LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

As you will have heard and read by now, the Council has considered recommending drastic changes in the membership structure of the Union as it affects clubs with the following objects in view.

- Increasing the appeal of the BCU among the hundreds of people and dozens of clubs who have not joined in spite of a considerable expenditure in time and money on publicity.
- (ii) Simplification of administration.

Approximately a thousand individual membership forms and several hundred of club affiliation forms have been sent out in the last year or so as a result of direct requests. A tiny fraction of these have been returned completed. As you would expect only a small number of people and clubs who have not joined have let us know their reasons. Those who have, have given very similar reasons; individuals have said that 15/- is too high for the services received and clubs that the fees are too high or that they are unable to give us membership figures on which to calculate a subscription. The answer seems to be lower fees and a simpler method of calculating club subscriptions.

If the Union is to become a more effective voice for canoeing, we must increase the membership. If the Union is to increase its services and facilities we must increase the subscription income. On the basis of "small profits—quick returns", it is held that we can increase both our membership and our income at one and the same time.

The Council proposes four types of membership:

(i) Affiliated Members, i.e. Clubs. (ii) Members, i.e. Individuals.

(iii) Divisions, e.g. Scottish Canoe Association.

(iv) Associates, i.e. Wellwishers.

Under the proposed scheme, Affiliated Members will pay a uniform subscription (suggested 2 gns.) regardless of size. The rights of this form of membership will be limited to those appropriate to organisations, such as the right to seek Union

recognition of its canoeing events and the right of access to the Union register of members for recruiting purposes. The individual member of an affiliated club would derive no personal privileges from his club's affiliation. It is hoped that the clubs will do all they can to encourage their members to join the Union. Two clubs have already altered their rules in anticipation of reorganisation to make Union membership a condition of membership. The Council must not and will not interfere in these matters. However, a club with at least six Full Union Members in membership will have the right to a voice and vote at General Meetings of the Union and to representation on the several Technical Committees.

Member's rights are those appropriate to a person: voting rights, the Union publications at a preferential rate, the right to wear the tie and fly the pennant, and the right to enter Union recognised events, etc. The responsibility of determining the conditions of recognition and granting recognition in the name of the Union will be delegated to the Technical Committees.

At the Annual General Meeting which we hope every member will do his best to attend, you will be asked to agree amendments to the present Rules:

- (a) Introducing Youth Individual Membership;
- (b) Extension of the definition of "Associate" to include individual Wellwishers;
- (c) The substitution of the words Junior Membership by the words Youth Membership. This is to avoid the present confusion between a form of membership and a standard in competitive canoeing.

You will be asked to agree:

- (d) To a reduction of the Individual Membership subscriptions to—Full 7/6, Family 2/6, Youth 3/6; and agree
- (e) To the abolition of the Individual Membership Entrance Fee. Then you will be asked to agree
 - (f) To a complete revision of the Rules to implement the re-organisation of club membership operative from November 1, 1963.

Finally you will be asked to agree

(g) To an "escape clause" giving the Union the chance of second thoughts in the light of the results of its recruiting campaign, at the A.G.M. in 1964 if those results are not conclusively in favour by October, 1963.

So you see that the idea is to reduce Individual Membership subscriptions in the year 1962-1963 and cut all club subscriptions to 2 gns. in 1963-1964.

Please come to the Meeting on January 26 at Star Cross School and join in the debate and cast your vote.

3. INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

We have continued to play a leading part in the work of the International Canoe Federation. At the 1962 ICF Congress in Essen, the President was again elected to the Board of Management as one of the three representatives for Europe. Mr. J. Spuhler was re-elected to the Slalom Committee and attended the meeting of this Committee in Spittal. Mr. A. Emus resigned as Chairman of the ICF Sailing Committee, but continues to serve as a member of the Committee. Mr. H. Thelen was elected Chairman of the new Propaganda and Information Committee of the ICF and continues to serve as Editor of the ICF Bulletin. In connection with his work he has visited the canoeing associations in most of the countries in Europe. He attended the meeting of the ICF Racing Committee in Paris and acted as BCU delegate at the ICF Congress in Essen.

4. NATIONAL COACHING SCHEME

During 1962 the National Coach completed two tours in most regions, running courses for training coaches and leaders and giving lectures, demonstrations and film shows. Bookings have been made through the CCPR whose co-operation has been invaluable. A scheme of coaching awards has been introduced, the main categories being Instructor, Hon. Coach and Senior Coach. 35 initial appointments were made, 32 passed the Instructors' examination and four that for Hon. Coach.

5. TESTS

During the year the National Coaching Committee took over the work of the Proficiency Test Committee. Thanks are due to the members of this committee for their most valuable work in initiating and administering a series of worth-while tests. An impressive number of people have taken the new Novice Test since it was introduced in June—indicating that there was indeed a need for such a test. During the last year 149 candidates have been successful in the Proficiency Test (until recently called the Elementary Proficiency Test), bringing the number of holders of this certificate since it was first introduced in June, 1952, to 441. Although only three have taken the Advanced Test in kayaks (five have now passed the test since 1952), it is to be anticipated that this number will increase rapidly in the years ahead. No proficiency tests at all have been taken in Canadian canoes but with the increasing popularity of this type of canoe one can reasonably expect a constant flow of entries in future.

6. CORPS OF CANOE LIFE-GUARDS

Although still small, the Corps of Canoe Life-Guards has been far from inactive. Members have been devoting much of their spare time to instructing other youthful canoeists, and giving demonstrations at swimming galas. Two outstanding events in the year have been a demonstration before the annual conference of the British Association of Organisers and Lecturers in Physical Education, and an exercise in Flood Reconnaissance carried out with the Buckinghamshire Constabulary. In this latter event, the enthusiasm of the Police for the scheme was almost overwhelming.

7. CANOE SAILING

Canoe Sailing has continued to develop strongly and the team which represented us in the international sailing regatta in Germany was very successful.

8. SLALOM

The year has been one of steady progress particularly as regards the influx of newcomers and the various slaloms held in each of the four divisions have been well attended. In the international field we have been conserving our resources but entries were made for a slalom at Spittal in Austria where next year's World Slalom is to be held.

9. RACING

The year under review saw a body of newcomers coming into racing and at the same time the retirement of many experienced competitors from active paddling. This resulted in a virtually internationally untried team which took part in the International Regatta in Essen (which replaced the World Championships) with only moderate success. The National Sprint Championships were held, only for the second time ever, in the provinces—at Boston, Lincolnshire. The Serpentine Regatta was again the highlight of the racing season with racing canoeists from many countries taking part. The Youth Championships have been an outstanding success—with the National Championships forming part of the Serpentine Regatta. Several training courses were held during the winter and earlier part of the season with the traditional Easter Course at Thamesfield.

With a greater number of newcomers to the sport, and in particular as a result of the Youth Championships which have opened up great possibilities for introducing racing to a so far unexplored section of the canoeing fraternity, the provision of more and better technical facilities for coaching and training remains one of the most urgent tasks which

lies ahead.

10. LONG DISTANCE RACING

An excellent season has been enjoyed, fourteen national ranking races being held, six in the south, five in the Midlands and three in the north of England. These were generally well attended and efficiently organised. The Hasler Trophy was won for the second year in succession by the Worcester Canoe Club, the Royal Canoe Club coming a close second. Once again a small team representing Great Britain took part in the Sella River race. The official pair finished tenth in a large entry, gaining fifth place for Great Britain out of a total of thirteen nations.

The LDR Committee made few changes to the existing rules for LDR Racing though the safety regulations have been considerably tightened up. The classes decided upon in 1961 have had a further year's test and these have again proved satisfactory, but a full assessment of their suitability will

not be possible until the end of the 1963 season.

11. YOUTH

During the year, considerable work has been done to improve organisation. The country has been divided into areas corresponding with those of the CCPR, to simplify administration, and Youth Officers have been appointed in most of these. Ultimately these officers will be able to work with the Education Authorities and local Youth organisations. More volunteers with a knowledge of both canoeing and young people are required for this work.

12. TOURING AT HOME

About 35 canoeists took part in the Easter Meet on the Rivers Sow and Trent. The first camp was in the sports ground of the English Electric Company at Stafford, who were good enough to make available the facilities of the sports pavilion. We are very grateful to them for their hospitality. This Meet showed once again that the Trent is not the uninteresting industrial river that many people—especially in the south—think it is. About 20 canoeists took part in an enjoyable weekend in excellent weather on the Bristol Avon at Whitsuntide.

Throughout the year members have toured in ones and twos and in larger groups at home and abroad. Unfortunately there is no sign of a real improvement in the position of access to private rivers or objections

from fishing interests.

13. TOURING ABROAD

Members have continued to canoe the rivers of Europe for pleasure, but the number of service organisations asking for information for marathon trans-continental trips seems to be increasing and these do not sound entirely pleasurable. France, Germany and Austria continue to be the most popular countries for foreign touring but Italy and Jugoslavia have also drawn canoeists.

14. PUBLICATIONS

A new pamphlet on Canadian canoeing has been added to those already published and we wish to express our gratitude to Brian Skilling for his work in compiling it. Canoeing in Britain has appeared four times during the year, giving useful information about future events and the results of past ones.

15. SUPPLIES

There has been a steady sale of foreign maps and guides throughout the year, and the BCU Guide to British Waterways has continued to sell well. A new pamphlet, on Canadian canoeing, has been added to the series.

16. FILMS

Three new films have been added to the British Film Institute Library and 15 loops added to the eight sold by ourselves. The BFI report shows that they have had 212 bookings over the last available period of 12 months, mostly for more than one reel. We ourselves have dealt with 87 customers for loops, mostly again of orders for several loops.

17. ENQUIRIES

Over 300 club application forms have been distributed during the past year, but only a small proportion have been returned. Over 1,000 individual membership forms have been sent out, of which only a small number have joined.

18. FINANCE

During the year ended 31 October, 1962, the BCU has managed to balance its income and expenditure account, but has not made any additions to its reserve account. Subscription income has increased from £555 in the year to 31 October, 1961, to £674 in the current year, as a result of an increase in membership. The coaching scheme in its first year has broken even and this is most satisfactory and pleasing. This is due to the immense amount of work and effort put into the scheme by the National Coach and his supporting coaches throughout the country, coupled with the considerable assistance received from the CCPR.

19. ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

We again express our appreciation of the work done by the CCPR for so many aspects of canoeing and thank the News of the World for their sponsorship of the Serpentine Regatta.

Competition Results

Leven Wild Water Test 1962

Appearances are often deceptive, and so it proved with this damp summer which left the Leven in low water on so many occasions and disappointed so many canoeists who had travelled North on the appointed dates to do battle with the river. Their visits were not entirely wasted, however, as much useful slalom practice was enjoyed at the main fall and the cruises down the course provided excellent opportunities of learning some of the secrets of this lively river in her many moods. Many more took part in the cruises and practice runs, and they outnumbered those who decided to compete with a recorded run. The spell of the river gripped them and they are all potential challengers for next year's competitions. On only one occasion this year did a good water level and good weather coincide.

The Gold Dipper for 1962 was won by Dave Mitchell of Chester Canoe Club on August 26 when there was excellent water at 10 feet 5 inches, but with heavy rain and headwinds which prevented exceptional times being achieved. Under such conditions it was a meritorious run and well deserving of this highest honour. Keith White was left in second place only five seconds behind, whilst Frank Nelson, of Lakeland Canoe Club, with his best performance yet, was only three seconds behind. Glyn Davies, of Chester Canoe Club, was one second slower. Among the ladies, Catherine Whiteside, of Lakeland Canoe Club, won a Bronze Dipper with a comfortable

margin to spare and becomes the third lady to join the ranks of the Dipper Club. In this competition the ladies compete on equal terms with the men, as the contest is considered to be more against the river than against the other competitors. The previous two ladies to hold the badge are Heather Goodman and Joan Beecham, also of Lakeland Canoe Club.

It was seen that some of the men who were capable of fast times sometimes returned slower times than those who appeared to be not so fast but who took care to obtain cleaner runs. This is one of the attractions of the course as it puts a premium on skill as opposed to brute force.

The seven minute barrier remains as a challenge and it seems probable. after last year's times, that it might well be broken in 1963, a year when steady training for the World Championships will produce competitors in

a peak condition of fitness.

For the sake of those not conversant with the rules of this contest, it may be helpful to say here that the Standard Water Level is reckoned at 10 feet 10 inches. For every inch below this level, five seconds are subtracted from a competitor's actual time. For each inch above this level, five seconds are added to the actual time taken on the course. This procedure enables equitable comparisons to be made at all navigable levels.

STOP PRESS

In her New Year's Honour's List H.M. The Queen made BCU President John W. Dudderidge, in recognition of his services to canoeing, an Officer of the Order of the British Empire (OBE).

Dudderidge, ever since the foundation of the Union in 1936, has rendered to our sport. The great strides which canoeing has made in recent years, cannot be separated from John W. Dudderidge as the driving force behind this progress. Honour has been bestowed not only on him, but also on our sport and the Union.

British Open Youth Championships 1963

Following the success of the 1962 Youth Championships, the general arrangements for the 1963 Championships will remain unchanged except that in some cases, in the light of the experience gained in 1962, the areas have been slightly re-defined.

The Championships are open to all boys between 14 and 18 and girls between 16 and 18-no matter whether they belong to an affiliated canoe club or not. They aim in particular at schools and youth organisations

which normally do not enter in competitive events.

It is suggested that all Area Youth Championships are held during the same weekend—namely the weekend June 22-23 which for this purpose has been kept clear, as far as possible, of all other competitive events so as to make the maximum number of club officials and members available for the running of the regional events. Clubs will again be asked to stage and to assist in the running of the Area Championships, and it must be left to them to change, if this is thought to be advantageous, the date and also to fix the venue. In any case, it is essential that all Area Championships are completed before the end of June by which time the names and addresses of the winners in each area must be forwarded to the National Organiser (A. L. Todd, 47 Knightwood Crescent, New Malden, Surrey) from whom also further information can be obtained. The National Championships will again form part of the Serpentine Regatta whose organiser is H. Thelen, 13 Campden House, London, NW6.

Safety Precautions-All competitors must wear approved life-jackets and their kayaks must be equipped with buoyancy

bags.

Equipment - Competitors must supply their own kayaks and paddles for the Championships. Kayaks paddles) will be supplied if required for the Area winners taking part in the National Championships regatta.

"Suggestions have been made from several sources that the British Canoe Union ought to make some pronouncement on this matter.

"At the present time a number of organisations, among them the British Standards Institution and the Ship and Boat Builders' National Federation, are considering the question of standards and development work is being carried on by manufacturing concerns.

"Through its National Coaching Committee, the British Canoe Union is keeping in touch with these developments and is being consulted in several of them.

"The Council proposes to await the results of the present independent enquiries and to examine them in the light of the equipment then made available to the public.
"The Council does not consider

that a useful purpose would be served at the present stage by adding to the number of investigations now being made or by making pronouncement while these investigations are still uncompleted."

A Note from the Editor

This issue of "Canoeing in Britain" concludes the 12th year of the Union's official quarterly. It is also the last issue for which I sign as Editor.

Already earlier in the year I indicated to Council that I wished to relinquish the offices in the Union which I have held for some years, and with the proposed changes in the Union's setup which will also affect "Canoeing in Britain", I thought the time for a "natural break" had come.

When I started "Canoeing in Britain" twelve years ago, we printed a few hundred copies. It was essentially a news sheet, a means of communication between the Union and its members and an outlet for news from Council, committees and clubs. This remained in all the years the unaltered editorial policy. However, with the growth of the Union, also "Canoeing in Britain" grew in

size and circulation. The last issue was printed with 4,700 copies. Therefore I felt the time had come—as I have suggested to Council—to change not only the Editor, but also review the editorial policy. I have proposed to Council to change over to a slightly more magazine type of publication by introducing articles of a general nature on various aspects of canoeing, having more illustrations, though not necessarily at the expense of the news reports—provided, of course, that the money for this expansion is available.

Council will have to decide whether these proposed changes can be carried out in conditions which I did not anticipate. It will also have to find a new Editor to whom I express my good wishes for the success of his efforts. Give him all the support which—as I know only too well—he will need.

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
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
