
editorial

GREAT PROSPECTS

The first few weeks of the new year, already the new canoeing season is creeping up on us. In Britain the 1969 competitive season looks like being the best ever for all sides of the sport.

In sprint racing, courses are already being run to train up and instruct young paddlers and I hear we have some talent but only in youth boys group, as in all sides of competition there is vast potential for girls and women. On the slalom side our national team is getting back into training after a short winter break and their target is the World Slalom Championships in France later this year. while at home we have our first ever International Slalom at Llangollen in October. The L-D side once again has a big calendar and I hear already that an even greater number of International Teams will be coming to Britain for the Championships to be held on the Tay in Scotland. Teams planning to compete include the Americans, South Africans and possible the Germans, apart from teams that have competed in Britain before - with a little luck we should see some ten federations in the L-D. The Canoe Sailing World Championships are to be held at Grafham Water in August and here again we should see a good number of federations.

TWO INTERNATIONALS and ONE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP – we are certainly on show in Britain this coming season and it is up to every paddler, to support teams and organisers as to what impressions our continental sportfriends will take away with them of British canoe sport. Make sure it is not a detrimental one – make sure these paddlers willWANT to come back again to our events!



DUISBERG - CANOE CENTRE FOR SPRINT RACING. This is the first of a series of short articles on Duisberg, a centre for German canoe sport. During the coming months, these articles, written by Klaus Klein of 'Wassersportverein Niederrhein E. V. ', Duisberg, will cover sprint racing, canoe sailing, white water and touring.

DUISBURG, famous for being one of the biggest industrial towns in Europe, has yet another face. This town is a sport minded town with a special attachment to water-sport. Within this 'CANOEING' takes the greater part.

There are more than 30 canoeing clubs in Duisburg and various places to exercise. Four clubs do racing-sport, while the rest are engaged in Touring and White Water Canoeing. Two clubs, the Wassersportverein Niederrhein! and 'Bertasee' use the famous 'Regattabahn' as a training course, while the two other clubs engaged in sprint canoeing, the 'Meidericher Kanu-Club' and 'Akerfähre' use the IRhein-Herne-Kanal! and the river 'Ruhr' for their training. While 'Bertasee' (with 74 German championships the most successful club in Germany) have nearly only juniors and seniors, and don't do a lot in youth canoeing, the three other clubs concentrate on youth canoeing. They devote much time in coaching boys





and girls from the age of 10 years onwards.

The most successful club in this direction is the 'MEIDERICHER KANU' CLUB¹ and with nearly 100 boys and girls they have a large reservoir to choose from. Their former junior K4 (which has raced together for almost 6 years) has been integrated in the national team. In the recent years they always had at least one boat in the first three in the final of the German Youth Championships, and put their biggest effort in the K4, which always brought them their biggest success. Until now their biggest discovery has been Ernst Blazek, who became junior world champion in 1962 at the age of 19, and promised to be one of the greatest talents ever. While Herr Willi Kühn and his son had their biggest success with coaching boys, Herr Helmuth Sgaslik, the chairman of Wassersportverein Niederrhein! had his success with girls canoeing. Some German Youth Championships and a talent like Elke Felten (she became 4th in Tokio) and Volker Buick, who won several championships, were the gains of many years of hard work, which one has to put up inspite of the ideal regatta course.

Several regattas during the year make Duisburg an interesting town for canoeists. The German Canoeing Centre and the Canoeing Centre of Noddrhein – Westfalen, have been permanently stationed in Duisburg. Weekly training courses for boys and girls are available. (They are coached by famous canoeists, who have studied at Cologne Sporthochschule, and are paid by the government).

The Regattabahn is entirely for rowing and canoeing. A big fence around the lake, keep swimmers and people off the water. A nearby Youth hostel and two other houses belonging to the council are for visitors, available and in easy reach of the 'Regattabahn'. Visitors from abroad can be sure of a hearty welcome, and are given every assistance.

Any sprint paddler wishing to make a trip to Duisburg for a spell of training under first class conditions and with top coaches should contact Klaus Klein c/o 'Canoeing Magazine'.

RACING THE DEE

Some 50 paddlers competed the second River Dee White Water Race, held on Sunday 12th January. Water conditions were not much above average while weather conditions were pretty rough with wind and driving rain for most of the event. For the few of who camped up at the Abbey, mud made things a little uncomfortable for the cars and the only consolation was that the ground was softer to sleep on!

The Dee course is raced from the Chain Bridge Hotel to just below the broken weir below Llangollen Town Bridge - a distance of around two miles. Competitors start at one minute intervals with the K1 event on the Sunday morning and the Team event in the afternoon.

Out in front of the K1 was Norman Jackson pacing for Manchester Canoe Club with a time of 13min 37sec. Tony Young of Leeds taking second place with 13min 56sec and Chris Skellern of Worcester Canoe Club racing into third place with 14min 2sec, Pauline Squires of Leamington Spa was the only woman competing in the K1 but although making the 'Tail' well, capsized on the Town Rapids and failed to finish.

In the C1 event G. Goldsmith of Brighton gained the win with a time of 18 min 26sec with J. Sibley of Windsor Canoe Club taking second with 19min 17sec. while only J. Court/J. Goodwin raced the C2 and made a good time of 16min 6 sec.

As mentioned the water conditions did not seem over hectic yet there were a good few capsizes and at least one kayak was completely broken in two.....





During the latter half of last season 'Canoeing Magazine' run a number of readers letters concerning arguements of the wearing of lifejackets and buoyancy aids. I had proposed to give a run down on jackets particularly suited to the canoeist, both buoyancy aid and lifejacket. However at present the B.S.I. are reviewing their standards for LIFEJACK-ETS with regard to inherant buoyancy and type used. The following feature is therefore on BUOYANCY AIDS only, that are suited to the canoeistor are in use with many competitive canoeists.

HARISHOK BUOYANCY VEST

The HARISHOK Buoyancy Vest is made of a very pliable closed cell Polyvinylchloride foam, specially developed for American lifejackets and shortly to be made under licence in Britain. The covering of the vest is of high quality, heavy duty industrial nylon, and the foam is inserted in stitched compartments between the outer and inner covers. All materials shed water so that this vest quickly dries after use. The jacket is warm and comfortable to wear, while nearly one inch thickness of foam provides not only the buoyancy but shock resist ance against any collision the canoeist may have during white water paddling or capsize. There are no sharp edges to wear the jacket and of course it is impossible to deflate. The buoyancy rating complies with the ICF rule of 6 kilos personal buoyancy, keeping the canoeist well up in the water yet allowing him to swim to safety.

There are no tight straps to restrict the wearer in competitions, while this vest is easy to put on and smart to wear. Price of a ready made Harishok is £4. 17.6d, but is also available in an easy to build kit at £3.5.0d with the foam buovancy sewn in. Available from H.Calverley 22, Schools Road, Abbey Hey, Manchester, 22.



LIFFEY LIFEY BUOYANCY AID

The idea of a buoyancy jacket for canoeists with foam inside it was not new but when the Liffey Lifey came out in June no-one had managed to find a suitable nonabsorbant foamata reasonable price. Thus the Liffey Lifey was the first of its kind and was a sales success. This jacket has caught on in a big way with water skiers as well as canoeists while an increasing number are being sold to Education Authorities and the Forces.

The jacket contains 61 kilos of non absorbant foam buoyancy between heavy duty nylon. It has a draw cord at the waist and elastic at the bottom. Available in two sizes, medium or large in Pink, Red or Light Blue. Price at present is £4. 15. o. but will be increased to £5.5.0. from the 1st March.

The foam now used is softer than the original 1968 models and the design has seen detailed improvements to the shoulders. Available from: Northern Wild Water Centre, 4, Victoria Road, Netherby, Yorks.



VIKING PERSONAL BUOYANCY AID

VIKING BUOYANCY AIDS are manufactured to the specifications of the Standards Personal Buoyancy Aids as adopted by the Ship and Boat Builders National Federation. The Viking jacket, is of top quality PVC/Mesh laminate with all edges stitched and webbing bound, is made up of a series of separate buoyancy compartments. Each compartment encloses a foam pad which in turn, is itself enclosed in an electronically welded polythene bag, the result is a double skin which ensures a completely water-tight iacket.

The Viking jacket has a lace-up front through non-corrosive brass eyelets and it also incorporates waist fastening with flexible tie tapes which eleminates the tendency for the jacket to ride-up over the head. Models are available in a range of eight sizes suitable for men, women and children. The prices range from 45/- for a childs jacket to 58/6 for extra large (over 15 stone).

The jacket is supple in wear, light in weight, and allows full freedom of movement. The outside of the jacket is high visibility fluorescent RED, as used 7 by the R.A.F. Rescue Units, Police and

Mountain Rescue Teams and of course the colour is impervious to sea water and will not lose its florescent luminosity through constant use. (minimum buoyancy for Medium Jacket 16lbs. minimum for large 19lbs). Details from: Channel Marine Factors, Westcliff Arcade, Ramsgate, Kent.



FLOTHERCHOC INTERNATIONAL LIFE-VEST

The FLOTHERCHOC life-vest must surely be the most popular buoyancy aid worn by rough water canoeists on the continent and to be seen in use in increasing number by British paddlers who have competed slaloms abroad.

The Flotherchoc is made of very strong nylon fabric for rapid drying and the buoyancy formed by a multitude of air cells which make it very light. The air cells, jointed and supple, are inserted into stitched compartments between the nylon and neither inflate or deflate. These air cells form a thermic vest and protects against shocks of a capsize in rock strewn rough water. All the materials are unaffected by sea water and the jacket incorporates a zip fastening with buttons of nylon.

A number of models are available but of interest to the canoeist is the 'KAYAK ICF' model with guaranteed 7.5 kilos of buoyancy for adults and 5.5 kilos for children. The 'KAYAK COMPETIT-ION' model, a short bolero styled jacket for kayak racing with minimum 6.5 kilos of buoyancy: the 'KAYAK COMPETITION' with sleeves, another short racing jacket but with sleeves added that should prove popular with our winter canoeists, again with 6.5 kilos buoyancy. All jackets are available in orange only.

Other jackets from Flotherchoc include models for water skiing, sailing and a full lifejacket. Made in France, the Flotherchoc is available from agents; Welsh Harp Boat Centre, 274, The Broadway, West Hendon, N.W.9.



SAFAFLOAT

This is another buoyancy jacket using the air-cell principle and is made again of orange nylon with zip fastening at the front but also includes a collar. The Safafloat has a waist tie-up and the air cells seem a little larger than either the Flotherchoc or Peter Storm. Price is £6.17.6. and details are available from Northern Sailmakers, Pier House, Wallgate, Wigan, Lancs.

PETER STORM SKIPPER

Similar to the Flotherchoc 'Kayak' buoyancy aid is a new jacket from Peter Storm, the SKIPPER. Peter Storm will now manufacture a special kayak jacket with independant PVC air cells and also made of orange nylon: both of British manufacture. These jackets are shorter than the standard buoyancy aids with PVC cells and also have larger arm-holes. The Skipper in all sizes - small, medium, large - has buoyancy higher than the ICF required minimum of $6\frac{1}{2}$ kilos. These jackets should shortly be available form most chandlers in the country. Prices range from £7.3.6. for the small to £9. 9.0. for the large size. Details from Peter Storm Waterproofs, Nottingham, England.



The HOLTWEAR 'SLIMLINE' Buoyancy Waistcoat is in tough yellow PVC and fitted with internal kapok expanded air pockets, which are secured individually to the inner container. Thus if the outer part of the waistcoat is damaged the inner pouches still retain their individual buoyancy.

Continual development has resulted in the new 'Slimline' which is slimmer and even more comfortable and unobtrusive than before, whilst retaining the unrivalled performance of the original design.

The 'Slimline' is an ideal buoyancy aid, affording protection from shocks on rough rivers while providing well over the minimum ICF recommended buoyancy for canoeists in the medium, large and extra large jacket sizes. Prices from $\pounds 3.8.6d$ for small to $\pounds 3.16.5d$ for the extra large. Available from Jack Holt Ltd., The Embankment, Putney, London S.W. 15.



These are by no means all the BUO-YANCY AIDS and JACKETS that are suited to the canoeist. Details from manufacturers that did not arrive from our request are Helly-Hansen 'NAVIGARE! and 'ELVSTROM' buoyancy aids; Kelvins Accessories Ltd. buoyancy aids; and Marksway.

Also available at a number of canoe manufacturers is the two cushion type of buoyancy aid, the cheapest form of aid with prices around 35/0d

BUILDING THE KAYEL-OTTER SLALOM KAYAK

part 1

These days, the majority of competition kayaks are made of glassfibre or for sprint racing are manufactured of hot moulded veneers. However competitive canceing is but one side of our sport and for those who are unable to afford the expensive competition craft or want a cheaper form of kayak for touring or more general purpose type craft, there are a number of easy to build kits on the market.

This month we start in Canoeing Magazine! the first of a series of building features and begin with 'part one' of a 'two part' article on building the Ottersports Slalom Kayak.

The kayak is of ply with glassfibre joints and certainly extremely easy to build. Its construction principle is a number of preformed panels, stitched together with nylon fishing line, temporary frames pinned into place and a glass fibre tape brushed over the joints to make a light, frameless kayak of monocoque design. The kit is complete to the last detail and includes all panels cut to shape as are the deckbeams, cockpit frames, temporary frames, with cockpit coamings and lippreformed. The hip-boards, knee bars and footrest are ready to fit into place and supplied is a glassfibre moulded seat. Glue and varnish, screws and nails glassfibrekit, plus illustrated stage-bystage building instructions - nothing could be simpler than building this kayak.

Our kit arrived, I took it down to the 16th Twickenham Scouts and with the help of one of one of their members we set too on the kayak.

Having checked all parts of the kit were present and spent a little time reading through the instructions we started making up the bottom panels. Being ready shaped, this is only a matter pairing the 13

panels (all parts are stenciled with a letter for identification) and making a butt joint with a buttplate on what will be the inside of the kayak, for all panels are only half the length of the finished craft. Thus with two chines and the deck there are 16 panels, the 12 hull panels having to be butt jointed. To ensure our kayak will have true lines the use of a stretched nylon datum line is used. Having glued and pinned the butt joints of the bottom panels, nipped and filed flush the pins, both panels are put face to face and using a simple drilling guide 1/16 holes are made all round the edges. Next the keel edge of each panel is bevelled to get the 14

keel angle. Bevelling is required on all the chines and deck but accuracy is not of great importance as the glassfibre will fill any gaps.

The chine panels and side panels of the hull are treated in a similar fashion but the butt plates on the side panels are cut short to allow room for the inwale. The inwale once again has to be jointed and this time a scarfed joint is used. Having glued and pinned this it should be left overnight to ensure the glue is set hard but when making up check that it is straight to a datum line. The inwales are next glued and pinned to the inwale edge of the side panels.



The hull is now ready to assemble and the bottom panels are laid inside face to face, the nylon line threaded in a half-hitch through each of the holes along the keel edge. The panels are then opened out and the temporary frame screwed but not glued, into position. The chine of the bottom panel is then bevelled to meet the chine panel and hole positions marked and drilled on the chine panel to match the bottom panel, with holes also drilled along the top edge. Both chine panels are then laced in position but may require a little trimming at the ends to gain a correct curve and also may need the use of copper wire to pull the ends together. The top edges of the chine panels are then bevelled as before, with the side panels

drilled and laced to form the complete hull. Care should be taken to ensure that the ends are trimmed to come together vertical.

Deckbeams and temporary stretchers are now put in place and the cockpit frames fitted. Our kayak is now ready for the glassfibre joints to be made but before starting, check the lacing which may now require a little adjustment. Follow carefully the instructions with the glassfibre kit and tape all the inside joints, using two layers on the keel. I found it advisable to use an old stiff brush for laying the resin and working it through the tape. The hull can now be left for the resin to set hard.

Clothes are kept completely dry by this suit, which seals at the wrists, around the neck and at the waist. The great advantages of the 'Sealsuit' is that it does not restrict movement when canoeing and one just slips it over ones clothes and you are ready to canoe.

An example of its ability to keep you warm was when Bob Chaplin, wearing one of these suits, swam across the Dee at the Serpent's Tail Slalom and then sat and judged for two hours, without catching pheumonia! TYNE CANOES LIMITED informus they have a new canoe in production, 'The Sportsman', a glassfibre 14' 9" touring and general purpose canoe. Also in production from TYNE is an interesting glassfibre paddle, note the grove down each edge. 'The Sportsman' is priced at \pounds 0.0. and the paddles at £2.5.0d.

Some four-five years ago the French team camped at Vega beach, some 5 miles from Ribadesella. Early one morning, with a dawn haze low over a fully flat sea our Frenchmen decided to train in open water. Out they went and back they came an hour later. Now it so happened that at that exact moment a couple of Spanish Guardia Civil (rural police and coast guard) passed by. They probably had arrived recently from Castilla plains and were on their first shore duty. For them the case was clear. Three crafts nearing

the coast in a definite attempt to land. That needed a thorough inspection! So, when the Frenchmen were pulling their canoes out of the water, they were asked for their own and their boat ducomentation.

On their answer "comprends pas" the Guardias frowned their eyebrows, looked at the dripping paddlers, and came to the conclusion that the case was even more serious than it had looked like in the beginning. This was not a simple landing, this was a foreign invasion on national territory by completely savage, indecently dressed and undocumentated people of unknown origin in as undocumentated and strange crafts! Their dury was overclear, so they duly arrested the flabbergasted Frenchmen and put them in the provisional local jail.

Two hours later, an excited captain of the French team came to tell me that his crew was hooked up. Logically a visit to the Ribadesella captain of the Guardia Civil was enough to have a motor messenger rush to Vega and set the invaders free again.... BOAT SHOW 69

Once again few of the major canoe manufacturers exhibited at the Earls Court International Boat Show. Only three firms - OTTERSPORTS, TYNE CANOES, and HOLWILL FIBREGLASS LTD - took their products to the show. However for paddlers there was a wide range of accessories that should have proved of interest and made a visit to this London show worthwhile.

First the canoe manufacturers. Ottersports was again showing a wide range of craft mainly for the touring enthusiast but had a new general purpose slalom kayak on show that looks very interesting. Also on this stand was a very nice Canadian paddle made by Moldau. I seem to remember recommending the slalom and white water blade I saw on the stand last year and it is only recently that I have seen the blade in use around the slaloms. This new Moldau Canadian blade will certainly appeal to our C1 and C2 exponents, make sure you have a look at it. On display at the Tyne stand was the new 'Sportsman' touring single in glassfibre as well as the established range of kayaks. Up in the Warwick Hall was Holwill Fibreglass. Here was a comparitively new range of kayaks from a Warwickshire manufacturer. Their range included the D.S.4 slalom kavak which seeing for the first time, I was most impressed with. Certainly this kayak will be seen around some of the slaloms during the coming season. Near at hand in the Warwick Hall was the British Canoe Union Stand, not this year showing a range of canoes and kayaks used in canoe sport but an information stand with a display of some very fine photographs (I have to comment on the photographs for they were all taken by your editor!) I hear from Martin Bosher who organised this year's BCU stand that the response was quite worthwhile in respect of gaining new members to the Union. Directly opposite







the BCU was the Scout and Guide stands. Here an interesting water competition was held and also on their pool was the Ottersports Slalom Kayak being featured in our magazine.

Talking of pools, this year's rolling display was undertaken by members from a number of clubs with the majority coming from the Leamington Spa Canoe Club. Monday 6th January saw our 'canoeing girl of the year!, Pauline Squires, becoming the first woman to put on a 'rolling' display at any Boat Show. Apart from finding it very cold - although having managed to borrow a wet suit from one of the exhibitors - failing to do two hand rolls, failing to do the 'hat trick', Pauline did manage some well executed 'rolls' and made seven 'rolls' in 15 seconds in a 'rolling' race! Well done to all those paddlers for giving up their time to publicise canoe sport, and all those who manned the BCU stand for hours on end.

What else of interest around the Show. As usual there was a wide range of wet suits, many well within the canoeists price range and of interest to any of the winter paddlers. Peter Storm had on display their new Bukflex anorak which looks very good and a real winner as far as canoeists go. Helly-Hansen had a very worthwhile 'Polar suit' on show, a track suit type garment with soft pile on the inside that I'm told will keep you warm in very cold conditions even when it is wet.

For white water boys who also take to surfing, the European Surfing Company was showing a wide range of boards, the design differing from last season, the boards being a little shorter with a more pointed nose. A new board to me was the 'Rider', manufactured by Western Wings, Worcester, quite an interesting board priced at a little under £30. All told, this year's International Boat Show was worth a visit from the canoeist.

Young paddlers are being taught to race in racing boats, they are meeting older paddlers, they are engaging in an excellent sport and in the right atmosphere. In the process, a coaching scheme for canoe racing is being hammered out. No doubt, a more authoritative report of this will soon be forthcoming from the sprint racing committee. But for the time being, thank you, sprint racing committee, you have a superb job over Mexico behind you and are now really building up a basis for another superb jcb over Munich.

Now, what about all this talk on the Cadet class? They want a canoe, one

design, that will be OK for touring, OK for sprint, OK for LD, OK for basic instruction. What's wrong with the Limfjorden? It is OK for all these things, still fast enough for a Senior racing paddler to finish well up in the Lee and Stort race last year, shaped like a boat, magnificent in rough water, quite stable enough for a beginner and with enough space to store camping gear. It has stood the test of time, let us give it an honourable maturity as a one design boat for sprint and LD.

Lastly, to Alan Byde, with respect, had he been at Marlow last weekend, he would have seen thirty racing paddlers, all mad keen for international honours, all striving to improve their technique and stamina, but all showing respect for each other, sharing washing up duties without too much coercion, altogether a happy training camp where people were learning the art of human relationships in a competitive world. Not a bad lesson to learn. They're a nice crowd, Alan, I'm privileged to be amongst them. Yours sincerely,

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

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
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
