# Dear CoDe

Dear CoDe

Is there a need for the Open Canoe Coaching Awards ??

I am writing with concern on how some of the Coaching service members Open Canoe Awards. This instructional award has continued to grow over the last decade, more so in certain areas of the country than others. While this "evolution" has continued to take place more organisations and clubs have taken to the use of the open canoe for personal and group development building sessions, expeditioning and touring, including the Duke of Edinburgh's Award and of course skills training. Theses sessions vary from being simple fun tasters to lengthy comprehensive skill sessions. The duration of these may last anything from 5 minutes to full days out, and could involve camping and self sufficiency from 1 evenings duration onwards. These can be based on simple and safe flat water locations such as canals and small sheltered lakes, to larger flat water expanses - larger lakes and the sea and of course moving water. The open canoe instructional awards were introduced alongside both the kayak and sea awards to deal specifically with this type of craft. To allow the safe introduction of persons to canoes and a progression through the awards on flat or moving

From my own observations and that of others it appears that there are a number of Coaching Service members who still feel that the open canoe awards are relatively unimportant, and seemingly minor, when compared to the kayak awards. How can you tell? By the way that these persons seemingly operate outside the "Terms of Reference for Coaching Awards". Inland kayak SIs are, according to the above, able to test the 1-2 Star (canoe) providing sufficient personal experience has been gained.

The question begging to be asked is how is this sufficient personal experience defined and who sanctions it?

While students are being coached to the level of 1-2 Star what venues are being used? I am sure that Open Canoe "Instructors" are aware of the differences of training and assessing using locations such as ponds and sheltered lakeside bays compared to open expanses of water and the inherent problems associated when using this type of craft on those waters. However, I am not as certain about some kayak "Instructors" using the medium of the open canoe in these environments.

The second point I would like to raise on this issue is that of expeditioning. Again kayak "Instructors" are using the canoe for this type of venture with groups. The Terms of Reference state that the minimum qualification for this should be SI (Canoe).

Why do we need the Open Canoe Award if these people are able undertake the above without the relevant qualifications? In the interest of the students safety and learning it is of vital importance that the "Instructor" is aware and is familiar with the relevant safety issues and measures associated with canoes, along with the ability to coach techniques safely and correctly. What better way to gain this expertise than by undertaking the relevant Open Canoe coaching awards. Thereby acquiring the necessary skills and operating within the Terms of Reference.

The Open Canoe awards should be operating alongside the kayak and sea awards enhancing the coaching of canoe sport. It should not be treated as the underling or pariah. For those kayak "Instructors" operating within the terms as laid down by the BCU, my apologies for any offence caused. As far as the "rogue" element are concerned please for the safety and enjoyment of your students get yourselves qualified. The excuse that any form of canoe sport qualification is better than none when dealing with the alternative forms of the sport in which the Instructor is qualified cannot be upheld whilst there is in operation a specific series of coaching awards aimed at these forms.

These "Instructors" should not take all the blame. Many organisations do not enquire over the staff specific qualifications and fail to ensure that the staff keep within the boundaries of the terms of their specific award.

The Open Canoe is rich with diversity allowing many students to enjoy the activity of canoeing even maybe for the first time. After all not all canoeists were kayakers. Yet they still achieve the same satisfaction from their chosen aspect of canoe sport. One of being in control and paddling their canoe on flat or moving water, maybe enjoying the peace and tranquillity of a lake, the thrill of white water or the feeling on a trip of escaping to the wilds and being totally self sufficient. Let us not undermine or others the importance of the Open Canoe coaching awards.

# The Placid Water Progression - for fouring and racing by Richard Ward


National Coach for Marathon Facing

Twelve years ago, after a long campaign by David Train the 'Fladbury way' was officially recognised by the Coaching Committee and became known as the Placid Water Scheme. For the first few years the scheme was propelled along by David and a small band of helpers. As a direct result in this period as well as building up Fladbury Canoe Club to be one of the biggest and most successful clubs in the country there was an upsurge in new and existing clubs interested in touring and racing. The philosophy behind the scheme is simple and persuasive.

- "Open" cockpit craft used in the scheme allow easy access to the craft and remove concern of entrapment removing emphasis on practising capsize. Thus broadening the range of people to which canoeing will appeal.
- A progression of canoes and kayak to allow easy introduction to faster craft, appropriate to paddlers ability, to enable efficient raving and touring in a placid water environment.
- 3 Directionally and laterally stable canoes and kayaks to allow reasonable journeys to be undertaken at an early stage.
- 4 Placid Water Craft enable easy and worthwhile use all year round of the many miles of navigation and flat water without access problems along which many clubs are located.

The Placid Water instructional awards are linked closely to the competitin coaching awards for racing (see diagram). Together they provide the coaching framework to support every level of paddler from raw beginner to the World Champion. Placid Water canoeing under the auspices of the BCU, through affiliated clubs, regional and national committees offer a vast range of safe and organised paddling activity. Placid Water touring and racing are closely linked, certainly many racing clubs use recreational journeying to help the general development of their paddlers.

# **Placid Water Coaching**

The scheme of instructional PW awards was originally geared to support and create racing and touring clubs. In the early stages this was where most of the impetus for the system came. Alterations were later made to make the progression more acceptable to the centre situation, but they failed to have the desired impact. It is now firmly my view that the future lies within the clubs it was designed for at the outset. To meet the needs of these clubs there have been three main changes implemented.

- Return to the Original Progression

  The original scheme has been adopted reintroducing
  - The original scheme has been adopted, reintroducing the progression of boats for both canoe and kayak.
- 2 The Placid Water Coaching Panel (PWCP)
  - The appointment of a panel made up of a member from each BCU region to focus the promotion of Placid Water coaching support and development in their region.
- 3 Clarification of the Examiner system.
  - To fall in line with the rest of the coaching service a series of E2 examiners have been created to staff future coaching courses. As a result, on offer in 1994, for the first time for a number of years, is the full range of Placid Water instructional and competition coaching awards.

### For the future

The continued development of the coaching awards scheme to support existing activity and encourage new is the priority for the next few years. In the meantime, in CoDe, this article will be followed by a series of case studies, where the "Fladbury" approach has been adopted and adapted in a variety of different environments. In some cases the ideas have been in use a short time, in others the approach has been used for years. In all cases the inescapable logic of using the Placid Water philosophy prevails.
