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

# Annual General Meeting

COMMENT

The 23nd Annual General Meeting of the BCU will be held at Westminster Boating Base, Dinorvic Wharf, 136 Grosvenor Road, London, SW1V 3JY at 2.30pm. Full details are enclosed with this edition of *Canoe Focus*. The main motions for the meeting concern changes to the BCU's Memorandum and Articles of Association. This is in order to allow the BCU board of directors to be freshly constituted in a manner that truly reflects the federal nature of the organisation.

The plan is to introduce from May 1st a BCU board of ten persons. This will comprise of five representatives from England, two each from Scotland and Wales and one from Northern Ireland. Underpinning the board will be four main management committees looking after coaching, competition and our commitments to the World Class Programme, together with a council looking after the affairs of the BCU's English division (Canoe England).

The motions set out in the enclosed papers detail the changes to the BCU's constituting documents in order to allow these changes to happen.

If you are not able to attend the AGM in person, then please consider using the proxy form also enclosed to make your views known.

## International Canoe Exhibition

The Right Honourable Alun Michael MP, Minister of State for Rural Affairs and Urban Quality of Life will open the International Canoe Exhibition in March.

Positioned alongside the Outdoors Show it is anticipated that over 30,000 visitors will make the trip to the NEC in Birmingham during the three days of the shows from March 14 to March 16.

#### Access

Alun Michael's acceptance of an invitation to open the International Canoe exhibition illustrates just how far the access debate has developed during the past 12 months.

The BCU led campaign has reached many of the key decision makers, both politically and in the many agencies that affect our every day life.

The BCU's strategy is still to lobby for new legislation, a change in the law to enable greater access for canoeists. Clearly, there is still a long way to go but the efforts of the past year prove that the campaign is worthwhile and good progress can be made. On behalf of the BCU board and canoeists everywhere thank you all for your continuing efforts.

### **Operational plan**

During the next 12 months it is anticipated that the BCU will move into a new National Canoeing Development Centre at Holme Pierrepont . The move, which will house all BCU staff based in Nottingham into one place, combined with the new BCU development plan and the introduction of a more federal structure provides the BCU with an opportunity to introduce some significant changes to its staff/volunteer structures and respective responsibilities.

### **Strategy Unit Report**

Shortly before Christmas the government unveiled the joint DCMS / Strategy Unit report into delivering the Governments sport and physical activity objectives.

The strategy probably represents the most detailed review of British sport that has ever taken place. It presents a number of serious challenges to sports organisations including governing bodies. The report adopts the twin track objectives of promoting participation in sport and becoming one of the world's top five sporting nations by 2012.

The suggestions emanating from the report were welcomed by a recent BCU board meeting, whose members were able to note that the BCU's work on the organisations new operational plan compare favourably with the reports recommendations.

# Greenlandic champion in UK

During the Anglesey Sea Symposium, Maligiaq J. Padilla, the four times and current Greenland Kayak Champion will be running training sessions and leading trips 'Greenland style.'



What is Greenland style paddling? The word kayak (or Qajaq) translates roughly to 'hunters boat' and that is the tradition that Greenland style paddling keeps alive. The rolling manoeuvres are derived from hunting scenarios where you may have to deal with a harpoon line freezing water and an irate walrus. The paddling style is designed for long distance travel with maximum efficiency and minimal noise, the rope gymnastics develop balance and strength and the harpoon throwing speaks for itself.

Maligiaq lives in Sisimiut, West Greenland, on the Artic Circle. He was taught to kayak by his Grandfather, who passed on the tradition skills of the kayak hunter. His healthy respect for tradition, coupled with the dedication to training of a professional athlete has allowed Maligiaq to make a great contribution to Greenland style paddling at home and abroad. He not only delivers training to his local club but has also been invited to contributed to symposiums in the USA and Japan.

# Russian expedition

Two women, Justine Curgenven and Hadas Feldman, are challenging themselves to seakavak 300 miles along the exposed Pacific coastline of Kamchatka in the Russian far east. Big surf, unpredictable weather, the world's largest population of brown bears and a complete lack of infrastructure mean this will be a formidable undertaking.

But the plans don't stop there. They are offering local people work and conservation opportunities and intend to to Kamchatka. Over two years, they have collaborated with a local eco-tourism company

www.explorekamchatka.com and recruited six young Russians who we will train to become kayaking guides Kamchatka is a poor country struggling to create a viable economy after years of communist rule.

This project will be a major boost, providing work and income for local people in a way which preserves the natural environment.

Kamchatka is a land shaped from fire and ice. A remote, spectacular part of the world with 30 active volcanoes and vast tracts of unexplored

Justine, from Wales, and Hadas, from Israel, will spend three weeks in Kamchatka this May, training the guides so they can safely take tourists on short kayaking trips on a crater lake. One of the guides will then accompany them on their three week expedition up the amchatka coast. The idea is that at the end of their trip they will leave Kamchatka with a new eco-tourism business that local people can run themselves. A non-profit fund will manage the finances and all ofits will be used for maintenance, repair and future training. Groups experienced paddlers on their own expeditions will be able to hire

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### Ludford Bridge Weir re-opens



This medieval weir has now been rebuilt. The completion was marked by a ribbon cutting ceremony conducted by Alan Poulton, Chair of the Teme Weirs Trust. A Coracle helped Alan to the centre of the weir, he then cut a ribbon stretched across the river and pulled out a board at the head of the fish pass to allow

water to facilitate the passage of migratory fish.

At the same time, in front of the "Midlands Today" cameras, the canoe shoot was run by paddlers from the nearby college.

When approaching the weir, immediately after Ludford Bridge, the canoe shoot is located just to the right of the big rock and fish pass. The river in the photographs is at record low levels.

Chris Hawkesworth, the BCU's Planning and Facilities Manager said "Though coming from behind and at the last minute, the BCU was able to help design the canoe shoot and help with it's implementation".

Paddlers are asked not to "Shoot" the fish pass, it has been built exactly 60cm wide, exactly the same width of a kayak! and yes, paddlers have been stuck in it already. Chris added, "The BCU's access team in the area was a bit thin on the ground and did not become aware of weir rebuilding until the fish pass was already designed and it was too late".

In addition to BCU officer time, the BCU also made a donation to the Teme Weirs trust from access funds of  $\pounds 3,600$ . The trust has acknowledged canoeing as a legitimate activity on the Teme and the local access scene has been revitalised.

### Boulter's Weir on the Thames

The experimental cance flume at Boulters is now at the end of its second season and has hosted yet another freestyle competition. The cance flume is a joint effort between the Environment Agency and the BCU and cost over £20,000.



# **Questioning the minister**

At Parliamentary Waterways Group, Tuesday 3rd December 2002, questions from canoeing were put to Richard Cabourn MP, Minister for Sport.

#### From the British Canoe Union

An increasing cost for sport and recreation organisations is insurance, particularly for third party liability. There are instances where BCU approved canoeing activity centres have incurred up to 300% annual increase in premium and this without a claim on the policy. There are concerns that some activity centres and organisations might be unable to gain insurance cover for all or some of their activities if this rate of increase continues to directly impact on the range of activities that can be offered. Costs to participate in sport and recreation are increasing and insurance is ever more important to retain voluntary club coaches who are the backbone of sport when litigation is prevalent.

Can the minister please comment.

#### The minister replied:

He acknowledged the problem and the valuable and important contribution the voluntary coach provided in sport and recreation. It needed to continue and be encouraged, but he recognised people were turning away from the role with the change in society and the blame culture. Sensational headlines did not help when reporting an outdoors pursuit incident, especially when young people and voluntary leaders are involved. On these occasions the media and general public lose sight of the fact that many more young people are at greater risk from drugs etc. He went on to say he was due to see the major insurance companies and the Financial Services Authority as the matter of high annual increases in insurance premiums for sport is an issue for him. Increases of 300% and more are not uncommon.

#### From the Canoe Camping Club -Roger Green, Chairman

#### On the matter of access to water.

The University of Brighton report - "Water Based Sport and Recreation: the facts" commissioned by DEFRA identified the opening of more inland waters for public navigation as an issue to be addressed. The report found only 815km of access agreements to inland water from a total of some 55,000km of major and minor rivers in England and Wales where there is no public access for linear access by unpowered craft such as canoes. DEFRA have recognised this situation and have directed the Countryside Agency to arrange demonstration schemes for access. Is the Department for Culture, Media & Sport also responding to the findings of the University of Brighton report to enable more inland water to be opened to public navigation, essentially for unpowered craft.

#### The minister replied:

His department has been involved with the Brighton report as Sport England had been on the steering committee. He will continue to be involved as he is maintaining contact with Alun Michael MP, Rural Affairs Minister, on this matter and was aware of the proposed access demonstration schemes. "Watch this space" were his words. Roger Green followed up with some further comment that re-affirmed to the meeting the basis of the case for more access.

#### ACCESS V MORE ACTIVITY

Shepperton B Weir



Various parties came together to provide the funding, these included the Environment Agency, the BCU National Access fund, BCU Southern Region, the BCU National Freestyle committee, Windsor CC, and the Castle Hill Centre.

Chris Hawkesworth the BCU's Planning and Facilities Manager said "The weir sill has been drilled with holes. The holes allow tubes to be inserted to hold the boards that funnel the water. The flume was originally designed for summer river levels, to run at 4/5 cubic metres of water per second, this to give paddlers somewhere to go when nothing else on the Thames was running. The boards or "Flags" as they've become known as were due to be taken out in the autumn and replaced in the spring of each year. However, the Environment Agency have given permission for the flume to be used all year round but be warned, the flume can be meaty at times and many an expert paddler has been trashed."

The head of the Ray Mill Island has been extensively re-worked as a flood prevention measure. Whilst under construction, the contractor and the Environment Agency worked with the BCU to provide an ingress/egress platform, portage path and steps that double as seats for spectators.

Further developments at Boulters are planned, the canoe flume is to be altered to make it less meaty and more attractive, a second one is planned and moves are afoot to enable surfing to take place under the new sluice gates. The BCU is working with the Environment Agency in other areas of the London and the South, new facilities are planned for paddlers on the island at Hurley, Marsh and Shepperton B Weirs are the latest to be modelled and scheduled for refurbishment. Chelsea Creek at Lot's road power station is being appraised as a site for a possible regional white water course.

### **Hedsor Water**


The Environment Agency announced in late December it had won a High Court ruling that Hedsor Water is in fact a public right of navigation with open access to all boaters. The ruling marks the end of a dispute which started in 1870 and continued by successive riparian owners who claimed it as private water to deny public access to a most attractive 3/4 mile backwater. Formerly part of the main navigation before being bypassed by Cookham Lock Cut, Hedsor Water can only be accessed from where it re-joins the Thames just below the lock.

The present owner (and claimant), Josie Rowland has indicated that she wishes to pursue an appeal. Until the appeal position has been clarified the agency will not remove the signs or obstructions in Hedsor Water.

Although the backwater is now open to all, the agency advises extreme caution due to underwater obstructions. During the next few months the agency will be carrying out a survey and risk assessment of Hedsor Water and the findings will be made public. The BCU has on record that the hydraulic characteristics of the weir at the head of the backwater are reported as highly dangerous and unsuitable for white water training and playing.

In the interest of fostering good relations on the river and bearing in mind the claimant is likely to appeal on the High Court decision; paddlers are requested not to land in the backwater or portage about the weir as it is understood all the banks and lands in Hedsor Water are private property.

If further information becomes available it will be issued via *Canoe Focus* and the local access team.



We got a great view from the top of the falls of the river downstream - the infamous 'Fourth Canyon' that looked quite flat and boring from this height.


Mark and Lisa had just passed their 2 star test before this trip!

#### **Top Tips**

- Consider building in a couple of hours on arrival at Edmonton to visit Mountain Equipment Coop or other canoe retailer to buy paddles. Grey Owl paddles are less than half the UK price!
- 2. On the last two days the Nahanni flows out onto the flat tundra welcome to mosquito country. We recommend that you try to avoid camping in Fort Simpson for this reason.
- 3. We thoroughly enjoyed our last night staying B & B with the Lindbergs and highly recommend this. A cheaper alternative for the last night is to stay at Blackstone Territorial Park and to pre-book their bug proof group kitchen/dining hut.
- 4. Our eating tarp/flysheet was as invaluable as always. Also very useful were three cheap plastic buckets we bought for carrying water, washing, and bailing out canoes (our buckets and portable shower were the envy of some other groups).

#### Nahanni National Park - Grizzly Bear Notice:

In light of the rising frequency of human/grizzly bear conflicts, all park visitors are advised to take extra precautions and keep alert for bears while in the field. We advise that canoeists and hikers wear noisy little bells on their clothing so as not to startle the bears that aren't expecting them. We also advise park users to carry pepper spray with them in case of an encounter with a bear.

It is also a good idea to watch out for fresh signs of bear activity. Park users should look out for bear scrapings and recognise the difference between black bear and grizzly bear poop. Black bear poop is smaller and contains a lot of berry seeds and squirrel fur. Grizzly bear poop has little bells in it and smells like pepper spray.

#### At 7pm on Sunday evening the last of 70 sea kayakers had left Cwm Pennant to make their way home. They had come from all corners of the country, with one even flying in from Frankfurt for the event. This was the fifth consecutive annual sea kavaking festival to be held at the centre, and as in previous years it was fully booked several weeks

before the event.

 $S_{\rm winds}$  weather forecast was for force five to six south westerly winds and occasional showers. The rain held off until the evening, but the wind was as strong as predicted. Saturday morning was scheduled as a try a kayak session, and P&H, Nigel Dennis Sea kayaks. Outdoor Active, and Kirton Kayaks all provided demo fleets. There were a number of informal coaching sessions scheduled at the same time, with all abilities from novice to expert catered for. The strong winds led to some interesting paddling conditions in the afternoon and the

Neither island had been paddled around before and the trip around Ascension was completed single-handed.

Sunday promised to be a calmer day, and we set off from Caernarfon in bright sunshine and a light southerly breeze. Everyone paddled towards the southern end of the Menai Straits with the strengthening spring tide and out past Aber Menai point. The three strongest groups carried on to Llanddwyn island, the most southerly tip of Anglesey, for lunch. The novice group stopped on the shore, to be regaled with heroic tales by Derek Hutchinson, the grand master of sea kayaking. The strong ebb tide and the opposing breeze led to an interesting paddle back across the deep water channel, and two of the novices decided to go for an unscheduled swim. They were both successfully put back into their kayaks with no ill effects, and the rest of the return trip was uneventful. Over the next hour the other groups duly arrived at Dinas Dinttle, our scheduled finish point, in time to be treated to a spectacular acrobatic display by a solo Second World War fighter aircraft.

We ferried the drivers back to our start point in Caernarfon and after the customary goodbyes, and "see you next year" the multitude dispersed.

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# **PeakUK Himalayan** Nov 23-25th, Bhote Kosi, Nepal

For the past three years PeakUK have organised a series of whitewater challenges across Britain but this year the decision was made to go international. Supported by Equator **Expeditions. the Nepal Association of Raft Agents, Destination Nepal, the** Nepal Tourist board and the Nepal Ministry of Tourism, the competition proved to be one of the biggest international sporting events of this kind ever held in Nepal. With 45 members of the media present the event made several of Nepal's national daily papers, was reported on national radio and was broadcast not only on Nepal television but also featured on the worldwide program Transworld Sport.

The PeakUK whitewater challenges are unique as competitors must complete a downriver race, an extreme slalom and a freestyle in the same kayak and a champion is found by combining all three results. Categories in the Himalayan Challenge included International Men, International Ladies, Nepali Men and Nepali Juniors.

The first day saw around 100 competitors, from 15 countries pitt themselves against the extreme slalom. The course was set on the last rapid of the Upper Bhote Kosi. A super steep grade 4+ rapid which challenged the paddler to make upstream and downstream gates, touchboards and some freestyle moves including a spin and a cartwheel. Many competitors struggled with the very tough course and only one, Ed Cornfield, from the UK completed the course with no penalties giving him and early victory. In the International Ladies Lynsey Evans took 1st place. The Nepali's gave it their all, in an impressive show, considering most of them had not seen a slalom before. After a good fast run Tara 'Ram' Bhandari took 1st in the men's with Shyam Shrestha winning the juniors. Tired but content competitors returned to Equator Expedition's Paradise Resort, Sukute Beach for Dhal Bat (traditional Nepal meal) and an evening of traditional Nepali entertainment.

Next morning came to soon for many people who had enjoyed the culture of the night before but there was no rest as buses were loaded and the short journey to the start of the downriver race at Kohte Beach commenced. A 7.30am breakfast next morning saw many a bleary eyed paddler fuelling up for the downriver and freestyle



heats. The downriver race was a gut busting, 3km stretch of grade 3-4 water on the Bhote Kosi from Kohte Beach to the confluence of the Balephi Khola. To spice things up a little, the start was 'le Mans' style. Boats were placed on the rivers edge while paddlers formed a diagonal line. Those whose boats were at the upstream end of the line had least distance to run, being virtually stood next to their boats, while others had to sprint up to 50 metres. The flag fell and it was go, go, go. For the next 60 seconds chaos ensued. The downstream end of the line seemed to be the preferred end, with a good sprint and a slick entry giving some competitors an early lead, while a sprint and a fumbled fitting of ones spraydeck saw some lose valuable seconds. The finale was a 10 metre scramble, to ring the sacred Balephi temple's bell at the confluence. Once again chaos reigned as boats and bodies charged out of the water fighting for that extra place. PeakUK boss Pete Astles had a tough time fighting off the competition but succeeded to win the International mens with team mate Lynsey Evans taking first in the International Ladies. Shyam Shrestha won the Nepali Juniors with Madan Gurung taking first in the Nepali Mens.

After a break for lunch (more Dahl Bat) it was time for the freestyle event, for many competitors this is their favourite part of the event. A super fast and not overly retentive wave just upstream of Sukette Beach was chosen as the venue. Gerry Moffatt and a team of Nepali raft guides had worked hard all the previous day using some bamboo and broken kayaks to create an eddy which allowed easier access to the wave. Everyone had three rides to strut their stuff with the best two results counting towards the next round. To score highly, paddlers must perform a variety of different moves with points being given for verticality and the number of direction changes made. As the heats went on it became clear that to qualify for the next round, smooth flat spins, blunts and vertical moves were needed, however the majority of paddlers found the wave too flushy. Only a handful of top paddlers thrilled the large crowd of spectators with some fine performances.

That evening after more Dahl Bat and beer, a live band entertained the crowds until unfortunately some of the not to tuneful French team decided they could do better. They tried and couldn't. After much merriment everybody fell asleep under the stars ready for the final day of competition.

Day three of the competition began at 12ish allowing competitors and organisers a rare and much welcome lie

in. The relaxed atmosphere soon changed as the freestyle semis and finals began. A crowd several hundred strong gathered, the music was pumping and compere Mark Lowe was doing his 'Smashey and Nicey' impression on the mic.

The International Men's semi-finals kicked off proceedings followed by the Nepali Men's semis. In both categories the top ten men had three rides with the best two counting. The top five then went through to the sudden death knockout finals. Each paddler took one ride with the lowest scorer being knocked out until eventually there is one winner. The men's international was won by Norwegian Kia Engbert with PeakUK's Lynsey Evans taking the ladies victory. Tara 'Ram' Bhandari was first in the Nepali Men's with Sano Babu Sunawar taking the junior victory.

At the end of the whole competition all three results were combined to give Mark (Snowy) Robertson of the UK victory, closely followed by team mate Pete Astles. Lynsey Evans won the International ladie's event with a hat trick of victories. Tara 'Ram' Bhandari after an excellent victory in the extreme slalom took 1st place with Shyam Shrestha placing first in the juniors. The Nepali winners both took home a brand new kayak kindly donated by Riot and Perception kayaks.



# **Getting my body** Exe Descent 2002

Jackie and I decided to enter the 2002 race at the end of last spring. Jackie was keen to get more involved in paddling again after a break of a couple of years and I was six months pregnant and looking forward to getting my body back.

Training for the Exe Descent seemed like an ideal way of killing two birds with one stone and so we planned regular trips of sea kayaking and surfing with the odd bit of doubles paddling thrown in. We began like regular keeny beenys for a little while until work commitments got in the way, and my body bloated so as to make too much hard work rather uncomfortable (damn!). Anyway, like the best laid plans of mice and men, by the time November the 17th rolled up we hadn't done anything like the training that we'd planned to and shuttle and babycare arrangements became far more last minute than is good for the stress levels.

Never mind. We managed to scrounge a nice yellow double tourer off Liam of Cornwall Canoe and Kayak, which we christened 'The Good Ship Rainbow' after its make. News reports of massive flooding, on the Exe did nothing to quell the trepidation in our tummys, not helped by Steve's query on the whereabouts of my will but by that time there was no backing out.

Sunday morning dawned loud and clear as we loaded the car, dropped the kids off at grandparents along with oodles of milk and nappies and headed off into the sun, literally, as Devon was free of the cloud that was covering up Cornwall. En route we failed to spot any other kayaks until we got to Exeter, and then the beboated car in question was going the wrong way. Obviously we began to question ourselves as to whether we had got dates and times and venue right. but eventually as we approached Tiverton it became apparent that the race was on. Then came the convoy of cars driving around the town as no-one knew where the college was and everyone thought that perhaps the car in front knew where they were going. No matter. One of the things that I really like about canoeing events is catching up with old friends and making new ones, and at a gathering as huge as this one we could be in our social element - although pre race butterflies can get in the way.

Fortunately, following a couple of dry days the water level had dropped to something approaching sensible and to be honest I was glad that we'd be a bit more water assisted than we were when I did the Exe with Steve three years ago. Soon enough it was our turn to get ready for the start. As we sat there half in half out of the river, struggling with trying to get our spray decks on and rogue nettles stinging our fingers a capsized canadian plus paddlers ploughed into us. Was this an omen?

The start of the race was a melee of vessels all aiming for the middle which coincidentally was the line that Jackie and I



were planning on taking too. However not possessing masses of testosterone and being a tad tentative anyway (read that as scared). we opted for slightly river left and promptly hit a rock. Not good. Nevertheless we were upright and did manage to stay that way throughout the initial crowding, rapids and weirs of the first mile or so. As the river began to wind its way along banks shaded by trees we congratulated ourselves on not being fazed by the start and got down to the business of hard slog that was to come. Somewhere in front of us, only spotted during straight stretches was a couple of double tourers (just like us but with different types of boats) to aim for and behind us but close enough to focus the mind was another couple of doubles.

Actually, the good ship Rainbow proved to be very responsive to power as applied by us and we fairly flew. However I almost regretted not fitting a rudder to help us steer the meandering river until we overtook people who had lost theirs and were having trouble because of it. So on we continued, with the sun tanning our faces (honest) blinding us to some of the branches overhanging the water which clattered on our helmets as we ducked under them.

After many more weirs and holding our position we were informed by a marshal that we only had four more miles to go. This sounds like a lot but when you have already done 15 this bit of info was inspirational and we put on a bit more of a spurt. We were still in self-congratulatory mood when we arrived at Four Pynes and faithfully following instructions aimed hard left to avoid the viscous centre stopper. Blasting over the top and scraping down the slope we hit the viscous left hand stopper and were going nowhere. I yelled at Jackie to paddle hard which was unnecessary as she was already doing it. My paddles were collecting as much air as water and then the boat began to broach. Instinct told us to lean downstream until the hopelessness of the situation told us that we were going over. Capsize we did. We had planned that in such an event and since we both favour rolling on opposite sides, that Jackie would lie forward on the front of the boat and I would attempt a roll, but in this situation it seemed pointless and both of us bailed. Out we came into the chilly river and emerged somehow clutching the same paddle to be rescued by the very busy safety crew on the bank. Our boat milled in the eddy beside the stopper which was itself retrieved and we went about emptying it with exhausted bodies. Meanwhile many other boats joined us on the bank which made us feel a little better!



The number of doubles that passed us indicated how well we had been doing and fired up a new determination to finish the race so onwards we went rejuvenated by that brief rest. The enforced portage around Cowley felt hard and the 200m or so of humping the boat could have been miles. Nevertheless once back on the water we knew that we had broken the back of the slog and we worked very hard to try to make up some of the time we had lost. Following our swim I had not been sorry that we'd had to miss Cowley and was now dreading Flowerpots, remembering from three years ago that it seems huge from the top. It approached and if there had not been so many people watching I would seriously have considered another portage. All too soon we were peering over the top with trepidation when I heard a voice yell out "Yo Joanie" or something similar,

Catching a fleeting glimpse of another St Austell paddler we were gone into the jaws of the final weir... and blasting out the other side. Euphoria! Only the home straight to go! That in itself was a relief and our pains nearly sank away as we gave the final stretch everything that we had left. It was with great relief that the finish was spotted and we could have a break. Steve met us and helped us drag the boat up the bank whilst busily polishing the halo he had received for providing the shuttle. He regaled us with tales of k-boats arriving at the end sunk and half sunk so we felt quite lucky really! Bless plastic kayaks.

It felt so good to be home and dry and the private promises made during the race of "I'm never putting myself through this again" were forgotten amidst post race adrenaline and elation. In the end we finished tenth out of about twenty which in itself is not bad considering that we were competing with all male teams as well since there are no separate categories in the touring doubles section. What could we have done if we hadn't taken that swim!? Maybe we'll find out next year. In the meantime, many thanks to Liam for the loan of the Rainbow, Steve for giving up your Sunday to provide the shuttle and Steve's mum for babysitting!

I was awakened two hours later by the guards who had a police report of someone paddling in the river! Seven o'clock Saturday morning, oh boy high water! It had stopped raining; the sun was even beginning to shine. I could see a good day ahead. A bit later, as the helpers and coorganiser Alan stepped in to cater for the rush, I took a demo boat, kindly provided by Pyranha, and a group of helpers that I was to leave halfway down the river as part of the negotiated access agreement with the landowners. 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





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# A man of designs

Bet you wish you had had a woodwork teacher who taught you how to make kayaks and then started a school canoeing club so you could show off the results of your classroom efforts?

Back in the 1960s, one school in Kent had just such an enlightened teacher - Dennis Davis. Faced with a class of teenage lads (this was

back in the time before sex equality!) most of whom had little interest in the conventional woodwork syllabus, Dennis drew on his personal interest in canoeing to design a plywood craft which used a minimum of materials, needed no bulky, space-consuming moulds and could be

term. After those early experimental days, Dennis perfected his design criteria over a range of round bilge, compounded ply kayaks, and went on to extend his portfolio with conventional stitch and tape canoes, a chined sea kayak and several dinghies. In more recent times, conscious of advancing years and the needs of less able bodied sailors, he returned to the compounded ply method (also known as 'tortured' ply construction) to design a mini solo trimaran, which is car-toppable and suited to the less athletic among

us. Affordability, economy of materials (most of his canoe and kayak designs need only two sheets of plywood) and simplicity of construction are the hallmarks of Dennis's designs. These criteria, combined with the elegance of their lines and their relative light weight (it is perfectly possible to carry single-handed a kayak made of 3mm ply and even the canoes using 4mm are much lighter than their plastics equivalents) have made Dennis's designs appreciated far and wide.

Plans are regularly sold on the north American market; quite a compliment when one looks at the vast range of designs available over there. His greatest success on the American front was back in the mid 1980s when the U.S. magazine WoodenBoat featured the DK13 kayak and followed up with an invitation to teach his compounded ply construction method at their summer school in Maine.

When the first class of students launched their kayaks, the school's director expressed his amazement, admitting that he had not really thought the method would actually work! Dennis's most recent canoe

An illustrated leaflet describing Dennis Davis's canoe and kayak designs may be obtained by telephoning him on 01237 475165 design, the DD23 'Bliss' (named after the between wars exponent of open canoeing, William Bliss) became the subject of *Build Your Own Canoe*, published by Crowood Press after a commissioning editor had seen an article by Dennis in a wood working magazine.

Dennis also has two earlier canoeing books to his name: *The Book* of *Canoeing* (published in 1969) which has full building instructions for a compounded ply kayak; and *Canoeing* (1981, in the Teach Yourself series). His interest in writing and publishing have long gone hand-in-hand with his design career and in 1993 he pushed the boat out a bit further by editing and publishing a bi-monthly, subscription magazine aimed at all enthusiasts who enjoy engineless small boats. Alas, the economics of small scale publishing defeated '*AFLOAT*!' which folded after fourteen issues.

In 1999 Dennis returned, after a forty year break, to his other great love - flying. Since regaining his private pilot's license he has built, from a kit, a two seat microlight aircraft; a task he found rather more complex than making plywood canoes! From a boy in post-war London scrounging orange boxes and canvas to make his first canoe, to a 'senior citizen' doodling ideas to recycle the plywood crates his microlight kit came in, Dennis Davis has never long been without a boat design simmering in his imagination. That so many of those imaginings have translated to craft giving pleasure to so many paddlers is a very satisfying achievement.

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
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# What is Dreamflight?



#### It all started in May 2002, when an e-mail arrived asking for a volunteer to act as an escort on the Dreamflight trip 12-22 October. First question was who or what is Dreamflight?

Dreamflight is a National charity which was started by two British Airways crew members that decided it would be a good idea to take 192 seriously ill kids to Florida for the holiday of a lifetime. It has now been running for about 16 years, and each year a specially prepared BA747 flies across the pond for the ten day trip, loaded with 192 kids, a full crew and around 100 adult escorts.

So the application was filled in, I was short-listed, the interview took place and I was chosen to represent my company (First National Group, who sponsor the charity). "By the way you need to raise at least  $\pounds$ 1,000."

This comment prompted some thought, "as a canoeist you could do something" I cannot remember who made this remark. Well three peaks is a challenge, so are three lakes, "how about two", I chose Windermere & Bala with the target of 24 hours door to door, was this wise considering it was up and down the M6?

Saturday 21st September was approaching fast, having contacted the BCU initially and now relying on local information the trip was organised. We left Birmingham with a team of four, two to Kayak, two to drive/support. On arrival at Windermere at 4.15am, I was

undertaken before was about 12 miles, and we did not undertake any real training programme, we started the challenge. The lake was perfectly flat so it was straight down the middle and equipped with lights just in case there was

anyone else on the water we paddle on. The end came at around 7.45, with a brief stop over at Bowness for refreshment and to apologise to the local police for the poor road sense of our support crew. Only two other encounters were made on the lake. One was an owl just after we started, the other was a deer down to the water for its morning drink. Oh, there were some people water skiing at around 7.05am and both groups couldn't work out who was the craziest. By 8.10 though we were loaded and on the road again for Bala, traffic was kind to us and four and a half hours later we started our final leg. Again we found Bala was like Windermere, mirror like and very few craft availing themselves of this lovely day. We decided to have lunch first at Glanlynn campsite and then paddle the four miles down four back again, overtaking a couple of sailing boats in the process as they had no wind to assist them.

We had a great day paddling these two lakes and

have raised approximately £2,000 in the process. My thanks go to the BCU & access officers, Snowdonia National Park, Glanlynn campsite, Royal Sutton Canoe club for the loan of the two-man explorer and a special thank you to Evans Halshaw Aston for the loan of the car (MGR ZT-T, tdci). A great vehicle for canoeists, and of course my team... fellow paddler Samuel (son aged 13) Wife Nicola, and sister-in-law Anne who both shared the driving.

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Deeping Canoe Club Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award Expedition July 2002

We arrived in Fort William in the early hours of Thursday morning after traveling the 450 miles up from Deeping, Lincolnshire, over the Wednesday night. We pitched our tents at Locky Campsite and then slept for several hours after getting something to eat and viewing the attractions of Fort William at 7:30 in the morning. In the afternoon we went and had a look at Neptune's staircase to find and appropriate getting in point. After agreeing on the getting in point – a large pontoon, we returned to the campsite to meet our assessor.

Before leaving home we obtained the five day weather forecast from the BBC website and a weather insight from the European Centre for Medium-Range Weather Forecast. This showed us that the wind speed was going to be low for the five days, however, if the weather did ever become too severe we were all prepared to sit it out.

After setting off at 10:00 from Neptune's Staircase we made good time and arrived at Gairlochy at noon. We had a bite to eat before setting off up Loch Lochy just before the weather closed in around us. This provoked large waves, which we had been trained in. (To experience the similar weather conditions, we had a number of training sessions on Rutland Water, paddling 3-4 ft. waves.) We continued up Loch Lochy past Clunes car park where we were meant to have lunch, but due to the weather conditions we missed this point but continued and found another nice beach where we had our lunch. Our assessor had been following us for about anhour before we heard her whistle and signal to stop. She had only wanted to check our proficiency, but did not realise how fast we were paddling. The waves had risen slightly at this point to make the journey more interesting.

Our first campsite was at Glas Dhoire a ruin about half of the way up loch Lochy. This is opposite the Corriegour lodge (a hotel, which is a large white building on the other side of the Loch). The ruin is not visible from the water although a large stream runs into the loch, which can be used for drinking water. We found a small grassy area on the northeast side of the headland with a sandy beach to pull the boats up onto and a forestry track and cycle way on the other side of some trees.

We left the campsite at 9:10 the following morning and proceeded on up Loch Lochy to Laggan locks. This was the first set of what seemed to be thousands of portages we had to make this day although by the end of the day we had certainly become quicker. We proceeded on Loch Oich keeping the green and red buoys on our left, close to the shore out of the way of the shipping channel. We went on the right hand side of a small island, which separated us from the shipping



channel. We would not recommend this as the water became very shallow. We continued towards Fort Augustus passing Bridge of Oich, Cullochy lock and Kytra lock. Kytra Loch allows camping behind a small wooded area, an excellent site for future reference.

Once again, on Saturday the weather started off calm as we finished the last stretch of Loch Lochy. The weather remained calm as we continued to paddle the Caledonian Canal and the whole of Loch Oich. The wind picked up in the early evening as we left Fort Augustus to paddle the first quarter of Loch Ness. Fortunately at this point the wind was behind us, which made paddling much easier and faster.

We arrived in Fort Augustus at 4:15 and after carrying our boats down the locks, had a snack to prepare us for the first part of our journey up Loch Ness that evening. Local fishermen confirmed that the boathouse, at grid reference 438, 145 would be a suitable campsite. We arrived at the boathouse at 7:15.

At 9:00 on Sunday we set off from the boathouse with the wind still behind us, at times the rain did come down hard.

There were several other places that could be used for campsites between the boathouse and Foyers such as the grassy area at grid reference 454,166 that is sited between two streams and a large area of flat grass suitable for camping on. Our last campsite was near the picnic spot at grid reference 550,284. After arriving at 1:15 and having lunch we set off over to Urquhart castle with our supervisor to do some sight seeing. We returned to the campsite and found a nice spot about 100 yards down from the actual site, which was screened from the

road by a hedge. Although surrounded by trees and bushes the flies were a problem.

#### Low mist over Loch Ness

Surrounded by hills and mountains, we notice low cloud formation which often affected our visibility preventing us from seeing the other side of the Loch. We also found that the clouds rose and fell extremely quickly and was unpredictable. This cloud formation remained the same throughout the rest of our journey. However, staying close to the land did not affect our navigation too much.

On Sunday afternoon Loch Ness was like a millpond. There was absolutely no wind. This was probably due to the change in wind direction we were going to experience the next day. This change took several hours, but fortunately we had reached our destination that morning so we made use of this time by paddling over to Urquhart Castle. As wind picked up in the evening from the north, it was obvious that Monday's paddling would mean paddling into the wind.

This being the case on Monday, we were not bothered as we enjoyed paddling a different class of water. Although the winds were strong we still managed to keep to a constant speed of 3 km/h over the 2-3 foot waves, which was very exciting.

#### The rough bit on Loch Ness

We arrived at Dochgarroch at 12:30 after starting at 08:30. The proposed campsite is no longer at Dochgarroch so an alternative place

to stay would have to be found if the trip was to continue although we could have continued on and possibly completed the trip into Inverness the same day.

Physically and mentally exhausted we decided to empty the kayaks and load the trailer ready to return home straight away. A twelve

thanks

hour journey wouldn't seem so long if we slept most of the way, which we did.

Over the trip we made good time and always arrived at our destination within our specified time. This was helped by having the wind behind us for all of the way except for the last day but even this did not dramatically reduce our speed as we completed the last section of Loch Ness and canal in four hours, a distance of 14.5 Km so our speed still works out to be been around 3km/h.

A lot of the equipment was borrowed and we would especially like to thank Howard Blackman, our Paddle Sport Development Coach who arranged the loan of the sea kayaks. John Fleming Deeping Canoe Club

# Duke of Edinburgh's Award in Paddlesport

Many people don't realise that you can do all sections of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award in Paddlesport – so if you coach or work with young people and think they would like a challenge with a difference read on...

#### **About the Award**

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is a voluntary, non-competitive, flexible programme of practical, cultural and adventurous activities designed to support the personal and social development of any young person between the ages of 14 and 25. It offers opportunities for individual challenge as young people design their own programme around activities which interest them, whilst allowing for personal time, commitment, opportunities, budget and any travel implications.

Each individual's programme is worked out with the aid of a mentor/leader with knowledge of The Award and its requirements, which is then given national accreditation for the Duke of Edinburgh's Award upon completion. The young person receives a certificate, badge and local recognition and a presentation by HRH the Duke of Edinburgh at the Palace for those who complete Gold.



#### How long will it take?

The following chart shows the timescales involved at each level of the award.

# Entry to the Award can be at one of three levels depending on age:

**Bronze** for young people aged between 14 and 25 **Silver** for young people aged between 15 and 25 **Gold** for young people aged between 16 and 25

The Programmes are designed around four sections. These are Skills, Physical Recreation, Service and Expedition/ Exploration with an additional Residential section at Gold level. The participants choose an activity from each of these sections which has to be undertaken over a minimum time period set for each level of the Award. (One of the aspects of the Award is "stickability"!) Individuals set their own goals, with monitoring and evaluation aided by a qualified person in that activity.

#### So what does each section involve?

For each of the following section participants must spend a minimum of one hour a week engaged on their chosen activity for the set time period for the Award they're completing.

Physical Recreation: any discipline of Paddlesport counts - recreational or competitive. Goals need to be set relevant to the discipline and the candidates should demonstrate an improvement by the end of the time period.

**Skills:** this can include boat building, outdoor equipment maintenance and making equipment/clothing. It also includes umpiring/refereeing, planning and running events, committee skills and judging. Again, goals need to be set with an experienced person, progress reviewed and the experience evaluated.

**Service:** in this section, young people are encouraged to give some voluntary service to their community. They may or may not need to attend a training course depending on which service they choose to opt for. Suitable activities include the BCU Cadet Leader Award, coaching (unpaid), life saving/safety duties (unpaid).

**Expedition/Exploration:** you may be surprised to find out that this section can be done on the water – by Open Canoe, Kayak, Sea Kayak, White Water Racers, Open Cockpit Tourers, Rafted Canoes or Bellboat! Participants need to be trained in expedition skills and reach a certain skill standard for the craft they have selected. The latter may be used for their Physical Recreation section. The duration of the venture is set in days and nights camping depending on the level of Award and the distance is measured in hours journeying (see box).

#### How to get involved

To get started on the Award a paddler will need to register with their local Operating Authority (contact Head Office for details or see website for Regional office details). Entry to the scheme can also be made through an Access Organisation. These Organisations are licensed to deliver just one or two sections of The Award to young people not already engaged on the programme. Canoe clubs and Centres make ideal Access Organisations as they allow their members to gain a range of relevant experiences – eg learn water-based skills, improve performance, help out or go on an expedition. If the young person then becomes involved with The Award sections completed with an Access Organisation are accredited to their record book.

## First Perception Wavehopper Challenge

The Tyne Tour was the venue for the first Perception Wavehopper Challenge series for 2002/3 season in the North East. The plan was to run coaching and the challenge race on the Saturday with coached runs of the gorge on the Sunday for the more experienced paddlers. Those of you who went will know the water was high – here is one of the paddlers account of the event.

On Saturday 2nd of November on the first day of the Tyne Tour 2002 we went down to Tyne Green ready in our Canoe kit for an exciting day in a Wavehopper - a white water racing boat. Almost immediately, we were on the water and getting used to them. Our group consisted of nine 'pupils' and one coach - Nigel - with a few more advanced paddlers acting as safety cover. There were seven boys, three of which were from Hexham Canoe Club, and three girls, including my sister- Sandra and I, also from Hexham Canoe Club.

After an hour or so of practising we put the Wavehopper's on their trailer and went up to Warden to do a timed run down to Hexham. The other girl decided that she was not going to do the run, but everybody else had a shot at it. Sandra went first with me following ten seconds later. There was then a one minute gap before the next person went then a ten second gap and so on. This was so that if someone went in, they could be rescued easily, and just to let us know there was somebody around if you needed them. Everybody came down quickly – all times were below twenty minutes and there was only one capsize. The HCC (Hexham Canoe Club) boy even managed to get back in his boat without help!

After medals were awarded those who did not need to go decided to come down as a group from Haydon Bridge. We even had a few parents that tagged along! We came down quickly, and enjoyed it thoroughly, although I was very tired by the end of it!

On Sunday, five of us met up hoping to go down Warden Gorge in the Wavehoppers. Unfortunately since the river was still running high 'Rescue rock' had been submerged and the Gorge was 'officially closed'. One of the group then decided he was going to do his own thing and so there was just my sister and me with two coaches - Nigel and Lloyd! We decided to go down form Alston to Featherstone Castle, It was a great run although surprisingly the water was running fairly low. We all had a couple of hairy moments especially me, when we were going under the viaduct. I did not get my line right, so ended up nearly hitting one of its stanchions, and nearly capsized. Luckily, I managed to right myself and continue but it did get my heart going fast! The river had barely a flat stretch on it just miles of rapids of all shapes and sizes! It was an amusing run and thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. I would do it any time given the chance! Jennifer Hyslop

#### "The first"

May I respond to your correspondent Michael Rhodes, who credits Gino Watkins with being the first European "to muster the Greenland kayak and learn to roll and even to hunt from it". Having a long-standing interest in the history of canoeing and in particular sea kayaking, I have learned that many claims for something to be "the first" do not stand up to investigation. Albeit that such claims are often made in good faith.

There can be no doubt that Gino was a remarkable character. He died a comparatively young man at 25 yet had been the recipient of medals from the Geographic Societies of three nations. By any standard that is an outstanding achievement. I am sure that he would be the last to claim "a first" had he knowledge of a previous occurrence.

A party led by the Norwegian explorer Fridtjof Nansen crossed the Greenland Icecap on foot in 1888. They arrived at the west coast too late in the year to catch the last ship back to Europe that season and had to over-winter in the Godthaab area. While there, apart from one Lapp, the group all obtained kayaks and became sufficiently competent in their use to travel about the area and engage in hunting from them. All this 19 years before Gino was born.

It my seem churlish to make the point but, for the benefit of those who lay great store by such records, not to do so would unjustly deprive the real holder of the honour. Personally, I have no idea which European first became proficient in the Greenland kayak. Considering the hundreds of years of commercial contact I think it would have occurred a long time ago. Perhaps it predates Nansen's activities but I am sure it was some years before the renowned Greenlander, Manesse Mathaeussen introduced Gino to the wonders of the kayak and the narrow bladed paddle.

#### Where are the canoes?

In the December issue of *Canoe Focus* as usual there is nothing about canoes, only dozens of photos and articles about kayaks. There is one stamp-sized photo of a canoe. Is it not about time the magazine was re-titled Kayak Focus? In fact the BCU ought to be called the BKU.

The excuse that 'canoe' is merely a generic term is often put forward, but it's a flimsy argument when faced with the fact that a canoe is a canoe, i.e. an open, non-decked boat, not a kayak. Why does the fallacy still exist whereby the whole world is nuts about kayaks, and that all we want to see is endless pictures (they might just as well be the same shot) of helmeted kayakers getting as wet as possible? Why don't the powers that be realise that the union and its publications would have a far wider appeal if canoes were featured equally with kayaks. 





# Not for lounge lizards



What's this - a computer that fits on your wrist, which helps you to get fit, tells you where you are and where you've been, what the weather's going to do, and even what time it is! And all the information you collect is immediately downloadable onto your PC!

I have been testing the The Suunto X6 for the past two months and have slowly come to admire the watch for its capabilities. Looks though are another subject. If you like your watches big and orange, shockproof but capable of causing a shock - like a jaffa sitting on your wrist, then this is a must have.

However, this is not a watch for lounge lizards, it is for outdoor people who take off for days on end and need something reliable to give them the information they need.

The X6 and X6HR feature a graphical display; accessing an altimeter, barometer, compass, clinometer (for measuring slope angles) and multi-faceted log book, as well as watch and chronometer. After a few days of fiddling with the buttons, attempting to evade the manual, I gave in and with the aid of the excellent instruction manual started to make sense of all those numbers and graphics.

A button on the left side of the watch allows you to scroll up and down the menu, finding illustrated modes with names like 'Weather', 'Hiking', 'Compass', 'Time' and 'Chrono'.

I particularly liked the Position mode, which includes a scrolling compass (which uniquely

gives a reading in bold when it's horizontal). and provides a bearing tracking to help ensure you always know where you are.

The Weather mode, using the barometer, provides information on temperature and atmospheric pressure changes. Its two-day memory, combined with a storm alarm, will proactively let you know if atmospheric pressure is dropping fast, signalling an approaching storm.

The data, clearly illuminated on-screen, is simple to understand, emailable, easy-tomanipulate and printable.

There is also an adjustable alarm for use in interval training or just for getting up in the morning. The heart rate monitor records (only on X6HR) readings at 2, 10 or 60-second intervals.

The battery is owner-replaceable and has a life of 12 - 18 months. The watch is also water resistant to 100 metres, so you won't need to worry about it when you're taking the kids swimming or having a bath or shower.

Both the Suunto X6 and the Suunto X6HR come complete with an interface cable, and CD containing Suunto's exclusive 'Suunto Activity Manager' software, which will automatically download onto your computer (Windows computers only). The X6HR includes Suunto's new Heart Rate Monitor Transmitter Belt, also with user - replaceable battery.

#### Suunto X6HR

The more reserved black and chrome X6HR features a heart rate monitor - the device that all athletes of today swear by to achieve and maintain maximum fitness, in the shortest possible time, with the least possible effort.


And, having recorded speed, distance



travelled (horizontally and vertically), direction. and heart rate, you can plug the wristop into your computer, by simply plugging a small cable into the casing. The measurements can be plotted out, and you can actually, easily, use them! or prove your fitness on screen to friends and family, use the data collected to improve on training technique and future performance. or you can even arrange virtual competitions with other enthusiasts, if you are that way inclined!

All in all, this is a very comprehensive item to have on your wrist and definitely deserves a more worthy athlete than me and on the few occasions I have ventured out during this winter, it has proved itself to be shock proof and water resistant. All-in-all, the true outdoor enthusiast would find this watch invaluable and the bright orange colour means it's easily spotted; therefore becoming a good talking point down the pub afterwards!

# Three new QuickTides

QuickTide has established itself as the fast way to determine tide times at multiple coastal sites - the preferred tool for planning canoe trips in estuaries and by the sea. The three new 2003/2004 OuickTides were published in October 2002 and many of last year's cards were ordered by canoeists.

On the card's disk, you just align a colour and a code to display the approximate high- and low-tide times for a particular day in 2003 or 2004 - the colour matches the coast colour on the QuickTide map.

QuickTide predict two years, and need no calculations - with traditional tide tables you subtract say 2 hours 47 minutes for the coastal displacement, add an hour for BST and convert from the 24hour clock. On the continent, you have English information about the tides

### Canoe Pioneer: MacGregor's adventures in the 'Rob Roy'

December at the River & Rowing Museum sees the opening of an exciting exhibition celebrating John MacGregor, canoe pioneer, and the founder of the Royal Canoe Club at Teddington.

MacGregor's adventures in the 'Rob Roy' brings to life the intrepid adventures and explorations undertaken by John MacGregor and his canoes, all christened 'Rob Roy', the nickname given to him by his parents.

His first adventure with 'Rob Roy' was in 1865 when he launched off from the banks of the River Thames setting out on a 1,000 mile journey through Europe. His travels along the rivers, canals and lakes of Belgium, France, Germany and Switzerland, resulted in his publication titled 'A *Thousand Miles in the Rob Roy Canoe*'. The tour format has been chosen to provide you with options on distance (with the idea that it will allow juniors to join in) and to avoid shuffling cars (with the exception of the Stage 1 only option).

There will be an entry charge (on the day) of  $\pounds 2.00$  per BCU member on production of a current BCU membership card and  $\pounds 3.50$  for all other paddlers which provides Third Party Liability Insurance up to  $\pounds 2m$  for the duration of the event.

At the time of writing, it is assumed that the BCU/NRA Medway Licence arrangement will still be in place.
