Watersports

Message from Rt. Hon. Peter Walker
M.P. for Worcester & Secretary of State
for the Environment

The creation of the Department of the Environment marked a major step forward in the organisation of central government on environmental matters. For the first time, we have combined within one Department all the major decisions on housing, new towns, the road programme, transport services, the development of our water resources and the major projects to combat pollution. This will help us to plan more effectively for the safeguarding of our countryside and for the provision of the facilities needed to enable us to enjoy it.

We must remember that the countryside as we know it has resulted from the interaction between man and his environment over the centuries. It is the workshop of agriculture; but agriculture itself is changing, and these changes must have some impact on the countryside. We cannot freeze the pattern at any point in time, but we can, within limits, guide the pace and the direction of the change, and we need to find ways in which agricultural improvements can make a positive contribution to the countryside.

The countryside is faced with tremendous pressures. There is a continual threat from proposals for different sorts of development. At the same time, more recreational facilities are needed for an expanding and ever more mobile population. We have to ensure that we have the right sense of priorities and that we achieve a proper balance between the competing demands. Some of our recreational needs can be met by the multiple use of our resources, such as forests and reservoirs, and in this and other ways we must find a means of accommodating our needs so that the least harm is done to the natural environment.

In the last two decades the upsurge of interest in water sports of all kinds has been most spectacular. Since 1948 the number of sailing clubs affiliated to the Royal Yachting Association has risen from 400 to 1,500. In the same period the number of rowing clubs has doubled and in addition there are at least 70,000 water skiers; then there are the anglers - some 3 million of them. All these enthusiasts make it certain that the problem of access to suitable waters will remain acute.

To meet the demand we must utilise to the fullest extent those resources we already have; and this can only be achieved by reconciling conflicting use interests. This is easier said than done but by zoning and time-tabling different waters activities are increasingly solving their difficulties satisfactorily. Regional Sports Councils through their Water Recreational Sub-Committees are giving assistance and direction in this.

Canoeists, perhaps more than any other recreation user of inland waters, have found difficulty in obtaining access to rivers and canals. They should be greatly helped by the licensing scheme introduced in 1970. Under this scheme, once local agreements are reached, canoeists should be able to have access to specific waters at specific times without provoking disagreement with landowners and anglers.

The 1968 Countryside Act provides a basis within which informal recreation facilities can be provided both on land and water. The provision of such facilities is a field in which there is a role both for local authorities and for private enterprise, and there may be many cases where these two could join together to meet the need.

All these problems show that conservation is a cause which will need continuing vigilance and understanding on the part of all concerned. We each have a role to play, and it is a cause we must all help to win.

Ferry

A ferry will be in operation for most of the time between Pitchcroft and the control area for the use of competitors, campers and the public. Free to competitors.

Refreshments

A licensed bar has been applied for. For times of opening see the Stop Press on the start list insert.

The bar marquee stands in the race compound near race control. Assorted soft drinks and snacks will be on sale throughout the weekend in the compound to both competitors and public.



CROWN YOUR SUCCESS AT THE CROWN

The Course

For both the long distance singles race, on Saturday August 28th and the doubles on Monday 30th, the course runs over 14 miles of the rivers Severn and Teme.

All classes paddle the full distance, starting on the Severn just above Worcester bridge. The first nine miles are deep and relatively straight and competitors will have no drag or navigation problems. Their main concern will be getting away from the rest of the field at the start, so look out for fireworks, as up to 400 boats surge forward on the word 'go'!

Bevere weir, 2½ miles north of Worcester, is the first major obstacle. Paddlers can portage (carry) their boats over or round the weir. Going over the top may be the quicker alternative but the concrete face is wet and slimy.....a real gamble.

After going round Bevere island, paddlers can tackle the weir in any way they choose. The salmon chute is on the extreme left, running fast and deep. Some may even try the face, probably very shallow at this time of year.

The return to Worcester and on to Diglis is a long hard slog, but competitors, still fresh at this point, will probably press on with little trouble, anxious to reach the next obstacle, Diglis weir.

The salmon chute at Diglis is a narrow one and there is sure to be a queue to get past the weir. Some may go over the face, some will certainly end up swimming! Spectators will have an exceptionally good view of the race at this point, with a car park close by.

Once over Diglis, paddlers will go hell-for-leather for the Teme. And here their problems may well increase. The Teme, after the first few yards, gets progressively shallower and faster-running. A totally different technique is called for. The successful competitors will be able to alter their paddling rhythm and read the water, avoiding the shallows where they could run out of water and steering the best possible route on the many sharp bends. Spectators will have an excellent view of the boats from old Powick bridge, as the paddlers hot, sticky and sore by now, struggle up to the weir.

After turning round the buoy, just above the weir, competitors can choose how they get past this obstacle. Their choice could be decisive and will depend on the state of the water.

On the way back to the Severn, concentration will be vital. With shallows and bends, the lead boats will have to fight their way down against the boats coming up....could be interesting! A bad decision could mean a smashed rudder or a holed boat and damaged chances of a good result.

Back on to deep water and return to Diglis. Fatigue, aching muscles and possible dehydration will be as important as the condition of the boats at this point. Will paddlers choose to scale the weir face, carrying their boats or go round and lose valuable seconds?

Elation at having scaled the weir will fade when the exhausted paddlers see how far they have to go to the finish at Worcester Canoe Club, but they may manage to raise a sprint over the last 500 metres from Worcester road bridge when they remember the bar is open!

Practice

Practice will not be allowed on the course until Monday, August 23rd. From Monday until Thursday, 26th, permission to practise must be sought from race control; because of numerous fishing contests.

Over the championships weekend, practice will be allowed at the following times without prior permission:

Friday, 27th	10.00 - 20.00 hours
Saturday, 28th	19.00 - 20.00 hours
Sunday, 29th	Only upstream of race control until 17.00 hours. After then the whole course will be open until 20.00 hours if the regatta is finished.

During practice lifejackets WILL BE WORN whilst negotiating weirs.

Note: Marshals will patrol the course throughout and any competitors found violating these rules will be disqualified from the entire championships.

Boat Numbers

Shall be on the BCU standard white discs and nothing else. Only one number will appear per disc, two per boat one each side of the boat - fore and aft,

Rules

The races will be run under British Canoe Union Rules and Recommendations.

Safety

It is advised that lifejackets should be worn throughout this course. The organisers reserve the right to make compulsory their wearing if water conditions warrant.

Competitors must be able to swim and all boats should have sufficient buoyancy to stop them sinking when waterlogged. The organisers cannot in any way be held responsible for loss, damage or accident whether to property or personnel.

Colours

Club or International vests must be worn and international teams must carry either the name of their country or its recognised symbols on the bow decking of their craft.

Briefing

All competitors will attend the briefing on the day of the event. These will be:

at the marquee.

Monday, August 30th, 11.00
at the marquee.

They will sign in and be given a receipt showing their race number. When they present their boat before the race for checking, this receipt must be handed to the checker who will pass the boat if it complies with the rules.

Camping

Is on Pitchcroft, a public park and racecourse in the centre of Worcester by the river, opposite Worcester Canoe Club. The site opens 13.00 on Friday and closes 18.00 on Monday. Car parking, water, washing facilities and toilets are all close by and milk and groceries will be on sale.

Campers should check in with the camp steward at the site. Minimum charge 60p.





Canoeing

Canoes, for most people, mean the things the Ancient Britons made out of hollowed-out tree trunks, or the birch-bark boats American Indians paddled. At most, a few will dimly remember building a rather precarious craft out of plywood and canvas in the garage at home and never using it very much.

And more than 15 years ago, that was roughly what canoeing amounted to in Britain.

But in the mid-50's, interest in this versatile sport began to build up. Small groups of enthusiasts used to meet at weekends, two or three times a year and race up-river under handicaps. This, in fact, is almost exactly the background of Worcester Canoe Club, now one of the largest and most successful in England. With the coming of fibreglass and cheap construction of sleek, high-performance craft from moulds, the sport has mushroomed in all its forms.



TOURING, always popular, is as strong as ever. A canoe can carry a large amount of camping equipment and stores and doubles are the ideal solution for youth and outdoor activities groups to build and use. A canoe can go in shallow water where most other craft cannot. Yet at the same time it is sufficiently seaworthy to explore the coastline.

ROUGH WATER, white water or down-river canoeing is possibly the most popular, and exciting, branch of the sport. In the West of England, Wales, Scotland and in fact anywhere where there are mountains, races are held to see who can steer his way down these fast-flowing, rock-strewn rivers and how quickly!

CANOE SLALOM, like ski slalom (canoeing takes many of its terms from skiing) involves steering your kayak in and out of striped poles at speed and against currents and white water.

SPRINT CANOEING, is gaining popularity and spectators will have a chance to see the form on this one on Sunday August 29th when long distance racing gives way to sprint just for a change. Sprint and long distance have virtually the same relationship in canoeing as they do in athletics. The main difference is in the design of the boat, as in all forms of canoeing, but boat designs tend to change rapidly, as designers seek the ultimate! The K1's and K2's (single and double kayaks) used in the long distance races during the championships, are equally suitable for sprinting, and will be used for the sprints.

SURFING is perhaps the latest and most exciting branch of the sport. At one time a paddler, if he fancied, just took his boat down to the sea and surfed. Now special surf boats are being designed and many club bars empty each weekend in the summer as members head down to the briny for the sun and the surf. Unlike a surf board, which can only travel forwards or sideways, a surf canoe can travel in almost any direction and with skilful handling can even loop the loop. As long as the paddler can roll his boat (essential in surf) he is king. Imagine the sensation of riding ten foot breakers at up to 20 mph, sitting on the surface of the water.

LONG DISTANCE racing is just a part of all this. It too has shared in the success of the sport in recent years. The annual Open National Long Distance Championships are now one of the major international long distance canoe events. This year teams are coming from five European countries including Spain, Ireland, Denmark and Austria. They vie with the Spanish Sella Descent, the Irish Liffey Descent and the Danish Gudenaen.

Last year they were held at Exeter, the year before on the Tay, in Scotland. This year Worcester has the privilege.



This year they are larger than ever, in every aspect and for the first time a really spectator event.
