The BOA Appeal is quite distinct from the BCU Olympic Training Fund which is being used to give our team the best possible preparatory training. What is the good of pre-paring a team if the money is not there to send it to Rome? The Union is responsible for the return of all forms, and clubs and individual members are therefore requested to return the forms, with any donation, as soon as possible, as until the Appeal Committee knows the amount of money available the BOA cannot decide on the numbers of competitors to be sent.

PAUL FARRANT

We mourn the loss of Paul Farrant, the British canceist who in 1959 carried off the Slatom World Championships at Geneva, and who died on Easter Monday as a result of injuries received when his motor cycle was in collision with a coach.

To his many friends at home and abroad the news of Paul's death came as a great shock and brought a deep sense of personal loss and bereavement. To a wide circle of canoeists in Britain, who may never have met him but knew of his achievement, Paul personified their own hopes and aspirations. Their pride in his success was so deeply felt that it gave many of them a sense of participation in it. To an even wider circle of canoeists all over Europe, particularly the devotees of slalom, Paul symbolised the best type of British sportsman: single minded, competent, modest and with a sense of humour which could meet success or defeat with equanimity. Wherever canoeists meet this year at the great international slaloms. Paul Farrant will be remembered with affection and respect.

Paul, 25 years old and a member of Chalfont Park Canoe Club, made his debut in slalom in 1951. By 1952 his progress was sufficient to merit his inclusion in a team being sent to an international slalom at Lippstadt. In 1953, in his new and rather unorthodox canoe "Platypus", Paul won the British Slalom Championships and was a member of the British team competing in the World Championships at Merano. Two years later he competed at the World Championships at Tacen, and in 1957 he went to the World Championships in Augsburg where he put up the best British performance.

Encouraged by this and by his coach, Oliver Cock, who was to have an increasing influence on his progress, Paul entered upon serious preparations for the 1959 World Championships to be held in Geneva. Much of his training was done on the rough water

below Hambledon Weir on the Thames. His progress was evident quite early in 1959 when he gained third place at Anseremme and played an important part in the succes of the British team which won the team event at Lippstadt. When Paul went to Geneva, he went full of hope and high ambition and became world champion, finishing, with the runner-up, a full minute ahead of the rest of the field.

We have received many letters of condolence from individuals and organisations at home and abroad, and these have been sent to Paul's parents who have been greatly sustained by them. We are sure that all our members will join with us in our expressions of sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. Farrant in their bereavement.

The Union has decided to sponsor a "Paul Farrant Challenge Trophy" which is to be handed to the ICF Slalom Committee for competition in the F.1 class at World Championships.

Ron Rhodes, Bob Lowery, Ray Blick, Ted Cronk, John Harris and Bazil Pratt for the men's events with Alan Young as a reserve, and Marianne Tucker for the women's race.

Apart from Ron Rhodes who in view of his previous performances is the obvious choice for the K 1 1,000m, event, it has still to be decided in which events the individual paddlers will be entered.

GREETINGS FROM THE PRESIDENT

John Dudderidge has sent us the following message to our Olympic Team:

"This will be the last issue of "Canoeing in Britain" to appear before the Olympic Games in Rome, and it gives me great pleasure to say a few words on behalf of all members of the Union, to the few who will represent

Great Britain in the canoeing events on Lake Albano.

The last few years have seen a steady rise in enthusiasm and standards, and the results achieved last year in the European Championships in Duisburg have nut heart into every competitor, as only the taste of success can. However, there is no false optimism, and all appreciate full well the standard and determination of their opponents. We say to them: Good fortune go with you, and doing your best, may you achieve success."

THE TRIALS

Following the traditional Easter Training Course, this year held on Ravens Ait on the Thames, a series of trials and weekend courses have been held in various parts of the country. The first of the trials were held in Bedford on May 14-15, ably organised by the Bedford Group of the Canoe Camping Club. With the support of the Bradford-on-Avon Rowing Club to whom we are greatly indebted, another weekend course with time trials were organised June 11-12. The final trials were held June 25 on the River Lea in Edmonton in London.

INTERNATIONAL MEETINGS

All competitors who after the Bedford weekend had been put on a short list of possible Olympic candidates were entered in a triangular match Germany-Poland-Great Britain held on June 18-19 in Duisburg. Each nation was allowed to enter two crews in each event.

As far as placings are concerned, the results were slightly disappointing-partly due to the fact that with our small numbers we had to cover too many events, but the times showed considerable progress since last year when we competed over the same course in the European Championships. The high light of the regatta was, from our point of view, the K1 1,000m. event in which Ron Rhodes took an easy second place with Bob Lowery in fourth place. The winner in this race was M. Scheuer (Germany) in 4 min. 20.4 secs., Rhodes' time was 4 min. 23.8 secs., followed by F. Briel (Germany) in 4 min, 25.7 secs. Lowery's time was 4 min. 28.3 secs. In the K 1 4×500m. Relay our two teams took fourth and fifth place.

The Olympic Team will compete in another international regatta in Berlin on July 23-24.

New Charges for Canoes on Canals

In January British Waterways introduced a new system of charges for pleasure craft on canals. Unit charges and mileage charges have ceased to apply, and the old pink application form CPO 865 was abolished.

Canoes are now classified as "Unpowered Vessels Class D or E" according to whether they use locks or not, and "Powered Vessels under 25 feet" if driven by outboard motor. Licences are given for fixed periods and for any part of the canals and navigations under the control of British Waterways, including the Crinan and Caledonian and other Scottish canals.


