Notes for BCU Racing Calendar

- Ass** Indicates an assessment race for GB Team.
- *** Indicates that this is not a standard divisional race. Usually classes are some combination of senior/junior, mens/ladies/mixed and singles/doubles.
- SCA** Indicates that this is a race run by the SCA. Most races have a long course (10-25 miles), a short course (6-9 miles) and a novice course (3-4 miles).
BCU ranked paddlers should enter these races as follows:
Div 1-3 Long Course, Div 4-7 Short Course, Div 8-9 Novice Course.
Ladies, juniors and veterans are never promoted to the long course, but may opt to paddle it if they wish.
- K1** Indicates there will be a Div 1 K1 class, but no Div 1/2 K2 class.
- K2** Indicates there will be a Div 1/2 K2 class, but no Div 1 K1 class.
- H** Indicates a Hasler qualifying race for 2001/2002 for the region shown.
- H2003** Indicates a Hasler qualifying race for 2002/2003 for the region shown.
- 1** 13 Miles and 3 portages. Shepperton to Richmond K2s only.
- 2** 24 miles and 8 portages. Windsor to Teddington. K1s compete for the Eve Watkin Cup. The Bernard Watkin Cup is awarded to the winning team. Open to K1, K2, C1 and C2. Juniors in K2 only.
- 3** 13.5 miles and 21 portages time trial. Great Bedwyn to Newbury.
- 4** 14 miles and 14 portages time trial. Aldermaston to Reading.
- 5** 18.5 miles and 23 portages time trial. Newbury circuit.
- 6** 18 miles and 8 portages. Reading to Marlow Rugby Club.
- 7** 13 miles and 4 portages on canal for K2s only. U18, U16, U14, U12 boys, girls and mixed. Senior open for men, women and veterans.
- 8** 22.5 miles and 30 portages time trial. Pewsey to Newbury.
- 9** 17 miles and 9 portages on canal/river. K1, C1, K2, C2 straight through/relay.
- 10** 34.5 miles and 30 portages time trial. Devizes to Newbury.
- 11** 54 miles canal, 54 miles Thames and 17 miles Tideway with 76 portages.
Non-stop for senior doubles. Junior doubles and singles race in 4 stages over 4 days.
- 15** 10 miles of tidal estuary on flood tide - can be rough. Divs 1-7 only plus tourist trial.
Buoyancy aids compulsory.
- 18** 95 mile circular canal race through the night. K1 and K2 non-stop and relay plus 10 paddler double tourer relay.
- 19** 18 miles and 9 portages. Allington to Tonbridge. K1/K2, C1/C2. Classes for divs 1-3, 4-6, 7-9, singles and doubles plus touring.
- 28** 19 miles and 9 weirs. Tiverton to Exeter. Over 16 years only.
- 30** 15 mile river descent for all boats.
- 35** Veteran event only. 35+ men, 30+ women. 10 miles run in age groups.
- 37** 10.25 miles and 6 weir shoots or portages. Classes for K1/K2 Divs 1-3 and 4-9.
WWRs, C2 racing and touring, slalom and touring.
- 40** 12 miles and 5 portages for divs 1-3, 8 miles and 3 portages for divs 4-9.
- 52** K1 senior (1, 2 & 3), Open (4, 5 & 6), Junior. K2 Senior (1/2 & 3/4), Open (5/6 & 7/8), Junior. Plus general purpose canoe.
- 54** K1 and K2 divided by age groups.

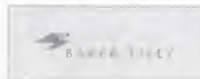

THE RACING REGISTRATION SCHEME

Introduction

The Racing Registration Scheme was introduced in 1977 by the Racing Committee who were concerned over the lack of an efficient communication system between the Committee, competitors, officials and Regatta Organisers, and its inability to ensure that only B.C.U. members competed at regattas.

The Scheme also enables the committee to establish how many active racing canoeists there are in the country at any one time, and provides a means of communicating with them.

The Registration Number is the unique numerical identification for each paddler, and is used in computer programmes when programming a regatta. Only Registered Paddlers will be allowed to compete in B.C.U. Events at N.W.S.C., Entries submitted without a Registration Number will not be accepted.

Initial Registration

This may be done in one of three ways:-

1. At any N.W.S.C. Regatta, at the Secretary's desk.
2. By post with the Registration Officer (Send S.A.E. please).

In all cases the following are required:

1. Full Name and Address.
2. Date of Birth.
3. Club.
4. Your ranking (if known).
5. A Coaching Scheme Certificate of Standard for 500m which states the actual time taken for your trial.
6. Proof of current B.C.U. Membership (a photocopy of your card is acceptable).

Renewal of Registration

Competitors will remain on the active register until such times as they have not competed for two years, or their B.C.U. membership has lapsed. On production of a current B.C.U. card, anyone not listed on the active register may apply to be reinstated.

Current Lists of Registered Paddlers are intended as 'working' lists and only include paddlers who have raced during the last two years and those who are fairly certain to race in the current season. Anyone who does not appear on the lists will have been transferred to the storage file and can be brought back to the 'live' file at any time they return to racing.

Youth paddlers who initially registered as Cadet members will remain on the register but should join the B.C.U. as full Youth members at the end of the first year. They should inform the Registration Officer of any change of number.

TEAM LEADERS HANDBOOK

Summary of Responsibilities

1. At the Club

- a) Ensure that club members achieve the relevant standard to qualify for competing at National Regattas.
- b) Advise the Colours Registration Officer of their appointment, and include details of any changes in the Club Racing Colours.
- c) *Check that all boats have adequate buoyancy.*

2. Entries

- a) Advertise the Regatta to all club members, collate entries, and return Entry Form by closing date accompanied by the correct entry fees.
- b) Check Timetable for clashes & problems.
- c) Ensure that paddlers are conversant with the Rules of Racing for Competition & Conduct as shown in the Handbook, and hold current membership of the British Canoe Union. Ensure that all paddlers have been registered.
- d) Encourage paddlers to purchase their own Year Books.

3. Before the start of Racing

- a) Collect and check the detailed regatta programme ensuring that every entry made is shown correctly.
- b) Arrive on time for the Team Leaders Meeting. All scratches, crew changes, and late entries should be made during the meeting.
- c) Advise paddlers of any changes and/or alterations to the programme.
- d) Ensure that paddlers and their boats are adequately dressed and equipped for the conditions.
- e) Ensure that all paddlers are fully aware of safety measures.

4. During Competition

- a) Ensure that paddlers arrive in time for their races, wearing club colours, and with the correct lane number.
- b) Ensure that K4s, if required, are booked in advance. Boat hire is included in the Race Entry Fee.
- c) Be available to receive notification of disqualifications, and deal with any problem involving paddlers from their club.
- d) Collect from, and promptly return to, the Secretary's Desk all Long Distance Numbers. A deposit of £10.00 is required.
- e) Hand in S.A.E. to the Regatta Secretary for a copy of the results.

5. After the Regatta

- a) Return Long Distance numbers promptly to the Secretary's Desk.
- b) Display results on club noticeboard.
- c) Note promotions of Club paddlers.

TEAM LEADERS HANDBOOK

1. Appointment

Club Secretaries must inform the Colours Registration Officer, who is the Team Leader for their club (and if you wish a nominated reserve), before January 1st each year. If a club is to be represented by another person at the N.W.S.C. the regatta organiser should be informed by the registered Team Leader, preferably when the entries are submitted.

2. Communication

At all regattas, the organisers will only communicate with the Club Team Leader or his/her nominated reserve, in respect of:-

- a) Making entries
- b) Making late entries.
- c) Communication from the organisers to his/her club paddlers - including disqualifications.
- d) Making protests.
- e) Receiving results.

3. Safety

The Team Leader is primarily responsible for the safety of his club members. Team Leaders should ensure that paddlers are:-

- a) suitably dressed for the weather, water and race conditions.
- b) able to perform basic capsizing drills and are briefed on what to do when approached by a safety boat.
- c) able to swim at least 50 metres in wet clothing without a lifejacket.
- d) that all canoes are fitted with buoyancy, bow and stern, sufficient to ensure that the canoe will remain afloat and support the crew in the event of a capsize.
- e) that all competitors in Junior or Youth classes are in possession of a lifejacket or buoyancy aid which conforms to the standard of the I.C.F or S.B.B.N.F.

In the event of cold and/or windy conditions the organisers may at their discretion cancel or postpone a race, or insist on the wearing of buoyancy aids.

4. Entries

Please note all the information given on the completion of the Official Entry Form which appears on the following page.

All entries must be made on the Official Form. Please do not break up the form. Send the complete form, even if you are making only one entry. Please ensure that you use the correct form.

Fees for this season have been increased and the charge bands are as follows:-

- a) All entries for a N.W.S.C. Regatta must be made on the Official Entry Form, or a photocopy. A blank form is included on the entry form for this purpose.
- b) **One Page for Each Class** must be used.

- c) At the top of each page, enter the names of all the paddlers who are to be entered in that class. Indicate the paddler's Initial, Name, and Club as shown below. If, in a crew boat, you include a paddler who is registered in the name of another club, make sure that his name & club are shown.
- d) Use the first four figures of the box for the paddler's Registration Number. A full list of these is shown in the Racing Year Book.
- e) If a paddler has a 3 figure Registration Number, e.g. 027, prefix it with another zero e.g. 0027. **No entry will be accepted without a Registration Number**
- f) Enter A.N.Other by four zeros.
- g) Do not use one page for more than 12 names. Photocopy or use the spare page at the back of the entry booklet.
- h) Telephone Entries are not accepted.
- i) The closing date for entries is normally the Friday fifteen days before the event. Any entries arriving after the closing date must be made by the Team Leader at the Team Leaders Meeting.
- j) Entries made without the correct fee(s) will be charged as Late Entries.

5. Notes on Classes

- a) Kayak competitors are divided into three age groups, Youth, Senior and Veteran. These three kayak classes are then divided into Men and Women. These three subdivisions then being further divided into ability groups. Canadian paddlers are divided into three ability groups.
- b) Youth Paddlers will paddle in the four youth divisions according to their individual ability. Promotions within these classes will be done on the basis of improvement in standard of performance. When applying for registration the time certificate submitted should show the time recorded on the 500m test in order that new paddlers can be classified correctly. Beginners do NOT automatically start in the "D" group.
- c) The chart "Standards for Sprint Racing", demonstrates the way in which the subdivisions are made according to speed.
- d) The status of a paddler in a kayak class has no bearing on his status in a Canoe.
- e) Mixed Events, in which male and female competitors race together in the Men classes, are permitted, provided the races are of parallel standard to that of their designated classes.
- f) Open Events - In order to facilitate programming we reserve the right to combine classes in any distance at any regatta, with the exception of National Championship events, which will all start separately provided there are sufficient entries.
- g) Paddlers must race ONLY in their designated class for singles events (K1 and C1) at N.W.S.C. Regattas. Competitors may race above their designated class in crew boats only. Exceptions may be made when O.R.S. coaches wish to enter squad paddlers in higher classes.
- h) A Youth paddler may race in crew boats in a senior class equivalent or above the standard of his own youth standard. e.g. BAK= MBK (see chart).
- i) All paddlers will be graded into classes according to the standards set out in the Standards for Racing. Coaches should use the Coaching Scheme 500m Racing Tests as preparation for paddlers entry into racing.
- j) Youth National Championships
Youth Paddlers will race in the following Age Groups
 - UNDER 18 (BORN 1984)
 - UNDER 17 (BORN 1985)
 - UNDER 16 (BORN 1986 or 1987)
 - UNDER 14 (BORN 1988 or later)A youth paddler, who has been promoted to Senior Status on ability, may for National Championship Events only race in his/her youth age group.
- k) Promotions/Demotions
 - a) Will be made throughout the year on the basis of standards laid down, and using the race results.
 - b) Are not automatic, and need to be ratified by the S.R.C nominee before taking effect.
 - c) Will be notified on the regatta results and should take effect at the next regatta.
- l) Veterans
Paddlers born before 1967 may compete in the Veteran class unless Men's A or B

6. Check your Programme

Prior to the Team Leaders Meeting, it is essential for each Team Leader to make a careful check of all his entries. It is best to keep a copy of your entry for this purpose. If there are any omissions or if you wish to make substitutions, mark your programme: the Team Leaders Meeting goes very quickly, and leaves no time for hesitation.

TEAM LEADERS HANDBOOK

It is not uncommon for the regatta organisers to make a few mistakes with the entries, but it is your responsibility to check the programme. Once a race has been passed during a meeting it is not normal to go back.

The event organisers will do their best to arrange the programme so that all races in each class are well spaced out, giving a minimum rest period of 40 minutes between races. Any competitor racing outside his designated class in crew boats cannot depend on the programme accommodating this situation satisfactorily.

7. Team Leaders Meeting

It is intended to hold only one meeting per regatta, at 0800 hrs on the Saturday morning (unless otherwise stated) in the Lecture Room. If the meeting cannot be completed in a reasonable time it will be adjourned and the time of the reconvened meeting announced. Each club must nominate one representative to deal with alterations and late entries at the meeting. This nominated representative will be responsible for all the money owed for the entries he submits. This money must be paid by 12.00 Noon on Saturday. Failure to pay on time will incur a £5.00 surcharge that must be paid by the end of racing on Saturday. Failure to meet this deadline will result in all paddlers from that club being disqualified from Sunday's racing.

Procedure

- a) Team Leader signs in on arrival.
- b) Meeting commences promptly at 8.00 a.m.
- c) Technical announcements.
- d) If there are any objections to the programmed order of events they must be raised at this stage.
- e) Late entry provision:-
 - i. Events will be dealt with in order.
 - ii. The Competition Organiser will call out in order each set of heats (or finals, if there are no heats). Team Leaders should scratch any competitors who do not intend to race, or make suitable substitutions. They should call out the lane number first then the competitors name(s).
 - iii. If there are any vacant lanes the Competition Organiser will then ask Team Leaders to raise one hand for each late entry they wish to make. If there are more late entries required than there are vacant lanes available, a draw will take place.
 - iv. It is not permitted to return to an event that has been concluded.

8. Entries after the Team Leaders Meeting

Entries after the meeting for laned races will only be accepted in exceptional circumstances, and at the discretion of the Competition Organiser.

Late entries will be accepted for long distance events (3 km, 6 km, 10 km.), up to one hour before the race, on payment of the appropriate late entry fee. Entries can be made on the form available from the regatta secretary's desk.

9. Club Colours

Must be worn by all competitors in all events at the N.W.S.C. regattas.

- a) In K4 crews where more than one club is represented, paddlers must wear the colours for the club in whose name they are registered.

TEAM LEADERS HANDBOOK

- b) Clubs racing for the first time at an N.W.S.C. regatta may request exemption from this rule by application to the Regatta Organiser; but the competitors should wear a plain white shirt with no markings. The club must then register its colours before taking part in subsequent events.

10. Numbers

- a) It is a requirement that clubs should provide their own lane numbers as prescribed in the Racing Rules for races up to 1000m in length.
- b) Sets of numbers 1-9, and suitable mounting brackets for kayaks and canoes, are available for sale from the regatta secretary's desk.
- c) For races over 1000m in length, the competition organisers will issue numbers. These will be of a type that fix into a slot on the deck of the boat, all competitors must ensure that their boats are fitted with these slots.
- d) Numbers for long distance racing must be obtained from the regatta secretary's desk and may be collected by Team Leaders ONLY. A deposit of £10.00 must be left by every club collecting numbers, regardless of how many numbers are required. This money can be reclaimed at the end of the day when all numbers are returned; alternatively it can be left at the desk to cover for numbers which will be required for Sunday's racing, and would then be returned Sunday evening when all numbers were collected in.
- e) Lost Numbers will be charged at £5.00 per number, and the amount deducted from the deposit before it is returned.
- f) A form will be available at the meeting on which the Team Leaders should order the numbers required for the day's long distance races in advance. This form should be handed in to the regatta secretary's desk. He will then make up your requirements for collection later in the morning, (after 11.00).

ALL CANOES AND KAYAKS MUST BE FITTED WITH NUMBER SLOTS

11 K2/K4 Crew Names

Notification of crew names must be made at the Regatta Office at least 30 minutes before the race. Any crew which has not notified the full set of names will be allowed to start the race but will not appear in the results, nor will they go forward to the next round of the competition. Paddlers who take the place of other paddlers without the proper substitution will be allocated 2 penalty points and disqualified from the event.

12 K4s

- a) They will be stored on racks outside the boathouse.
- b) Crews must not sit in the K4s *except when they are on the water*.
- c) Young paddlers must be supervised by a responsible adult when handling the K4s onto and off the water. The K4 Official reserves the right to refuse the boat to any youth crew that is not accompanied by an adult.
- d) Check your K4 before you use it. If it is not in order please report the fact to the Official. The crew that previously used the boat will be held responsible.
- e) K4s can be booked for any race during the course of the day as soon as the boathouse is open and the K4 Official is present.
- f) Crews must supply their own wing-nuts and toggles when they report to collect the boat they have booked.
- g) Crews must use the boat allocated.

TEAM LEADERS HANDBOOK

13 Protests & Disqualifications

- a) Notification of disqualification will always be made to the Team Leader or his nominated reserve. Except in National Championship Events, there will be no appeal against disqualification.
- b) In a National Championship event, a protest must be made by the paddler's Team Leader.
- c) Team Leaders should realise that it is impossible to adequately umpire all races in every regatta. Where infringements are observed by an umpire, these will be reported to The Chief Official who will, if necessary, inform the offending paddler's Team Leader.
- d) Often however, infringements will not be observed by the umpires, and Team Leaders should realise that they have a responsibility to explain the situation to young paddlers who may easily become frustrated by what might seem to be an arbitrary system of justice.

14 Results

If a copy of the results is required, please send a S.A.E. marked RESULTS with your entry, or leave an addressed envelope and the appropriate postage at the Regatta Office. A fee of £1.00 is payable for each copy.

15 Car Parking

Team Leaders MUST take an active part to see that club members observe the car parking lines. Parked cars must not obstruct the launching access for K4s to the concrete pontoons in front of the boathouses. Particular attention should be paid to the access road in the vicinity of the Centre Buildings. Access for emergency vehicles must NOT be impeded.

The pontoon on the seating side of the tower on the waterfront is a No Parking Area, and must not be used by competitors. This area is solely for the use of safety boats.

Particular attention is drawn to safety requirements, especially the need for adequate buoyancy in all boats.

Sufficient fixed buoyancy must be securely fitted to all boats before they are allowed on the water. Severe penalty points (and disqualification) will be incurred by all those ignoring this requirement. This is intended to ensure the safety of all those on the water.

NATIONAL WATER SPORTS CENTRE REGATTAS

Disciplinary Procedures

The Chief Official

The Chief Official will be solely responsible for all disciplinary matters of a minor nature, under the operation of a penalty points system. At his/her own discretion, he/she may issue up to three penalty points for a single offence.

Racing in incorrect or wrong colours	1 point
Racing with incorrect or without number	1 point
Failure to observe water zoning procedures	1-2 points
Unauthorised substitution for another paddler	2 points + Disqualification
Failure to report for Semi-Finals and/or Finals having qualified in the heats	2 points
Conduct during racing likely to cause injury or damage to equipment	3 points + Disqualification
Use of bad or offensive language	1-3 points
Underweight Boat	1-3 points+Disqualification
Underweight Boat (2nd offence at same regatta)	Regatta Disqualification
Failure to report for boat weighing immediately	1-3 points+Disqualification
Insufficient Buoyancy	2 points
Insufficient Buoyancy (2nd offence at same regatta)	Regatta Disqualification

Disqualification from the rest of the regatta if the offence is committed on Saturday. Should the offence occur on a Sunday, the offender will be banned from racing on the first day of the next regatta. Weights must be properly fixed to the boat or seat. Stones in bags or any other removable temporary system will not be accepted. A policy of random Boat Weighing will be continued through the year. Boats required for weighing will be notified at either Start or Finish.

Random inspections will be made at launching points, and if buoyancy appears inadequate, 2 points will be awarded immediately, and the boat turned back. If the boat goes on to race, without fitting in the correct buoyancy the offender(s) will, if the offence is committed on the Saturday, be disqualified from the rest of the regatta. If the offence is committed on the Sunday, the paddler(s) will be banned from racing on the first day of the next regatta. Persistent offence by paddlers from any one club may eventually result in **ALL** paddlers from that club being banned from a regatta.

'A' Classes will be subject to maximum penalty, and more stringent inspections. An official will be checking both buoyancy and boat weights, and keeping records of his findings. Inspections may be carried out both prior to, and after, craft go afloat.

Totting Up

- When a paddler achieves a total of 4 points he/she will be automatically disqualified from the next full days racing. In two day regattas, if the incident occurs on the Saturday the disqualification becomes effective on the Sunday. If the incident occurs on the Sunday the disqualification will be for the Saturday of the next regatta. Penalty points awarded will be notified on the result sheet at the end of each regatta.
- A paddler who collects a further 3 points during any one season making a total of 7 in all, will be disqualified for the next two days racing.
- A paddler who achieves a total of 4 or 7 points during the last regatta of the season, will serve his suspension at the first regatta of the next season.
- All other paddlers will start the new season with a clean sheet.

Team Leaders will be informed when a warning or disqualification is effected. The notification will also appear on the result sheet.

NATIONAL WATER SPORTS CENTRE REGATTAS

Disciplinary Matters of a More Serious Nature.

In respect to all other disciplinary matters the Chief Official, Competition Committee and the Competition Jury must act as described in the Racing Rules which include penalties in accordance with B.C.U. Rules or the Racing Section Disciplinary Regulations.

- N.B.** A reported incidence of dissent/abuse towards a Regatta Official, another competitor or their equipment, or a spectator must be treated as conduct prejudicial to the interests of the sport and dealt with under the Section Disciplinary Regulations.

THE MCGREGOR PADDLE COMPETITION

A simplified scoring system was introduced in 1997.

Under the following system most clubs should have an equal opportunity to achieve a winning score:

1. Each Club will automatically score 1 point for every paddler competing in the Inter Club Regatta.
2. Each Club will score 1 point for each promotion accredited to their paddlers during the four previous Regattas i.e. April, May, June, & July of the same year.
3. The scoring at the Inter Club Regatta will be on the following basis:

Each Club will score its best	12	K1/C1 results in all finals
	6	K2/C2 results in all finals
	3	K4 results in all finals

Scores will be awarded, provided there at least three crews participating, on the following basis:

1st	20 points
2nd	19 points
3rd	18 points....etc

4. Notes:

- a) Composite crews, with members from more then one Club, do not score.
- b) At least 50% of the crew must be registered in the class in which they are racing.

i.e. 2 paddlers K4, and 1 paddler K2. Crews may be made up with paddlers from a lower ability group with the following exceptions:

 - i) Men may not paddle in Womens races.
 - ii) Boys may not paddle in Girls races.
 - iii) Seniors may not paddle in Junior races.
- c) No one may enter any singles class other than their designated class as shown on the Registration File.

System for the membership for Juniors of a B.C.U. Affiliated Club.

A junior club member need not be a full member of the B.C.U. in order to race in Junior D Classes. He or She must be a member of his or her club, and the number used for his or her identification will be club's affiliation number followed by his or her own individual club number.

Should he or she be promoted, however, to 'C' or above, he or she must then become a full member of the B.C.U. in his or her own right.

It is the responsibility of the Team Leader to advise the Registration Officer of the full B.C.U. Number.

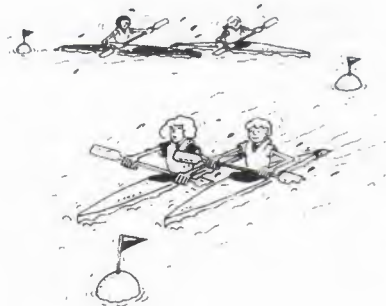

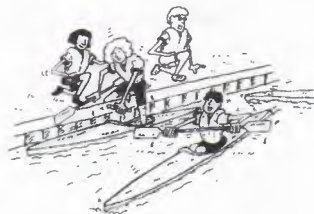

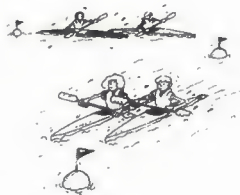

The BCU would therefore like to encourage organisers to follow an event format for Lightning's that provides an enjoyable challenge for children, normally aged 8 - 12 years, as outlined below. SRC-Cups 2002

1. Introduction

The SRC-Cups 2002 is a new competition set up by the BCU Sprint Racing Committee to encourage clubs and paddling organisations to run and take part in Local Sprint events. In creating more events there will be more opportunity for paddlers to take part in Sprint Racing.

We have defined Sprint Racing as a race between paddlers on the water over a measured course of between 50m and 1000m. The competition is therefore designed to be flexible enough to enable the inclusion of a wide range of boats, event formats and venues. In so doing we also hope to introduce Sprint Racing to more paddlers, coaches and clubs.

2. The Competition Prizes

Prizes for each race within the regatta are at the discretion of the organiser. The SRC-Cups annual prize will be a trophy and cash prize of £150 to the winning club in each region (more than one winner per region the £150 prize money is shared).

3. Rules of the competition

The intention is to keep the rules to a minimum. To achieve this aim it is essential to base the competition on Fair play and common sense.

3.1 The event

To qualify as an SRC-Cups event a regatta must satisfy all the following criteria:

- At least 2 separate clubs must take part each with a minimum of 4 paddlers competing in the event
- There must be at least 2 separate Sprint race categories per event
- The event registration form must be completed and sent to the National SRC-Cups coordinator.
- The event runs between 1st Jan 2002 and 23rd August 2002

3.2 Points Scoring

Points are scored in qualifying events as follows:

- 10 points are scored by the club hosting the event, plus a further 5 points for each eligible club participating
- Each other club participating scores 5 points (NB Points can be scored out of region)

3.3 Prizes

- The regional winner will be the club with the most recorded SRC-Cup points in their region.
- Prizes will be presented at SRC AGM part 1 at the September Regatta

3.4 Sanctions

- Any club found to be cheating the SRC-Cup rules will be disqualified from the event.

Leptospirosis and the Canoeist

Leptospirosis

This is an animal infection, but after recovery the animal continues to excrete the organisms in the urine. These survive for days or even weeks in moist conditions, but for only a few hours in salt water. Humans catch the infection by direct contact with the urine, or the urine polluted environment. Bacteria enter through skin abrasions or via the eyes, nose, or mouth.

The Illness

The usual incubation is 7 to 12 days. Normally a 'flu-like illness occurs which resolves in 2-3 weeks. There may be fever, severe headache, pains in the back and calf and prostration. A few cases develop jaundice, when the condition is known as Weil's disease. Although death may occur in about 15% of the jaundiced patients, death without jaundice is virtually unknown. Antibiotics during the first few days may help in limiting infection. Many cases recover without specific treatment.

What to do

If you think you may have the infection, go to your doctor and tell him/her that there may be a small risk of leptospirosis. The diagnosis is by clinical suspicion. Blood tests can rarely confirm the illness in time to affect treatment. They may subsequently confirm it.

The microbiologist at your local hospital is the best source of advice.

Prevention

1. Cover all cuts and abrasions with waterproof plasters.
2. Always wear footwear to avoid cutting the feet.
3. Avoid capsize drill or rolling practice in inland waters.
4. Shower as soon as possible after canoeing.
5. If in doubt, contact your doctor early.

Remember, simple precautions can reduce your risk.

REGATTA OFFICIALS TRAINING

The training of officials is a highly important area of our activities from both a National and Regional point of view. Anyone interested in assisting at National regattas at Nottingham is encouraged to come and sit alongside more experienced officials to learn what is involved. Each year in November, a course is held at the N.W.S.C. to introduce anyone who wishes to help with either National or Regional events.

Candidates can progress from this course, through officiating at our own National and International Regattas to a standard where they become eligible to take the International Canoe Federation examination, so then becoming qualified to officiate at World Championships.

THE BASIC COURSE: The basic course is aimed at complete beginners and no previous knowledge or experience is assumed. All aspects of the organisation are covered in a basic and practical way. Particular attention is given to the organisation of low key, local events of all kinds. This course would be followed by practical experience at regattas, working alongside a more practiced official to gain knowledge and experience.

THE SYMPOSIUM: This consists of discussion groups of more experienced officials who meet to discuss any problems which have arisen during the season, and methods of solving them. Additional training can be given in specialised fields for those aiming to take the I.C.F. examination.

British Canoe Union - World Class Directorate

The BCU World Class Directorate takes full responsibility for the World Class Programmes. With a combined budget of £2.5 million (inc. Start), employing 25 full time staff some part-time members of staff, with several more event based staff employed on a regular basis. The Directorate are based at The Elms at the National Water Sports Centre in Nottingham. The majority of sprint coaches and the National Performance Manager are based from their home offices and clubs in the West Thames area. The World Class Potential Mens Kayak Coach and National Junior Coach are based at the Elms.

World Class Performance

This programme currently supports 27 UK athletes in their training and competition programmes with the aim to win medals in significant international competitions now and within the next 4 years, particularly at the Olympic Games in Athens 2004. Athletes are selected according to the UK Sport Performance Matrix and are expected to have achieved results in the World Top 20. The Olympic disciplines of Canoe Slalom and Sprint Racing are supported through the World Class Performance Programme. Marathon Racing is also included subject to international results (normally world top 6 or above) This Programme is funded until March 2005. The BCU Performance Director (PD), John Anderson, has overall responsibility for managing and directing the World Class Performance Programme. The BCU is accountable to UK Sport for this programme. The PD also provides the overall strategic direction for all of the World Class Programmes; Performance, Potential and Start.

The above chart gives general information on the standards that are generally considered prerequisites for athletes to be accepted onto the Performance Programme. Athletes achieving a Top 10 position at the Marathon World Championships may be considered for the programme. This will be based on the quality of the start line, number of nations and competitors, the individual's time and difference between their time and that of the winner.

In addition, athletes in this category will have to demonstrate a commitment to the Sprint Racing programme

World Class Potential (WCPL)

The World Class Potential Programme is funded by Sport England for English development athletes. Sport England defines the programme as follows:

'To assist the development of talented performers with the potential to win medals in significant* future international competitions within the next 10 years' (*Note: BCU defines significant as European or World Champs)

Athletes will be principally within the age range of 18 – 25 years old.

Full Review

In October each year the WCPL coaches and Programme Manager of the BCU carry out a full review of athletes included on the WCPL programme along with those who may not yet be included but who may be of the appropriate standard. The recommendations of the coaches are prepared for formal approval by the BCU World Class Programmes Management Group. This paper is then submitted to Sport England for their final consideration and agreement. The final decision is with Sport England who fund the programme.

Principles For Inclusion in the Programme

The following notes aim to outline the criteria that the World Class Directorate uses to assess the performances of individual athletes with regard to inclusion on the World Class Potential programme.

Principles

Athletes to be included in the programme will principally be within the 18-25 age range. If a junior athlete (17 years old or younger) is achieving performance standards for an athlete of 18 or older, then they will be considered for the WCPL programme. The implications of this is that if the junior is selected for the WCPL programme then they will receive the personal funding associated with the WCPL programme and appropriate additional training opportunities but will predominantly be involved in the junior programme.

The programme recognises that the Womens kayak and canoes are development classes and that entry criteria will reflect this – particularly with the U20 age range.

The inclusion of athletes onto the programme will be based upon the following criteria:

Main Criteria

The main criteria used to assess performances of individual athletes will be position and timed performance at identified races. Due to the different status of events through the season the following list offers guidance on the relative importance of races in the assessment process:

- Priority 1: *Major International Sprint Championships e.g. Olympic Games, Senior & Junior World Championships, Senior, U23 & Junior European Championships.*
- Priority 2: *Major International Marathon Championships eg Senior & Junior World Championships, Senior and Junior European Championships*
- Priority 3: *Single Sprint International results (senior) e.g. Senior World Cup Races*
April and June domestic regattas (major selection events)*
- Priority 4: *Other nominated domestic events*

Notes:

** All events will be subject to an assessment of the quality of the start line. 'Light' start lines will not be given the same credibility as those start lines which contain evidence of senior world top 20 athletes competing.*

Other Criteria taken into account

At every programme review point, there are a limited number of spaces available on the programme. This number is determined by both Sport England and the standards of the programme. Our inclusion principles which come into effect when this review is being undertaken are:

- Where athletes are of a similar standard, factors such as age, rate of progression and commitment to the programme will be taken into account.
- Where an injury affects an athlete already on the WCPL programme, funding status will be discussed in consultation with all parties concerned as directed by the World Class Programmes Manager.

Objectivity

Whilst the inclusion for the World Class Potential programme aims to be as objective as possible, the nature of the age range, rate of development and value judgements on the quality of start lines will inevitably lead to some subjectivity.

There are three ways of inclusion within the WCPL squad:

1. Qualification through selection and performance for the Senior European or World Championship Sprint team

Any athlete selected for this team and achieving a Top 20 position in an Olympic event will be guaranteed their position within the WCPL programme for 2002/2003

Any athlete selected for the Marathon Senior World or European Championship team and achieving a Top 5 position can pre-qualify their position on the programme as long as they can demonstrate continued improvement matched to the WCPL sprint standards

2. Qualification through selection and performance standard achieved at World Cup 4, European U23 Championships and/or Junior European Championships.

Athletes can pre-qualify their position on the programme by being selected for these events and making Top 5 in an Olympic event

3. Year End Review

All other athletes, not achieving pre-qualification to the programme will go forward into the year –end review where international & domestic performances against the standards will be assessed

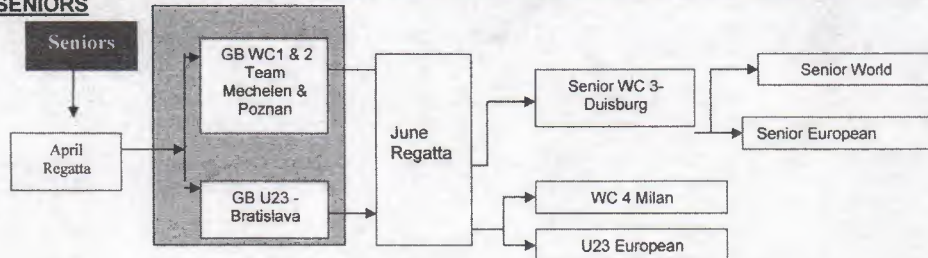

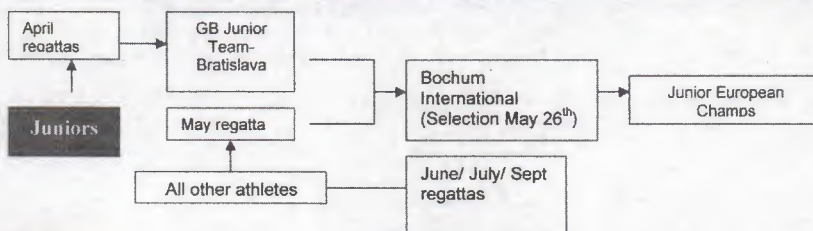

The above flow chart identifies the senior and junior races to be used for the 2002 season to assess performance for the World Class Potential Athlete Review in October 2002. No sprint racing results other than those races listed in the flow chart above will be used in the assessment process.

All Athletes not selected for international teams must participate in the 5 domestic races identified through the 2002 season. The results from these races will be used to assess athletes for their inclusion on the programme. Inclusion is subject to achieving the appropriate performance standard.

MARATHON RACING

Sprint Racing results remain the priority but Marathon results may be used to support Sprint performances.

In particular:

Results from World/ European Championships will be taken into account when assessing performance.

Results from World Cups may be taken into account – dependant upon class size and strength.

Marathon results can be used to support Sprint Racing performances

World Class Start (WCS)

Introduction

The World Class Start Programme is funded by Sport England for English development athletes. Sport England define the programme as follows:

'To help in the identification and nurturing of a specific number of performers who have the necessary characteristics to achieve future World Class success'.

Athletes will be principally within the age range 13-18 years old and the programme is largely based in the clubs and regions. It also covers preparation and racing of junior international Great Britain U18 teams and junior development teams.

Full Review

In October each year the WCStart coaches and Programme Manager of the BCU carry out a full review of all athletes. The recommendations of the coaches are prepared for formal approval by the BCU World Class Programmes Management Group. This paper is then submitted to Sport England for their final consideration and agreement. The final decision is with Sport England who fund the programme.

After April selection events, a Junior Elite group is formed which operates until October.

Athletes can only be part of one home nation's programme

Criteria

- Age
- Stage of development
- Commitment to training and the programme
- Other scientific testing

WORLD CLASS START and FLATWATER RACING

How the programme will affect you, your coach and your club.

1. ***Existing coaches** will be supported to improve by nationally coordinated but largely regionally delivered programme of development – more courses, updates, good practice, work with top coaches, international trips.
2. ***New coaches** are being identified and trained, with additional emphasis on female and canoe coaches.
3. ***Coach education** nationally coordinated specifically in flatwater racing via National Development Coach – Graham Campbell
4. ***Coaching conferences** and national symposiums annually at least.
5. ***New resources** developed and supplied to coaches
6. ***Racing Coach Website** for information, sharing good practice, feedback from the club coaches, an avenue for presenting new ideas.
7. ***Athlete Website** for information, sharing ideas, communicating with top coaches and elite athletes.
8. ***International coaches** giving high quality input for athletes and coaches - Alex Nikonorov, Claudine LeRoux, Nandor Almassi providing initiatives, devolved experience, programme advice, technical support, direct coaching.
9. ***High quality coaching support** and coach education in regions and clubs from National Junior Coach – Shaun Caven and up to 4 regional coaches.
10. ***Regional Coordinators** for administration, event organising etc.
11. ***National assessments** providing ongoing national and international comparison of progress for athletes over a wide range of training areas.
12. **Programme** of regionally based training days and training camps in holidays.
13. **Sprint/ marathon focus** in programme of support for paddler/coach development.
14. ***Regional funding** to support resources, access to training venues, centres, extra coaching costs, equipment, coach support.
15. ***Canoe paddling** a specific initiative to support and develop canoe paddling and coaching.
16. ***Junior womens kayak** a specific initiative to support and develop junior women kayak paddling and coaching.
17. ***Sports Science input** directed at coach education in the clubs, beginning with psychology. Some subsequent direct paddler education.
18. **Training manual/diary** for all paddlers, collecting best advice and information from many sources.
19. ***A link to development** in clubs and regions by discipline committees and other BCU programmes including new canoe/ladies initiatives.
20. ***Crew Preparation** at GB U18 team level, (including residential training camps), development international teams, regional crew boats.
21. ***International events** at GB international level and BCU development international team level in sprint and marathon.
22. **Personal grant** £250 minimum personal grant for all nominated athletes.
23. ***Inclusive philosophy** supports up and coming paddlers from outside nominated list wherever appropriate.

Those features of the programme marked * will be of benefit to nominated, and all other junior paddlers alike.

- 1 **General Notes on Selection**
As an outdoor sport that can be affected by weather conditions and lane draws, it will be necessary to operate a policy of continuous assessment. Athletes achieving satisfactory results at National events can be considered for selection to GBR and English teams.
- 2 Any athlete wishing to be selected must complete an availability form supplied by the Programme manager. They must also complete an athlete's agreement.
- 3 **Selection Committee**
The BCU Sprint Racing Committee has established a Selection Committee. The Selection committee comprises the BCU Performance Director, the National Performance Manager (Sprint Racing), the National Performance Coach (Sprint Racing), the relevant National Squad Coach and a nominated member of the Sprint Racing Committee. The National Performance Manager will normally chair selection meetings
- 4 **Competition Programme**
The National Performance Manager for Sprint Racing in conjunction with the National Performance Coach will prepare a draft training and competition programme for approval by the BCU Performance Director and the Sprint Racing Committee. This Programme will be published in the yearbook.
- 5 **Teams for Major Internationals**
Teams for all major international events, World Cups, World and European Championships must comply with the rules of the International Canoe Federation and the European Canoe Association. Entry to these events is restricted to National Governing bodies affiliated to the ICF and the ECA. Restrictions also apply to the number of entries each country may place. Selections for these competitions will be made by the Selection Committee as shown in 10.2
- 6 Teams for the World and European Championships will be submitted to the Sprint Racing Committee for ratification.
- 7 **Teams for Minor Internationals**
The National Performance Manager, in consultation with the Senior or Junior National Coaches and the relevant National Squad Coach, may select teams for minor internationals.
- 8 **Olympic Games**
Entry to the Olympic Games is subject to qualification rules as agreed between the International Canoe Federation and the IOC. The Selection Committee as defined at 10.2 will select the G.B. Olympic Canoe and Kayak Sprint Racing Team. This team will be submitted to the Sprint Racing Committee for ratification and then to the British Olympic Association for approval.
- 9 **Funding**
International team selections will be subject to available funding; this means that funding may influence the size and number of our international teams. Athletes who are not on World Class Programmes will be asked to contribute an amount determined by the National Performance Manager and approved by the BCU Racing Committee. These contributions will only be used to support the international Competition Programme

Continuous Assessment Process:

Results from international competitions and the domestic regattas shown below will be used for assessment during the year. Paddlers wishing to be assessed should compete in the following National regattas.

- All Seniors: April and June.
- Senior U23: April, June and July.
- All Juniors: April, May and July.

In cases where a selection is not clear cut the selectors may also look at previous competition results and use this information to assist in the selection process. The Racing Committee reserves the right to vary these selection dates if unforeseen circumstances disrupt the selection timetable. If this becomes necessary every effort will be made to inform athletes as soon as possible. The SRC may select other international teams during the year.

RACING SECTION CONSTITUTION

As submitted by the British Canoe Union Sprint Racing Committee for approval by the Annual General Meeting of the Sprint Racing Section held on Saturday, 29th January, 1977 and ratified, and subsequently updated (14 Nov 98, 2 Dec 2000 & 6 January 2002). The Constitution is bound to the Articles and the Association of the British Canoe Union.

1. Title

The section shall be called the British Canoe Union Racing Section.

2. Objectives

To the extent to which it is authorised by the British Canoe Union (B.C.U.) the Section shall control competitions in canoes and kayaks, over distances up to and including 5000 metres, on racing courses which are designed to be as flat and as still as possible, and in relation thereto shall:

- 2.1 Organise and conduct National Championships and other competitions on behalf of the B.C.U..
- 2.2 Draft Rules and Regulations.
- 2.3 Select, train, and administer teams representing the United Kingdom and Channel Islands for international events.
- 2.4 In cooperation with the National Coaching Scheme, develop good coaching within regions and clubs.
- 2.5 Train competition officials.
- 2.6 Foster technical research and development.
- 2.7 Act as a final authority in settling disputes.

3. Membership

Membership shall be open to any individual member or affiliated member of the B.C.U.

4. Officers

- 4.1 In order to carry out its objectives, the following officers and other committee members shall be elected.
 - 4.1.1 Chairman
 - 4.1.2 Secretary
 - 4.1.3 Treasurer
 - 4.1.4 A committee known as the Racing Committee (R.C.) consisting of the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Section, and not more than eight other Committee members. Nominated representatives from B.C.U. regions, the W.C.A., C.A.N.I., S.C.A., and other groups, with an interest in racing will be entitled to attend and speak at meetings of the Racing Committee at the expense of the nominating organisation.
 - 4.1.5 A member who is not a full member shall not be eligible for election as an officer, or as a member of the Committee, other than as a non-voting co-opted member.

4.2 Period of Office

- 4.2.1 The Chairman shall hold office for one year.
- 4.2.2 The Secretary and Treasurer shall hold office for two years and retire on alternate years, the Secretary one year, the Treasurer next.
- 4.2.3 The members of the Committee shall retire after two years, half of them shall retire at the Annual General Meeting at which the Secretary retires, and the other half the following year.
- 4.2.4 All officers and members of the Committee shall be eligible for re-election.

4.3 Nominations

Nominations of candidates for election shall be put forward in the form of a motion under the terms of paragraph 6.6.

4.4 Co-Options

The Committee may co-opt not more than three full members to its number (who shall have no voting rights).

4.5 Vice Chairman

At the first meeting of the Committee following the second part of the Annual General Meeting, the Committee shall elect a Vice-Chairman from amongst its members, to serve until the next

Annual General Meeting.

4.6 Casual Vacancies

In the event of a casual vacancy among the officers or members of the Committee, the Committee shall appoint another eligible person to act for an appropriate period, but not beyond the next Annual General Meeting.

5. Duties of Officers & Committees

The Racing Committee shall be responsible for the finances and for carrying out the objectives of and the Section as defined in paragraph 2. It shall, additionally, be responsible for appointing Team Management and Team Coaching personnel, and other specialist officers as from time to time may be required, and for defining their terms of reference. It shall have the power to set up Sub-Committees without prejudice to the over-riding control of the Section.

- 5.1 The Secretary shall keep minutes of the proceedings of the General and Racing Committee meetings, report to the Annual General Meeting on the attendance of each officer and member at Racing Committee Meetings held during the previous year, and carry out other duties as the Racing Committee may from time to time direct.
- 5.2 The Treasurer shall keep such books of account as the B.C.U. Council and the Racing Committee may from time to time direct. Expenses for attending Racing Committee and Sub-Committee meetings may only be paid to Elected, Appointed, and Co-opted members.
- 5.3 Six members shall form a quorum at a meeting of the Committee.

6. General Meetings

6.1 The Annual General Meeting (AGM)

The Annual General Meeting shall be held in two parts. The first part shall be held at the time of the last competition held at the National Water Sports Centre, Holme Pierrepont, during September each year. The second part shall be held during the period 1st November to 31st January.

6.2 Special General Meeting

A Special General Meeting may be called at the discretion of the Racing Committee or by not less than 10 affiliated members of the Section entitled to vote as defined under paragraph 7. Such notice must state in the form of a motion the business to be discussed and bear the signatures of the members concerned and the name of their club.

6.3 Right to Speak

Only full members of The British Canoe Union are entitled to speak at General Meetings.

6.4 Notice of General Meetings

- 6.4.1 At least 14 clear days must be given of the date and place of any General Meeting.
- 6.4.2 In addition, every B.C.U. affiliated member who has taken part in a National Competition, as designated by the Committee, during the year, shall be sent a written notice of a General Meeting by first class post, addressed to the Secretary of the affiliated member organisation as recorded at the B.C.U. Headquarters.

6.5 Business of General Meeting

6.5.1 Only the business notified in the agenda accompanying the notice shall be transacted at General Meetings. Amendments must be kept within the terms of motions for consideration and the Chairman has the power to refuse any amendment which subsequently alters the intention of the motion.

6.5.2 The business of the Annual General Meeting shall, for the first part, be to consider any motions on the Agenda in relation to paragraphs 2.3 and 2.4 of these rules, to receive any proposals from the Racing Committee concerning amendments to the Section Constitution, and to receive reports from Team Management and Coaching Personnel and other specialist officers.

For the second part it shall be:

- (a) To receive the report of the Chairman.
- (b) To receive the report of the Secretary.
- (c) To receive the report of the Treasurer and to adopt the accounts.

- (d) To elect the Chairman.
- (e) To elect the Secretary or Treasurer.
- (f) To elect the members of the Committee.
- (g) To consider any motions on the agenda for the alteration of the Section Rules or Constitution or which are in relation to paragraph 2.

6.6 Motions

Any motion for discussion at the Annual General Meeting Part 2, or nomination for officer or committee member, not originating from the Racing Committee, must be signed by two full members of the B.C.U., who are members of an affiliated member club entitled to vote under paragraph 7, and shall be lodged with the Secretary within 14 days after the Annual General Meeting Part 1 of that year.

6.7 Quorum

No business shall be transacted at any General Meeting unless a quorum of members is present at the time the meeting proceeds to do business. Ten full voting members, as defined in paragraph 7, shall form a quorum.

7 Voting

Each affiliated member club of the British Canoe Union whose membership consists of 12 individual members or more, represented at a General Meeting, and whose members have taken part in a National Competition as designated by the Committee, shall have one vote.

- 7.1 Each affiliated member club must be represented by a full member of the British Canoe Union who shall cast their vote.
- 7.2 No member shall be entitled to speak or vote at a General Meeting unless all monies due to the B.C.U. by him, at that time, have been paid.

8 Amendments

A decision to alter the Racing Rules and Regulations can only be taken at a General Meeting, with a simple majority of the votes cast.

- 8.1 A decision to alter any part of the Section Rules can only be taken at a General Meeting with a majority of two-thirds of the total number of votes cast.
- 8.2 Other decisions taken at General Meetings will be by simple majority of the total number of votes cast, unless otherwise specified in the Section Rules.
- 8.3 The Chairman shall have a casting vote only.

9 Financial Year

The financial year of the Section shall end on the 31st October. Prior to the second part of the Annual General Meeting, and at such other times as the Committee may think fit, the books and accounts shall be audited.

10 Advisory Committee

Without prejudice to its over-riding control of the Section, the Committee may establish:

10.1 Competition Committee

A sub-committee responsible for selecting, training and administering the Olympic Racing Squad and teams representing the United Kingdom and the Channel Islands for international events. This Competition Committee shall be composed of a Chairman appointed by the Racing Committee, the O.R.S. Administrator, the O.R.S. Section Coaches and Team Management personnel. Policy decisions of the Competition Committee shall be subject to ratification by the Racing Committee.

10.2 Regatta Committee

A sub-committee responsible for organising and conducting National Championships and other competitions on behalf of the British Canoe Union, and training competition officials. This Regatta Committee shall be composed of members as may from time to time be determined by the Racing Committee. Policy decisions of the Regatta Committee shall be subject to ratification by the Racing Committee.

10.3 Finance Committee

A sub-committee responsible for approving the expenditure programmes of all other sub-committees, monitoring such expenditure and advising the Racing Committee on matters of general financial policy. The Finance Committee shall be responsible for the production of the Section Year Book and other racing publications that may from time to time be required. The Finance Committee shall be composed of the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of the

Section, the Chairman of the Competition Committee and the Chairman of the Regatta Committee. Decisions of the Finance Committee shall be subject to ratification by the Racing Committee.

11 Appointment

The appointment of officials by the Racing Committee within the terms of paragraph 5. shall be subject to the approval of the Annual General Meeting of the Section (2nd part).

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THE RACING SECTION RULES

Definition

Racing is competition in canoes and kayaks over a course as flat and still as can be obtained over distances up to and including 6,000 metres. Although competition may be organised for any craft the normal classes of boat will be the K1, K2, K4, C1, C2, and C4.

Part I - GENERAL REGULATIONS

There are three levels of competition: - International, National Status and Club.

1. **International Competitions** will take place in accordance with the I.C.F. Rules for competition.
2. **National Status Competitions**
 - 2.1 All competitions announced as National Status competitions shall be held in accordance with the Racing Rules of the British Canoe Union.
 - 2.2 National Status Competitions are those at which promotions within the National Divisions take place.
 - 2.3 National Status Competitions are organised on behalf of the B.C.U.
 - 2.4 All competitors at National Status Competitions must be registered with the Racing Committee and must be B.C.U. members or, if racing in a Junior "D" class, a member of a club which has a registered youth section and is affiliated to the B.C.U..
 - 2.5 Organisers of National Status Competitions shall declare that the competition is being held under B.C.U. rules.
 - 2.6 National Status Competitions require a permit from the Racing Committee. Application for a Regatta permit shall be directed to the Secretary of the Racing Committee. Such a permit shall require:-
 - 2.6.1 Observance of the B.C.U. Racing Rules.
 - 2.6.2 Inclusion of the words "Under B.C.U. Rules" on all printed matter issued in connection with the competition.
 - 2.6.3 Compliance with Part III Rule 14.2 regarding Regatta Officials.
 - 2.7 National Status Competitions will be included in the official B.C.U. Calendar of events.
 - 2.8 Within 14 days of the close of a competition a completed regatta programme with results, and signed by the Competition Secretary shall be sent to the Records Officer of the B.C.U. Racing Committee.
3. **Club Regattas**
 - 3.1 B.C.U. members are allowed to participate with non B.C.U. members.
 - 3.2 No promotions will be made at Club Regattas. Performance will not affect National Ranking.
 - 3.3 The Rules and Classes may be altered to suit Club requirements.
 - 3.4 Organisers of Club Regattas may advertise their events in the Year Book on payment of the appropriate fee.
 - 3.5 Organisers are asked to encourage all who take part to become B.C.U. members. Where fees are charged, B.C.U. members should be charged a reduced fee.
 - 3.6 To ensure uniformity, organisers are asked to follow the B.C.U. Racing Rules as far as possible.
 - 3.7 Organisers are asked to make it clear in all literature what the events and rules will be.
 - 3.8 A booklet 'Organising a Club Regatta' will be available.
4. No Club or member of a Club or individual member of the B.C.U. may compete outside the United Kingdom without permission from the Racing Committee.
5. No member of a foreign club may compete or be invited to compete in an open or national competition within the United Kingdom without permission from the B.C.U. Racing Committee. A foreign competitor shall normally be expected to have the sanction of his own National Federation unless he has been domiciled in the United Kingdom for two years or more. This rule does not apply to women competitors who leave their country of origin and acquire by marriage British Nationality. In this case, they can compete without the delay of two years.
6. When a competitor is a member of two or more clubs he shall, by March 1st have declared the name of the club in whose colours he will race that year in individual events. A person joining a second club after March 1st must continue to race for his first club. A competitor who has changed his club is not permitted to race for his new club, unless prior consent of his old club has been

obtained. The consent shall not be withheld in the case of a change of residence from one area to another.

7. Amateur Status

The Racing Committee Rules are those of the British Canoe Union

7.1 The British Canoe Union Amateur Rule - (1st January 1983)

"An amateur is a sportsman who devotes himself to sport as a vocation for his own pleasure and for his moral and physical well-being without deriving therefrom, directly or indirectly, any material gain"

7.2 The Eligibility Committee, which is the authority appointed by the Union to advise, when necessary, regarding the interpretation of the Amateur Rule, and to define the amateur status of members, has issued the following Code of Practice, which clarifies the terms contained in the Rule

7.2.1 An amateur canoeist may not:

7.2.1.1 Be or have been a professional athlete in any sport.

7.2.1.2 Have allowed his person, name, picture or sport performance to be used for advertising, except when the British Canoe Union or its Committees enter into a contract for sponsorship or equipment. All payments must be made to the British Canoe Union and not to the individual.

7.2.1.3 Have acted as a professional coach or trainer in any sport.

7.2.1.4 In the practice of sport and in the opinion of the British Canoe Union manifestly contravene the spirit of fair play in the exercise of sport, particularly by the use of doping or violence.

7.2.2 An amateur canoeist may:

7.2.2.1 Be a physical education or sports teacher or a member of a coaching scheme who gives elementary instruction.

7.2.2.2 Be a canoe accessory designer or manufacturer.

7.2.2.3 Accept, during a period of preparation and/or actual competition which shall be limited by the rules of the British Canoe Union and its Committees.

a. Assistance administered through the National Olympic Committee or the British Canoe Union: food and lodging; cost of transport; pocket money to cover incidental expenses; insurance cover in respect of accidents, illness and disability; personal property, sports equipment and clothing; cost of medical treatment, physiotherapy and authorised coaches.

b. Compensation authorised by his or her National Olympic Committee or the British Canoe Union, in the case of necessity, to cover financial loss resulting from his or her absence from work or basic occupation in the Olympic Games and sports competition or other canoeing activities. In no circumstances shall payment made under this provision exceed the sum which the competitor would have earned in the same period. The compensation may be paid with the approval of the British Canoe Union or the National Olympic Committee at their discretion.

7.2.2.4 Accept prizes won in competition or other canoeing activities, within the rules established by the British Canoe Union and its Committees and the International Canoe Federation. (This awaits final approval following a decision of the I.C.F. Congress, when Note 2.2.4 "Cash Prizes" may be revised)

7.2.2.5 Accept academic and technical scholarships.

7.2.2.6 In all cases which are not covered by the above regulations, the corresponding rules of the International Canoe Federation or the National Olympic Committee shall apply.

7.3. Procedures To Be Undertaken By Those Seeking, Obtaining, and Disbursing Sponsorships, Sports Scholarships and Awards.

7.3.1 Details of all personal sponsorship arrangements, sports sponsorships and other awards, offered to or negotiated by individuals or organisations, must be submitted by beneficiaries to the British Canoe Union Committee responsible for administering the particular activity, for registration and approval. When doubt exists regarding the appropriate Committee to whom information should be furnished, British Canoe Union

Headquarters will arrange for the necessary action to be undertaken.

7.3.2 A central registry of all personal sponsorship arrangements will be maintained by the British Canoe Union Headquarters, and will be available for inspection by authorised officers of the Union.

THE RACING SECTION RULES

- 7.3.3 The Eligibility Committee has advised that the term "personal sponsorship arrangements negotiated by beneficiaries" shall include:
Sponsorship provided by individuals (not family), commercial, industrial, and public authorities, National and Regional Sports Aid Foundations, Local Authorities, Trust Funds, Educational Institutions and agencies, Clubs and other miscellaneous supportive groups.

7.4. Advertising on Boats and Equipment

- 7.4.1 Advertising of any tobacco or tobacco related products on boats or equipment is not permitted by the B.C.U.
- 7.4.2 Use of athlete images during the period of the Olympic Games is regulated by the I.O.C. and the Olympic Charter.
Except as permitted by the I.O.C. Executive Board, no competitor who participates in the Olympic Games may allow his person, name, picture or sports performance to be used for advertising during the Olympic Games except where:
- 7.4.2.1 The N.O.C. of the athlete has given its express prior written consent to each such use, and
- 7.4.2.2 That, in any event, such use is not in relation to the athlete's performance at such Games.

8. Classification of Paddlers

- 8.1 Junior: A Junior is a competitor under 18 years of age at the beginning of the current calendar year. A Junior will have junior racing status unless promoted to senior racing status. Each Junior status competitor will be nominated to compete in one of the Junior classes as laid down from time to time by the B.C.U. Racing Committee. Juniors who have Senior status may race in the appropriate Junior class for National Championship events.
- 8.2 Senior: A Senior is a competitor who or is over 18 years of age or over at the beginning of the calendar year, and will have Senior racing status. Each Senior status competitor will be nominated to compete in one of the Senior Classes as laid down from time to time by the B.C.U. Racing Committee.
- 8.3 Veteran: a Veteran is a competitor over the age of 35 years of age at the beginning of the calendar year who is not already nominated to compete in Mens A or B
- 8.4 Promotions: Entry to and promotion between classes will be at the discretion of the B.C.U. Racing Committee and will be based on results gained in competition at regatta venues nominated by the Racing Committee. A competitor may, at the discretion of the Racing Committee, be permitted to revert to a lower class at the end of a regatta season.
- 8.5 Mixed Events: Mixed events where male and female competitors take part in the same boat are permitted.
- 8.6 Status: Status in Kayaks has no bearing on status in Canadian Canoes and the converse i.e. a premier Senior Class competitor in Canadian Canoes may be a lower Senior Class in Kayak.
- 8.7 Special Rules for Kayak Fours: Senior status competitors may not compete in fours events of a lower senior class than that for which they are nominated as individuals. Senior Class competitors may be members of fours crews competing in higher senior classes than their own without losing their individual Senior Class status. a win in a fours event does not affect the status of the members of the crew.

9. National Championship Entries:

Entries for these events shall be restricted to British Nationals who are members of the B.C.U. Aliens resident in Great Britain for at least two years may be permitted to enter for a National Championship event except in the case of women competitors who conform to the reference to British Nationality contained in Rule 5.

10. Limitations

11. Trademarks

Boats, accessories and clothing may carry trademarks, advertising symbols and written text.

All advertising material should be placed in such a way that it does not interfere with competitors' identification and does not affect the outcome of the race.

The advertising of tobacco smoking and strong spirit drinks will not be accepted.

Any boat, accessory, or article of clothing, which does not comply with the above conditions, will be ineligible for use during a competition. Teams and competitors are responsible for their own equipment.

12. Construction

12.1 The Hull

Section and longitudinal lines of the hull of the kayak and canoe shall be convex (only horizontal and vertical).

12.2 The Deck

The deck construction may not be higher on any horizontal point than the highest point of the front edge of the first cockpit.

12.3 No foreign substance may be added to boats which give competitors an unfair advantage.

12.4 All electric, electronic devices are forbidden in a boat when racing, this to include:

- pumps
- speed measuring devices
- strain gauges
- heart monitors

Kayaks

12.5 Boats may have one rudder. Over-stern rudders may not be thicker than 10mm for K1 and K2, or 12mm for a K4.

12.5.1 The boat to be designed as to be a sit-in (Kayak type) not a sit-on (Surf Ski type).

Canoes

12.6 The canoe must be built symmetrically upon the axis of its length.

12.6.1 Steering rudders or any guiding apparatus directing the course of the canoe is banned. A keel, if any, must be straight, shall extend over the whole length of the canoe and not project more than 30mm below the hull.

12.6.2 The C1 and C2 may be entirely open. The minimum length of the opening shall be 280cm and the edge of the side of the craft (gunnel) can extend maximum 5cm into the craft along the whole defined opening. The boat can have maximum three strengthening bars with a width of 7cm each.

12.6.3 The C4 canoe may be entirely open. The minimum length of the opening shall be 390cm and the edge of the side of the craft (gunnel) can extend maximum 6cm into the craft along the defined opening. The boat can have maximum four strengthening bars with a width of maximum 7cm each.

13. Boat Control

13.1 The length of a kayak or a canoe shall be measured between the extremes of the stem and the stern. Stern-bands or other projections of the stem or stern, if any, are to be included. Any rudder forming a continuation of the length of a kayak is not to be included in the measurement.

13.2 No alterations in canoes and kayaks are permitted after the measuring and weighing and before the competition has taken place.

THE RACING SECTION RULES

Boat Weighing

- 13.3 All loose outfit shall be removed. Permanent knee rests attached in a definitive way to the floorboard and buoyancy attachments consisting of water absorbing material must be absolutely dry at the first weighing prior to the race. Three or more boats according to the decision of the Competition Committee and on a random system shall be recontrolled immediately after the race.

Part III - ORGANISATION OF COMPETITIONS

14. Officials

- 14.1 If its nature and extent demand, each competition shall be held under the supervision of the following officials:

Chief Official	Competition Organiser or Competition Manager
Competition Secretary	Starter(s)
Aligner	Course Umpire(s)
Finishing Line Judge(s)	Turning Point Umpire(s)
Measurer(s)	Timekeeper(s)
Media Officer	Announcer

If circumstances permit, one person may function in two of the above offices. The Chief Official, Competition Organiser, Starter, Umpires, and Chief Judge should, if possible, be registered British Canoe Union Officials.

Unauthorised persons must not enter any official's area unless the Competition Committee or the Jury send for officials or team officials in order to solve problems.

- 14.2 For status competitions two members of the competition committee must be registered Regatta Officials of the B.C.U. Racing Committee.

- 14.3 Competition Committee: The top management of the competition shall be in the hands of a Competition Committee which shall consist of:

Chief Official

Competition Organiser

One additional person who may be one of the other officials provided that his function allows him to be near the finishing line at all times. This person is appointed by the Competition Organiser.

The Competition Committee must:

- 14.3.1 Organise and supervise the competition.
- 14.3.2 In the event of inclement weather or other unforeseen circumstances which make it impossible to carry out the competition, postpone the competition and decide on another time when it may be held.
- 14.3.3 Hear any protests that may be made and settle any disputes that may arise.
- 14.3.4 Decide matters concerning disqualification in cases where the regulations are broken during a race. Should a competitor be injured during a heat, the Committee may allow him to participate in another heat.
- 14.3.5 Make decisions based on the Racing Rules. Penalties in accordance with the B.C.U. Rules or the B.C.U. Racing Section Disciplinary Regulations may also be imposed i.e. disqualification for a longer period than the duration of the competition in question.
- 14.3.6 Before any decision is made regarding any infraction of the rules, hear the opinion of the Umpire who controlled the race in which the infraction was said to have occurred. The Committee shall also seek the opinion of other officials supervising the race, if it is felt to be of importance in clearing up the alleged infraction.
- 14.4 The Competition Jury: Final authority for National Championship Competitions shall rest with a Jury composed of a Chairman and four members.
- 14.4.1 The members of the Jury shall be appointed by a quorum of the Racing Committee prior to the commencement of the competition. (In the event of a quorum not being present, the Chairman, Vice Chairman, or another official of the Racing Committee and two Committee members may appoint the Jury).
- 14.4.2 The Chairman of the Jury will be the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Racing Committee or an elected Racing Committee member.
- 14.4.3 Subordinate to this Jury are the Chief Official and other officials shown in rule 14.1.
- 14.4.4 Protests shall be referred to the Chief Official for decision by the Competition Committee in accordance with Rule 24.
- 14.4.5 An appeal against a decision of the Competition Committee must be addressed to the Chairman of the Jury and handed in not later than 20 minutes after the Team Leader has been informed, in writing by the Chief Official, of the decision against the competitor

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or crew and has signed the receipt.

- 14.4.6 The decision of the Jury is final.

14.5 Duties of Officials

- 14.5.1 The Chief Official, who is also the Chairman of the Competition Committee, shall observe and supervise the races and decide on all matters arising during the actual contest which are not dealt with in these Rules. With the confirmation of the Competition Committee, he may disqualify any competitor who behaves improperly or who, by his conduct or speech, shows contempt towards the competition officials, other competitors or onlookers.
- 14.5.2 The Competition Organiser is responsible for organising the competition and producing the competition programme. He should chair the Team Leaders Meeting and is responsible for the smooth running of the competition and the general co-ordination of officials and competitors during the competition. When required to do so by the Competition Committee (or Jury in the case of National Championship Competitions) he shall, with the assistance of the measurer, ensure that regulations concerning measurements are complied with. He shall make certain that the announcer gives the onlookers all the necessary information about the races such as the starting order, the names of competitors failing to start and the result.
- 14.5.3 The Competition Secretary shall be responsible for recording the results of the races, arranging the draws for intermediate rounds and finals and distributing the results and draws to those Officials who require them.
- 14.5.4 The Starter decides all questions concerning the start of the races, and is alone responsible for decisions as to false starts. His decision is final. He shall see that the starting gun or pistol or other starting device is in good working order. By means of a signal, he shall communicate with the officials at the finish line and, after having received a signal from there that all is ready, he shall order the competitors to their places and carry out the start according to the Racing Rules.
- 14.5.5 The Aligner is to bring the boats to the starting line with the least possible delay, to check the competitors' attire and the competitors' number. When all boats are level he shall notify the starter by raising a white flag.
- 14.5.6 The Course Umpire shall see to it that during a race the rules are complied with. If the rules are broken, the Umpire shall report to the Chief Official, who in turn shall refer it to the Competition Committee. The Competition Committee shall decide whether any of the competitors concerned shall be disqualified or not. If the Umpire has a report of an infraction of the rules he shall show a red flag after the race and shall make a report before the next race takes place. In such a case, the Competition Committee make known its decision immediately and before the result of the race is announced. If there is no infraction to report, the Umpire shall show a white flag. In races of 500 and 1,000 metres, the Umpire shall follow the race in a motorboat. He shall be completely unhampered during the race. No one except the Umpire and the driver shall be admitted to the boat reserved for him. When a motorboat is not used, one or more Umpires shall be placed in such positions from which they can ensure that the rules are being complied with. In long distance races with many competitors, more than one Umpire may be nominated. One of the Umpires shall, if possible, follow the leading group in the race, but without disturbing the other competitors. In case of hindrances the Course Umpire must stop the competition passing all boats in the race and waving the red flag or using a sound signal until all boats have stopped paddling. After this all boats shall return to the start. The Course Umpire shall report immediately the infraction to the Competition Committee.
- 14.5.7 The Turning Point Umpires, when a race is run along a course with one or more turning points, one or more Umpires and one recorder must be stationed at each turning point, where they gain the best view of the turn. The Turning Point Umpire shall see that the competitors turn according to the rules. The recorder shall make a list of all who pass the turning point. Immediately after the race, the Turning Point Umpire shall report to the Competition Committee as to who has turned and if any infraction of the rules has taken place.
- 14.5.8 The Finishing Line Judges decide the order in which the competitors passed the finishing line. The Judges shall be placed at the finishing post. If the Judges differ regarding the placing of two or more of the competitors the dispute in the absence of photo finish, shall be decided by simple majority. In the case of equal voting, the Chief Judge has a casting vote. When the photo finish is used, the result determined by the Finish Line Judges shall be compared with it, with the photo finish being decisive.

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- 14.5.9 The Timekeepers are responsible for recording the times. This shall be done by means of stopwatches or suitable electronic equipment. It is the responsibility of the Chief Timekeeper to ensure that the timing equipment is working correctly. The Chief Timekeeper shall divide the work amongst the timekeepers. At the end of each race, he shall compare the official times with the other timekeepers and immediately inform the Competition Organiser (or Manager) of them. Each race shall be timed by at least two watches. When the watches have not recorded the same time, the longest (worst) time shall be taken as correct. The stopwatches are to be started when the electronic or optical signal from the start is received. Timekeepers may also officiate as Finish Line Judges.
- 14.5.10 The Announcer shall, on the instructions of the Competition Organiser, announce the start of each race, the order of the starting and the position of the competitors during the race. After the race is finished, he will announce the results.
- 14.5.11 The Media Officer must supply all the necessary information to the representatives of the press, radio and television about the race and its progress. He is authorised therefore to ask for information from the different Officials who must procure for him as soon as possible the copies from the official results.
15. **Invitations**
An invitation to an Open Regatta shall contain the following information:-
- 15.1 Time and place of the regatta.
 - 15.2 Situation and plan of the course.
 - 15.3 Classes and distance of the races.
 - 15.4 Whether the races are to be held on still or running water, up or down stream.
 - 15.5 Amount of entry fee.
 - 15.6 Address to which entries should be sent and the final date for receiving entries. This date shall not be earlier than 14 days prior to the first day of the competition.
16. **Entries**
Entries for open Regattas can only be made in accordance with the regulations given in the invitation. An entry shall, however, always contain the following information:-
- 16.1 Name and address of competitor or crew.
 - 16.2 Name of club to which competitor or crew belong.
 - 16.3 Classes and distances in which the competitor or crew propose to compete.
 - 16.4 Similar details of reserves if any.
 - 16.5 The Racing Registration number of each competitor, member of the crew or reserves. An entry may be sent by facsimile if it is dispatched before midnight on the last day for receiving entries. Entry by facsimile must be confirmed immediately by letter and in the eventuality of conflicting information; the information by letter would take precedence. Late entries shall not normally be accepted. The acceptance of late entries shall be at the discretion of the Competition Committee who may charge up to double the entry fee.
17. **Acceptance of Entries**
Confirmation that the entry has been accepted, together with notification of the result of the draw and time of events, shall be sent to the entrant on written request by him and on production by the entrant to the Competition Organiser of a "stamped addressed" envelope.
18. **Alterations to Entries and Withdrawals**
Any competitor named in the final entry or at the Team Leaders Meeting may substitute for any other in the given type of racing (kayak men, kayak ladies, canoe men). Notification of alterations in the entries must be given in written form to the Chief Official at least one hour before the first race of the morning or afternoon session. The withdrawal from a race is considered final and no renewed entry of the same crew is allowed. Every competitor whose entry has been confirmed by his own club, at the time of the meeting of the team leaders, called for this purpose, is obliged to take part in the due event. If the competitor does not start, and has no valid reason approved by the Competition Committee, he shall be disqualified for the whole competition. a competitor who arrives too late at the start, shall be considered to have voluntarily withdrawn and shall be disqualified from taking any further part in the event, under this rule.
The refunding of entry fees for entries withdrawn not less than 24 hours before the competition is at the discretion of the Competition Committee.

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19. Alterations in the sequence of events

The sequence of races given in the programme and the intervals between races as given in the racing programme are binding on the organisers. Alterations cannot be made unless the respective Team Managers at the competition give their consent.

20. Marking Signs

For National Championships and where possible for other competitions the turning points shall be marked by at least six flags (or buoys) which shall be readily distinguishable and shall, if possible be diagonally divided with one half in red and the other half in yellow. Both the start and the finishing lines shall be marked with red flags or buoys, at the points where these lines intersect the outer limits of the course.

21. Courses

Before the start of the races the racing course shall be measured and marked by means of clearly visible flags mounted on buoys. The course at the start shall permit a clear width where possible, of at least 5 metres for each boat. For National Championships the starting and finishing lines shall be at right angles to the course. The finishing line shall be at least 45 metres long and be marked by two flags. The Finishing Line Judges must be placed as near to the finishing line as possible. For National Championship races up to 1,000 metres, the course must be straight and in one direction. For races exceeding 1,000 metres turning points are permitted. In this case the following conditions should be fulfilled, (unless a special dispensation has been obtained from the Racing Committee).

21.1 For National Championships the following conditions should be fulfilled:-

21.1.1 The distance between the starting line and the first flag of the first turning point (first open stretch) shall be straight and at least 1,850.5 metres.

21.1.2 The distance between the last flag of the first turning point and the first flag of the second turning point (second stretch), shall be straight and maximum 1750.5 metres.

21.1.3 The distance between the last flag of the second turning point and the first flag of the third turning point (third stretch) shall be a minimum of 500 metres.

21.1.4 The conditions of all other stretches shall be in accordance with point c. (from the 4th to the 12th or more stretches)

21.1.5 The radius of each turn should, if possible be at least 40.5 metres.

21.1.6 Both the start and the finish of the race shall be in front of the finish tower.

21.1.7 The red flags of the finish line shall be placed as much to the outside possible in order to get the widest possible finish line.

21.1.8 The starting pontoons for the 500 metre races are to be removed if possible.

21.2 For competitions other than National Championships these conditions should be complied with, where possible, and the Racing Committee approval for the course sought through the Secretary.

22. Canoe Numbers

All kayaks and canoes shall carry a vertical number plate marked with black numbers on yellow ground indicating the lane. The plates shall be placed on the centre line of the after deck (Canadian Canoe foredeck). The approximate size of the number plate shall be 18 x 20 cm.

23. Instructions for Competitors

Written instructions shall be available for competitors 2 hours before the start of the competition, containing the following information:

23.1 Detailed information of the courses and course markings.

23.2 Starting time.

23.3 Starting line.

23.4 Finishing line

23.5 Competitors racing number.

24. Protests

A protest against the right of a crew to take part in a race shall be referred to the Chief Official not later than one hour before the start of the race.

24.1 A protest made later (within 31 days from the date when the race in question was held) is only permitted if the officials of the club of the competitor making the protest can prove that the facts on which the protest is based, came to their knowledge later than one hour before the start of the race.

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- 24.2 A late protest shall be referred to the B.C.U. Racing Committee accompanied by the prescribed fee (see below).
- 24.3 A protest made during a competition must be addressed to the Competition Committee and be handed to the Chief Official not later than 20 minutes after the Team Leader has been informed by the Chief Official of the protest against his competitor or team. All protests must be made in writing and be accompanied by a fee of £5.00 (International Competitions £15.00) which shall be returnable if the protest is upheld. If the protest is not upheld the fee may not be returned at the discretion of the Competition Committee.

Part IV - RACING REGULATIONS

25. Disqualifications

Any competitor who attempts to win a race by any other than honourable means, who breaks the Racing Regulations, or who disregards the honourable nature of the Racing Regulations, shall be disqualified for the duration of the race concerned. Should a competitor have completed a race in a kayak or canoe which is shown on inspection not to fulfil the classifications (see Rules 10-13), he shall be disqualified from the race in question. It is forbidden to receive during a race, outside help, or to be accompanied by other boats along the course - even outside the lanes - or by throwing objects into the course. All such acts shall entail the disqualification of the competitor(s) concerned. For National Championships, and where possible all other competitions, all disqualifications by the Competition Committee have to be confirmed in writing immediately with reasons. The Team Leader has to acknowledge the receipt on a copy with the exact time, which is the start of the protest time.

26. Means of Propulsion

Kayaks shall be propelled solely by means of double bladed paddles. Canadian Canoes shall be propelled solely by means of single bladed paddles. The paddles may not be fixed on the boat in any way. If a paddle is broken a competitor may not be provided with a new one by a supporter.

27. Heats and Finals

At least three kayaks or canoes must be entered before a race can be held. If the number of entries in race up to and including 1,000 metres is so great that heats are necessary, the number of kayaks or canoes in each heat and in the final must not exceed nine. The division of competitors into heats shall be determined by drawing lots.

- 27.1.1 Where the width of the course permits, eight or nine kayaks or canoes shall participate in the final, (if more than this number has been entered in the entire race) the recommended procedure is:-
3 to 9 entries direct final.
10 to 15 entries two heats and three from each to final, rest to 1 semifinal, with 3 through to the final.
16 to 27 entries 3 heats, 1-2 to final: 3-5 to semifinal, with 3 to the final
- 27.1.2 The division into heats must be made in such a way that at least three competitors proceed to the final (or intermediate heats) from each preceding heat.
- 27.2 When making the draw, the difference between the number of competitors in the heats of the race shall not exceed one.
- 27.3 If the number of competitors in the heats varies, the earlier heats shall have the largest numbers. Any crew which has not taken part in a heat as instructed shall not be allowed to compete in the final. The composition of a crew which has qualified for intermediate heats or for the final must not be changed.
- 27.4 Heats and the final shall be run on the same stretch of water. For races of more than 1,000 metres, heats shall not be held, and all canoes or kayaks taking part shall start simultaneously. The procedure for selecting competitors to race in finals will be on the basis of one of two criteria: either times or positions obtained in heats. The criterion used for each event will be decided by the B.C.U. Racing Committee and published in advance of the event.
- 27.5 Should the width of the water not permit a simultaneous start, starts at regular intervals shall be permitted.

28. Start

Lots shall be drawn to determine the stations of boats at the start. Lane One shall be on the left

THE RACING SECTION RULES

(when facing the finish), then lane two and so on. In competitions where heats are required, lots must be drawn for each heat separately (opening, intermediate, and final).

- 28.1 Competitors shall be at the start at the time specified in the racing programme. The start shall be given without reference to absentees.
- 28.2 The position of the boats at the start shall be such that the bows of the competing boats are on the starting line. Boats must be stationary.
- 28.3 The Starter will announce to the competitors the time remaining to the start by "START WITHIN TEN SECONDS", when he is satisfied he will give the starting signal by a shot or a short powerful sound.
- 28.4 In the long distance races the starter shall declare "START WITHIN ONE MINUTE" when he is satisfied he will give the starting signal by a shot or a short powerful sound.
- 28.5 The starting signal can also be the word "GO".
- 28.6 If the Starter is not satisfied with the line-up he will call "STOP", and hand over to the Aligner for repositioning.
- 28.7 If the competitor starts paddling ahead after the words "START WITHIN TEN SECONDS or ONE MINUTE", and before the starting signal has been given, he has made a false start.
- 28.8 The starter must immediately fire two shots and warn the offending competitor/s. If two false starts are made by the same competitor/s the starter must exclude him/them from the race. A warning and subsequent disqualification by the starter applies only to the boat/competitor which/who caused the false start.

29. Interruptions

The Umpire has the right to interrupt a correctly started race if unforeseen hindrances arise. Such an interruption may be effected by the course umpires with a red flag and sound signal. The competitors must immediately stop paddling and await further instructions. If a race is declared null and void, no change of the composition of a crew is permitted at the new start. In the event of a capsize the competitor or crew is eliminated from the race if he or they are not able to get in again without outside help.

30. Taking Pace and Hanging

Taking pace or receiving assistance from boats not in the race or by any other means is not permitted. When a race is in progress crews not taking part in the race are strictly forbidden to proceed over whole or part of the course, even outside the marking buoys.

- 30.1 Races up to 1,000 metres. In races up to 1,000 metres competitors must keep to their lane from the start to the finish of the course. They shall keep as far as possible the centre of their lane. No competitor must come nearer than five metres in any direction to another competitor.
- 30.2 Races of more than 1,000 metres. In races over distances of more than 1,000 metres competitors may deviate from their lane providing they do not impede other competitors.

31. Turns

When a race is run on a course with turning points these shall be passed to port (i.e. in an anti clockwise direction). When going around a turning point, the competitor on the outer course must leave room for the competitor on the inner course if that competitor has the bow of his boat at least level with the front edge of the cockpit of the boat on the outer course. With respect to K2 and K4, this refers to the fore-cockpit. With respect to C1, it refers to the level of the competitor's body, and for C2 it refers to the level of the body of the foremost member of the crew. A competitor will not be disqualified for touching a turning buoy, unless, in the opinion of the Turning Point Umpires, an advantage has been gained therefrom. In making a turn, the boat shall follow as closely as possible the course as marked by the buoys at the turning point.

32. Overtaking

When a canoe or kayak is overtaking another canoe or kayak in a race, it is the duty of the overtaking craft to keep clear at all times of the boat being overtaken. On the other hand, the craft being overtaken must not alter its course to make difficulties for the overtaking craft.

33. Collision or Damage

Any competitor who collides with another, or who damages the craft or paddle of another can be disqualified and can be required to pay damages.

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34. Finish

The finishing line is reached when the bow of the canoe or kayak with the competitor/s in it passes the line between the red flags. If two or more boats reach the finishing line at the same time they get the same classification in the final. In the case of a dead heat finish for any position which determines the advance to the next level of the competition the following rules will apply:

- 34.1 Wherever there are sufficient number of lanes available in the next level of the competition, drawing of lots will determine to which race each boat will advance. If possible it may also use lane number 10.
- 34.2 Wherever there are not enough lanes available there will be a re-race between the boats involved 30 minutes after the race (and for International Competitions one hour after the last race of the day, or half day programme)
- 34.3 In the case of a dead heat in the re-race, drawing of lots will determine the outcome.

35. Racing Colours

Every racing club must register their racing colours with the Racing Committee (and any changes thereto). All competitors from a club must wear the correct colours at all times.

Part V - SPECIAL RULES FOR NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP EVENTS

- 36. Only members of the B.C.U. who qualify under Rule 9 may participate in National Championship events. The only exceptions to this rule are those exempted under Rule 5.
- 37. All canoes and kayaks must comply with the classes and building rules as laid down in Part II of these rules.
- 38. Officials: Fully in accordance with Rules 14.1 and 14.3.
- 39. Competition Committee: Fully in accordance with Rule 14.3.
- 40. Competition Jury: Fully in accordance with Rule 14.4.
- 41. Marking signs: In accordance with Rule 20.
- 42. Courses: In accordance with rule 21.
- 43. Disqualifications: In accordance with Rule 25.
- 44. Heats and Finals:
In the event of there being fewer than three boats in a National Championship event then no medals will be awarded. If three boats are in an event then only a Gold Medal will be awarded. If four boats are in an event then only Gold and Silver Medals will be awarded. If five or more boats are in an event then Gold, Silver & Bronze medals will be awarded.
- 45.1 These regulations may be applied without alteration to any Specialist Section of the B.C.U. by means of a resolution passed by a general meeting of the Section Specialist Committee. The Racing Section adopted this code of practice at a Special General Meeting in April 1989.

Part VI - DISCIPLINARY REGULATIONS

45.2 General procedure

- 45.2.1A complaint that an individual member of the Union has behaved in a manner that is, or is likely to be, prejudicial to the conduct of a Section event or of a Section training facility, or to the interests of the Section, or to the general interests of canoeing, may be lodged by means of a statement of complaint signed as provided below and setting out the facts on which this complaint is grounded.
- 45.2.2A complaint by an affiliated club or by a committee organising an event or training facility shall be signed by two members of the club or organising committee who are B.C.U. members, one of whom must be the chairman or secretary of the club or committee.

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- 45.2.3A complaint by any other person shall be signed by the person concerned and state that person's address.
- 45.3 The complaint shall be sent to the chairman or secretary of the Specialist Executive Committee, who shall take immediate steps to convene the Executive Committee within 30 days to consider the complaint and any rebutting or mitigating statement furnished by the alleged offender.
- 45.4 The Section Executive Committee shall ensure that a copy of the complaint is or has been handed personally to the individual member to whom it relates, or has been sent by recorded delivery post to that member, together with an invitation to furnish in writing within 21 days any rebutting facts or mitigating explanation or submission and a notification of the date when the Section Executive will meet to consider them. At the same time the member shall be asked whether he wishes to be present, in which case he may be asked questions, when the complaint is being considered, and informed that if no reply is received within a period of 21 days the section Executive will consider the complaint in his absence on the basis of the facts and statements in their possession. The Section Executive may invite the complainant to comment on the member's reply, and shall supply a copy of any such comments to the member before the meeting.
- 45.5 At the meeting the Section Executive Committee shall consider the complaint and any statement made in writing or orally by the member concerned. If the member has asked to be present at the meeting he must have been invited to attend. The Section Executive Committee may question either party, if present, or call on them to supply additional evidence. If the section Executive Committee has not completed its consideration of the complaint within 30 days from the date of the meeting referred to in Regulation 45.3 above) it shall be taken to have rejected it, but the complainant may in that event address a complaint to the B.C.U. Council for consideration under Article 8 of the Articles of Association of the British Canoe Union.
- 45.6 On completing consideration the Section Executive Committee shall draw up its findings of fact, and may decide:
- 45.6.1 To reject the complaint.
- 45.6.2 To warn or reprimand the individual member concerned.
- 45.6.3 To suspend the individual member from participating in specified section events or training facilities either -
- 45.6.3.1 For a period not exceeding 3 months, starting at least 10 days after notification of the decision to the member, or
- 45.6.3.2 For a specified number of such events or facilities, not exceeding five in number, consecutively where all that number would not have taken place within the period specified in 45.6.3.1 above.
- 45.6.4 To recommend to the B.C.U. Council that a suspension should be for a longer period, or that the member should be suspended from all B.C.U. membership rights, or expelled from the Union, or that some other specified penalty should be imposed by the Council.
- Where the complaint was originally lodged by the Section Executive Committee itself, it shall not impose a penalty under 6.3.1 or 6.3.2 above, but may recommend that the penalty be imposed by Council.
- 45.7 The Section Executive Committee shall notify the member by recorded deliver post of its findings of fact and of its decision or recommendation and shall inform him of his right of appeal under regulation 8 below, where applicable, and shall send a copy of the notification to the B.C.U. Council.
- 45.8 In the case of a decision falling under regulation 6.3 or 6.4 or involving a recommendation under regulation 6.2, the individual member concerned may appeal to the B.C.U. Council within 10 days of the date of notification, setting out the grounds for appeal in writing: where an appeal is made the penalty shall be treated as in abeyance pending consideration of the appeal by Council
- 45.9 The B.C.U. Council shall consider, within 30 days of being notified of the complaint, the Section Executive Committee's findings and decision and give the member an opportunity within a specified time to make orally any further explanation or defence that he desires to submit.
- 45.10 The B.C.U. Council's functions under regulation 9 may be performed by a standing Committee appointed for the purpose under Article 42 of the Articles of Association of the B.C.U.
- 45.11 **Immediate Discipline**
- Organisers of events or training facilities in the Section's programme may, without prejudice to the making of complaints under Regulations 45.2-45.10 above, summarily exclude or disqualify members or competitors for violent or very unreasonable behaviour from the event or session concerned or from subsequent events or facilities held at the same site within 2 months of the offence.
- 45.12 **Code of Ethics**
- Everyone within the BCU Sprint Racing Section is subject to the conditions and ethics as given in Section 5 of the BCU 'Coaching Code' published by the BCU UK Coaching Service, and are required to operate under the same general Sport and Recreation Code of Ethics.
- 45.13 **Regatta Officials**
- 45.13.1 It is vital for the honourable nature of the Sport that Officials are not subjected to any act that may compromise their position.

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- 45.13.2 Regatta Officials must not be threatened or subjected to harassment, intimidation or abuse. No attempt should be made to persuade Regatta Officials to take an action which is dishonest or contrary to the Official's code of ethics or honourable nature of the Racing Regulations. This applies at anytime, in or out of competition. It is incumbent on each Official to report all such acts.
- 45.13.3 The report should be in writing and sent without delay to the Racing Committee (through the Section Secretary) who will consider the matter in accordance with the Section's Disciplinary Regulations.
- 45.13.4 In the event of an action taken immediately prior to or during a BCU Regatta, the Official should hand their written report to the Chief Official. The Chief Official with the Regatta Committee must take action in accordance with the Section's Disciplinary Regulations.

Notes to the Racing Regulations.

Interpretation of Rule 30.1 - Races up to 1000 metres (including the 5 metre rule)

The rule requires competitors to keep to their lane from the start to the finish of the course and for their boat not to come nearer than five metres in any direction to another boat. Rule 42.1 in the Rules for World Championships requires the lanes along the length of the course to be marked by buoys not more than 25 metres apart.

This means that the competitor may progress along the course in any part of their lane provided that their boat does not come within five metres of another boat. Their boat must pass between all the buoys that mark their lane along the length of the course.

For a boat to momentarily deviate out of the line marked by the buoys but still pass between all the buoys is not an infraction provided that the boat does not come within five metres of another boat. However, it is reportable and a red flag must be shown at the end of the race with a written report in the normal way.

The rule also says, "They shall keep as far as possible the centre of their lane." The wording appears to conflict with the first part of the rule - "Keep their lane." However, it is not intended to. Competitors are not permitted to race down the side of their lane following the line of buoys that mark the lane. They must follow a line as close to the centre of the lane as they find they are able to do. If a competitor should race very close to the buoy line for 100 metres or more, that is an infraction.

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RACING SECTION DOPING CONTROL RULES

B.C.U. Sports Management Committee June 1995

46 Definitions

- 46.0.1 'Prohibited Drugs' means drugs and other substances that may be taken for the purpose of enhancing performance in sport or that are included in lists published from time to time by the International Olympic Association and/or the International Canoe Federation (I.C.F.) as being prohibited drugs and substances.
- 46.0.2 'Doping' means the use by or distribution to an athlete of a prohibited drug
- 46.0.3 'Designated sampling officer' means a person designated by the British Canoe Union (B.C.U.) or a National Canoeing Association or an independent sampling officer appointed by the Sports Council or the International Canoe Federation (I.C.F.) for the purpose of collecting samples of a body fluid from athletes in the course of training or competing for testing for the presence of a prohibited drug.

46.1 Prohibition of Doping

- 46.1.1 Doping is prohibited.

46.2 Submission to Tests

- 46.2.1 Any athlete shall, if requested by a designated sampling officer, submit to a doping control test.
- 46.2.2 Every athlete invited on to a B.C.U. national team or squad shall be required to sign a declaration in the form required before being allowed to participate in the said team or squad. See Appendix 1.
- 46.2.3 Any refusal or failure to submit to a doping control test when required to do so shall be treated as prima facie evidence of a contravention of rule 1.1 and shall be reported to the B.C.U. Drugs Advisory Committee, who shall institute disciplinary procedures as if the test had been carried out and a positive result found.
- 46.2.4 The athlete concerned shall immediately be suspended from all B.C.U. or I.C.F. competitive events pending a decision under the disciplinary procedures.
- 46.2.5 The identification of a prohibited drug or one of its metabolites or the presence of specified amounts of endogenous substances subject to quantitative analysis in a body fluid shall be prima facie evidence of a contravention of rule 1.1 and disciplinary procedures will be instituted.
- 46.2.6 Any person assisting or inciting others in the contravention of any provision of these Rules shall be presumed to have committed an offence against these Rules and may be subject to disciplinary action.

46.3 Sampling procedures

- 46.3.1 Samples may be taken at any international or domestic competitive or squad training event for the management of which the B.C.U. or the I.C.F. is responsible or on other occasions as determined by the Sports Management Committee or Specialist Committee concerned. (Committees to minute a requirement for out of competition testing)
- 46.3.2 The competitor shall provide a minimum of 100 ml. of urine under the direct observation of the sampling officer. The sample shall be divided (either by the competitor - or if requested by the sampling officer) into two parts. The first, the 'A' sample shall be approximately 2/3 of the total volume and the second part shall be 1/3 of the total volume.
- 46.3.3 Both 'A' and 'B' samples shall be submitted to an I.O.C. accredited laboratory. The 'A' sample will be analysed for the presence of substances of the I.O.C. Doping Classes and Methods. The 'B' sample will be securely stored by the laboratory pending the results of the 'A' sample analysis. If the 'A' sample report is negative, the 'B' sample will be destroyed. However, if the 'A' sample is found to contain a substance of the IOC Doping Classes or Methods the 'B' sample shall be retained.

46.4 Procedures following the testing

- 46.4.1 If the result of the test is positive the athlete concerned shall be notified immediately by the B.C.U. and shall be suspended from all B.C.U. competition pending an investigation by the B.C.U. Drugs Advisory Committee.
- 46.4.2 The reserve sample shall be tested by the Drugs Testing Unit, normally within 7 days of the notification to the athlete concerned of the result of the first test. The athlete or his or her nominee shall be offered the opportunity to attend the testing laboratory on the date when the reserve sample is to be tested by the Drugs Testing Unit.
- 46.4.3 If the result of the test of the reserve sample is negative, the athlete concerned shall be notified accordingly and the suspension lifted and no further action shall be taken.
- 46.4.4 If the result of the testing of the reserve sample is positive the test result shall be taken as

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conclusive and the athlete concerned shall be informed immediately of this result.

- 46.4.5 The B.C.U. Drugs Advisory Committee shall investigate the circumstances at a meeting to be held within 28 days of the notification to the athlete concerned and he/she shall be invited to attend the meeting, or be represented, and give an explanation of the circumstances. The athlete shall be informed that he or she may submit a written explanation prior to the meeting instead of or as well as attending in person.
- 46.4.6 The B.C.U. Drugs Advisory Committee shall consider the circumstances in the light of the explanation and any advice available from the Drugs Testing Unit as to the interpretation of the results and shall then decide whether a penalty should be imposed, and if so that penalty, and shall report its decision immediately to the B.C.U., stating the reasons for the conclusions it reached in the course of considering the circumstances and any explanation given by the athlete.
- 46.4.7 Where an athlete has refused or failed to attend to submit to a doping control test as requested under Rule 2.1 the B.C.U. Drugs Advisory Committee shall invite him or her to provide an explanation and shall proceed to consider the circumstances as if the results of the test had proved positive.
- 46.5 Penalties**
- The B.C.U. Drugs Advisory Committee may:
- 46.5.1 Decide to warn or reprimand the athlete or
- 46.5.2 Impose a period of suspension from any or all B.C.U. competitive event for a stipulated period or
- 46.5.3 Impose a period of suspension from any or all B.C.U. competitive events up to and including a specified major championships or
- 46.5.4 Impose a life-time ban on participation in any or all B.C.U. competitive events or
- 46.5.5 In addition to or instead of any of the above penalties recommend to the B.C.U. Council of Management that the athlete should be suspended or expelled from B.C.U. Membership.
- 46.6 Subsequent procedures**
- 46.6.1 The Chief Executive of the B.C.U.(or an officer delegated by him) shall, within 7 days of being notified by the Drugs Advisory Committee of its decision and conclusions, notify to the athlete the decision and conclusions of the B.C.U. Drugs Advisory Committee and the date when any penalty imposed or recommended under Rule 5.2, 3,4 or 5 will become operative and that he or she has a right of appeal against the decision within 14 days to the B.C.U. Council by sending to the Chief Executive of the B.C.U. a written statement setting out the grounds of the appeal. The B.C.U. Council or Standing Committee appointed by Council under Rule 6.3 shall meet within 30 days of receipt of the appeal. Where an appeal is made any penalty imposed shall be treated as in abeyance pending consideration of the appeal by the B.C.U. Council.
- 46.6.2 The decision of the B.C.U. Council shall be final, and shall be notified to the Sports Council and the I.C.F., and the name of the offender and the penalty imposed may be published.
- 46.6.3 The B.C.U. Council's function under Rules 6.2 and 6.3 may be performed by a standing committee appointed for the purpose under Article 42 of the B.C.U. Articles of Association.
- 46.7 Application to members of Canoe Association of Northern Ireland, the Scottish Canoe Association, or the Welsh Canoeing Association, or other governing body of sport recognised by the Sports Council and/or the Central Council of Physical Recreation and/or I.C.F.**
- 46.7.1 Where the athlete is a member of the Canoe Association of Northern Ireland, the Scottish Canoe Association, the Welsh Canoe Association or governing body of sport as defined above, the outcome shall be reported to that Association or governing body of sport with a view to their applying a comparable penalty to competitive events for which they are the governing body.
- 46.8 Application of a decision under the Drugs Control Rules of C.A.N.I., S.C.A., or W.C.A., or other governing bodies of sport recognised by the Sports Council and/or the Central Council of Physical Recreation and/or the I.C.F.**
- 46.8.1 Where the B.C.U. is notified by the Canoe Association of Northern Ireland, the Scottish Canoe Association or the Welsh Canoeing Association or other governing body of sport as defined above of the outcome of comparable disciplinary proceedings against a B.C.U. member, a comparable penalty shall apply to B.C.U. competitive events.
- 46.8.3 Any athlete who is suspended or banned from competition by any governing body of sport or who has been suspended or expelled from that organisation for offences against the rules for the control of doping within that sport shall not be eligible for participation in competitive events held under the jurisdiction of the B.C.U.

APPENDIX 1 - SENIOR PADDLERS

Each Training Squad Manager is asked to ensure that every SENIOR paddler invited onto a national squad signs the following declaration:

Agreement By Competitor

I, _____ Agree not to use any of the substances on the list of prohibited drugs prepared by the International Olympic Committee (the I.O.C. prohibited drug list) and the International Canoe Federation and hereby agree that notwithstanding my selection for the British Canoe Union Team, I may be excluded from competition by the British Canoe Union or suffer such other penalty as permitted under the Doping Control Rules if I fail to comply with one or more of the following conditions:

- 1 To supply the B.C.U. and/or the I.C.F. and/or the Sports Council or other body as be designated under the Doping Control Rules contained in the Yearbook for each discipline of Canoeing upon request with full information concerning medications and medical treatments which have been prescribed for me or which I have undergone.
- 2 To submit to such medical control and examination as may from time to time be required by the B.C.U. and/or I.C.F. Medical Commission and/or Sports Council etc.
- 3 To abstain from the use of any and all drugs included in the I.O.C. prohibited drug list together with chemically and pharmacologically related compounds.
- 4 To abstain from the practice known as 'blood doping'.

APPENDIX 2 - JUNIOR PADDLERS

Each Training Squad Manager is to be asked to ensure that the parent or guardian of every junior paddler invited onto a national squad signs the following declaration:

Dear Parent/Guardian

Your son/daughter (name) _____ is being considered for selection to represent

In order to be able to participate, he/she must be prepared to submit himself/herself, if selected, to Doping Control Procedures. This involves providing a sample of urine under observation by a trained sampling officer, in accordance with the B.C.U.'s rules for the Control of Doping, which are contained in the Yearbook, or can be forwarded upon request to the B.C.U. office.

Your agreement is required for your son/daughter's participation in Doping Control Procedures. Failure to give this agreement will mean that your son/daughter will not be eligible for selection.

RACING SECTION DOPING CONTROL RULES

Do you use a Ventolin Inhaler?

If you have been prescribed a Ventolin Inhaler, and compete at a level which might make you subject to a doping test, you are invited to register the fact with the B.C.U.'s Medical Officer.

Ventolin inhalers involve a drug called Salbutomal which is a banned substance under the International Olympic Committee's rules. It has been agreed, however, that users of inhalers, who register the fact with their governing body, will not be subject to the normal disciplinary procedures which follow the identification of a banned substance, if the amount detected is consistent with the declared use of a Ventolin inhaler.

Please send to the B.C.U. office for a registration form for completion by your general practitioner. Upon its return to the B.C.U. office, receipt will be acknowledged and the team doctor of your discipline will be informed. Should you be subject to a doping test the fact that your use on an inhaler has been declared should be made known to the officials concerned.

Banned Substances

The list of permitted and prohibited drugs is constantly changing. Members of national squads should receive a card giving some basic advice. On no account should a member of a national squad take a new medication without first checking that it is not on the banned list.

Some medications on the banned list will be allowed if the athlete has registered them with the B.C.U.'s Medical Officer. This particularly applies to Ventolin inhalers.

Athletes and coaches requiring further advice on medication should ring the Sports Council Advice Line.

RACING AWARDS AND COACHING

THE PLACID WATER PROGRESSION

The Placid Water Progression was set up as a coaching scheme to develop marathon racing, sprint racing and fast touring.

Outlined below are the current *skill, racing and coaching awards* designed to support a progressive coaching & paddling scheme for clubs based on placid water using open cockpit canoes and kayaks.

Skill Development Awards for paddlers

The Placid Water Star tests provide four progressive levels of award for canoe and kayak. They can be used either as a basis to encourage skill development for paddlers or as an indicator of the appropriate level of skill for aspirant coaches in the instructional coaching awards.

Details of the complete syllabus is contained in a free leaflet "Placid Water Star Tests for Kayak and Canoe" (ref: CT011/00/1) available from BCU Office.

Racing Awards for Paddlers

The Racing tests are designed to encourage paddlers to improve performance and recognise their progress in racing kayak and canoe. The Sprint Awards also provide a useful guide to indicate the class or division to which paddlers should enter into sprint and marathon racing.

The awards can be examined by any BCU Coach (Level 1 – 5) or Club Official & can be taken in any kayak or canoe.

There are three types of Racing Award:

1. The Sprint (500M) Awards

In each case the paddler must equal or beat the times below to achieve the standard.

To promote fair racing and as a guide for coaches, team leaders and paddlers, the following standards, based on the "Sprint (500m) Awards", are suggested as the entry levels into Divisional Marathons and Sprint Regattas held at the National Watersports Centre, Holme Pierrepont, Nottingham.

Coaching Awards

The Placid Water coaching awards split into two closely linked coaching progressions; instructional coaching and competition coaching.

The instructional awards are geared to support those coaches introducing instructing, leading and organising a Placid Water Club or Centre. The syllabus requires the coach to have personal paddling skills as well as coaching skills – where the coach would normally instruct from a canoe or kayak.

The competition awards are intended to support those people who wish to help paddlers improve their performance in Sprint and Marathon racing (it does not require the coach to have any personal paddling skills).

The suggested entry point into coaching for new coaches is as a Level 1 "instructional" coach (Bell Boat helm or Level 1 Placid Water Coach). It is possible for non-paddlers to enter directly into the Level 2 Racing Coach, but it is hoped that they will follow up the course with a Level 1 Placid Water Coach Award in due course.

BCU Coach Update (revalidation)

In 1999 the BCU National Coaching Committee introduced a programme of revalidation for all BCU Qualified Coaches. The BCU programme is set up to provide:

- I. A system to enable long term training support for coaches
- II. A means to share good practice
- III. Improved BCU Coaching Service contact and communication with coaches

The original drive to establish the revalidation programme was external pressure from Sport England to set up a coach licensing scheme for sports coaches and a desire to improve the quality of coaches.

“Coach Update” now involves all BCU coaches – competition and recreation.

Originally called revalidation, Coach Update requires coaches to put in a minimum of 6 hours of training during in any 3-year period. There are four ways for coaches to become updated:

- a) Attending a BCU Regional or Local Coach Update Forum
- b) Participating in a BCU Coaching Awards Course
- c) Completing a “Continuous Coach Development Record” and sending it in to BCU Head Office (for your copy see CoDe No. 102, December 2001)

- d) Completing the above form online, via the BCU Website
www.bcu.org.uk/coaching

The first 3-year period for Competition Coaches started in September 2000. Therefore **September 2003** is the first deadline for competition coaches to update by.

New for 2002

All coaches are now required to hold a current first Aid Certificate to maintain their BCU Coaching Award. The level of First Aid Training is as follows:

4 hour Certified Course:

Bell Boat Helm, Placid Water Level 1 & 2 Coach, Level 2 Racing Coach.

8 hour Certified Course:

All Level 3, 4 & 5 Coaches (Placid Water or Racing)

There will be a period of grace through until September 2002 for existing coaches to get the appropriate level of First Aid Certification. Most First Aid awards have a 3-year lifespan. It is the responsibility of each coach to make sure the BCU Coaching Service is sent a photocopy of his or her new certificate when the qualification is renewed.

INTERNATIONAL MARATHONS

SELECTION POLICY FOR GREAT BRITAIN REPRESENTATIVE TEAMS

Objectives

- 1 To win medals at World, European Championships, and World Cup events.
- 2 To maintain a position as a top nation in international competition.
- 3 To ensure the long-term athlete development required for international success.

This policy may be amended or supplemented by the BCU Marathon Racing Committee at its discretion in order to achieve the above objectives to cover exceptional circumstances. Every effort will be made to ensure as much notice as possible is given to all persons affected by any change.

Process of Selection

- 1 Each year, the ICF publish an International Calendar from which a programme of International Events to be attended is selected. Due regard being given to the Objectives and to budgets. Some events may be designated "Development". The programme is specified in the Year Book.
- 2 The basic team composition for each event will be detailed in the Year Book. Changes may be necessary to suit all the factors affecting team size and budgets.
- 3 The selection of teams for **all** internationals will be made on a **continuous assessment, open to all** basis. The composition of the team for each event will depend entirely on paddlers being and proving that they are of sufficiently high standard.

(The system of **continuous assessment** as opposed to a system of 'first past the post' at a nominated selection event has been in operation for several years and has operated very well. It allows the selectors to consider an athlete who has under performed in any one race. This could be due to illness or equipment failure. It also means that consideration can be given to improving athletes who may not be winning but show potential for the future.)

- 4 Teams will be selected from results at the Assessment races, as detailed in the Year Book, while accepting that there can be many variations of circumstances to affect performance. In marginal cases, previous competition results may be taken into consideration.
- 5 All Senior and Junior Kayak Men should race in the Assessment classes, and Senior and Junior Women, and Canoes, in Division 3 unless otherwise instructed.
- 6 Athletes wishing to be considered for International Events must comply with the following conditions.

- 6.1 They must be Comprehensive BCU members, throughout the year.

MARATHON SECTION

- 6.2 Having due regard to their availability for selection and their preferred programme, they should apply to the Team Manager, by completing fully, the Application Form and returning it by the dates specified in the Year Book.
- 6.3 They should be prepared to meet all assembly costs and pay a contribution towards food, as detailed in the Year Book.
- 6.4 They should be prepared to travel and be accommodated in the best interest of the team.
- 6.5 They must be prepared to accept the Team Coach's direction with regard to training and racing while abroad.
- 6.6 They must be prepared to dress and conduct themselves in a manner befitting a British Team representative, and promote the good name of British canoeing both at home and abroad.
- 6.7 They should be prepared to give support to Sport UK, Sport England and the Lottery in promotional aspects, in return for the Grant Aid received.
- 6.8 They should wear the GB tracksuit and team clothing provided, on all suitable occasions.
- 6.9 They should compete in the appropriate Assessment events, and make themselves available for at least one World Cup event if they wish to be considered for the World Championship.

PERFORMANCES IN ASSESSMENT EVENTS AND INTERNATIONAL EVENTS WILL HAVE A STRONG BEARING ON ALL TEAM SELECTIONS.

- 7 The principles guiding the Selection Committee will be as follows:

The best team available to represent Great Britain selected with regard to -

- Winning medals at World & European Championships and World Cup events.
- Gaining National Team points.
- Enhancing experience and development potential consummate with the level of the Competition.
- Available budget for an event that supports the overall Marathon programme.

- 8 The Selection Committee shall consist of the following:

The BCU Marathon Racing Committee selectors comprising -

- Chairman BCU Marathon Racing Committee, who will Chair all selection meetings
- Marathon Team Manager
- Up to 4 additional members nominated by the BCU MRC
- The BCU Performance Director
- The BCU Flat Water National Performance Manager

Selectors are required to make every effort to attend all Domestic Assessment events, to ensure that a true and accurate assessment of current abilities can be made.

MARATHON SECTION

2002 INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMME

At the time of going to press, the overall funding for our programme from the Lottery, has not been finally resolved. It is clear however that the money will be supplied from different sources, which will mean tight restrictions on its use. It is the Committee's intention to provide as full a programme as possible for 2002, within the restraints. The World Championships for Seniors and Juniors will be in the Czech Republic. The 2 World Cup events are in Sweden and Denmark.

The main events for the year, for both Seniors and Juniors, are therefore: -

World Cup 1	Kungälv (Gothenberg), Sweden	June 15/16
World Cup 2	Maribo, Denmark	July 13/14
World Championships (WC3)	Tyn nad Vltavou, Czech Republic	August 17/18

The World Cup Trophy will be awarded for the best total results from the two events. Each country can enter 3 crews, (2 at World Championships) in each class, with only the first finisher to count. In the Junior World Cups there are classes for Men K2, K1, C1 and Women K1& K2

In addition to the 3 main events, we plan to send small teams to Crestuma, Pontrevedra K4 and a development team to local European competitions depending on the assistance we receive from the Organisers. We will also support other events, where the Organisers provide total finance.

MARATHON SQUAD

The BCU Performance Department, in consultation with the Marathon Committee and within the constraints imposed by the Lottery Panel, has nominated potential team members to form a National Marathon Squad. They are recognised in the Performance Potential & Start Plans. MARATHON RACING

PART A. - CONSTITUTION AND ADMINISTRATION

1. The Marathon Racing Section of the BCU interests itself in all matters arising out of Marathon Racing in Great Britain.
Its aims are as follows :-
 - (a) To encourage Club, Regional, National and International Marathon Events.
 - (b) To draft rules and make recommendations for the conduct of National and Regional marathons.
 - (c) To give advice, guidance, and encouragement to sponsors of Marathon racing in Great Britain.
 - (d) To select, train and administer teams representing Great Britain in International events.
 - (e) To select, train and administer teams representing England in International events.
 - (f) To confirm and record cross channel canoe and kayak record attempts.
 - (g) To foster the development of suitable craft and equipment for Marathon Racing.
 - (h) To act as final authority in disputes and protests.
2. Annual General Meetings shall consist of a Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, National Racing Coach and other such officials as the Annual General Meeting consider it necessary to elect, together with the representatives appointed by the clubs and organisations. Each canoe club affiliated to the BCU, and having five full members of the BCU, may appoint two representatives to attend the Marathon Racing Annual Meetings. Under current arrangements the Race Records Officer has a clerical function only and is not an elected member of the Executive Committee.
3. Each club or organisation affiliated to the BCU and represented at an AGM will be entitled to one vote. The Chairman will not be entitled to vote, except in the case where a casting vote is required. A quorum shall consist of six represented clubs.
4. The AGM or Executive Committee may co-opt additional members as they think fit in the interests of the sport, but co-opted members will not be entitled to vote. The AGM or Executive Committee may co-opt members or persons who are full time employees of the Union or who have a commercial interest in canoeing only with the permission of Council.
5. At least one meeting will be held during the year in addition to the AGM. Where clubs wish to raise alterations or additions to the 'Rules for Competition' at this half year meeting, the proposal must be forwarded to the secretary in writing and be correctly proposed and seconded by two individual members by 12th June. Proposals and matters for discussion shall be promulgated to clubs at least two weeks prior to the meeting. Any additions or alterations to the 'Rules for Competition' agreed by the meeting will come into force on 1st September following the meeting.
6. Where clubs wish to raise matters of policy or alteration of existing rules at the AGM, the proposal must be forwarded to the secretary in writing and be correctly proposed and seconded by two full individual BCU members by 12th October. Proposals and matters for discussion shall be promulgated to clubs at least two weeks prior to the meeting.
7. The AGM shall elect an Executive Committee, consisting of officers and other members up to a total of 12, for the purpose of day to day administration. The quorum of the Executive Committee shall be four voting members. The Executive shall be responsible to the AGM.
8. The officers and members of the Executive Committee shall serve for two years and shall be eligible for re-election, half retiring one year and the other half the following year. Nominations for election shall be in writing supported by the signatures of two full BCU Members and must reach the Secretary before October 12th prior to the meeting at which the annual election takes place. If more than one nomination is received for a post, the AGM will elect by ballot. If no nomination is received for a post the previous officer will be automatically re-elected provided they are willing to stand.
9. Marathon racing funds shall be administered by the Executive Committee.
10. The Executive Committee shall approve the list of trophies which are the property of the committee and are awarded each year. The executive will also determine and publish the basis for competition for these trophies.

MARATHON RACING

11. Each Year the Executive Committee shall organise or nominate a Championship Marathon event
 - a) The course must be typical of present courses.
 - b) The winners of the classes shall be considered the National Marathon Racing Champions in their respective classes.
 - c) Clubs wishing to stage the National Marathon Racing Championships should apply to the marathon Executive (by the end of May two years preceding the Championships). The venue for the following year shall be announced at the half year meeting.
 - d) The Marathon Executive shall appoint a Chief Official from outside the organising club to oversee the running of the National Championships. He/she will be the liaison between the marathon Executive and the organising club, and will be empowered to approve such things as courses, entry fees, distance and the difficulty of courses, start times etc.
 - e) The organising club will provide a set of accounts of the event to the Marathon Committee by the end of December.
 - f) Sponsorship deals for the event shall be approved by the Marathon Committee.
 - g) The event shall be called the British National Open Marathon Racing Individual and Team Championship.
12. The treasurer shall keep such books of account as the executive shall instruct, and produce annual accounts for approval.

PART B - RULES FOR COMPETITION

General Rules Applying to All Races

1. DEFINITION

A marathon race can be raced over any distance. Usually between 3km and 200km.

2. BEHAVIOUR

- a) Canoeing is a non contact sport and competitors shall race in a fair manner.
- b) All paddlers will wear appropriate clothing when racing. This is a minimum of singlet and shorts. These should preferably be in club racing colours.

3. THE RACING STRUCTURE

The marathon racing system has been designed to encourage all levels of competitor from the raw beginner to top class internationals. There are five categories of race: -

GROUP A

These races will appear in the Canoe Racing Handbook calendar. For these races the race levy must be paid and competitors need to be BCU, WCA, SCA or CANI comprehensive members.

- a) Divisional races approved by the Executive Committee.
Promotions between divisions will take place based on the results of these races.
- b) Races and time trials approved by the Executive Committee but not in the divisional system such as stage marathons, descents, Royal K1, Richmond K2, Thameside etc.
- c) The National Championships.

GROUP B

- d) Those races in the regions and clubs not appearing in the calendar. These will include handicap and fun marathons and junior *Lightning* races [see index for *Lightning* event guidance notes]. No promotions will take place at these races.

Clubs are encouraged to hold handicap races throughout the year as an introduction to competing in the divisional system. These should be over a 3-10km course with handicaps based on age, experience and type of boat.

GROUP C

- e) Races approved by the Executive Committee but organised by outside bodies such as the D.W. Committee.

MARATHON RACING

4. CLUB MEMBERSHIP

When a competitor is a member of more than one club, he shall declare before 1st September to the Race Records Officer of the Executive Committee the name of the club for whom he will race that year. When a competitor changes his club in mid season, he is permitted to compete for his new club, instead of his old, provided that prior consent of the old club be obtained. This consent shall not be withheld unreasonably, particularly in the case of a change of residence from one area to another. The agreed change must be advised to the Race Records Officer in writing before points can be allocated to the new club in club competitions.

5. SAFETY

Competitor responsibility

- a) Competitors must render their boats sufficiently buoyant to remain afloat and to support the crew in rough water in the event of a capsize.
- b) Competitors must be able to swim adequately in the waters on which the race is being held.
- c) On open water adequate spray covers must be worn.
- d) All paddlers are required to render assistance to other competitors in distress.
- e) The wearing of life jackets or buoyancy aids is compulsory for all paddlers ranked in divisions 7, 8 and 9 irrespective of the race they are entered in. This applies to singles and doubles races. The penalty for breaking this rule is disqualification from the race.
- f) Life jackets and buoyancy aids will conform to BCU/BCMA STANDARD BA83.

Team Leader responsibility

- g) Team Leaders should decide if paddlers, under 16 years of age, in the higher divisions should wear life jackets or buoyancy aids.

Race Organiser responsibility

- h) Race organisers may require life jackets or buoyancy aids to be worn and will have the FINAL say as to who should wear them (except where this is covered by rule 5e) depending on weather and water conditions. Such equipment must be provided by the competitors.

6. DISCIPLINE

Marathon racing is subject to the BCU Disciplinary Code [see index].

7. DRUGS

Marathon racing is subject to the BCU Doping Control Rules [see index].

8. BROKEN PADDLES/BOAT

A competitor must not change boats during a race, but may change paddles in the case of breakage.

9. WASH HANGING

Competitors must not hang on the washes of powered craft.

10. ASSISTANCE TO COMPETITORS

A competitor may receive food and drink during a race, but no other assistance unless permitted by the organiser. This applies particularly to help at portages.

11. BOAT DESIGNS

Any type of canoe or kayak can be used.

Kayaks shall be propelled solely by means of double bladed paddles.

Canoes shall be propelled solely by means of single bladed paddles.

The paddles must not be attached to the boat in any way, being supported only by the hands.

For GROUP A races boats must comply with the ICF regulations as detailed below :-

single kayak	max length 520cm
double kayak	max length 650cm
single canoe	max length 520cm
double canoe	max length 650cm
double touring canoe	max length 550cm

Boats over 460cm in length must not have concave sections unless classified as Wild Water Racing boats and falling within the ICF regulations for such boats.

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12. BCU MEMBERSHIP

All competitors in GROUP A races must be COMPREHENSIVE BCU, WCA, SCA or CANI members. Membership numbers must be quoted on entries and results and a valid membership card or photocopy **must** be produced at race check in. Those unable to prove membership will be required to pay an extra Event Fee of a minimum of £2.00 and a maximum of £5.00. This covers the organisers for insurance purposes.

The exceptions are juniors ranked in divisions 7, 8 & 9 who are members of clubs with registered junior sections who should produce their registered junior section card instead.

Upon promotion to Division 6 there is a period of grace of 4 weeks during which a junior, racing with a registered junior section card, must become an individual comprehensive member of the BCU/WCA/SCA/CANI.

13. RACE LEVY SCHEME

At all GROUP A races, published in the Canoe Racing Handbook, there will be a race levy of £1.00 for each senior paddler by age, as recognised by their BCU, WCA, SCA or CANI membership, & 50p for each junior paddler by age, as recognised by their membership. The levy to be charged on all paddlers booked in irrespective of whether they start or finish the race. For divisional races (3a) the race organiser is to remit the race levy together with the race results to the Regional Hasler Adviser. For other races (3b) and (3c) the race organiser is to remit the race levy together with the race results direct to the Race Records Officer. **All levies to be sent within 7 days of the race.** Cheques to be made payable to the BCU Marathon Racing Committee.

14. RACE REGISTRATION

The organiser of a GROUP A race must apply for that race to be registered. This must be done by the autumn of the year preceding the event. The event must be organised and run under the Marathon Racing Rules. Registered races may advertise through the Union and may appeal through the Executive Committee in cases of dispute or difficulty. [See also BCU Disciplinary Code]. The registration fee will be the race levy described in rule 13.

15. BOAT NUMBERING

At all GROUP A races a competitor shall number his boat for a race in the following manner. The number plate will be yellow and displayed vertically in a slot placed on the middle of the back deck about 500cm behind the cockpit in the case of kayaks and on the front deck in the case of canoes. The slot will be fitted with a locking pin. The characters on the vertical number plate will be the same standard as a car number plate. The dimensions of the plate will be 200mm long x 150mm high with the top corners rounded to a 10mm radius.

Paddlers ranked in divisions 1-8 not displaying vertical number plates will not score club points. Paddlers ranked in Division 9, club and fun race paddlers may alternatively use 225mm diameter white discs which should be displayed on fore and aft decks or as directed by the organiser.

16. ASSESSMENT RACES

Assessment races will be picked by the Executive Committee as the most suitable races for determining the members of British teams and the race organisers will be advised by March 1st each year via the Canoe Racing Handbook. At these races, assessment classes may be separated from other race classes and may be run over the same or different courses.

17. ORGANISATION OF GROUP A RACES

- a) Organisers **must** be affiliated to the British Canoe Union.
- b) The race shall be open to amateur canoeists who are members of an ICF affiliated federation.
- b) The race shall be properly advertised and the organisers shall issue adequate instructions on request, up to one month before the event, to prospective competitors or interested group leaders.
- c) After the race the organisers shall issue complete results sheets to all competitors who provide stamped, addressed envelopes.
- d) In the event of circumstances which render it impossible or unsafe to run the race as planned, the organisers shall take all reasonable steps to inform the competitors and supporters at the earliest possible moment.
- e) Organisers shall charge an entry fee for each competitor to include the levy cost. This fee may be reduced for juniors or augmented for late entries.
- f) **WITHIN 7 DAYS OF THE RACE** the organisers must remit the race levy together with the race results in accordance with rule 13.
- g) Changes of class/division and late entries shall be permitted if the organiser so wishes. Information regarding late entries and class/division changes should be available to competitors at least 30 minutes before the start time of the class/division concerned.

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- h) The race organisers shall provide a Protest Committee consisting of four officials or members of the organising body to hear and settle all protests by any competitor in that event. The following rules will be observed:-
 - i) The protests must be received within 30 minutes of completion of the relevant race and before the announcement of the final results. Failure to observe this will invalidate the protest.
 - ii) The protest must be in writing to an officer of the organising body and must give full details of the alleged infringement of the rules.
 - iii) The Protest Committee must meet immediately to hear all the evidence and to consider the protest's validity in accordance with the BCU and Marathon Racing Rules.
- i) A protest against an organising body may only be dealt with by the Executive Committee. Any such protest must be made immediately and in writing to the Secretary of the Executive Committee and give full details of the alleged infringement of the rules. The person making the protest must also inform the secretary of the club or body concerned. Failure to comply with these conditions will invalidate the protest.
- j) Appeals against the decision of the Protest Committee are permitted and these will be heard by the Executive Committee.

18. ORGANISATION OF GROUP B RACES

- a) For these races competitors do not have to be BCU, WCA, SCA or CANI members, there is no levy and no requirement to submit results to the race records officer. Race advertising, entry fees and classes are at the discretion of the organiser. The formal requirements to register club membership and for protest procedures are not necessary.
- b) Rules 1, 2, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 11 shall apply to all GROUP B races.

Rules Applying to Regional Divisional Races

- 19. Regional divisional races are GROUP A races and all of rules 1 -17 above shall apply.

20. THE DIVISIONAL SYSTEM

- a) At a divisional event there are separate singles races for each of divisions 1 - 9 and separate doubles races for divisions 1/2, 3/4, 5/6, 7/8 and 9.
- b) It is recommended that entry into the divisional system should be based on the standards detailed in the Sprint Section "Standards for Racing".
- c) Each year a divisional list will be published in the Racing Handbook for divisions 1-8. These lists are checked and any paddler not having competed for two successive seasons is removed from the lists. Each autumn clubs are asked to submit a list of the paddlers who will not be active for the coming season and where appropriate, to amend a draft of the proposed divisional lists.

21. TYPES OF COURSE

Whilst there will be some variations due to local conditions and types of course available, the normal distances will be:-

Div.1, 2 & 3 Singles, 1/2 & 3/4 Doubles

Full senior course of about 20km with any degree of severity.

Div.4, 5 & 6 Singles, 5/6 Doubles

Course of about 13km which may include portages and/or weir shoots.

Div.7, 8 & 9 Singles, 7/8 & 9 Doubles

Course of about 6.5km with the minimum practical hazards.

22. SPECIAL PRIZES

Race organisers are encouraged to give prizes for special groups of paddlers. eg. First under 16, First C1. In particular they are strongly recommended to give a prize for the first woman in each division and for the highest placed TC2. This kind of encouragement is particularly important in the divisional system.

23. SEPARATE STARTS

Each class of six or more starters must start separately.

24. HANDICAP SYSTEM FOR LOW ENTRIES

If there are less than three entries in a division then the organiser will transfer those entries to another division. Where possible they should be transferred to a race of the same distance so that paddlers are not required to race further than they originally entered. Where there is a choice, transfer to a lower division is

preferable to transfer to a higher division. A handicap (if moved down) or an allowance (if moved up) will be used to calculate the results. Transferred paddlers racing in a different division will count for prizes but will be ignored in calculating promotions and 'D' notices. The handicap or allowance, per division moved, to be:-

20km course	3 minutes for singles ; 6 minutes for doubles
13km course	2 minutes for singles ; 4 minutes for doubles
6.5km course	1 minute for singles ; 2 minutes for doubles

25. COMPETING IN A CREW BOAT

A paddler is normally ranked on singles performances. However when competing in doubles events the competition ranking shall be the average of the paddlers individual rankings (all halves rounded down). All paddlers competing in crew boats must show their singles ranking on the entry form and these rankings **must** be shown on the results.

eg. Paddler A = Div.5 and Paddler B = Div.8. $5 + 8 = 13$, average = $6\frac{1}{2}$ so the competition ranking = 6 and the entry would be div.5/6

26. PROMOTIONS

a) The Executive Committee has discretion to promote at any time when it is found to be necessary. This duty is delegated to the Ranking Officer.

b) Promotions may take place on either singles or doubles performances.

c) Status in canoe will not affect status in kayak and vice versa.

d) Generally no woman or canoe paddler will be promoted higher than division 3 and no junior kayak paddler higher than division 2.

e) Promotions between the divisions throughout the season will be calculated as follows on the basis of singles results

Divisions 8 & 9

All finishers whose time is equal to or faster than the fastest paddler not promoted in the next higher division + 3 minutes, are promoted to the higher division provided that there are a minimum of 5 starters in that higher division.

Division 7

Promotions will be made at the discretion of the Regional Hasler Adviser of the region in which the race takes place. The Regional Adviser's decision will take into account the performance of the paddler compared with the regional division 6 paddlers. If any paddler or team leader feels that this has resulted in an inappropriate promotion they should appeal to the ranking officer to correct the situation.

Divisions 5 & 6

All finishers whose time is equal to or faster than the fastest paddler not promoted in the next higher division + 4 minutes, are promoted to that higher division provided that there are a minimum of 5 starters in that higher division.

Divs. 1, 2, 3 & 4

Promotions between divisions 1, 2, 3 and 4 will be decided by the ranking officer and can be made at any time. They will be determined in conjunction with the national and regional coaches and will be based on performance in all races.

f) Promotions are not limited to one division. For example, a division 9 paddler with a time within 3 minutes of the division 7 winner would be promoted straight to Division 7. Similarly a Division 6 paddler with an appropriate time could be promoted to division 4.

g) The lower limit of 5 paddlers to render a race quorate for promotion purposes, as described above, is intended to ensure that the winner's time is a realistic one for that division. However the Regional Hasler Adviser may amend or dispense with this limit if persistent low numbers in a division are clearly preventing the promotion system from operating as intended.

h) Since there are not usually any promotions from division 7 to division 6 or from division 4 to division 3 on the day, it is normally the winner of division 7 whose time is used for calculating promotions from division 8 to 7 and the winner of division 4 whose time is used for calculating promotions from division 5 to 4. These promotion calculations hold good even if subsequently the ranking officer does promote the winner of division 7 and others to division 6 and the winner of division 4 and others to division 3.

i) Once promoted paddlers **must** race in their correct division, or higher division, except under the provisions of rules 24 or 25. Any competitor found racing in a lower division, singles or doubles, except under the provisions of rules 24 and 25, may be disqualified from the event and be banned from marathon competition for 12 months from the date of the event when the misdemeanor took place.

j) All paddlers, both from within the region and from other regions are eligible for promotions. The only exceptions are paddlers transferred from another division under rule 24 (handicap system for low entries).

27. DEMOTIONS

a) The Executive Committee has discretion to demote where this is found to be necessary.

b) Demotions between divisions 4 to 9 throughout the season will be calculated as follows.

MARATHON RACING

All those finishing a singles race with a time slower than the fastest paddler in the division not promoted, + 10% will be designated 'D'. With 3 'D' notices a paddler will be automatically demoted to the next lower division.

- c) Demotions between divisions 1, 2, 3 & 4 will be determined by the ranking officer in conjunction with the national and regional coaches. It will be based on performance in all races.
- d) All paddlers, both from within the region and from other regions are eligible for 'D' notices. The only exceptions are paddlers transferred from another division under rule 24.

Rules Applying to Regional Hasler Races

28. Regional Hasler races are GROUP A Divisional races and all of rules 1-17 and 19-27 above shall apply.

29. THE HASLER TROPHY

The Hasler Trophy is the National Team League Championships and is competed for throughout the season (1st September-31st August) on a regional basis. There is a national Hasler Final after the end of the season, usually in late September.

30. REGIONS

The regions are defined as the Sport England regions for England plus Scotland East, Scotland West, and Wales. Each region will run its own league championships throughout the year and will decide how many results are to be counted by clubs. It is hoped that eventually there will be enough races in each region for clubs to count their best 8 or 9 results from the total number of races.

31. DIVISIONS

Races for singles divisions 1-9 and doubles divisions 1/2, 3/4, 5/6, 7/8 and 9 must be held at all events except where varied as agreed with the Regional Hasler Advisor.

32. COMPETITORS

- a) Each club will be allowed as many competitors as it wishes.
- b) A paddler can only compete in one race in a qualifying event.

33. POINTS

- a) In regional races only those clubs within the region will score points. Paddlers from other regions will not be taken into account when calculating points except that their time will be used for the 110% or 115% calculations if they are the fastest boats not promoted.
- b) To be included for points, clubs must be affiliated to the British Canoe Union.
- c) All competitors in both singles and doubles **must** show their singles ranking at race check-in. Competitors not doing so will not score points in the regional competition and may not count the race as eligibility to compete in the final.
- d) The points system will be as follows.
 - i) Divisions 1-9 singles and 1/2, 3/4, 5/6, 7/8 & 9 doubles will count for points.
 - ii) Points will be awarded per paddler in both singles and doubles - 20 for 1st, 19 for 2nd, 18 for 3rd and so on down to 2 points for all paddlers who finish a singles race within 110% of the time of the fastest boat not promoted or who finish a doubles race within 115% of the time of the fastest boat not promoted. One point only for paddlers who finish outside the 110% or the 115% limit irrespective of their position. This to apply to all races except division 9 singles and doubles which will receive 20 for 1st, 19 for 2nd, 18 for 3rd and so on down to 2 points for all paddlers who finish.
 - iii) Transferred paddlers racing in a different division under the provisions of rule 24 will count for Hasler points.
 - iv) Paddlers in a separate assessment race at a Regional Hasler event will not score Hasler points.
 - v) Each club will count its six best scoring singles boats from any divisions and its three best scoring doubles boats from any divisions. Only the scores from three doubles boats can be counted even if some of these boats contain just one paddler who is eligible for Hasler points for a particular club.
 - vi) At each event the club with the highest score will get 10 regional points in the regional competition, 9 for 2nd and so on.

Rules Applying to the Hasler Final

34. The Hasler Final is a GROUP A Divisional race and all of rules 1-17 and 19-27 above shall apply except rule 25 (crew boats) that is replaced by rule 38.

MARATHON RACING

35. CLUB ELIGIBILITY

- a) The top 4 scoring clubs from each region (8 clubs from the combined Midlands region) as determined by the regional Hasler competitions, plus a team from the Combined Services and from the Isle of Wight, may compete in the Hasler Final at the end of the season. Additionally a team from the host club (or from each host club if there are two organising clubs) may compete if they have not qualified from the regional competition.
- b) Each eligible club will be allowed as many competitors in the final as it wishes.

36. PADDLER ELIGIBILITY

- a) A paddler must compete in 3 qualifying events at his or her current ranking, during the season (Sept 1st - Aug.31st), to be eligible for the final. The exceptions are Div. 1 senior kayaks, Div.2 junior kayaks, Div.3 women kayaks and Div.3 canoes who must compete in 2 qualifying events.
- b) Qualifying events are regional Hasler races including assessment classes. Also a paddler may count competing in the National Championships on one or both days as one qualifying race. The previous Hasler Final does **not** count as a qualifying race.
- c) The qualification must be in the same type of boat (ie canoe or kayak).
- d) Paddlers are only eligible to paddle in a singles race at the Hasler Final if they have competed in 3 qualifying events in singles. The exceptions are paddlers already ranked in their highest division (Div. 1 senior kayaks, Div.2 junior kayaks, Div.3 women kayaks and Div.3 canoes) although they must still comply with rule 36a.
- e) Regional Champions are eligible to compete in the final, provided they have complied with rule 36a, even if their club has not qualified for the final.
- f) A paddler can only compete in one race at the final.
- g) The Regional Hasler Adviser will check the eligibility of paddlers from his region for the final. The Race Records Officer will be able to produce listings on request to help clubs and Hasler Advisers carry out this task.

37. CLASSES

There will be races for singles divisions 1-9 and doubles divisions 1/2, 3/4, 5/6, 7/8 & 9.

38. COMPETING IN CREW BOATS

At the Hasler Final where crew members in doubles races are ranked in separate divisions they must race in the classification of the higher ranked paddler.

39. POINTS

- a) All competitors in singles and doubles **must** show their singles ranking on the entry form. Competitors not doing so will not score points.
- b) Clubs qualifying for the final will start the final competition with 1 point for each promotion gained by any of their members during the season (Sept. 1st - Aug.31st), up to a maximum of 12 points, irrespective of whether the promoted paddlers are racing in the final or not. These promotions may be automatic from race results or discretionary by the Hasler Adviser or Ranking Officer and can be from regional races or the National Championships. There will be no promotion points from promotions at the previous Hasler Final.
- c) Point scoring at the final will be as described in rule 33d (i), (ii), (iii) & (v).

40. TROPHIES

- a) The *Hasler Trophy* will be awarded to the club scoring the most points at the final including promotion points under rule 39b.
- b) The *Regional Trophy* will be awarded to the region with the highest aggregate score at the final (including promotion points under rule 39b) from their three highest scoring clubs.
- c) The *Adam Thomasson Trophy* will be awarded to the winner of the Div.2 race at the final.
- d) The *Ross Warland Memorial Trophy* will be awarded to the highest placed junior in Division 4 at the final.
- e) Individual Senior, Woman and Junior Regional Champions will be identified from the regional Hasler competitions. These will be the individuals scoring the highest number of points, in the appropriate division for the final trophy award, in their own regional races. These Regional Champions are eligible for the following trophies at the final :-
 - i) The *Rhodes White Trophy* will be awarded to the Senior Regional Champion who gains the most points in Div.1 at the final.
 - ii) The *David Shankland Trophy* will be awarded to the Woman Regional Champion who gains the most points in Div.3 at the final.
 - iii) The *Barber Trophy* will be awarded to the Junior Regional Champion who gains the most points in Div.2 at the final.

MARATHON RACING

Rules Applying to the National Championships

41. The National Championships is a GROUP A race and all of rules 1-17 above shall apply.

42. DEFINITION

- a) The National Championships shall be called *The British National Open Marathon Racing Individual and Team Championships* and will identify the various National Champions.
- b) There must be at least 3 entries for a National Championship or Divisional Championship race to take place.

43. PADDLER ELIGIBILITY

- a) Paddlers may compete in races specified for those of a higher ranking but will not be allowed to compete in races specified for those of a lower ranking. (Eg. An U18 may race as an U23 or Senior but not as an U16 or O35.)
- b) Senior and Veteran Women paddlers may compete in a doubles crew in Senior and Veteran Mens kayak races of the same or higher ranking.
- c) All ages are calculated at 1st January of the year of the Championships.

44. NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP CATEGORIES

a) There will be separate races for mens kayak, womens kayak and mens canoe in all age categories in both singles and doubles except for Under 14 Men where there is no singles canoe class.

- b) **Senior paddlers** will race over a course of approximately 26km. The winners of these races shall be deemed the:-

*Senior Mens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Senior Womens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Senior Mens National Canoe Marathon Champion of Great Britain.*

- c) **Paddlers aged under 23** will race over a course of approximately 26km. The winners of these races shall be deemed the:-

*Under 23 Mens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Under 23 Womens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Under 23 Mens National Canoe Champion of Great Britain.*

- d) **Paddlers aged under 18** will race over a course of approximately 20km. The winners of these races shall be deemed the:-

*Under 18 Mens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Under 18 Womens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Under 18 Mens National Canoe Marathon Champion of Great Britain.*

- e) **Paddlers aged under 16** will race over a course of approximately 13km. The winners of these races shall be deemed the:-

*Under 16 Mens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Under 16 Womens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Under 16 Mens National Canoe Champion of Great Britain.*

- f) **Paddlers aged under 14** will race over a course of approximately 6.5km. The winners of these races shall be deemed the:-

*Under 14 Mens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Under 14 Womens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Under 14 Mens National Canoe Marathon Champion of Great Britain.*

- g) **Paddlers aged 35 or over** will race over a course of approximately 20km. The winners of these races shall be deemed the:-

*Veteran Mens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Veteran Womens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Veteran Mens National Canoe Marathon Champion of Great Britain.*

- h) **Paddlers aged 45 or over** will race over a course of approximately 13km. The winners of these races shall be deemed the:-

*Over 45 Veteran Mens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Over 45 Veteran Womens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Over 45 Veteran Mens National Canoe Marathon Champion of Great Britain.*

- i) **Paddlers aged 55 or over** will race over a course of approximately 6.5km. The winners of these races shall be deemed the:-

*Over 55 Veteran Mens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.
Over 55 Veteran Womens National Kayak Marathon Champion of Great Britain.*

MARATHON RACING

Over 55 Veteran Mens National Canoe Marathon Champion of Great Britain.

- j) Where crew members in doubles races are in different categories they must race in a category for which they are both eligible.

45. DIVISIONAL CATEGORIES

- a) There will be separate races in singles for each of divisions 1-9 and in doubles for divisions 1&2, 3&4, 5&6, 7&8 and 9.
- b) Paddlers will race in their ranked division irrespective of age, sex or boat type.
- c) Paddlers in singles divisions 1, 2 & 3 and in doubles divisions 1&2 and 3&4 shall race over a course of approximately 20km.
- d) Paddlers in singles divisions 4, 5 & 6 and in doubles divisions 5&6 shall race over a course of approximately 13km.
- e) Paddlers in singles divisions 7, 8 & 9 and doubles divisions 7&8 and 9 shall race over a course of approximately 6.5km.
- f) The winners of these races shall be deemed *Divisional Champions*.
- g) Where crew members in a doubles race are ranked in different divisions the competition ranking shall be determined in accordance with rule 25.
- h) Where a race is inquorate [see rule 42b] the paddlers may transfer to another division as allowed by rule 24 but they will not be eligible for the Divisional Champion title or medals.

46. TEAM COMPETITION

- a) Points will be awarded per paddler both in singles and doubles races. 20 for the winner then 19, 18, 17 etc. down to one point for each finisher.
- b) All competitors in singles and doubles **must** show their singles ranking to be eligible for team points.
- c) A trophy, *The Spanish House*, will be awarded to the club scoring the most points at the National Championships.

47. PROMOTIONS & DEMOTIONS

Although no automatic promotions will take place at the championships, the Executive Committee may exercise their right under rules 26 and 27 to promote or demote on the basis of the results.

48. HASLER QUALIFICATION

The event will not count as a Regional Hasler event nor be used to allocate points for Regional Hasler competitions. However it may be counted by a paddler as a qualifying race for the Hasler Final and clubs may carry any promotion points gained to the Hasler Final.

PART C - THE STARTING OF ASSESSMENT RACES, NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS RACES AND HASLER FINALS RACES

There is a necessity to maintain the standard of starting at assessment races and major championships. The following will apply to all assessment races, to all races at the National Championships and to all races at the Hasler Finals.

1. REQUIREMENTS

- a) The start line should be clearly defined on both banks.
- b) A clearly defined marshalling line must be established behind the start line.
- c) The race must be started by a person drawn from the approved starters list, who will have an experienced assistant.
- d) The marshalling line should be controlled by at least two experienced officials.
- e) The above should all be equipped with PA equipment or loud hailers that it is the responsibility of the race organiser to provide.

2. STARTING PROCEEDURE

- a) An audible warning will be given 5 minutes before the first start. From that time on, no paddler is to pass in front of the marshalling line. All paddlers who are already in front of the marshalling line have 3 minutes to get behind it.

MARATHON RACING

- b) A second audible warning will be given 2 minutes before the first start. Any paddler in front of the marshalling line will be penalised. No paddler is to go in front of the marshalling line until instructed by the marshal.
- c) Once released by the marshal, the paddlers will be under the starter's control. Any paddler going in front of the start line before the 'GO' will be penalised.
- d) For each contravention of the above rules, a 2 minute penalty will be imposed.
- e) Note that the Marathon Team selectors have been instructed by the Executive Committee that they should use the results INCLUDING any penalty, as the basis for selection.

PART D - RECOMMENDATIONS

These recommendations are intended to guide organisers and others in the provision of acceptable races.

1. ADVANCE INFORMATION

Do not attempt to run a race without visiting a few to find out how things work. Advance information sent out to competitors and clubs should at least set out the following details.

- a) Name, date and status of the race.
- b) Name of the organising body.
- c) Closing date for entries and whether or not late entries will be accepted.
- d) Address to which entries and enquiries should be sent, and if possible a corresponding telephone number.
- e) Entry fees and to whom these should be payable.
- f) Locations of start and finish, and directions for getting to these places.
- g) Time of start and closure of checking in.
- h) Brief description of the course, sufficient to give a newcomer the general picture of the type of course and warning of any details of the course that they should inspect in advance.
- i) Any special regulations that competitors should be aware of before they arrive.
- j) Any major changes since last year.
- k) An entry form asking for full details of competitors. (Specimen race details follow these recommendations).

2. SAFETY

Safety measures are largely at the discretion of the organiser, since adequate measures vary considerably with course and conditions. Unnecessary precautions are wasteful and irksome, but inadequate precautions can lead to disaster. It is a stipulation that all paddlers ranked in Divisions 7, 8 and 9 wear a buoyancy aid [Rule B5 (e)]. On the open sea it is probably wise to insist on buoyancy aids for all. On open water, rescue boats are very important. It does not take long to paddle half a mile out to sea, but it takes a long time to swim back, especially in cold water. A weir may be trivial to a fresh paddler but a different story to one who has just raced 15 miles. It is sometimes a good idea to position frogmen below a weir to pull people and equipment out as they drift past, but make sure that all rescuers are competent. An incompetent rescuer can be more of a hindrance than a help. An important precaution is to make sure that no-one is stranded or lost halfway round the course. On open water races it is important to account for everyone. On calm water it is usually sufficient to have a back marker paddle over the course at the tail of the race.

3. BRIEFING AND CONTROL

a) There may be a wide range of ambitions present at the race - some people go for a pleasant paddle, some with Olympic hopes. Try not to let them stumble over each other. Both parties are aggravated when a fast crew is confronted by a slow crew blocking a critical portage. Let the fast classes start first. Local conditions and variations in the course for different classes should be taken into consideration when arranging the start order.

MARATHON RACING

- b) Every boat should be inspected at check-in to ensure it is numbered clearly, correctly and durably. Although it is the competitor's responsibility to number their boat, it is human nature that some will fail in this responsibility. Have with you the wherewithal to number boats and use it when the occasion demands.
- c) It is customary to deliver a briefing shortly before the race. This is the time to explain the starting procedure and order, to describe any special features of the race course and to emphasise any special regulations.
- d) Ensure that the course is clearly marked at all points where there could be doubt. Marshals should be positioned at turning points, and should tick off numbers on a check list. It is desirable to position marshals at portages and shoots. The marshals should keep the passage clear for competitors, keep spectators and competitors off forbidden land and report any misdemeanors to race control. A marshal's directions should override any prior instructions. A marshal should be clearly identifiable.

4. STARTING

- a) A clean start is important and difficult to achieve. Most people can start the lower ranks of competitors in order but a strong personality is needed to keep those in higher divisions in good order. The starter must never lose control of the start, either through physical inability to make himself heard, or through weakness of will. Preferably get an experienced racer to start your race and supply him with a megaphone. Do not be bullied by the competitors. They often try out the strength of the starter while waiting on the line. In the very last resort you can disqualify on the spot. On the other hand do not keep the competitors hanging around unnecessarily. They are often nervous before a race, may be getting cold or just plain bored. In fast water or wind it is often difficult for them to hold their positions. If you have got them into a fair line then start without further delay. Say 'READY GO'.
- b) Massed starts are good value for bullfighting addicts but can be bad for competitors. Do not start classes together if it means overcrowding the start line. In Regional Divisional races each class of six or more boats must start separately [Rule 23].
- c) Record the time of the start of each class. Do not use a system which relies on a set start time. You cannot guarantee starting on the exact second.

5. FINISHING & RESULTS

- a) Mark the finishing line clearly and signify a crossing of the line audibly, by bell, whistle or some such device. It is not always obvious to the paddler exactly where the finishing line is, particularly as they may be exhausted.
- b) Have a reliable clock which is readable and have a backup in case of malfunctions. Make a record of the finishing order of every boat as it passes the finishing line. Have one person making an independent list of boat numbers. Another should make a list of boat numbers and finishing times: this person should have a pad of paper with each sheet numbered in advance so that you will know later if any sheet has been mislaid. On each sheet mark, say, ten lines. When a boat finishes, record its number and finishing time alongside. Never mind computation at this stage, your hands will be full recording the finishing order correctly. When a page is full pass it to someone else to analyse.
- c) It is useful to have a portable cassette recorder running constantly at the finish line. You can record everything that happens at the finish and the tape can be used to check the finish order and timing if for any reason the finishing team becomes overwhelmed by mass finishes. Give the recorder to one of the finish team and tell them to 'talk' every boat over the line, giving number and time.
- d) Have someone out of the wind and rain and away from possible distraction from paddlers, to analyse your finishing results. Arrange a system for displaying the results as soon as you know them. If there are any errors the paddlers will usually spot them, and they can be queried before prize giving. Have a results display system that is not dependant on good weather. The thing that competitors want to see quickly is a list of finishing order with overall times. Other details such as start and finish times are essentially irrelevant and only clutter the display. Have the prize giving as soon as possible and announce any divisional promotions at this stage.

6. AFTER THE EVENT

- a) After the event is over, buckle to and get the final result sheet sorted out. If you put it off, your memory will dim, pieces of paper will get lost, your enthusiasm will wane and competitors will get very cross.
- b) Result sheets should be arranged by divisions in finishing order and should show position, name, division ranking, club, BCU number, points and promotions to higher divisions. Three flow charts follow this section to aid the calculation of promotions, demotions and Hasler points. Totals of points scored by clubs should also be shown although these will be verified by the Hasler Advisor. [A specimen results sheet extract follows].

MARATHON RACING

c) The race organiser should record at the top of the result sheet the number of paddlers who have entered the race. For regional Hasler races, four copies of the results, together with the race levy, should be sent to the regional Hasler Advisor. The Advisor will check/correct promotions and Hasler points before sending the results on to the Race Records Officer and the Ranking Officer. For other races the results and levy should be sent direct to the Race Records Officer. Results and levy in either case to be sent within the 7 days stipulated [Rule 13].

PART E - VENUE AND ORGANISATIONAL CRITERIA FOR THE NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS AND THE HASLER FINALS

The Marathon Committee will look to the following ideal criteria when considering applications for the hosting of the National Championships and the Hasler Finals. Any club wishing to host the National Championships or the Hasler Finals will be expected to make a short presentation to the half year meeting outlining their proposals for the course and organisation to meet these criteria.

1. THE COURSE

- a) The course should be wide enough at the start to provide a fair start for all paddlers. It should also be wide enough throughout its length for competitors to overtake and pass each other in opposite directions.
- b) The course should be capable of being paddled in an understern rudder boat.
- c) Portages should allow a minimum of 12 metres at the 'get out' and 'get in' points. Portages should not be of excessive number or length.
- d) Access to portage areas for spectators should be good with adequate parking, or pool transport should be provided.
- e) The course should be reasonably accessible for spectator viewing.
- f) There should not be too many other conflicting water users.

2. ORGANISATION

- a) The organising club(s) should have a proven track record in organising normal Divisional marathon races.
- b) The venue should have good access by road and not be too far for the majority of paddlers to travel.
- c) There should be adequate camping facilities nearby, particularly for the two day National Championships.
- d) There should be adequate parking at the start and finish.
- e) There should be adequate covered checking-in and refreshment areas at the start and finish and a results display area.
- f) There should be adequate toilet facilities at the start and finish areas.
- g) There should be an adequate PA system at the start, briefing and prize giving areas.
- h) There should be adequate First Aid cover in appropriate areas.
- i) The starting of all races is to be as the procedure set out in PART C.
- j) There should be a computerised results facility capable of showing class results and team scores immediately after the races.
- k) Prizes at the National Championships will be the official BCU National Marathon Championship medals and Divisional medals.
- l) Prizes at the Hasler Finals will be the official BCU Hasler Finals medals.

MARATHON RACING

BCU MEMBERSHIP AND EVENT TICKETS

All seniors must be full members of the BCU if they wish to race in a Marathon event that has been advertised in the Calendar. Juniors who are ranked in division 6 or above must also hold full youth membership.

A junior club member need not be a full member of the BCU in order to race in the lower divisions (7,8 & 9) of the Marathon racing system or in the other 2 categories of marathon races. He must, however, be a member a club with a registered junior section and the number used for his or her identification will be the club's affiliation number followed by his own individual club number. This method of recording the juniors' numbers on the result sheet has proved cumbersome so it is advised that the club abbreviation followed by the paddler's club number is easier and preferred by the Records Officer, both for identification and ease of recording. i.e. LIN/005, CHE/017.

Should he be promoted however into a higher division (6 & upwards) he must then become a full member of the BCU in his or her own right.

Race Organisers **MUST** still check that his or her membership is current either by photocopy of membership with entry or seeing the card on the day of the race.

If the card is unavailable or forgotten the paddler may purchase an "Event Ticket" as a "stop gap" but only once per season. The records officer carries out a check on event ticket issue for all race results and those paddlers abusing this system will be penalised.

The system is as follows:

1. The tickets are for use by non-members at the entry level only of National Competitions requiring membership i.e. Divisional Racing.
2. For use at a BCU event when the organiser believes a participant may be a member but the member cannot provide proof by way of a membership card.
3. Event organisers set fees, minimum £2.00 and maximum £5.00. In every case £1.50 will be sent to the organiser's regional treasurer and the rest kept by the organising committee
4. Event Ticket fees are not refundable
5. The overall consideration is to encourage, in the best possible way, membership of the Country's Governing Body for Canoesport.

The task of keeping records and working out promotions is becoming increasingly more time consuming. 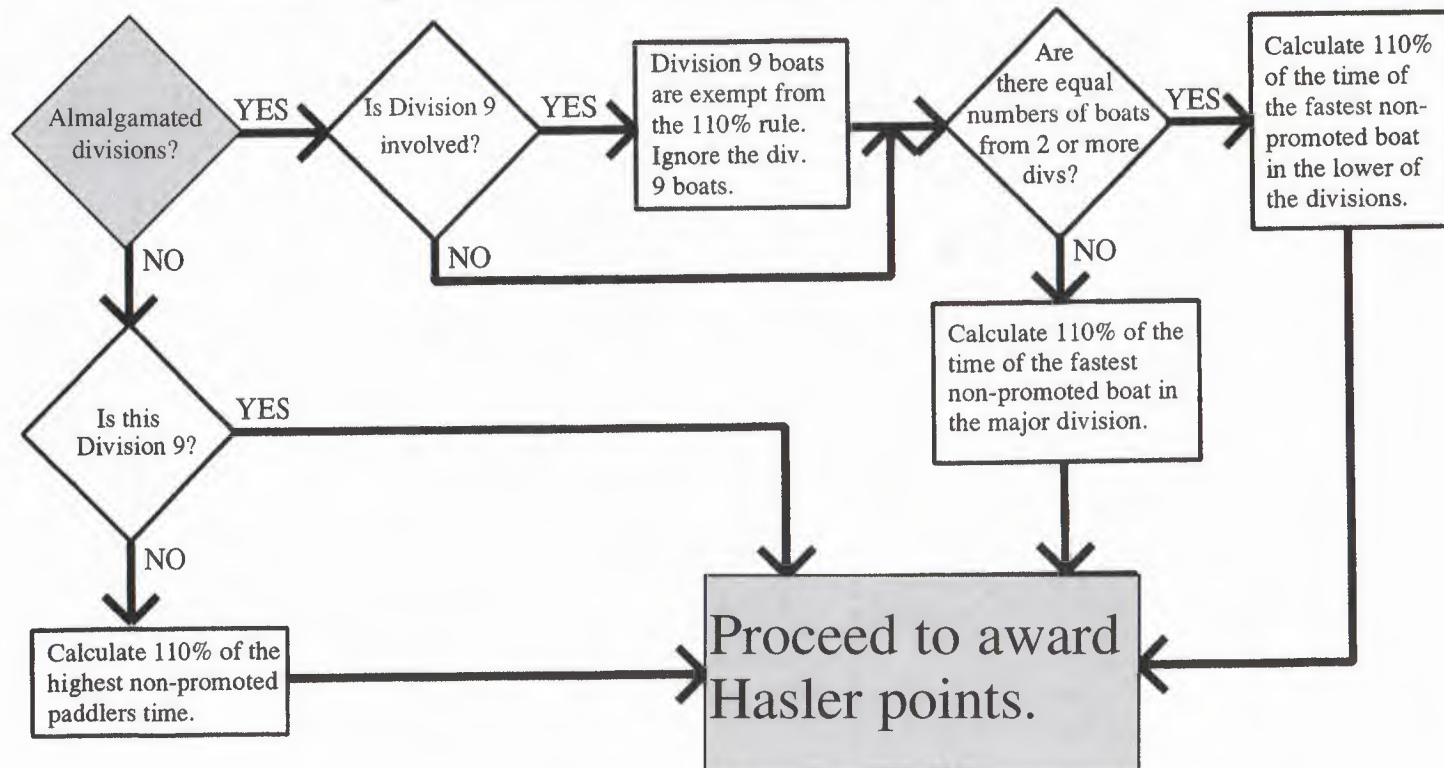

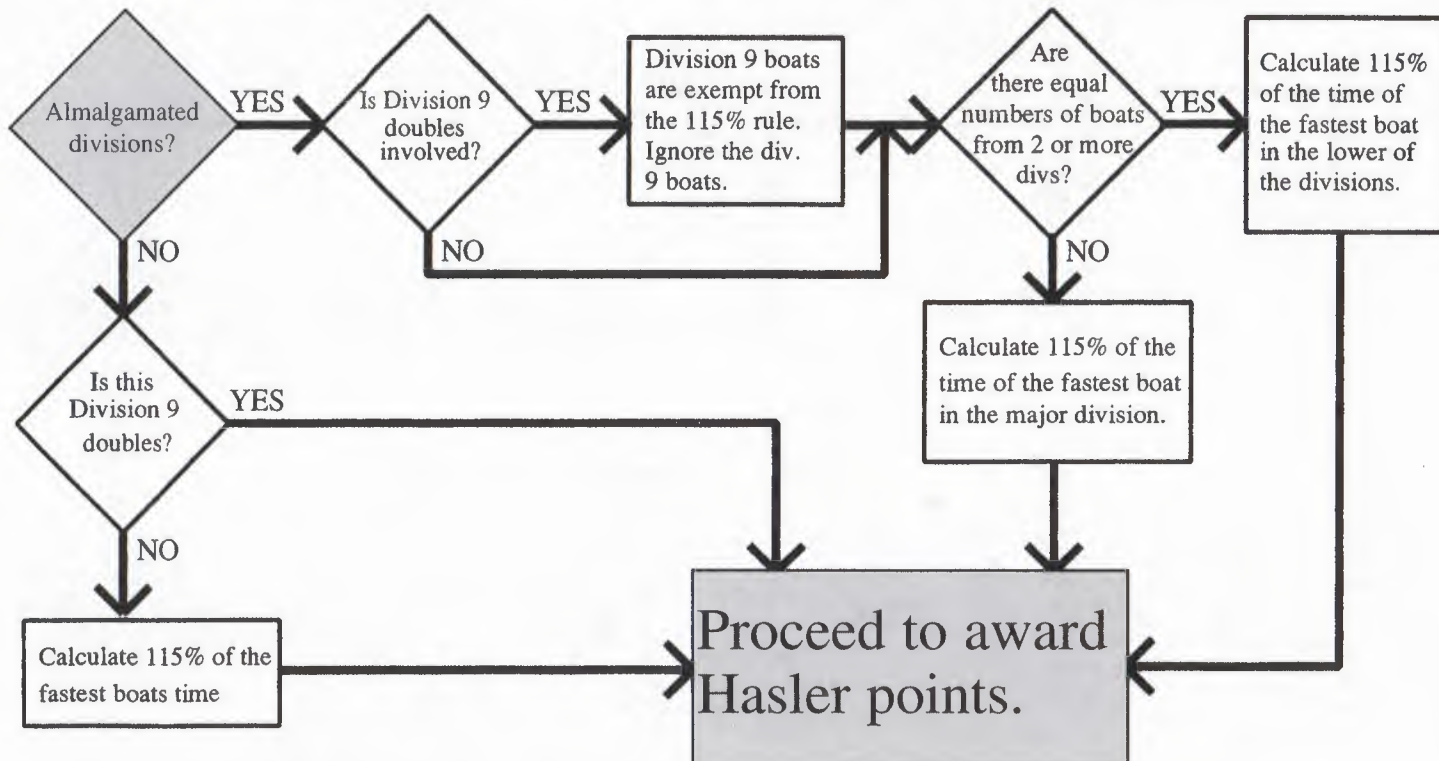

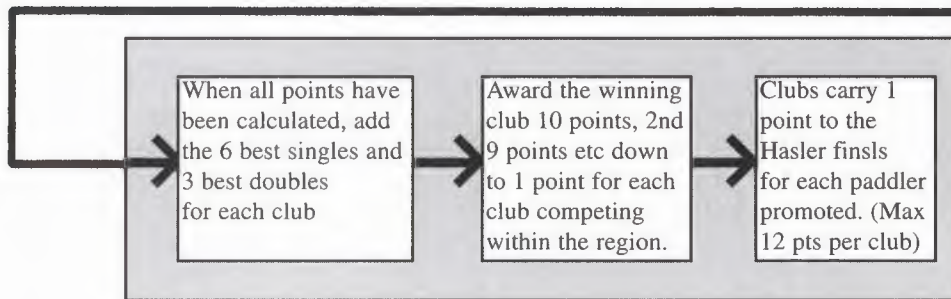
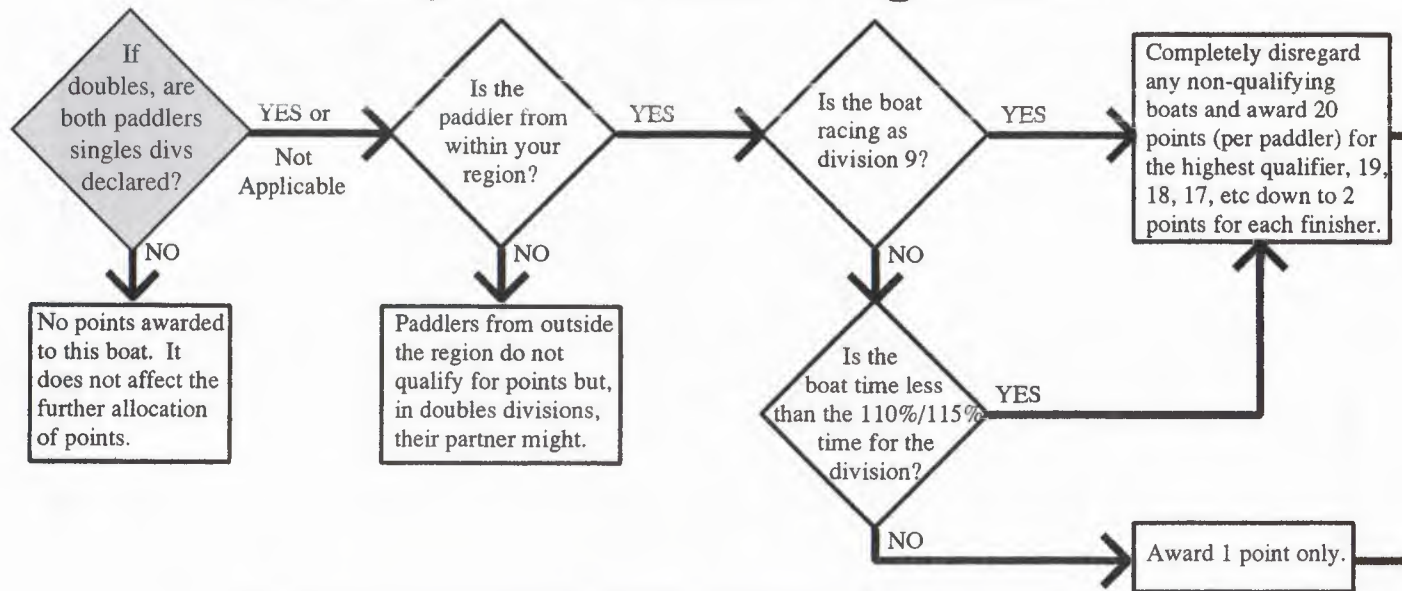
Calculating the 110% for Hasler points in singles

The Ranking System

The purpose of the promotional system within the divisional system is to have every paddler competing in the correct division for his/her personal ability, and thereby gaining maximum advantage from their racing.

The administration of the system has seen continued improvement over the last few years, and with continued co-operation of the Regional and National Advisors, Race Organisers, and Club Team Leaders, this should continue into 2002. The prompt return of the race results and levies by the Race Organisers to the Hasler Advisers is **crucial**, and the one area which still continues to need improvement. The quicker these are received (using a fax or e-mail are the quickest methods), the quicker they can be processed through the system, and confirmation of promotions made before paddlers race again.

The Divisional Lists have been updated after each set of results has been received by the Records Officer during 2001. However, not all Club Listings (45 out of 90) were returned by the Club Team Leaders by the closing date for inclusion in the Year Book so inevitably there will be some errors. If you feel that the promotion/demotion system will not serve to correct these errors quickly enough, please contact the Divisions Officer (address elsewhere in this handbook) stating the nature of the problem.

If you think that your divisional updates and the Marathon Newsletter are not getting to the Team Leader of your club, please let the Records Officer know so that the records can be updated.

In addition, by request from Race Organisers, a list of clubs with abbreviations used by the Marathon Committee has been included. Please note that these have now been standardised and should be the same as the abbreviations used by the Sprint Committee
