## **Competition Results**

#### Kavak Racing

A very noticeable feature of this year's racing season—to judge by the entries for racing events held so far-is the great number of enthusiastic youngsters and juniors who, many of them for the first time, are entering for sprint racing events. The response to the Regional Youth Championships has also been reasonably encouraging so that there is every prospect for

the first National Youth Championships to be held as planned.

However, also very noticeable is the disappointing lack of physical strength and technique. Without these the present enthusiasm will soon collapse when the results one had hoped for will not materialise. It is just not good enough to "Have a bash", and it will remain one of the most urgent problems for the Union and the Paddling Racing Committee how to provide more coaching and training facilities. On the other hand it must be regrettably reported that when such facilities are being available, not sufficient use is being made of them: for instance at the Easter Training Course at Thamesfield not a single representative from the North and the North East was present though a number of places had been reserved for them at their own special request.

## SPORTS AND POLITICS

The World Championships in Racing which had been scheduled to be held August 17th-19th in Essen. Western Germany, have been cancelled.

This distressing news is the result of the increasingly tense political relations between East and West. The authorities of Western Germany announced they would not allow a canoeing team from Eastern Germany to take part in the Championships.

The ICF felt that, according to its statutes and its tradition, it could not allow that one of its members was to be prevented from taking part in an international event which was to be held under its auspices. Since no other solution could be found, the Executive of the ICF decided to cancel the Championships. The Organising Committee of the Championships will organise a big international regatta instead—with the same programme and on the same dates-but, of course, this event will have no World Championships status.

Over our justified indignation that the authorities of Western Germany threatened to take police measures against the participation of a team from Eastern Germany in the Championships, we should not forget the fact that our own government, as that of all other NATO countries, have for a long time taken the same line: no citizen of Eastern Germany is allowed to come here.

What makes this case such an outstanding piece of hypocrisy is the fact that it is laid down in the constitution of Western Germany that inhabitants of Eastern Germany are allowed to enter and leave freely her own territory. In their hysterical endeavour to avoid anything which might give the appearance as if they were to recognise Eastern Germany, the authorities of Western Germany sabotage sport, cultural and human relations whilst these considerations apparently do not apply when it comes to doing business-and big business-with the same people who are not to be recognised.

Taking the long view, our sport and international sport as a whole will benefit from the unpleasant, but necessary decision of the ICF: it has shown that in matters of principle no rotten compromises are possible—something which others might care to take to heart: championships which are not open to all, cannot be called "World".

## From the Coaching Committee

#### **Proficiency Tests**

There are now three standards of tests (for both kayak and Canadian type of canoes):

- (1) Novice Canoeists Test. This is a newly introduced test. Details of the test are as follows:
- (a) The candidate will swim 50 yards in light clothing (e.g. shirt, shorts and gym shoes).
- (b) The candidate will give a satisfactory performance of the following skills in a single-seater, or if no singles are available, in the rear seat of a two-seater.
- 1. The candidate will handle his canoe into the water.
- The candidate will make the canoe fast to the bank, and leave it.
- The candidate will get into his canoe from the bank, and will put out into midstream.
- 4. He will demonstrate paddling forwards and backwards.
- He will paddle upstream, return and make a clean approach to the landing stage or bank.
- 6. He will disembark and take the canoe out of the water.

- Returning into his canoe, the candidate will move into deep water, where he will capsize and swim ashore with it.
- He will empty the canoe, take it from the water and place it properly on the bank.

In items 1, 6 and 8 the candidate may have assistance if he so desires. The test can be carried out on any available water. There is no fee due from candidates taking this test. Successful candidates will be given a certificate.

- (2) Proficiency Test. This test now replaces the Elementary Proficiency Test. In addition to the skills required in the old Elementary Test, candidates must also be able to demonstrate the following strokes:
  - (a) Draw stroke.
  - (b) Sculling stroke.
  - (c) Sculling for support.
  - (d) Sweep stroke.
- (3) Advanced Proficiency Test, A practical canoeing test will be included and questions on the leadership of expeditions will be asked.

#### REPORTS

Durham CC realised a profit of £47 from their Easter draw. prize consisted of a continental holiday for two in the Black Forest.

A panel of instructors has been formed in the North East. Learner canoeists from schools, both teachers and pupils, TA units, Combined Cadet Force units, clubs and members of the public have been introduced to basic canoeing up to the Novice Award standard. Instruction is given at four centres: South Shields, Sunderland, Hartlepool and Durham. Because three of the clubs in these places are sea canoeing clubs, much discussion went on over the application of the skills laid down in the Union's standard tests, to the problems presented by sea conditions. The courses which started in May, are well attended. Durham County Council runs weekend courses in canoe building and handling at Stobb House, a beautiful country house on the Tees near Barnard Castle.

We regret to have to announce the death, in the beginning of June, of Mr. T. G. Day, for many years Commodore of Richmond Canoe Club. We extend our sympathies to his family and his club.

Recently, over a period of three weeks, the calm and peaceful River Wear at Durham took five lives. One, a canoeist, not wearing a life jacket, played about in a "toy" canoe. A would-be rescuer was also drowned.

Four canoes were launched on June 2 by Twickenham CC which will be manned by boys of Fortesque House who have qualified as Life Guards under the direction of Twickenham CC's own lifeguards. The four canoes were presented by the Thames Youth Venture to the London Federation of Boys' Clubs two years ago. As the Federation ceased to operate, the canoes were handed over to Twickenham CC to form a new section and it was thought that this expansion could successfully include Fortesque House boys.

Upper Wortley School CC whose boathouse was destroyed in the spring gales are now rehoused. With the help of members, parents and friends the old boathouse has been repaired, and one parent presented the club with a new large hut which has been turned into a clubroom.

Windsor and District CC went to the Upper Wye over Easter and did, together with Twickenham CC, the Wey over Whitsun. A silver challenge cup has been presented to the club for the year's best aggregate

performance.

The Canadian Canoe Association of GB intends to produce a journal dealing solely with Canadian paddling. Its title will be "The

Canadian Canoeist".

Bental Apprentices CC—they have their headquarters at Blackbridge, Heybridge—took six hours over their first trip in the season—covering a distance of 13 miles: the water level was very low necessitating a great deal of walking and a number of uncomfortable portages. They had a sked Southend Waterworks for permission to canoe through their

section of the river but they did not inform them that they were going to close the sluice gates, and the river below was dry.

The Cormorant CC had a barbecue on the Nene on May 30, over Whitsun they went to Gayhurst, and on June 27 they organised a racing

meet on the Nene.

Fifteen members of Coventry CC were in London on May 19 to take a message from the Lord Mayor of London to the Lord Mayor of Coventry. The distance to be covered was 131 miles of canals with about 100 locks to be portaged. They did this in relays of two canoeists in two canoes who would cover a distance of approximately 10 miles before handing over to two fresh canoeists. who followed in cars and motor cycles. The weather was bad to begin with and appalling when they reached Coventry. Since no canoeing is allowed on the canals in the dark, they had to stop each evening, but nevertheless they did the trip in just 48 hours, having left the City Road Basin in London at 10.30 a.m. on May 19 and reaching Coventry at the same time on May 21.
