To commemorate the death of Paul Farrant, winner of the FI class in the 1959 Canoe Slalom World Championships, the BCU has presented to the ICF a Challenge Trophy to be competed for in the FI class in the bi-annual Slalom World Championships. The trophy is the work of Jean Gibson.

A National Canoeing Coach

The Council of the British Canoe Union decided at its last meeting to appoint Mr. Oliver Cock as National Coach. Mr. Cock who is at present the BCU Honorary Coach will take up his appointment on January 1st, 1962. He will be available to organise courses for the training of coaches and others preparing to take charge of canoeing activities in clubs, schools and other organisations. The present coaching scheme of the BCU will continue during 1961.

The appointment of a National Coach has become possible through a grant of the Ministry of Education. However, this grant covers only 80% of the cost of the coaching scheme, and for a long time the Union's finances will be strained to the maximum. Council, in making the appointment, decided to take this calculated risk, hoping that ways and means will be found to find the balance.

The Set-up

The work of the National Coach will be directed by the BCU Coaching Committee which consists of the following members:

Chairman: to be appointed by Council and the nominees from each of the following bodies:

BCU Proficiency Committee

BCU Paddling Racing Committee

BCU Slalom Committee

BCU Long Distance Racing Committee

BCU Corps of Canoe Life Guards

BCU Youth Committee

The Central Council of Physical Recreation.

The Committee has the power to co-opt and the BCU Hon. Treasurer shall be an ex officio member of the Committee.

The Coaching Committee shall

- 1. direct the coaching activities of the Union
- 2. supervise the work of the National Coach
- 3. control the funds made available for the Coaching Scheme
- 4. approve scales of charges for the services of coaches
- approve the conditions for coaching awards, examinations for such awards and the appointment of Hon. Coaches to the Coaching Panel
- co-operate with the CCPR and other organisations in the promotion of coaching programmes
- co-operate with the BCU Proficiency Committee in the work for water safety and canoeing proficiency
- be responsible to the Council of the BCU and make regular reports and recommendations to that body.

The Duties of the Coach

Among the duties of the National Coach are:

He shall be responsible for the planning and conduct of courses for the training of coaches, including arrangements for examinations for Coaching Awards —

He shall assist and advise the Honorary Coaches in their work -

He shall direct the training of Canoe Life Guards and supervise their operations.

Administration

The CCPR has agreed to help with organising and administering the coaching scheme and the work of the National Coach. During the first year the National Coach's work will be largely experimental and much of his time will be taken up in making contacts in order to make known the scheme. The following programme has been established for the first half of 1962. The time allocated to the CCPR Regions, Wales, Northern Ireland and Scotland is reasonably short as it has been agreed that the National Coach should visit all parts of the United Kingdom during the first seven months, but it should be realised that for special events he will not keep rigidly to the areas specified.

Setbacks in Racing

No Team for Poznan

It is with very great distress that we have to report that Great Britain will not be represented in this year's European Championships which will be held in August in Poznan (Poland). Since 1936 when we for the first time entered international competition, we have taken part in all European, World and Olympic Championships. Following last year's tremendous efforts to produce an Olympic team, the Paddling Racing Committee found itself unable to enlist sufficient support to send even a token representation to Poznan. Most competitors, some of them hesitatingly, others point blank, declined an invitation to be considered for inclusion in a British team because they could not spare the time nor afford the expense, though the Committee gave the assurance that it would hold itself responsible for the cost of travel and of the transport of boats. The Committee had also to accept the view, expressed by competitors themselves, that, with one or two exceptions, they are not up to the required standard. Performances in earlier regattas seem to support this view though one could argue that there was still sufficient time to reach peak form by August.

Regional Youth Championships

The arrangements reported in the last issue of "Canoeing in Britain" for the holding of a National Open Youth Championships Regatta at Henley had to be cancelled. Despite the co-operation of the stewards of Henley Royal who were willing to make certain facilities available for the Championships, the Paddling Racing Committee found itself faced with an estimated bill for £500 from the contractors. It was too late to search for another venue and still set the complicated machinery in motion for getting the information out to the various youth organisations throughout the country at whom the Championships were aimed.

Rather than abandon the scheme, arrangements have been made instead with the Central Council of Physical Recreation for the holding of Area Youth Championships to be run on similar lines but on dates to be decided in each region. The areas are combinations of the CCPR Regions, and in each region the Paddling Racing Committee has appointed a racing official who will act as chairman of a committee comprising the appropriate CCPR Regional Officers and BCU Youth Officers to co-ordinate the arrangements:

All set for Dresden

Keith White (Manchester CC), Iain Carmichael (Twickenham CC) Martin Rohleder (Manchester CC) and Paul Mayhew (Chalfont Park CC) have been selected to represent Great Britain in this year's Canoe Slalom World Championships on the Rote Weisseritz near Dresden, with Geoff Dinsdale (Twickenham CC) as reserve. Keith White, Iain Carmichael, Martin Rohleder, Ray Parker (Richmond CC) and Alan Hubbard (Richmond CC) will be our team in the Wild Water World Championships.

The slalom team took part in the international slalom at Goumois (France) on June 11 with outstanding success. Iain Carmichael took first place in the hotly contested F1 class and we also won the team event. Don Lucas, Keith White, Martin Rohleder, Paul Mayhew and Nigel Morley took 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th places—nicely bunched together.

Earlier we were represented in the Monschau slalom and wild water race (Germany). Keith White came in 8th with 273 pts., compared with the winner's, A. Kempken (Germany), score of 240 pts. Martin Rohleder was 24th (298 pts.), Paul Mayhew 43rd (415 pts.), Ken Miles 45th (416 pts.), Geoff Dinsdale 51st (469 pts.) and Alan Hubbard 55th (607 pts.).

In the wild water race T. Prijon (Germany) came first in 21 min. 21 secs. Of our competitors Alan Hubbard came 24th (24 min. 18 secs.), Keith White 56th (29 min. 41 secs.) and Ray Parker 58th (31 min. 51 secs.).

We will also send a team to the Anseremme slalom in Belgium, consisting of Keith White, Iain Carmichael, Glyn Davies (Chester CC), David Mitchell (Chester CC), Dick Marlow (Chalfont Park CC) and Ken Miles (Chalfont Park CC). Apart from the first two named, this entry is intended to give experience to promising youngsters. Before going to Eastern Germany, the World Championship team will enter a slalom and wild water race on the Lieser in Austria, the venue of the 1963 World Championships, where they will stay on for some days for training.

LD Notes

This season has again shown the tremendous increase in the popularity of Long Distance racing. Entries have almost been doubled and the standard of racing shows continued signs of progress. However, at the same time, we must record two fatal accidents. At the Leamington Spa LD Race in which over 100 boats had been entered, a canoeist drowned in a practice run down the course, and in the Midland CC LD Race a further fatal accident occured to a junior competitor.

It is time that it is once more stressed:

canoes entered in races should always have ample buoyancy where the course warrants it, it is advisable to wear life jackets organisers of races must provide ample safety craft at any danger points and a sufficient number of helpers must be made available to marshall the course.

Many completely inexperienced canoeists-some not even members of the BCU-have tried to enter for races, little realising the strenuous and exhausting type of sport it is and without any idea to the danger to themselves. Organisers should consider these entries carefully before accepting them.

The LD Committee is sending a strong team to this year's Sella River Race: P. Lawler and R. Still of Richmond CC will lead the 14 strong British contingent.

The future of the Hasler Trophy is very much in the balance. Richmond CC, CTC, Learnington Spa and Worcester CC are all in the running for this trophy.

The Union has effected a Comprehensive Canoe Insurance Policy at Lloyd's. Cover under this Policy is available to Affiliated Clubs, their members and to Individual Members. What will it cover? All types of canoes and gear and if the member so wishes the camping gear and clothing normally carried in the canoe. What risks are covered? All loss or damage however caused. Also Third Party liabilities up to £1,000 in U.K. and Europe.

How much will it cost? Values up to £50: 25s £75: 30s

£100: 35s £125: 40s £150: 45s

For an additional 10s to any of the above, the Third Party Liability cover may be increased to £5,000.

Proposal forms are available from Headquarters or Club Secretaries.

The Policy does not cover normal wear and tear or valuables. No claim will be paid if the damage or loss is under 50s, however, claims in excess of this amount will be paid in full.

Owing to his other commitments Oliver Cock had to relinquish the office as the Union's Film Officer. He will be succeeded by C. M. Rothwell, 21 Windsor Road, Clayton Bridge, Manchester 10, to whom in future all enquiries regarding film loops and strips should be addressed. The Union's canoeing films will be, as hitherto, handled by the British Film Institute.

New Books on Canoeing

Two books on canoeing have appeared recently on the market: one a revised edition of Noel McNaught's "The Canoeing Manual" (Nicholas Kaye, 15s), and the other Percy W. Blandford's new "Tackle Canoeing this Way" (Stanley Paul, 12s 6d).

There will be an Olympic Canoeing Regatta in Tokyo. The 58th Session of the International Olympic Committee held in Athens on June 18-21 rejected the proposal of the Japanese Olympic Committee that canoeing and modern pentathlon should be dropped from the programme and decided that the same events will be staged at the Games in Tokyo as in Rome, plus two more events: judo and volley ball. The latter two events had been proposed by Japan.

It is a sign of the rapid development of our sport that any handbook on canoeing, as far as any reference material is concerned, soon becomes out-of-date. It is therefore appropriate that "The Canoeing Manual" which first was published in 1956, has been brought out in a revised edition. In a conversational style practically all aspects of canoeing are covered, except racing, and beginner and old hand will find it a most readable book. However, even the new edition could not keep pace with the development in canoeing: it lists for instance just over eighty clubs affiliated to the Union whilst since the book went to press another fifty or so new clubs have joined the ranks of the national canoeing organisation. It would have been better if when giving the location of the club, the author had not been guided by the address of the secretary. It is known that Chalfont Park CC are at Hambledon on the Thames (and not in Sandhurst), Richmond CC in Richmond on Thames (and not in London SE11) or the Canoe Fellowship in Weybridge (and not in London NW1). When reading the chapter on canoe slalom the expert raises his eyebrows over some of the things said, for instance when special mention is made of the "barrier" which went out years ago.

Blandford's "Tackle Canoeing this Way"—tersely written, amply illustrated, approaching such subjects as types of canoes, equipment, technique, touring, safety, racing, sailing, white water work, building and maintainance from a technical angle—is a competent introduction to the sport by the well-known designer. We liked in particular the chapter on sea canoeing. All in all: a useful and valuable addition to our canoeing literature.


