priority to on time renewals and new members.

SPARKS Shine Out in Scotland Around Britain Canoe Challenge

B lind man, Steve Macdonald, aged 24 from Liverpool, and Peter Bray, expert Canoe Instructor of Outdoor Challenge have now crossed the halfway point in their expedition to circumnavigate the coastline of Great Britain for SPARKS, SPort Aiding medical Research for

KidS. Since the launch on 15th May from St. Katherines Dock, London, they have paddled 58 days to Applecross, and undergone 38 enforced rest days due to weather conditions or Steve being ill.

The wind takes on an extremely malevolent personality when it blows in your face no matter how many corners you turn, as it has done with Steve and Pete. They curse the skies quite often! Steve has caught a couple of stomach bugs off the sea, and recently developed the readed tenosynovitis. As soon as endal heard about his ailment they provided modified crank paddles which have greatly eased the use of his wrist. Despite difficulties a clear routine has developed within the team for each expedition day. Peter pores over the nautical almanac, sea charts and O.S maps daily, as each paddle has to be planned and timed perfectly so that fierce tidal races can e avoided or at least conquered at heir lowest force. Fortunately, the canoeists keep to an average speed

of 4mph which helps the support team know when to expect them at each days meeting point.

Pete and Steve now have a host of strange stories about life on Britain's shoreline, they came round Beachy Head at night, not only did their light break, but the moon disappeared! The lighthouse flashing on the white cliffs guided them in the mists. On their paddle out of the Isle of Wight they overtook a yacht at 9mph much to the dismay of the yacht owner! On Holyhead Island 2 young anglers cast out their lines onto the canoe between Steven and Pete as they paddled past. The hooks and weights got tangled in the kit on the canoe and it was only this that prevented Steve from being seriously injured.

Recently the paddlers were joined for a couple of days by Dan and Karen Trotter as they left the support team to camp on Arran, Kintyre, Gigha and Cruach Scarha. They designed and built canoe faroe which fairs excellently in rough sea conditions. They filmed Steve and Pete in action for a possible documentary, and recorded the team's experiences for the Out of Doors programme on Radio 5. Their adventure turned into a wildlife tour as they spotted porpoises, otters, deer, seals, golden eagles, basking sharks and of course the vicious

midges.

The team would like to thank our sponsors, Lendal, Phoenix, Trax and Outdoor Leisure for the top quality equipment they donated; to Dan and Karen Trotter for the canoe and for their support; to the Somerfield staff for all their efforts in fundraising or SPARKS, and the Coastguard and RNLI for their assistance.

Lastly, we would all like to thank the people and canoeists we've met on the way for their kindness and hospitality, as this is what makes good memories in all the months of hard work. We hope to be blessed with good weather for the rest of the trip, which ends in mid-October, especially for Cape Wrath and the Pentland Firth.

Obituary - Dick Grieve

It is with regret that I have to report the death of Dick Grieve on 8th August after a short illness.

Many will remember him for his unstinting service to canoeing for over 20 years which took many forms.

Locally he served Colchester Canoe Club, Essex Canoeing Association (only resigning as treasurer this year after over 12 years service) and the Essex Winter Series of races where his cheerful and ribald humour as starter and finisher was often to be heard at many of the events, and his efficient behind the scenes works ensured prizes and trophies were always available when required.

In the Eastern Region he served as Racing and Marathon representative for over 10 years encouraging the development of the Placid Water Scheme within the region and being a participant at the first placid water award course to be run within the region by David Train in 1982.

I have many fond memories of producing the Eastern Region yearbook with Dick on many an evening in January's past, the pages laid out on his floor while the stapler was getting too hot to hold.

He will be remembered by the British Team for his backroom work transporting boats around Europe, for his ribald humour and harassment, but always ensuring equipment was ready for the event and allowing the competitors to concentrate on the competition, and by the many others in the racing world to whom he will have issued boats during the many regattas he attended in a great variety of roles at Nottingham.

While he will probably be remembered most for his background work he was first and foremost a paddler, and many of us in the Eastern Region will remember him at his last paddle at the Eastern Region day in May where as usual he gave his full support to events to encourage our sport at any and every level.

Dick was awarded the BCU Award of Merit for services to canoeing in 1990.



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

even junior men and three junior women represented Great Britain at this new biannual event. There were 4 European nations competing. All of our boats reached the semi-finals. Our most experienced paddler, Daniel Golder (Banbury), had the most successful regatta. He was our only finalist. He came seventh in the 1000m final and missed the 500m final by 0.15 secs. His time of 1min 48.5 secs was actually the eighth fastest semifinal time.

The K2 of Damien Chapman (Nottingham)and Ross Sabberton (Norwich) had a food regatta missing out on the 1000m final by only 2 seconds. Rachel Train (Fladbury) also missed her 500m K1 final by the same margin. The K4 S00m crew of Chris Cheyne (Leighton Buzzard), Lea Pilgrim (Barking and Dagenham), Adam Kennedy (Fladbury) and Ben Tendler (Wey) came seventh in their semi-final only 4.2 secs behind the winner. The performance of Lucy Hardy (Fladbury) and Nikki Gordon (Barking and Dagenham), in the K2 500m semi-final where they finished ninth was disappointing. However, Nikki will still be a junior next year, along with Adam Kennedy and Damien Chapman when the Junior World Racing Championships will be in Lahti, Finland from 19th to 23rd July.

majority agreement, among the member states, the Standard should become effective in Spring 1997.


The main 'bone of contention' has been whether or not there should be two types of helmet within the scope one for water grade 2-3, the other for 3-4.

The French and Germans have now agreed to a shock absorbtion performance figure for a single standard for use on water up to grade 4. (It is generally accepted that those paddlers who paddle grade 5 and above must make their own decisions with regard to the type and level of protection necessary).

Once the Standard is agreed it can be used to demonstrate conformity to the requirements of the EC Directive on Personal Protective Equipment. The Directive became effective on 1 July 1995, and from that date it was illegal for a manufacturer to 'place for sale' a helmet that did not carry an EC mark, indicating conformity to the requirements of the Directive.

Helmets held in stock by retailers, may continue to be sold, however, while stocks last. Helmets issued to paying clients may continue to be used for the duration of their reasonable life.

S aturday started with the Junior K2 where Daniel Golder & Damien Chapman were always in the lead group and doing much of the work. Leading out of the last turn they dropped the Poles and then the Hungarians and with 50 metres to go it looked as if they would win but the Swedes had one final burn in hand and finished extremely fast, making up three lengths to take victory.

In the Junior Men K1, the South African Hank McGregor always seemed in control of the race. Getting among the tail-end K2s he pulled away to win by 2 minutes. Ross Sabberton was in the third group and won the sprint to take a good 5th. place, but Lea Pilgrim never seemed comfortable despite some slick portaging and finished 12th.

The Junior Ladies, Rachel Train and Lucy Hardy both had steady races in the middle of the field to finish 10th. and 12th. respectively.

Connor Holmes had an excellent start in the Mens K1 but then allowed himself to drift towards the rear of the large lead group, worried about conserving his strength over 40km. When this split he ended up

> in the third group. Neil Coleman had a slower start and in this class of field and a very fast race, was unable to work his way to the front as he had done in the Grand Prix earlier in the year. On the final lap a leading group of 4 broke clear and in an exciting finish the Australian, Chad Meek, out sprinted Gary Mawer of Ireland and Richmond with the 1995 World Cup champion, Rui Cancio of Portugal, third.

> A clear win by the Swedish Ladies K2 went down well with the home crowd but even more popular was the other Swedish K2 of Eklund & Augustssom. Capsizing off the start they caught up with the race and worked their way through the field to finish 4th. Just ahead of Sonja Bapty & Trish Davies who worked really hard for their fine 5th. place. Helen Gilby & Alison Thorogood had a good start but after several clashes finished back in a disappointing 8th.

Legendary Arne Nielsson

The first day's racing was completed with the C1 race won by the legendary Arne Nielsson of Denmark in his last international competition. He was able to cruise the second half of the race and still finish over 2 minutes clear. James Lee did far better than expected to finish in the

top 10. His time was less than 6 minutes outside the medals and with only 1.5 minutes covering 6th. to 9th. places, he was very much in the thick of the racing.

Sunday started with the Mens - perhaps the closest race of the lot. The initial lead group of 14 boats broke into two groups after about 7 km. with Ivan Lawler & Steve Harris in the first group and Simon Dark & Greg Slater in the second

At the last portage there were still 5 boats in the lead group including both Swedish boats which ensured a certain amount of partisan encouragement from the P.A. system. However Ivan & Steve ensured they were first out of the portage and there was no way they were going to let anyone past. To the cheers of the British supporters they retained their World title in fine style. The excitement of their sprint finish was hardly over before Simon & Greg led in the second group to take a well earned 6th. place.

To have a lead group of 5 boats at the finish with another group of 4 just 30 seconds down is unprecedented at a World Championships and indicates how the overall standard is rising.

The Brits went wild

Early on in the C2 race the Train brothers broke clear of the pack with the two Hungarian boats and we all expected another long race of attrition. But Steve & Andy stepped up the pace after the top turn,

dropping one of the Hungarian boats and on the second lap stormed away to go one better than in Amsterdam 2 years ago and become World Champions - by nearly 6 minutes. The Brits went wild - two races and two wins.

The final race was the Ladies K1. Anna Hemmings was drawn six places away from the defending World Champion and Olympic gold medallist, Susanne Gunnarsson of Sweden. But she managed to sprint fast enough off the start to cut across the field onto her wash. These two with the 1995 World Cup champion, Nicole Bulk of Holland, were soon clear of the rest of the field

Towards the end of the first lap Bulk was dropped leaving Anna and Gunnarsson to contest first place; Gunnarsson had the better final portage with only 1,200 metres to go but Anna was immediately back with her and the final result was in doubt right to the line. In the end Gunnarsson's strength and the frantic home crowd enabled her to edge ahead but it was obvious from the state of the Swede that Anna had pushed the World Champion to the very limits of her resources.

Beth Campbell in her first major international K1 race paddled well to finish in 21st place.

Tremendous results, brilliant sunshine, superb organisation and large enthusiastic crowds made these a championships to be remembered.


How to write a press release


To help you do this here are the basic rules of how to write an effective press release:

- Keep it concise. Never more than a sheet of A4 for the 'story' (you can add team lists and statistics on separate sheets if relevant.)
- Make your paragraphs short and type (or write) in at least 1.5 line spacing (Editors like to write amendments between the lines).
- Put the 'news' in the first paragraph

(and your sponsor's name) (editors will cut the story from the bottom upwards)

- Make sure the 5 'W's appear in the first paragraph (Who, what, where, when and why)
- Clearly mark your sheet as a News Release and give an embargo time (i.e. when the news is available for use preferably "For immediate use")
- Always put a contact name and number at the foot of the release (and make sure that the person named is available to answer calls)
- Try and make sure your release title is eye-catching
- If possible, add a quotation from a team member, coaches etc.
- Remember that the media will always want to know people's ages, occupations, place of residence and full names. (e.g. Lucy Smallwood, 22 an accountant from West Taphouse, was today selected for the British Canoe Team for a World Cup Race on March 16th 1996. The first Cornish paddler ever to make the National Senior Team)
- Decide on a 'house style' for names and stick to it. (e.g Lucy Smallwood - followed by Lucy for each subsequent mention or Miss Lucy Smallwood - followed by Miss Smallwood)



- 3 You will receive an application pack along with its unique reference number.
- 4 Read the contents of the pack carefully and make sure that your scheme is eligible.
- Complete the application form and send off the consultation forms in the pack to the Governing Body. 5
- 6 Be patient, the number of applications is growing steadily and they all take time to process.
- 7 If you are successful you will be notified of the level of the grant. Which will be paid in stages according to your projected cash flow.
- The Sports Council will hold on to 10% of your award until completion of the project. Don't forget this 8 when budgeting.
- On completion of the project you will be expected to hold an official opening ceremony.
- 10 It's not going to be easy but with careful planning it should be possible.



Sea Kayaking Incident Report - North Stack - Anglesey

he British Canoe Union have received the following report on an incident which happened in Parliament cave behind North Stack on Wednesday 17th July 1996; 13.10hrs approx. in otherwise absolutely flat calm, settled, hot and sunny weather.

...A group of experienced sea kayakers were taking lunch in the cave; boats were pulled up, equipment was spread about and people were sitting on rocks in the area. Several were preparing to have a swim in this sheltered spot.

Without prior warning other than a very slight movement of the water, a set of ten or more huge (approximately boat length) dumping surf waves was funnelled in. Five or six boats were thrown into the water and carried out, as were paddles, food, clothing and other equipment. One boat was badly damaged.

People who tried to catch items were taken off their feet and at risk from rocks and flying boats. I truly thought I was watching the development of a major 'epic'.

It was exceptionally fortunate that there was slack water and no wind such that it later proved possible to retrieve almost everything and there were no injuries.

Enquiry from marine operations revealed that this incident coincided with the proximity of the new Stena high speed catamaran which was running slightly late. We were probably the best type of group to cope with the situation. One poses the question as to what might have happened to children or anyone fishing on the rocks, abseilers at low level, anyone on a 'bivi' overnight at the head of the cave, a group of canoeists exploring a cave in settled water and so on. Such a situation is clearly potentially fatal.

This part of the coast is a treasure for its natural history, leisure and sporting resources. In my opinion, Stena have failed in 'a duty of care' to the public by such apparently irresponsible operation...

The BCU are taking this very seriously and are investigating the matter fully.

Reminder - Remember to send back your Bib to your Bib Officer before the 30th November if you're looking to keep your bib deposit - clean and dry and with sae please. Also, do tell your Ranking Compiler if you have changed address since completing your Registration form- it'll save you chasing your Slalom Yearbook next year.

Aspiring British Team Coaches and support staff might like to hear of a new initiative taking place next 1/2 February at Holme Pierrepont. If you've always wanted to become involved and haven't been sure how, you're invited to attend the weekend, when we'll be on the look out for new and additional staff at all levels. 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Focus Reviews: Paddler's Gear

Thanks to Neil and John for all your hard work in reviewing the Rapid Fire and the Mosquito. Many thanks to Phoenix of Nottingham for lending us the spraydeck, we couldn't have done the test without it!

Rapid Fire & Mosquito

he reviewers for paddler's gear in this issue were a 6' 11", 13.5 stone, broad shouldered, loud mouthed Southerner, and a 5'9", 11stone 12lbs, stocky Scotsman. The boats were tested on the white water course at Holme Pierrepont.

Both kayaks are designed by Eurokayaks and $cost \pm 367 + vat$. The reviewers felt that both boats were ideally suited for their purpose and extremely good value for money.

The Rapid Fire

Weighing in at 17.5 kilos, is aimed at the river running/playboating market and is most suited to a lightweight paddler. Both paddlers found the Rapid Fire to be extremely responsive, although a little under buoyant (but perhaps they were just a bit too heavy!). It has very sharp lines at the front and the rear with round

cockpit gunwales for easy rolling. It was felt that this was a great boat for

playboaters who enjoy cartwheels,

loops, popouts and pirouettes, etc.

with flat decks to aid the moves. Lots of rocker gives a good ride on the waves. Very good value for money, and excellent fun to paddle., It was felt that this boat would also be well suited to lady paddlers. The only slight criticisms both paddlers had was that the Rapid Fire was not as comfy as the Mosquito, and that the metal work for the full plate footrest was rather sharp and could catch on bare legs or wetsuits, this could be easily resolved with some neoprene padding. The summing up comment: Great it turns on a sixpence! The Mosquito The Mosquito




The Mosquito at 19 kilos, designed for the heavier paddler is also aimed at river running and playboating. It was felt that the Mosquito was more versatile than the Rapid Fire and would be

suitable for most types of canoeing. More forgiving and faster across the pools than the Rapid Fire, performing well on the waves. The 13.5 stone paddler felt that the volume was more than adequate for his weight. Flat deck sections allow for loops and popouts, the rounded gunwales around the cockpit area proved very forgiving in the stoppers and allow excellent handling. Once again both paddlers struggled with the comfort of the footrest but found the thigh braces in the Mosquito very comfortable. The summing up comment: An excellent boat for all seasons.

The 'Bus Trip



ue to lack of space at the race site it had been decided to have two major park and ride sites to transport spectators to and from the event. This meant that every school bus (yes those

yellow ones!) from miles around had been allocated to the Olympic cause. These park and ride areas were situated north and south of the site leaving approximately a 40 minute ride to get you there. This was usually a "good fun" trip.

Each bus had been allocated a guide who had a script with information on the history and development of the Ocoee Valley to pass on. As many of the spectators had travelled some distance to be there(including us!), it proved to be a useful excercise.

This was followed by "Who knows what Canoe Slalom is all about?", and surprisingly few

knew anything about the sport they had travelled so far to see. They were "at the Olympics", and that was all that mattered. It was usually at this time that we were found out to be non-Americans and that was when the fun started. These trips were never quiet or boring. What a good start to the day!

The Venue

The Olympics, the major sporting event in the world and on the Ocoee River, Tennessee, with 14000 spectators each day, this was definitely the biggest Canoe Slalom race that had been held since the 1972 Munich Olympics race at Augsburg.

What a race venue this is! With a brand new Centre building at the top of the course, seating for 14000 spectators and facilities to match for Officials, Press and spectators alike, nothing had been left to chance by the organisers. As Albert Woods of the International Canoe Federation(ICF), was quoted "This is without a doubt the most fantastic white water slalom course in the world."

As you entered through the security areas, the sounds of Tenneesee Blue Grass music wafted around and you were guided past displays of the history and geography of the Ocoee Valley giving visitors the chance to see how the course had been developed

Food, drink and, of course the inevitable mechandising stalls were well placed to relieve

you of any hard earned cash. (It was estimated that over 5 million T-shirts were

sold at these Olympics!) As it was vital to drink as much as possible with the humidity and the high temperatures, (low 90's), there were water stations everywhere.

With security at a high level and uniformed marshalls everywhere to help and look after you the Ocoee had a "Buzz" about it from the moment you got in!

The Course

Designed by a 3-man panel, including Dave Mitchell of the USA, it was always going to be a tough, technical and physically demanding course, testing the skill and fitness of the racers.

One or two of the sections on the course had their own built-in hazards. There was "Slam Dunk", the single biggest drop on the course and "Humongous" (named after a character in Mad Max), this being the rough stopper area at the end of the course. Plenty to make the racers think about, whilst giving the prospect of exciting viewing for the 14000 spectators and TV audiences world wide!

The Technology

There were 20 television cameras covering the races, fourteen cameras representing the Atlanta Olympic Broadcasting Organisation, who provided complete olympic coverage world wide. Among their equipment were 2 remote controlled cameras on rocks in the middle of the river, 3 "javelin" cranes to extend a camera up to 25ft. across the water and a camera suspended from a 1600ft. cable that traversed the length of the course

Highest on the list was the camera mounted on a platform perched 600ft up on the side of a mountain, adjacent to the course. Apparently, a single cameraman climbed the rugged trail to this platform every morning, managed to kill a

rattlesnake, spot a black bear and still send out stunning pictures each day

NBC operated another 6 cameras on site to bring the total to a staggering 20 cameras covering the event. There were plenty of

disappointment.", and so it proved for the team at the Ocoee.

However, apart from the outstanding paddling, some of the lasting memories that everyone took away must have been of the tremendous support for the home racers, the tunnel of noise created by the 14000 spectators blasting out from Slam Dunk onwards and the encouragement given by the large crowd to those who had made the effort to compete despite the unrest and troubles of their home countries.

The biggest cheer for a non American competitor was for Samir Karabasic of Bosnia Herzegovina, who unfortunately terminally damaged his kayak prior to the race. Local Hero Scott Shipley came to the rescue and gave Samir



Olympic Slalom Facts & Figures Proposed changes for Olympic Slalom rules are:

- 1. A 2 second penalty for hitting a gate instead of 5 seconds.
- 2. No practice runs
- 3. Splitting the race into a qualification and a final race as in the World Cup and World Championship races.

The Ocoee Venue:

Is approximately 415 metres long , has a gradient of 9-10 metres and a water flow of 35-45 cubic metres per second.

About 8,155 cubic metres of water flow through the course on a competitors three minute run - that's about enough water to flood the surface of a football field to a depth of SIX FEET !!

58 of the 134 competitors also took part in the Barcelona Olympics and of the 15 athletes who won medals in the sport, 11 are competing on the Ocoee.

Sialom isn't like other Olympic sports, here are some of the differences:-

- 1. Canoe Slalom is the only sport in which the "field of play" is intentionally littered with rocks.
- 2. It's the only sport in the Olympics in which the field of play has to be turned on and off.
- 3. Unlike most other timed events, athletes compete against the clock, not each other.
- 4. The Ocoee Whitewater Centre is believed to be the only venue where the athletes day village is located in a black bear habitat and is the only medal awarding venue outside the state of Georgia.

Two USA team members, David Hearn and Adam Clawson, both C1 paddlers, were participating members of the nationwide Olympic Torch Relay.

Boat repair service a first for the Ocoee.

Andy Bridge (USA) and Gary Barton (CAN) had a boat repair service available at the course from 5th July and estimated that they had repaired up to 70 boats in 23 days!

one of his old race boats. This, naturally, made for good media stuff and so on race day, Samir was cheered all the way down the course for his efforts in making his Olympic dream come true. Nice one Scott!

In summing up this Olympic experience, it was obviously disappointing not to see a British paddler on the medal podium, but that cannot detract from the fact that this was an amazing event . The drama was there till the end of each class with medals being won or lost in an instant of skill, luck or tactical error.

It was, overall, a massive win for the organisers who provided a race venue with facilities which will be hard to match, never mind better.

computer links for journalists and commentators, running scoreboards for spectators, but surprisingly no huge video screen for competitors at the top half of the course to see the drama at Humongous - and there was plenty!!

The Competition

Well, there's nothing that I can say that hasn't been said or thought of before so I see no point in trying now. This was an incredible competition to attend never mind compete in and our racers efforts to win medals were thwarted by better performers on the day, which is one of the lessons of sporting life we all took away from the Ocoee.

Focus Feature: Atlanta Olympics (Sprint)



he BCU Racing section had a team of eight paddlers and three officials in Atlanta, for some it was their first Olympics and they probably enjoyed it immensely. This was my fourth Olympic Games and my first as team manager. Perhaps I have become more cynical over the years, but for me it was impossible to ignore the fact that the sporting events were often lost in the razzmatazz of corporate images and putting on a massive TV show



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The important thing in the Olympic Games is not the winning but the taking part, the essential thing in life is not the conquering but the fighting well.

Sadly the above slogans no longer apply to the Olympic Games. With qualification systems and teams selection policies largely dictated by politics many worthy athletes do not even attend the Modern Olympics, and when they do they are outnumbered by almost every other group.

These were the Games of the XXVI Olympiad. They were the largest Olympic Games ever with a record number of 197 countries taking part. The helpers and officials, along with the media outnumbered the athletes by about 15/1. On top of this there was a vast army of people just outside the Olympic Village all trying to gain some commercial advantage by cultivating any sort of association with Olympic Athletes. The detractions were immense. It was possible, if one had the stamina, to collect a suitcase full of freebies, all you needed was a map of Atlanta and a week to spare. Needless to say many athletes failed (thankfully none of ours) before the competition even got under way.

For the first time Canoe Racing had an organised (some would argue disorganised) qualification process. This had been hastily agreed between the IOC and the ICF and should have allowed the best athletes to qualify and would offer wild cards to nations who were unable to qualify crews through the two stages of qualification. In brief the qualification system didn't work, the number of qualified athletes after the second round of competition was almost fifty short of the required 350. Many athletes, thinking that they had failed to qualify had given up.

Great Britain's Olympic Racing Team for the Atlanta Olympics consisted of eight athletes, a team manager and two coaches. Andrew and Stephen Train had qualified directly at the previous World Championships with a brilliant

5th place in the finals of the C2 1000 metres The remaining crews all trained hard

throughout the 95/96 winter in preparation for the second round qualification event at Sevilla. 51 nations were grouped in the European pool which included the African continent and also Australia and New Zealand. To make life even harder, competitors who had already qualified were allowed entry in other events and could even qualify places for other athletes. The regatta took place some ten weeks before the start of the Olympics and just four competitors from each event would qualify for Atlanta.

Our team was well prepared and we felt we had a good chance of qualifying additional boats. We entered 9 events in Sevilla: all our boats made the semi finals, and six boats went on to the finals. There was a small cross wind for most of the final days, this occasionally blew in little squalls and affected the times across the course by several seconds. We were genuinely unlucky with our draws. Almost all our boats being on the windier side of the course. By the end of the regatta we had one sixth and four seventh positions, and went home to lick our wounds

System had failed

It soon became obvious to the team management that the Olympic qualification system had failed to produce the number of athletes required to make the Olympic competitions viable. It was decided to approach the BOA and ask for support for the K1 and K2 crews who had been close to qualifying. A reasoned argument would be made that these boats could all be ranked as top 18 in the world and as such deserved to be entered in the Olympic Games. Having gained support from the BOA our athletes were informed that there was still a chance of selection and urged to carry on training. Finally with just three weeks left to our planned departure date we were told that our additional athletes had all been accepted.

The first day in Atlanta was a rest day. This gave the team the opportunity to get their bearings In the Olympic village, and also time to collect their Olympic clothing. On day two we were to establish a daily routine of early morning starts to the regatta course. The drive by bus could take up to two hours and occasionally the buses simply failed to show. We had shipped the Trains brothers C2 out by sea and arranged air freight for two kls, the rest of our boats were hired from the organising committee.

The regatta would take place over six days starting on the 30th July, this gave us twelve days to prepare. Andrew and Stephen Train arrived in Atlanta on the 22nd July and immediately moved to a hotel in the Gainsville area which was about 15 minutes from the competition venue. This had been planned some months earlier, and proved to be an excellent decision. Redgrave and Pinsent chose to leave the Olympic Village and move into the same hotel.


By the start of the competition everyone was eager to race. Day one saw the 1000 metres heats and we had three crews racing. Ivan Lawler's K1 1000 heat had three of the top four finalists in it. Ivan came in fourth and later qualified for the semi final via the repechage. Grayson Bourne and Paul Darby-Dowman were our K2 1000 crew. They qualified directly for the semi finals by finishing third in their heat. In the heats for C2 1000 Andrew and Stephen Train finished second, this qualified them directly to the final that would take place some four days later.

The second days racing was the 500 metre reps, Andrea Dallaway was our ladies K1 entry. Andrea had a good race but finished 5th in the heat. This would not qualify her directly for the semi finals but did qualify her to race in the repechage where the first four and the fastest 5th would go through. Andrea finished 2nd in a time of 1m 54sec, this equalled her best ever time and she was safely through to the semi finals. Alison Thorogood and Helen Gilby are better known for their marathon achievements. Our claim to the BOA had been that this crew could reach the top eighteen. They qualified for the semi final via the repechage and hoped to improve their final position with a good result in the semis.


Semi final day was the crunch day for all our boats other than the C2 1000 crew of Andrew and Stephen Train who had already qualified for their final. Ivan Lawler had succumbed to a stomach bug on the first day of racing. Although he could still produce the speed over short distances there was no real chance of his progressing to the finals. Grayson and Paul failed to qualify for the final but secured a top eighteen position. As did Andrea when she achieved another good performance in the ladies K1, this time to within a second of her earlier PB. The ladies K2 crew of Alison Thorogood and Helen Gilby tried hard in their semi final beating the British Course record time of 1min 50 secs but sadly failed to qualify for the finals

Saturday 3rd August was the day for the 1000 metre finals. All our team turned out to support Andrew and Stephen Train in their efforts to win a first ever Olympic medal for Great Britain in Canoe Racing. They had qualified directly for the finals with the second fastest time. Conditions for that race had been ideal, with a small head wind blowing straight up the course. Andrew and Stephen are technically very good, they also have terrific endurance. We had hoped that the light head wind would persist and perhaps even blow a little harder. However this was not to be; the wind had turned! Times would be that much quicker and the larger crews would enjoy the advantage of a tail wind. Andrew and Stephen raced well and produced a personal best time of 3min 36 seconds. This gave them sixth place in the Olympic final. Not as good as we had hoped for, but a terrific result none the less. 83

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Bishop's Stortford Canoe Club

New LAO, River Access To Rivers Licence Refused - Chelmer and Blackwater

The BCU approach to the Chelmer and Blackwater Navigation Company to get an agreement to include their waters in the BCU Licence have been rebuffed. Canoeists in general have earned a bad name with the company.

They complained that local canoeists under existing local licence agreements have been abusing the arrangements.

Let us hope that claims by paddlers to be licensed when they are not will become a thing of the past. If the situation improves in the future and widespread toll evasion ceases, perhaps another request from the BCU for an agreement will be met more sympathetically.

tick your finger in your mouth when you're driving along, unwind the window and hold your wet finger

out of the window until it gets dry and colder. Every time your ears get wet from rolling or playing in the pool, lakes or sea, the same sort of thing happens to your ears - they cool down a bit as your head dries. The process is accentuated in cold water or when there is a wind blowing. The consequence?

Surfer's Ear is the consequence. For the uninitiated, Surfers Ear, as surfers call it, (or Meatal Exostoses of the External Auditory Canal, as the Doctors call it) is the closure or partial closure of the outer ear by bony growths that develop to protect the inner ear from cold damage. The growths are stimulated by cooling caused by a combination of cold water repeatedly entering the ear and by the evaporative cooling that occurs when wet ears are exposed to wind

To the best of my knowledge, surfers, white water canoeists and strong wind windsurfers suffer worst because they spend a lot of time getting wet. The condition has this effect as it develops:

To research this article, I did some on browsing on CompuServe and the Internet. No-one who has experienced the Bitches or 8' Easky would call anything to do with sitting in front of a VDU surfing but having said that, computer nerds don't get blocked ear canals. I also trawled through the scant literature that exists and talking to hard of-hearing surfers and paddleheads.

There are some interesting points:

- 1. Surfer's Ear can be totally prevented by wearing a tight fitting hat or ear plugs
- If Surfer's Ear develops, it won't go away by itself.
 The operation to remove the bony growths that build up on the surface of the inner ear involves using a drill or a laser: "Craig was told that surgical technique was still favoured since laser heat is not totally predictable. Craig was back surfing within about 4 weeks with this procedure and has had no problems." Ron Grimaud

4. The operation is not simple and can cause permanent or partial deafness or facial paralysis: "My friend Ron had the operation in the 1970's, it left half his face drooping for four months from nerve damage- he had the operation again with good results" Mike Richard " They drilled through the eardrum when I had my first operation - at best, I will have lost 10% of my hearing in that ear" Shaun Baker

ear What I Sale

- 5. Once a paddler or surfer has had the operation, the ear canal is more prone to further cold water damage: "I had the operation in 88 or 89. Basically good results for about 5 years. In the last two, my eardrums have apparently become weak (doc calls them floppy) and when I dunk under water they scream sounds kind of like the old radio tuners in between stations. This is intermittent thoughsometimes I get out of the water wishing I hadn't gone in (pain), other days everything is fairly normal" Chris Rust, Hawaii
- One of the problems that occurs once Surfer's ear has developed is that any infection of the inner ear can't be treated easily. Standard lotions or potions are ineffective because the ear is completely blocked.
- 7. For paddlers who spend most of their cold water time surfing, wind direction makes a difference: "Wind direction is a big factor in ear trouble. West coasters get a problem mainly in the right ear due to predominately north wind direction whilst sitting in the line-up. I've heard East Coasters have trouble in the left ear" Mike Richards, California
- Surfer's Ear also has a noticeable geographic distribution - it is much less common in cold countries because people don't get their ears wet; much less common in warm countries where there is less damage from water cooling and evaporation. So, the big question is what to do

about it. The answer is quite simple, Don't Get Surfer's Ear because it is avoidable. Pragmatists may say "don't get wet" - that doesn't work for me unless I'm in the house! In reality, keeping your ears dry either means

perfecting tube rides, cartwheels and 360s or stopping the cooling happening in the first place. There are two ways of doing this:

A) Stopping entry of water into your ears - use foam plugs, swimmer's wax or Blu-Tak. Blu-Tak seems to work well and is cheap at 99p a pack but be warned - don't use Blu-Tak on your walls after it's been in your ears!

For: Very effective at preventing entry of water into the ear canal.

- Against: Tend to reduce hearing. Easy to lose one of them! Cost: 99p for a pack of Blu-Tak, f2 - £3 for a pair of reusable rubber or foam plugs.
- B) Minimise the repeated rinsing of the ear canal with cold water and prevent cooling. A swimmer's hat works OK but does not give much in the way of insulation. Neoprene hoods give greater insulation but have to be well cut to work and eliminate the entry of water. The best product that I've come across in the head wear line is the Playboater Earwig - a Imm skull cap with a narrow chin strap that can be worn under a helmet. The cap works so well because it is very stretchy and well cut. Patagonia's skull cap is thin but not as stretchy as the Imm neoprene; it stops cooling by evaporation, but not cooling. Others that I have tried including Wavelength and Alder surfing hats are warm but do not prevent water penetration.
- For: Good insulation, easy to take off (and not lose) when you're on the water. Do not affect the hearing as much as plugs or wax.
- **Against:** Do not completely prevent the entry of water. Cost: £5 for a cheap hat, £20 for the Playboater Earwig or Patagonia's skull cap.


Stick to your guns

If you're reading this article and thinking "maybe I've got this condition too", bear in mind that most GP's who live away from the coast will never have come across anyone with Surfer's Ear. They may not believe you when you tell them that you suffer from something that they have not heard about! Stick to your guns and show them this article if it helps.

After 30-odd years of surf and rodeo kayaking surfing and windsurfing, I have got 50%+blockage in both ears, but luckily, no infections. My recommendation? If you are paddling in cold water, wear ear plugs and a hat in winter and a hat only in summer. If you do both of these you will greatly reduce or eliminate the chance of having to have a difficult, inconvenient operation, spending time off the water and thinking

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



well until my legs went to sleep (and this was all on flat, hardly moving water). Time for a beer, we sit about until the early hours of the morning, waiting for it to get dark (it did for a short time at about 2am) chatting with new faces.

Water being quite shallow

Friday morning brings a heavy head, and practice and training day. First impressions are that the hole is very hard to get to, especially in canadians with the water being quite shallow, making the scope for vertical moves limited, but offering plenty of potential for blasting, surfing, flat spins and low cartwheels. Everybody must have seen it by now, well, actually you really can't miss it! The Citroën slalom boat.

something different that would get noticed, well, they certainly got it.

The deck artwork takes a whole day.. . first, Helen measures and cuts about 30 chevrons in different sizes. Each chevron needs to be exactly the same as Citroëns logo. The mould is cleaned and waxed, and boatbuilder, Perran Shreeve, starts the painstaking task of masking around every single

chevron with fine tape (a job which has speeded up over time as this is the 5th boat he has built for Helen and Citroën).

The chevrons need to be placed in the same positions as the original design and each one has to be measured carefully to get the correct distance between each pair and to make sure the points go exactly down the centre of the boat.

Perran then hand paints white gel coat on the 2 main chevrons, followed by spraying the rest of the chevrons in

sections. A large sheet of cardboard is used to cover the chevrons not being sprayed to enable 8 different colours to be used

A prepreg hull is used to keep the boat light as all the colours add on an extra couple of kilos. The total weight of the boat is 8.2 kilos and costs £1000.

The end result . . . probably the loudest slalom boat on the circuit (ever!). Unless of course you know different!

p&p available from Mobile Adventure This book is the companion to the guide White Water Europe -The North Alps, which was reviewed in the August edition of Canoe Focus. Once again, the text is accompanied by a selection of high quality colour photographs and sketch maps of the river sections with the major rapids and other landmarks highlighted; cartoons and drawings adding to the overall attraction of the book. The guide has also been completed using up to date research and the rivers covered are grouped by white water centres (i.e. Bourg St. Maurice). From a personal perspective, I have been fortunate enough to paddle a number of the rivers covered by this guide and the information given is accurate and up to date. However, please remember that rocks in glacial fed rivers do move around a bit! Like the first book, this guide is a must for all Alpine paddlers, it would also make good reading for those armchair enthusiasts who only dream of paddling in such wonderful places. (War stories could be greatly enhanced by using this guide). The author is to be congratulated on producing such a high quality product which will undoubtedly be a valuable asset for Alpine paddlers for many years to come.



Interactive programmes on computers are all the rage, now meet the interactive book. Despite the fact that this is an American book for the American market is has crossed the

Atlantic very well indeed. Clear and instructive diagrams with regular worksheets/reviews, keep your interest and even though it is aimed at the novice market it is impossible not to have a go at the worksheets. Yes I did learn a few things! It's approach is to introduce paddlers to Canoeing through safe and enjoyable paddling. Safety is evident throughout the book without being intrusive as it is presented in an enjoyable and informative way. A good review of strokes and moving water is the meat of the book. It does cover quite a respectable amount of material that will be of interest to instructors and their pupils. As suggested it would be of most use when backed up by a course of instruction. Some of the material is excellent but not presented in an obvious progression e.g. strokes, sweep, draw, pry, come before forward and backward paddling and no mention of trimming. However it is an excellent book, particularly for the price, that should be on the shelves of all who are involved in teaching Canoeing and those that are learning.

ur dry-land canoes were wooden bread boards borrowed from a heap left lying in the rain in the local bakers yard. In these trusty 'two-man canoes' we would launch ourselves in pairs down a nearby hill with the objective of destroying the imaginary German warships moored in the field at the bottom. 'Canoes' were always returned to the bakers' 'boathouse' each evening as we could not bring ourselves to scuttle them, as real Commandos would have done at the end of the day's 'raiding'. The bakers knew what we were up to but would never prevent us from borrowing the bread boards. As a boy I had little thought that many years later as an adult I would paddle the same route taken by those Commandos in 1942 together with one of the onginal "Cockleshell Heroes"

as it became damaged in the submarine, 1 was drowned, 1 was listed as "missing believed drowned" and 6 were captured, tortured and executed by the Germans. Having destroyed moored in Bordeaux harbour, Bill and Pyrenees to Spain and then home to originator of the raid and the team leader of the Cockleshell Heroes". he has written a book by the same name and it is currently available from Pen & Sword Books Ltd. Klepper folding canoes are the modern day equivalent of the "Cockle" canoes used by the Commandos on 'Op

Frankton'. The interest in this type of craft has been supported by Kirton Kayaks Ltd of Devon who are the UK distributors for Klepper Canoes and Spares. In view of this and the fact that 1995 was the Anniversary Year of the end of the war in Europe I decided to contact Bill Sparks and suggest a symbolic re-enactment of the canoe journey in Kleppers to commemorate those who did not return. Bill said he would be delighted to come over with us and offered to paddle too. At this stage I had 2 paddlers. I then sent a circular to

Project

various Canoe Clubs and Organisations looking for volunteer paddlers. The ones which turned out to be "worth their salt" were the men of the Artists' Rifles Canoe Club (ARCC). We discovered that the 10 paddles which we had been supplied with were mostly unserviceable. Whereupon I contacted Lendal Products of Prestwick and asked if they could help. They agreed to lend us 10 new paddles with custom-made extended shafts, all in black for the task. In the event these were subsequently purchased by ARCC at the end of the trip, so everyone was happy. It was a gallant gesture by Lendal Products and at short notice. Their paddles made an enormous difference to the purchase, control and power we had over the big Kleppers. This was especially useful in very lumpy waters during the night phase with the tide pushing us along at a cracking pace. A 2 man Klepper weighs 120lbs unladen and dry, imagine it soaking wet and loaded with kit plus 2 large men onboard (average height was 6'2"). This is when good paddles can really help - and they did.

mouth of the estuary. In 1995, there being no available submarines for our little 'country outing' we travelled by road and ferry. We launched into the rocky estuary at the mouth of the Gironde near the little town of St Georges de Didonne. There is a memorial to the Commandos just beside the lighthouse and we felt this would be an appropriate place to start. We were helped on our way by the mayor and some local dignitaries from the town. Just prior to the launch we held a short service for the Commandos who took part in were put in the water.


For safety and to conform to local regulations we took a large Rigid-hull Inflatable Boat (RIB) with twin outboards, GPS major shipping route, accordingly we were required to obtain permission from the French authorities to use "unpowered small craft" on the rivers. This was agreed but when I explained to the local authority that we planned to paddle through the night, dodging between the oil-tankers and merchant ships as they ploughed the waves - he almost had a seizure. ~"I seenk you plan to kel yourzelves" he said. I suddenly had a vision of a 30 foot propeller from an oil tanker coming towards me in the dark with the Frenchman at the helm now wearing Dr No clothes and saying "Good-bye Meester Bond".... Back in his office he listened to my plan asking me to plot our positions at various points on his navigation chart on the office wall. I felt like I was on trial for something I hadn't yet done. Finally he beamed and said he would waive the normal ban on night paddling in view of the commemorative reasons for the trip. "We get so many crazies over ere who weesh to play on zee reever. I don mine eef zay keel zemzelves but not make my sheeps to crash". I got the message

We decided to use 3 tides to cover the 95 Kilometres as it was not to be a race, more a wreath-laying ceremony. Also we wanted to get all 5 canoes to the end together which had been the goal of 'Op Frankton'. In 1942 only 2 finally made it to Bordeaux. Let us remember that we would not have people trying to kill us along the way, nor were we going to be paddling in freezing conditions. Similarly, we only had to carry emergency supplies in each boat. The Commandos had to carry; Silenced Sten Guns, Colt 45 Revolvers, 12 Limpet Mines, rations and ammunition for a week.

Consider also that they had to use wooden, collapsible assagai-shaped paddles, whereas we had the latest Lendal blades especially made in black for the event. As the Commandos could only paddle at night they used S tides and hid-up during the day. They also had to dodge the big ships but unlike us they could not afford to be spotted by them. In contrast each of us wore personal emergency

lights fixed to our bodies at night. Our safety boat, provided by Amphibious Skills Training(AST) of Devon had 2 highly qualified skippers who were also French speakers. They were able to contact the Port Authority Stations along the route to advise them of our positions. More importantly, to receive information and radio frequencies of any big ships creeping up on us from behind, in the dark. Jon Taylor of AST and his co-pilot Dr Jan Falkowski did an excellent job by also contacting the big ships to let them know exactly where we were. It is awe inspiring to be bobbing around on the surface in the dark and to watch a "steel apartment block" churn by at close quarters.

We originally planned to break the journey down into 3 phases of 30Kms, 30Kms and 35 Kms. These stages being (see map) St Georges de Didonne, St Christoly, Blaye and Bordeaux. We pressed on to Pauillac which was 45 Kms from the start point. We were rewarded for our efforts. Pauillac is the home of Mouton Cadet wine and there was a wine festival at Pauillac on the evening we arrived. Needless to say we had a good "run ashore".

Throbbing French resort town

When the time came to leave it seemed crazy to be leaving a throbbing French resort town offering free wine and food, warm dry bistros filled with friendly sports-people. Most of them had run in the Pauillac Marathon that day. By contrast we were pulling on our cold wet gear and slipping into a black river for 6 hours of blood, sweat and tears. I was close to a 'sense of humour failure' as someone had eaten my rations and quaffed all my fluids. I decided to go on a crash diet at that point. 'Crash' was an appropriate word for the next phase. Whereas the river had been millpond flat that day. At night it all changed, we had 3 ft waves breaking over the bows at some points. The spraydecks which had been optional during the day were compulsory at night. The tides had increased and the pull together with our stroke rate meant that we were surfing along at 10 knots on occasions. Keeping on course was difficult too as the currents pushed the stern round the second you took the power off the paddles. The Kleppers were very forgiving of all this and their built-in inflatable tubes saved us from

Again we made better time than expected, the journey for which we had allowed 6 hours took only 4. We put in at St Louis de






When you tell people you've been to Islay they're not quite sure where it is. I certainly don't know many folk who have paddled there and it's definitely not develop as popular as some of its more illustrious Hebridean neighbours.

idwinter's time honoured pastime of scrutinising the maps and charts made the appeal of this relatively southern island more and more enticing. The Plas Dol-y-Moch annual sea kayak trip is generally geared not for the marathon focused, salt encrusted, puffin eating, week in week out enthusiast but more towards those who have perhaps tried kayaking a time or two and who fancy a week of coastal exploration, acquiring new skills, finding out about the marine environment or just being away with a bunch of like-minded people keen to have some fun. It's always been a popular trip and interest is often from those who perhaps prefer a more all encompassing type of kayaking experience geared to get the most from each day rather than being shackled to one objective such as a circumnavigation.

Surf went on forever

With these considerations in mind it's logical to hire a bunkhouse or self-catering cottage and use it as a base from which to go on day trips that suit the aspirations of the group and match the weather. I got to hear about a place at the end of a 6 mile surf beach on the west coast of Islay between Bowmore and the impressive headland called The Oa. It's a relatively new bunkhouse with most of the amenities for a comfortable existence and there's even a bar/restaurant right next door.

to miss out on some of Islay's other highlights. Jutting out of Islay's southwestern corner, for example, is The Oa whose




kilometres to the Carreg Fhada lighthouse at Port Ellen. The rock architecture is pretty stupendous to say the least with an abundance of through caves and stacks. Committing stuff too as you gaze at the cliffs disappearing into the distance in the knowledge that the tidal stream zips round the bottom end at up to 5 knots !

Atlantic Grey seals

If you can force yourself past the distilleries of Laphroaig, Lagavulin and Ardbeg (all within 2 miles of each other!) there's a charming archipelago of broken islands that guards

Islay's Southeast corner. There's wildlife in abundance, especially Atlantic Grey seals, sheltered water in almost any conditions, rugged offshore rocks offering all sorts of rock hopping possibilities and gentle wooded foreshores which are carpeted with bluebells in May. Bivouacs...picnics...playing with seals...I could have stayed a long, long while. Duns, forts, castles, standing stones and ancient crosses are testament to those who passed this way in the mists of time before our time. What would they have thought about our folly ? But I digress...it's that sort of place.

Real playground

For the explorer of lonely coasts the northern tip would be quite a pilgrimage especially if that was combined with a jaunt over to Jura. For the white water enthusiast there are some rip roaring races and Orsay on the western tip is a real playground. Portnahaven is regarded as the prettiest of Islay's villages and the speed of the tide can be seen from its only street which wraps around the gut of a harbour like an old woman's shawl. Locals were eager to watch us getting ready for the fray and warned of the dangers of the sea. One man informed us that in the sound right next to Portnahaven the tide went north for 11 hours and south for 1 hour. And he was right. Sometimes there's no substitute for local knowledge. Two hundred yards off Orsay's southern coast there's a truck sized rock named An Coire (which surprise, surprise, means The Cauldron) and the water belts across that at 8 knots. What the Pilot doesn't tell you is about the race between Orsay and its immediate neighbour Eilean Mhic Coinnich. On a flooding tide the water is squeezed between the two islands setting a steep and meaty front wave with attendant break outs to the side. Rodeo Heaven ?. Beyond and away there's lots of bumpy water all the way past Frenchman's Rocks and the chart makes for interesting reading.

Everything on Islay felt so accessible and of course that meant less time driving and more time paddling. Living right besides the sea also meant that folk could play in the waves for as long or as little as they wanted

then nip off for a shower or a pint or whatever. This handy convenience also meant that in the evenings we could sample the delights of the Islay Festival which was in full flow at the end of May. Ceilidhs, films, Whisky tasting, slide shows...I'm surprised we made it home... but

y name is Matthew Sykes, I'm 23 years old and was born profoundly deaf. I am a student at Blackpool College, an associated college to Lancaster University, studying for a BA Hons. Degree in Technical Informational Illustration.

I first became interested in canoeing at the age of 11 after a school adventure holiday, near Swindon. One of the activities on offer was canoeing. A few weeks later the canoeing instructor, John Macdonald wrote to me and asked if I would like to join him on a canoeing course in Lechlade and do my BCU 1 Star. John and Dean were very good instructors and over a few days I passed my BCU 1 Star.

I loved canoeing so much and soon after, my family and I joined the Banbury Canoe Club. I enjoyed general paddling but I wanted something more exciting and I liked the idea of paddling on white water. Other members of the club where involved in canoe slalom 1 only saw it once and immediately decided that it was what I wanted to do. I was 12 at the time.

My first slalom was at Stratford Upon Avon. At that time the water at the top of the weir was used as well as the river at the bottom. In order to get the downstream gate at the bottom of the weir I had to go over it backwards and my mum was terrified!

From that moment on I have been thoroughly hooked on slalom and in one season I was promoted from Novice (now Div. 5) to division 3.

I loved everything about canoe slalom, especially in the early years of taking part in the British Schools Championships in Bolton and the Interclub Championships.

When I was in division 2 I went for selection at Holme Pierrepont and was over the moon when I gained a place on the under 16 Great Britain Squad.

My hero right from the start was Richard Fox. Richard always had time for me, helping and encouraging me whenever he could. He always took part in the Interclub Championships even after he was World Champion!

I realise now what a wonderful ambassador for canoe slalom he is. It seems a shame that today most of the top paddlers don't compete at events like the Interclub Championships or



attend lower level division events to inspire younger paddlers.

I would like to take this opportunity in thanking Brian Fuller (Olympic Slalom Team Manager) who has always been there for me, encouraging and advising me on my training. He still remains very supportive today and he, Peggy, David and Andrew are good friends to my family. Anne and Andrew Dancer were also very helpful when I started canoeing, explaining about all the rules and advising on the best equipment to buy.

On the whole most people in cance slalom know me and although they will nod and say hello not many will actually stop and hold a conversation with me. I think they are afraid that I won't understand them or they won't understand me but I am a good lip reader and I wouldn't get upset if they didn't understand my speech.

However, some people in canoe slalom have always made an effort to communicate with me right from the start. Peter Jones, the Fuller family, the Richards family, the Dillingar and McDermid families are all wonderful people and see me as a person first and never allow my deafness to bother them. My family have had some great times with them at events.

It seems a pity now that I'm in the Premier Division that there is less time for the social side of canoeing that we all so enjoyed in the lower divisions.

I have always been keen to help other paddlers when ever I have time. When I was at school I took the first and second year pupils for canoeing lessons to the level of BCU 1 star and have trained, helped and encouraged many other paddlers.

I wish that more deaf people would take up the sport.

I still very much love my canoeing - I enjoy the challenge of the white water. Although I don't have the opportunity to train on white water like many of the top 20 paddlers, due to the pressures of college work and lack of funds to pay for a coach I am still as determined as ever.

It is my dream to paddle in the 2000 Olympics in Sydney where my older brother lives. I only have one more year left to complete my degree and I'm really hoping that I can then concentrate more on my canoeing. Then I will need a lot of luck in order to find sponsorship and hopefully a coach who will be willing to learn British Sign Language and have enough faith in my ability to help reach a high level.

Lastly, none of this would have been possible without the tremendous support and encouragement from my Mum and Dad.
